A Customs Ruling.

American shipping lines doing a carrying trade between New England not giving New Ontario a Normal ports and the Maritime Provinces have customs at St. John. N. B., in connection with a shipment of McClary stoves from this city to St. John via Boston in bond. The stoves were carried from Boston to St. John in an American vessel, but the customs ruling is that all goods shipped from any point in Canada to another Canadian point shall be transported in British registered vessels. Evidently some Ontario firms have found it cheaper at times to send goods to the Maritime Provinces via the rail and water route by way of New England than by the Canadian all-rail route. The American railroads and steamship companies which have been getting this traffic will be shut off from it if the ruling of the St. John collector is established. An Associated Press dispatch says that Secretary of the United States Treasury Shaw has been asked to make some agreement with Canada whereby the non-enforcement of the regulation will be brought about. This would be a very opportune occasion for the Canadian Government to call Mr. Shaw's attention to the vexatious ruling of his third assistant in the matter of Canadian exports to the United States. This ruling, as has been pointed out before, requires every consignee of Canadian goods in the United States to make an affidavit before a United It's mighty hard States customs collector or customs notary before he can receive his property. 

RICH GAME IN SUDAN

An Immense Preserve Laid Out by the British Government.

Cairo, Feb. 3. — The British officials in the Sudan have laid out an enormous game preserve, 300 miles long by 150 miles wide, speaking a proximate-ly. It is situated between the Blue and White branches of the N River and the Abyssinia frontier. In

game preservation department, in the Sudan Government, reports that the natives are beginning to realize the advantage and the necessity of this reservation, and the regulations have been loyally observed, so far as the Government can ascertain, but, being such an enormous area, and much of it inaccessible, the rules must be vio-lated to a considerable extent with-out the knowledge of the Government.
