FAITH AND LOVE BETTER THAN DOUBT AND HATE

Canadian have faith in the future of their country. There are those who doubt, but they are in the minority. For the most part Canadians love rather than hate, but there are unfortunately a few who are inclined to hate. At the close of address delivered in London, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in one of the finest perorations ever given from a Canadian platform left this message for all Canadians, whether Liberal or Conservative, regardless of race or creed: "If you will permit me after a long life, I shall remind you that already many problems rise before you—problems of race division, problems of creed differences, problems of economic conflict, problems of national duty and national aspiration. Let me tell you that for the solution of these problems you have a safe guide, an unflinching light, if you remember that faith is better than doubt, and love is better than hate. Banish doubt and have from your life. Let your souls be ever open to the strong promptings of faith and the gentle influence of brotherly love. Be adamant against

the haughty; be gentle and kind to the weak. Let your aim and your purpose, in good report or in ill, in victory or in defeat, be so to live, so to strive so to serve and so to do your part to raise the standard of life to higher and better spheres."

Regardless of the tongue, no matter whether he casts his vote Liberal or Conservative, no difference, to what church one adheres, and without considering position, occupation or everyday work, this message should be heeded by all Canadians. Canada will be a better Canada if all remember that "faith is better than doubt, and love is better than hate."—The Farmer's Advocate.

The Western Front

The Germans are making desperate attempts to recover Douaumont, but have failed. The Crown Prince no longer has a pliant Falkenhayn at his back, and an unlimited number of men to sacrifice. Port Vaux is much more likely to fall than Douaumont. The French have begun to flank it on two sides. The tide has turned. The slight French losses in this great victory show not only the precision and strategic skill of the French plans; but the unguarded condition of the German defenders. They are no longer on the "qui vive." They are very sparing of their infantry just now on the British front as well, relying on their artillery.

Former Nova Scotian's Views.

The Rev. Dr. Charles A. Eaton, in the Madison Avenue Baptist church, New York, said that he looked upon the present as a time when the mental, moral, spiritual and economic resources of America were taxed to the utmost. He was certain that in not one single phase was the American people ready to meet the immediate future.

"We have developed a timidity, a sheep-like quality," he said, "in the expression of our public policy, which has created an attitude towards us in every land as dangerous as it is untrue to fact. Our life has become a life of expediency and not of principle. The conflict between labor and capital is still in the stage of the opportunist. Each local disturbance is patched up. We may be able to save this or that political party in the coming election but the problem is to save America by enthroning her once more upon principle and giving to her a moral and intellectual authority. The issue is whether the nation shall act and live by authority or by expedient. Shall we base our authority, domestic and foreign, upon a rock foundation of justice, courage, honor, which may involve sacrifice, or shall we adopt a basis of opportunism, timidity, indifference to principle?" This is the supreme decision. Nothing else matters.

Australia's War Taxation

(Westminster Gazette) The war-time profits tax which Mr. Hughes proposes for Australia is fifty per cent for the last financial year, and very nearly a hundred per cent for the present financial year. Apparently all profits over seven or eight per cent are to be taken by the State. The income-tax is also increased, and there is a tax on amusements. But perhaps the proposal which is most novel, as well as most remunerative, is levy on wealth of 1-1-2 per cent for the Repatriation Fund.

CLEANER POLITICS

Politicians who have kept their ears close to the ground have heard the rumblings of the rapid advance of the great movement for cleaner politics, which is fast gathering momentum in this country. Honest, straightforward, clear-thinking Canadians have decided that it is time they called a halt to the roads of graft, patronage and party pilfering. It only remains now for politicians to do their part. The people are ready.

In the past the general custom has been to blame everything upon the men elected to represent Canadian constituencies in legislatures and federal parliaments, but the common people—the electors—are beginning to see things in their proper light. Legislatures and parliaments are not so very different from the people represented by them. Public life cannot be purified unless the people attend to the cleaning up. There is no reason why it should be necessary for an honest business man to become dishonest in order to be rated as a successful politician. If it has been necessary in the past it has been largely the fault of the electors. Let the electors demand clean politics and Canada will get clean politics.

