

PROBLEMS OF TRANSPORTATION OCCUPY DELEGATES' ATTENTION

ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE CONVENTION DELIBERATE OVER MATTERS AFFECTING PASSENGER, FREIGHT, EXPRESS AND TELEGRAPH SERVICES—DECLARE FOR GOVERNMENT ROAD TO HUDSON'S BAY AND ENQUIRY INTO NAVIGABILITY OF SASKATCHEWAN RIVER—PROMOTE AGAINST ANOTHER FUEL SHORTAGE NECESSARY—A RIVER TRIP.

PRINCE ALBERT, June 19.—This morning's session of the boards of trade convention opened with the moving of a resolution by E. Whitton, Regina, asking the interior department to publish the rights of settlers from railways when subjected to delays in transportation. Rigby, Balgonie, seconded the resolution.

G. H. Shaw, of the C.N.R., moved that the resolution be amended to include the disabilities under which Canadian railways operated last winter. He did not believe it was in the interest of the country that a resolution should go out putting on record that it was necessary for the government to publish to the world that settlers were unable to get their rights.

Fuel Shortage Again Up.—James Leslie, Saskatchewan, moved a resolution urging the governments of Saskatchewan and Alberta to take steps to effectively prevent a recurrence of the fuel famine of last winter. Objection was taken by certain of the delegates to the entire West being included in the resolution.

Navigation of the Saskatchewan.—The question of the navigation of the Saskatchewan was brought up by J. E. Bradshaw, Prince Albert, in a resolution calling upon the government to survey the river from 109 miles west of Edmonton to Lake Winnipeg.

Uniform Railway Rates.—J. E. Bradshaw, Prince Albert, next brought up a resolution asking for legislation forcing railway companies to issue tickets at a uniform rate by each route as passengers might select.

Reciprocal Demurrage.—G. Stockman, Edmonton, moved a resolution in favor of reciprocal demurrage as a remedy for the present car shortage. Calling for the payment of non-delivery at destination within a specified time after receipt of goods, a failure to supply cars within three days of a request to do so. The resolution called for a mileage of one hundred miles for the day and a rate of ten and fifty miles per day on the branch lines.

Inadequate Telegraph Service.—The inadequacy of the telegraph service afforded the west was brought up by G. Stockman, in a resolution urging upon the provincial government the extension of the present telegraph system and asking that railway companies be compelled to supply lines for purely commercial purposes.

Government Fire Insurance.—Mr. Cunningham, Edmonton, moved a resolution calling for action on the part of the provincial governments to ascertain the advantages surrounding the operation of government fire insurance. Mr. Cunningham complained that however much was spent by western communities in perfecting their fire fighting equipments no lowering of rates was ever made, but rather the reverse. Government fire insurance had been carried out in New Zealand and he saw no reason why it should not be in Canada. The resolution was agreed to without opposition.

Agents at Flag Stations.—The necessity of placing agents at all railway points was designated as one of the items brought up by G. Stockman in a resolution calling the attention of the government and railway commission to the present state of affairs.

Exorbitant Express Rates.—E. M. Saunders, Moose Jaw, moved a resolution commending the railway commission for instituting the investigation into the high express rates existing in Western Canada. Mr. Saunders saw no reason why the rates should be subjected to rates much in excess of those charged in the East.

Scarcity of Labor.—Mr. Cunningham, Edmonton, also moved that the Dominion and Provincial Governments be urged to adopt the necessary steps to provide for a better supply of skilled and unskilled labor in the West. ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE WILL NOT DIVIDE ENERGIES

DECIDE NOT TO FORM SEPARATE ORGANISATIONS FOR ALBERTA AND SASKATCHEWAN - STRONG DECLARATION FOR GOVERNMENT OWNED TELEPHONE SYSTEMS - REDEMPTION OF BANK NOTES - WILL MEET IN MEDICINE HAT NEXT YEAR.

PRINCE ALBERT, June 26. - The fourth annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Western Canada, which concluded shortly after noon today, is declared by members who attended previous conventions to have been the most successful ever held, both from the social and business standpoint.

A great unity of purpose was shown, and it was resolved to hold a series of monster meetings throughout Ireland to endorse the declaration of the national convention that this short of national autonomy will satisfy the Irish people and lead to peace and content, as well as to impress on the mind of the British statesmen the necessity of fighting an acceptable settlement of the question.

