Chief of Detectives Is Firmly Convinced Wall Street Tragedy Prearranged.

New York, Sept. 23.—While investigators were still seeking to solve the mystery of the Wall street explosion of a week ago, police head-quarters announced a package conquarters announced a package con-taining dynamite had been found to-day on the platform of the Reed Avenue Elevated Station in Brook-

The bureau of combustibles at poline bureau of combustibles at po-lice headquarters announced that the dynamite package was a bomb with fuse attached and burning when a patrolman found it and "put it out." investigation into "planting" of the bomb was started immediately.

New York, Sept. 23 .- After one week of investigation of the explosion that spread death and terror in Wall street last Thursday, officials today still groped for light that might lead them to a solution of the mystery. Literally scores of clues, stories and conjectures have been sifted by operatives of the department of justice and local authorities without result. Despite the varied stories, however, William J. Flynn, chief of the department of justice agents. of the department of justice agents, was as positive as ever today that the tragely was the result of a pre-arranged plot of anarchists. He characterized as "plain bunk" renewed stories that it was accidental, and predicted that those responsible for the disaster would ultimately be brought to justice. "It was mately be brought to justice. "It was a criminal outrage," he declared. "We are positive of that, and we are going ahead on that theory."

CHICAGO POLICE FIND DYNAMITE WAS TAKEN

Chicago, Sept. 23.—Department of justice agents and police seeking clues here in connection with the New York bomb explosion speeded up their inquiry today, following discovery that 150 pounds of dynamite had been stolen on September 5 from the Astna Explosive Company at Lambert, Ill.

SEES BIG CHANCE Members of the Commission FOR TRADE IN BRITISH INDIA

Bombay Resident At Chamber of Commerce Luncheon Discusses Situation.

N. R. Chavre of Hombay, a young and well-educated high-caste Indian, a graduate of the Michigan University, who has a vision of a wonderful future for his native land, addressed the members' council of the local Chamber of Commerce at luncheon held in the Tecummerce at juncheon heid in the Tectur-seh House at noon today. Although he touched on the history and development of the people of India, and explained many of the native customs, he spoke chiefly on Canada's commercial oppor-tunities in India. His talk was illustunities in India. His talk was lifus-trated by many lantern slides.

Although he received much of his edu-cation in the United States, and has intentions of taking an M. E. degree in that country, on his return from India, where he is going in a month's time, Mr. Chavre gave evidence of an intense loy-alty to the British Empire.

A Rich Fleig.

To illustrate how far Canada was behind in her commercial endeavors in that wealthy country, he quoted figures showing that in 1918 and 1919 Canada's snowing that in 1915 and 1919 Canada's exports to India amounted only to \$166,000, compared to \$52,400,000 from the United States in the same period. In the two years named India exported to Canada raw material amounting to \$7,-840,000, and to the United States \$107,

70,000.

The United States, he said, is making most of its chances and endeavor The United States, he said is the most of its chances and endeavoring to establish a permanent trade with India. Some years ago practically all the goods used in that country were of British manufacture. Immediately prior to the war Germany had captured the Indian market wholly, and during the progress of the war Japan made a determined attempt to get in on the ground floor. The Japs showed beautiful samples, but when the goods arrived they proved to be of inferior. ground floor. The Japs showed beautiful samples, but when the goods arrived they proved to be of inferior quality. By their duplicity, he said, the Japs defeated their own ends. At the present time Japan is not considered a serious factor in India's trade.

CONCLUDES ITS CASE

MAY GO TO HAMILTON

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—(Canadian Press).

The case of the Bell Telephone Company in support of its application for increased rates was concluded this morning. In concluding the case, Glyn Osler, counsel for the company, stated that he might have to call one or two more witnesses when the next hearing took place, but that, generally speaking, the company had finished. Only one witness was called this morning, H. G. Atwater, rate engineer for the American Telegraph and Telephone Company, with offices in New York, who testified to the method adopted at arriving at the proposed new rates. Before adjournment today, it was agreed that interests opposing the application would be permitted to send a representative down to New York to inspect Mr. Atwater's records and verify them.