Premier Norris of Manitoba, speaking in London a short time ago, sized up the situation admirably in the following public life, while being honest in private life. I believe the people of Canada are looking for better things and are expecting service from the public men, men who occupy positions of trust in the different provinces. And never in the history of Canada has there been a more opportune season than when the struggle is on. Our people are in a thoughtful mood, and they are anxious for our public men to give better service to our country. To do this, however, we must have the support of the electors. It must not be left to the public men to purify public life. We must have the assistance of the electors themselves. It is just as easy for politicians to be made honest as any other class of men, but it is up to you to make them honest. Let us have cleaner politics, more honest business in the conduct of our public affairs. How can politics be made honest? Only by voters selecting none other than honest.

straightforward, clear-thinking, upright men of integrity and stamina to represent them. Crooked sticks cannot be made straight, but straight sticks may be selected and kept straight. When men of integrity are selected and elected, strengthen their hands by supporting them in right doing, frowning upon the man who seeks patronage, graft or any position or money for which he is not capable of giving honest value. Select honest men, elect them and help them to remain honest. Canada is ready for cleaner politics. —(The Farmers Advocate.)

"STRONGEST MAN IN CANADA'S ARMY"

Pte C. Glover of 180th Battalion, Now Here, Gives Wonderful Demonstration

The "strongest man in the Canadian army" is the title under which Pte. C. Glover of the 180th Sportsmen's Battalion is known to his fellow-comrades in arms. Pte. Glover demonstrated his strength to a St. John Times reporter recently. Physical strength was admired among the gladiators of old and it is safe to say that if Pte. Glover had been living when Rome was at the zenith of fame and power, he would have been an outstanding figure.

Pte. Glover is a native of Simcoe, Ontario. He lay aside pecuniary benefits to enlist in the 180th Battalion.

He weighs about 195 pounds and is the very personification of strength and physical power. Recently he demonstrated some of his feats to some members of the St. John police force. One of the sergeants of the force, weighing in the vicinity of 210, was seated on a chair, Pte. Glover lifted chair and all with his teeth. He lay on his back, stretched out his powerful arms. With one big man standing on each hand he lifted them from the ground. Among other wonderful demonstrations of strength are: To bridge 1100 pounds, lift 2280 pounds, lift on his chest a 65-gallon barrel of water, or one weighing 750 pounds; execute the human crab act, 180 pounds drew nails with his teeth.

246TH BATTALION QUARTERED AT HALIFAX

(Morning Chronicle) The 246th Battalion, Nova Scotia Highlanders, has arrived in the city from Aldershot and is now quartered in the huts on the Common. They are a fine looking lot of men, every one of them physically sound. Starting next week there will be a canvass of Eastern Nova Scotia, taking in the Counties of Colchester, Cumberland, Pictou, Guysboro and of Cape Breton Island. At a conference held the other day between the recruiting committee and the general officer commanding the Sixth Division and staff, it was decided that for the present precedence should be given to recruiting for the 246th, this to obtain until the battalion has been recruited up to strength. The plan is to send it immediately overseas as soon as it has reached full strength. In England it will be established as a reserve depot for the Highland Brigade.

Organization for the canvassing of each of the Counties above mentioned is being made. There will be speakers and two personal canvassing recruiting parties for each of these Counties. It is proposed to make a special drive in the smaller places in these Counties which have not been as thoroughly canvassed as larger places.

Liberty Calls For Canadians to Do Their Duty

"Under the responsibilities with which I am invested, and the name of the state which we are all bound to serve, it is my duty to appeal, and I do now appeal, most earnestly to the people of Canada that they assist and co-operate with the Government and the directors of National Service in the endeavor for this purpose. To men of military age, I make the appeal that they place themselves freely at the disposition of their country for such service as they are deemed best fitted."—Sir Robert Borden.

We are glad to know that the pulp mill at Milton will be running in the course of a few weeks, under the management of P. Moore, the property having been purchased from R. F. Davidson by the Medway Pulp and Power Co. Repairs are now being effected, and wood for grinding is being hauled—Liverpool Advance.

FRENCH CARRY HUN TRENCHES IN NIGHT RAID ON THE SOMME

Paris.—A system of German trenches Northwest of Sully-Saillisel, on the Somme front, was carried by the French last night the War Office announced today. The French advanced as far as the Sully Church.

South of the Somme the Germans made repeated attacks between Beaches and the region South of La Maisonette. By means of their last attempt they obtained a footing in some of the Maisonette farm buildings.

On the Verdun front the artillery fighting was less severe near Douaumont, and there was no infantry action in that locality.

