AGE LIMITS

Any Man 20 Years Old On Date of Proclamation, Not 34 Before Jan. 1, 1917

Ottawa, Oct. 9-To clear up confusion with regard to the age limits of Class 1, which is to be called out by proclamation for service under the military service act on the 13th inst, the following announcement is made by the Milita Service Council: "For convenience Class 1 is fr quently spoken of as comprising u married men and widowers without children between the ages of 20 and 34. It is to be noted, however, that under the provisions of the statute, the method of fixing these two limits is different. So far as concerns the age of 20, the date of the proclam ation governs. Any man who, on tha date, has reached the age of 20 year is within the class. With regard to the limit of 34 years, however, thi is fixed by reference to the 1st of January, 1917. Any man who had not reached the age of 34 years be fore that date is within the class It is to be noted also that, for the purpose of the act, any man married after 6th of July, 1917, is to deemed to be unmarried."