Although there was no definite decision regarding the date when the hearing of the application will be resumed. sion regarding the date when the hearing of the application will be resumed, it is practically certain that the next sitting will take place in Toronto on November 4. Chief Commissioner Carvell said that he was anxious to go vell said that he was anxious to go ahead with the case immediately upon his return from the west, and that he thought November 4 would be the best date to continue. The first hearing would be in Toronto, after which the board would go to Hamilton, if there was any great demand for a hearing in that city. Early the next week a sitting would be held in Montreal, and the final sitting would take place in Ottawa.

METAL WORKERS ARE AGAINST AGREEMENT

Claim They Acted On Instructions.

London, Sept. 24.—A referendum of the strikers in Turin has resulted in the rejection of the agreement arrived at in Rome between the employers' representatives and the workers in the metal trades, says a Rome dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph today.

Occupation of the Fiat, Lencia and Dubost automobile works, the Anzaido aviation works and other factories, chiefly textile, will be continued the dispatch says.



APPEARANCE OF CORN MILLERAND BORER IN ELGIN CO. ALARMING U.S. GOVT.

The American Department of Agriculture Sends Experts To Michigan.

FEAR INFESTATION THERE

Drastic Measures May Be Taken To Prevent Spread Across Line.

Washington, Sept. 23 .- Discovery of the European corn borer in the vicinity of St. Thomas Ont., has caused the department of agriculture to send a staff of entomologists to Michigan to confer with local agricultural interests to forestall possible infestation of the corn crop in that state.

Experts of the bureau of entomology,

the department announced today are concerned over the appearance of the corn pest in Canada as certain sections of New York, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Pennsylvania already have been quarantined to keep the insect from making its way to the corn belt. belt.

The corn borer in Canada is farther west than heretofore reported on this continent, the department's announcement said, and the corn affected is of the flint variety which in New England and New York has appeared to be especially susceptible of injury by the borer.





PLAN TO REPLACE **ALL 4-INCH MAINS** WITH LARGE ONES

Utilities Commissioners Will Secure Estimates of Cost At Once.

Replacing four-inch mains with others eight or ten inches in diameter will be considered by the public utilities commission at an early date, according to Commissioner F. G. Mitchell. While the

Mf. Mitchell also advocated connecting any "stub ends" which may exist and making complete circuits of them.

Both of these are necessary steps if the city is to have adequate fire protection, he asserted. Referring to the recent Collegiate fire, he said that the public utilities commission was quite prepared for an investigation, as the official gauges would show that an adequate water pressure had been maintained. He admitted, however, that the pressure in the mains near the Collegiate might have been less than in the downtown mains, as they are much smaller.

"It is for that reason I think they should be replaced by larger oner." he said. "The four-inch mains were laid when the city was much smaller than it is now. The demand which they must supply has increased steadily, and they are wholly inadequate. When it comes to fighting a fire with them it is found to be almost impossible."

In Ottawa, the present rate of \$49.50 was increased to \$54. OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—(Canadian Press) Hearing of the Bell Telephone Company's application for an increase in rates was not concluded by the board of railway commissioners today. When adjournment was taken, shortly after 5 o'clock, the company still had one witness to produce in order to complete the establishment of its case. It is probable that the taking of evidence will be concluded by noon tomorrow. The next sitting will not take place until early in November, because Chief Commissioner Carvell leaves on Saturday for the West, and he will not conclude western sittings for the board before the end of October. Meanwhile, accountants are to examine books of the

for the West, and he will not conclude western sittings for the board before the end of October. Meanwhile, accountants are to examine books of the company and produce all the statistical statements that have been demanded by opposing counsel.

Long-Distance Calls.

The chief witness called today by the company was N. M. Lash, chief engineer, who was called to demonstrate the greater items of costs in conducting a large telephone system other than increased cost of wages and materials. He dwelt particularly upon the increased complexity of the business and the ever-growing intricacies of long-distance telephony. He said that in the past the public had been satisfied to talk 300 or 400 miles. Now 2,000 or 3,000, miles was not unusual, and plants had to be able to take care of almost any distance. The cost of such telephoning was very great.

\$10,000,000 a Minimum.

Replying to questions by the chief commissioner, Mr. Lash said he was reasonably certain that \$10,000,000 are required annually by the company for the next two or three years, to meet

reasonably certain that \$10.000,000 are required annually by the company for the next two or three years, to meet the demands of the public.

This figure he put as an absolute minimum. He stated that it would take two years to install automatic telephones in any new exchange, and that it would be utterly impossible to think of substituting a complete system of automatics in Toronto or Montreal excepting at great cost.