Rheims was bombarded violently and some civilians were killed.

Berlin—(By wireless to Sayville)—British troops, attacking the German lines on the Somme front between LesBiefs and Marvel, succeeded in gaining some ground from the Germans, the War Office announced today.

It is the necessity of using Norwegian waters to get most securely at the Archangel routes that renders Berlin so savage at Norway for her timely embargo. Clearly the British Government is wide awake to the opportunity of heartily supporting Norway. Germany will not be permitted to bully that stalwart little people. But Norway, with her shipping disappearing like melting snow in summer, must wonder what President Wilson meant when he pretended to cast his shield over all neutral vessels. He talked as if he stood not for narrow American interests—but for the broad and high principles of neutral right. Yet who imagines that, if Germany had sunk twenty-three American ships since October 1st, there would not have been a stiff "note" sent from Washington to Berlin?

BRITISH RAID TRENCHES

London.—British troops made two raids on the German trenches to the west of Wytschaete, Belgium, and east of Boesinghe, last night, says the official statement issued this afternoon by the British War Office. A number of prisoners were taken. The text follows:

"Heavy rain continues to fall. There is nothing to report from our front south of the Ancre."

"During the night we conducted two successful raids on enemy trenches west of Wytschaete, Belgium, and east of Boesinghe, taking prisoners and inflicting considerable damage. Enemy working parties were bombed by us in the neighborhood of La Basse canal and suffered manly casualties."

ONE SOLDIER TAKES 102 GERMANS

London.—One of the fifteen Victoria Crosses, the award of which are made in today's London Gazette, is to Pte. Thomas Jones, who according to the official account, after killing three snipers who were shooting at him, entered the German trenches, and single-handed, disarmed one hundred and two Germans, including three or four officers, and marched them back to the British lines through a heavy barrage fire.

Those present declared they would stand for no compromise.

SHOULD MAKE INCREASE IN PRICE OF PAPERS

Advertisers' Convention Would Have Subscribers Pay Larger Share.

The need for an increase in the subscription rates of daily newspapers and other periodicals as the result of the substantial increase in paper costs was the outstanding matter dealt with in the last day's session of the third annual meeting of the Association of Canadian Advertisers, who brought their convention to a close at the Prince George Hotel yesterday evening. The question was raised in the report of the circulation and rates committee, the report declaring that the subscribers to a daily newspaper does not pay the cost of the paper upon which it is printed. It was shown that the cost of publication of an ordinary newspaper is from three to five cents per copy. The report declared that the advertiser is required to pay altogether too large a proportion of the costs of publication, and maintained that increased publishing costs must be met by a general increase in the subscription prices of daily papers and periodicals.

Delegates to the convention expressed their strong disapproval of the method of artificial stimulation of the circulation of a periodical by the gift of premiums and such like devices, the sentiment of the convention being strongly opposed to the practice.

BRITISH PEERAGE SUFFERS

It is stated that fifty-five sons of British Peers have already fallen in the war and the list is growing each month. It has been thought by some that the Dukes, Earls, etc., of Great Britain were of doubtful strength or use to the British Empire. But it contains men of eminent ability in the service of the State. They have never served it so worthily as during the present hour of need.

IS THERE ANOTHER SURPRISE FOR THE ENEMY

In a recent interview Sir John Jellicoe said that if the Germans came out they would get a surprise. The Providence Journal publishes a story that the British navy has been strengthened by half a dozen or more Dreadnoughts mounting eight 18-inch guns. The largest gun heretofore has been the British 15-inch. If that is the "surprise" the secret has been well kept, and the Germans might as well give up hopes of beating Britain on the sea.

ALDERSHOT REDIVIVUS

The camps at Aldershot have all been taken down and the scene on the grounds does not present the animated appearance of a month ago. For the time only a few men remain to care for the grounds and for future occupancy.

By order of the Government military authorities advertisements calling for tenders for supplies for Camp Aldershot for seven months commencing November 1st have been posted. No announcement has been made as to how soon the grounds may be occupied or how many troops may be quartered here. The camp engineers claim that two Battalions can be comfortably housed for the winter with very little additions made.

KENTVILLE BOARD OF TRADE

The Kentville Board of Trade does not receive the attention of the business and professional men and citizens that it should. It is an organization that can do much to benefit the whole community.

On account of the abnormal business during the past summer, caused by the large number of Soldiers at Aldershot, citizens have been so busy that possibly the work done by the local Board of Trade has been overlooked.

With the Camp closed for a time, business is now back to normal and we hope that all members will make a special effort to attend future meetings.

We have the basis of a splendid organization and it should receive the support of every citizen who is interested in the advancement of the Town.

An important meeting has been arranged for this Friday evening, November 3rd, in Court House. "Hotel Accommodation," "Canning Factory," "Dog Laws" and "Sheep Raising" are some of the matters that will receive attention. Some very interesting data has been obtained by the Board in connection with these subjects, and we trust their efforts will receive the support they deserve.

The work of the Children's Aid Society is worthy of our encouragement and support. Mr. Stairs, the agent of the Society has contributed much of his time and energy in this work with excellent results. The annual meeting will be held at Wolfville on Tuesday evening. The officers who are carrying on the work would be much encouraged by a good attendance from different parts of the County.

INCREASE YOUR EGG OUTPUT

What can we do to improve our stock and build up an egg laying strain? When the hatching season is on I would advise you to bear these things in mind:

1—It must be remembered that a chick with a strong constitution is better equipped for fighting disease than a weak chick with all the medicines and conditions known to the medical science. Then breed for constitutional vigor.

2 Many disease germs are transmitted from parent to offspring, so all diseases birds, or birds which ever have been diseased, should be removed from the flock. This past month we had a striking example of high vitality and low vitality. Two pens were housed in the same house, drank from the same pen, ate the same kind of food and slept under the same roof. One pen went all to pieces and every one of them were sent to the hospital. The pen on the opposite side withstood the severe weather, kept in splendid health and is one among the very highest pens in egg production.

3 Breed only from a male which has been hatched from an egg laid by a high laying hen.

4 Select your best laying hens to mate with the above male.

5 Breed from early maturing pullets.

6 Don't breed from hens which are continually going broody.

7 Breed from your hens and pullets which lay in November, December and January.

It is true the hen which has been laying through the winter will go to sitting first, but by this time the loafing hen has begun laying so the good hen is set on the poor hens' eggs, which practice has a tendency to produce a flock of loafers. — T. E. Quisenberry.

WORLD'S SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION IN TOKIO

New York—An invitation of the Japanese to hold the next convention of the World's Sunday School Association in Tokio has been accepted. It was announced today by the World's Committee, which held a meeting here. The meeting will be held after the close of the war. The invitation was brought by B. Okura in a message from the Japanese committee, of which Marquis Okuma, former Premier of Japan, is Chairman.

Thomas R. Fergus, member of the British Parliament, was elected President of the association by the committee, succeeding the late Sir Robert Laidlaw of London. The association, it is said, represents 304,000 Sunday schools in all countries, and has a membership of 31,000,000.

It was announced that the organization is carrying out plans for sending 1,000 New Testaments to the soldiers in the trenches, hospitals and prison camps, to be contributed by American Sunday school children.

Attempt to Assassinate Premier Hughes, of Australia

Melbourne, Oct. 30—An unsuccessful attempt was made recently to assassinate Premier Hughes at his home in New Victoria by a man who forced way into his bedroom.

CANADIAN TROOPS ARE HAVING A REST

Ottawa, Oct. 30—The Canadian divisions at the front are evidently having a well earned respite from the thick of the fighting on the Somme front. For the first time in many months the daily cable to the Minister of Militia reported today "no casualties." Report from the two preceding days also indicated a cessation of casualties among the Canadians. It is surmised here that the Canadian troops after their hard and continuous fighting of the past two months have now been given a chance to rest and to recuperate in the reserves behind the front line trenches.

RIAD A COMPLETE FAILURE

One transport carrying no troops, was sent to the bottom. Then the British destroyers engaged the invading squadron. In the spirited combat that followed two German warships were sunk, and another British vessel was disabled by a torpedo and run aground, and another British destroyer is still missing. The Kaiser's squadron then was driven off.

This raid, it seems, was Germany's reply to the French victory at Verdun, combined with the relentless British pressure on the Somme. It had been expected for a long time, and was the first effort to attack the British transport service. But failed in all its attempts.

TWO GERMAN TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYERS SUNK

British Lost Empty Transport, One Destroyer and Another Grounded

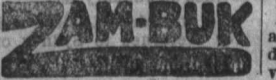
London—Ten German torpedo boat destroyers attempted to raid the British cross-channel transports last night, but the attempt failed, says an official statement issued by the British Admiralty today.

Two of the German destroyers were sunk, and the others were driven off. The German destroyers succeeded in sinking one empty transport, the Queen. All the members of her crew were saved.

Don't Change the Ten Commandments

(Chicago Tribune)

Without challenging the authority of the house of bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church, many laymen, we suspect, will regret its action in shortening the phraseology of the Ten Commandments. It is true we live in a brisk age and incline to the short cut in all things. But the Ten Commandments as we know in the King James version of the Bible are much more than a religious statute which may be arranged at will so long as the rules they convey are not altered. In the noble form the old masters of the great epoch of the British language gave them they are more imperatives. Their verbal vesture has a high quality which is a part of their influence, as the carriage and countenance of a clergyman convey the spirit of his office. Esthetically the Ten Commandments have become a part of our lives, and no economical paraphrase can take their place. There is the great beauty of antiquity in their phrases which we cannot afford to sacrifice. Doubtless the gothic cathedral might have been cut down with a saving of stone and labor. But the Commandments will lose artistically if the prohibition to covet one's neighbor's wife or his ox or his ass is omitted; if the confession that "The Lord thy God is a jealous God" is excluded; or the threat to visit the sins of the father upon the third and fourth generation is quietly shelved. The writings upon the tablets are a masterpiece of literary art as they stand. They may not be so when the bishops get through reading copy on them.

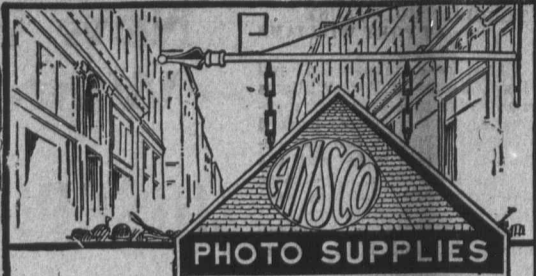

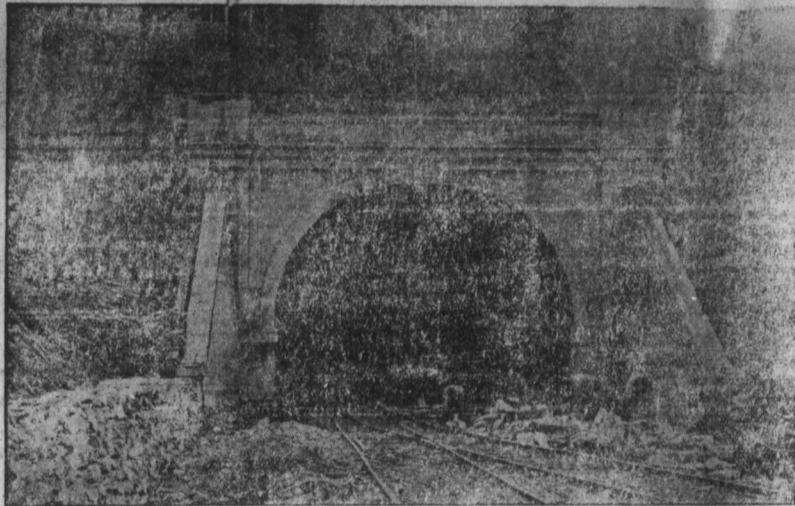

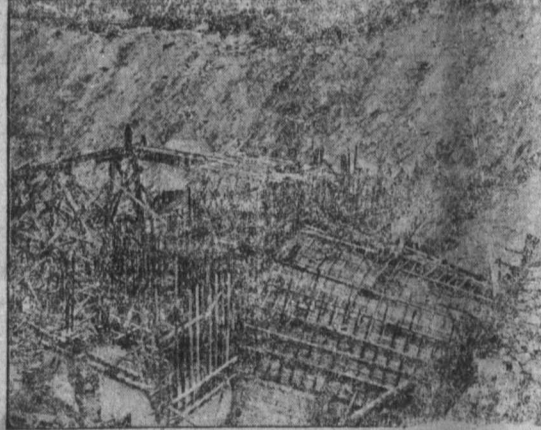
THE CONNAUGHT TUNNEL



ONE of the greatest of the achievements of the Canadian Pacific Railway is the Connaught Tunnel. This great work through the lofty Mount Macdonald—amongst the Selkirk Mountains, is nearly six miles long and double tracked. The excavation has been made at a cost of over \$12,000,000 to the great transportation company. But the C.P.R., which has spent from \$25,000,000 to \$35,000,000 per annum on the development of the West previous to the war, does not even in times of a conflict affecting the greater part of the world, spare expense where the public convenience makes an urgent demand. The opening of the tunnel will greatly facilitate traffic, will open a new route, and will do away with many miles of snow sheds.

The Connaught Tunnel will give the Canadian Pacific the lowest grade of any transcontinental railway running through the Selkirk Mountains. It was bored in less than three years under the supervision of Mr. J. G. Sullivan, Chief Engineer of Western lines, and it is claimed that no undertaking of similar dimensions was ever completed in such a short time. In the excavation of the tunnel many engineering difficulties had to be overcome. But mighty rocks gave way and the roots of a gigantic mountain crumbled before the advance of human skill. At various points along the pass there is an eighteen inch concrete wall lining.

During his recent trip to Western Canada, Lord Shaughnessy, accompanied by Chief Engineer Sullivan, took a tour through the tunnel. Lord Shaughnessy was well pleased



with what he saw. The construction work is now rapidly approaching completion. Two miles of steel rails have yet to be laid on one side of the track. It is expected that the formal opening will take place during the first days of December. Since its inception the C.P.R. it is reckoned, has spent over \$200,000,000 in the development of the West. The latest expenditure is as popular as any that had previously been made.

When His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught and party took a trip through the tunnel on July 17th, the Duke expressed in eloquent words the gratification it

FIGHT DECEPTION IN ADVERTISING

Canadian Association Condemns Fraudulent Publicity Methods

Many advertisers attended, Monday the third annual meeting of the Association of Canadian Advertisers at the Prince George Hotel, Toronto.

A resolution was passed placing the association on record as opposed to advertising that is fraudulent or questionable, that is indecent, vulgar or suggestive, that is ambiguous in wording and calculated to mislead, that exaggerates, that reflects on the goods of competitors and makes misleading free offers. Also advertisements of products containing drugs (sold to non-medical men) or advertisements that make curative claims not justified by the facts of common experience were placed under the ban.

It was felt by the association that by such a resolution its determination to frown on questionable advertising will be apparent to the public and to the press of the country.

TERRIBLE HOLOCAUST AT PORT WILLIAMS

There was many sad and heavy hearts at Port Williams and vicinity on Tuesday morning when the people learned that a destructive fire had occurred in their midst with the loss of three lives and three others so burnt that they were obliged to go to a hospital.

About 11.30 o'clock Monday night Mr. and Mrs. Harley Eisenhauer who resided near the Baptist Church were awakened by smoke and flames.

The parents and two children slept upstairs while Mr. Eisenhauer's father, Joseph, an aged and partly paralyzed man of about 70 years slept down stairs with two other children a boy of six and a girl of nine.

Mr Eisenhauer and his household had all retired, prior to eleven o'clock and it was about eleven thirty when the fire was first discovered. The fire upon discovery was burning savagely, the whole house being a mass of flames. Mrs. Eisenhauer with her young baby, made for the open. Upon getting out they were wrapped in flames. With great presence of mind the mother rolled herself on the ground and extinguished the flames of her clothing. She and her child, however were badly burned and taken to a neighbor's home where their burns were dressed by Dr. Fullerton.

The father and one child got clear of the house, suffering only slightly, but not so the grandfather and one boy and girl. They were burned to death. Despite the efforts of the neighbors who turned out en masse to render what assistance they possibly could, streams of water from the hydrant nearby were played on the house, but all in vain and in about half an hour the house was nothing but a smouldering mass.

The father after escaping himself made frantic efforts to save the other three and rushing into the flames was very badly burned—all to no avail.

The father, mother and baby were in a critical condition.

A jury was empanelled in the morning by Corner Dr. Fullerton. The community is greatly shocked by the sad event the most tragic that has happened here for many years.

Mr. Harley Eisenhauer and family moved to this part of the country over a year ago where employment was found as cooper. Mr. Eisenhauer and his father, the deceased were natives of Lunenburg County. Mrs. Eisenhauer is a native of Halifax County. Her maiden name was Murphy and she comes from the Musquodoboit Valley.