PARIS, June 18.—The French cruiser Chanzy, which recently was ashore on an island in the Chinese mainland, became a total wreck. The minister of marine has received a telegram from Admiral von Albatross, the French commander in the Far East, to the effect that water-tight compartments of the stranded vessel had ceded under the pressure of the waves. The cruiser had sunk by the stern, her decks being now awash. The crew had quit the vessel, and salvage operations had to be abandoned. There is said to be little hope of saving the guns.

ROME, June 18.—It is announced here that the Pope has become a vegetarian. His holiness formerly suffered severely from gout, but he has had no attack since January and he attributes this to the fact that he has adopted a vegetarian diet.

COPENHAGEN, June 18.—The police have expelled the German anarchist, Nienisch, against whom he has been employed for a short time in a suburb of Copenhagen, not far from the royal summer residence. The police received very serious evidence with reference to him from foreign countries, and it was feared that he was making an attempt against foreign sovereigns visiting the Danish Royal family during the summer. The police are watching other suspected foreigners.

VIENNA, June 18.—Fresh reports arrive from the electoral campaign in connection with the elections. The latest case concerns a political murder of rather an unusual character. In the electoral district of Wofjilow, a Ruthenian landowner was murdered by his own countrymen, as the Spaniards had heard that he had not voted for the national Ruthenian candidate, but for a Pole.

ATHENS, June 20.—An unknown man threw a dynamite cartridge from the gallery of the Chamber of Deputies during an all night session which began yesterday. The disaster was averted by the fuse becoming detached in the flight of the missile. The deputies rushed for the door. The man who threw the cartridge was arrested and proved to be a well known anarchist.

NAPLES, June 21.—A most appalling automobile accident occurred at Gaivelle, about 100 miles distant from Naples, yesterday. Five men being killed. The motor car which was going at a high rate of speed ran into a rock and was demolished. Among the killed was Prince Pescara, a member of the Italian nobility and related to the Spanish royal family on account of whose death the aristocracy of the whole of lower Italy will be mourning.

KIEV, Russia, June 23.—The Court martial convened to try the mutinous sappers at the summer camp at Baniarka, is said to have acted with promptness and severity. It is reported forty-eight mutineers have already been condemned and shot.

NEW SCHOOLS AT EDMONTON BAPTIST CONVENTION OPENS

DEPUTY MINISTER OF EDUCATION OF ALBERTA SPEAKS OF PROGRESS

From Tuesday Morning's Leader. The morning session of the Baptist convention was taken up with the report of the deputy minister of education of Alberta. The report was a most interesting one, and was given by the deputy minister, Mr. D. L. McKenzie, in a most able and comprehensive manner. He spoke of the progress of the educational movement in his province, and of the work of the department of education in the two sister provinces. He said that the department was now being organized at the rate of one a day. He expected that Alberta alone would require during the next few years at least 400 new teachers per annum. Teachers were now coming in numbers from the East and in the vast majority of cases they gave excellent satisfaction. There was, however, a serious difficulty in the way of the department, and that was the fact that many of the teachers were unacquainted with the provincial school plan and with the work of the department. That could only be altered by an efficient staff of inspectors. Teachers' salaries, he said, had been improving for the past six years, and for fully certified teachers the average salary was about \$80 per month, a figure, it may be noted in passing, considerably above the average obtained in Manitoba. So keen were the people of the province to have new school districts formed that an application for a school district was made to the Peace River county to have a school district organized there. The farmer in question had actually offered to pay for the building himself, but owing to the land not having been surveyed the matter was still pending. All over the province the schools were looking forward to receiving the new readers next year and there was no doubt that the new books were a stimulus to educational enthusiasm in Alberta. The readers, of course, will be the same as those used in Saskatchewan and the competition which has been inaugurated to secure for them a suitable name will be entered with all keenness in both provinces. Other school books, history and geography books, etc. are also to be revised and brought up to date. Asked with regard to the Albertan University, Mr. McKenzie said they hoped to make a definite report on actual teaching operations next year. Mr. McKenzie leaves tonight for Edmonton to resume his departmental duties.

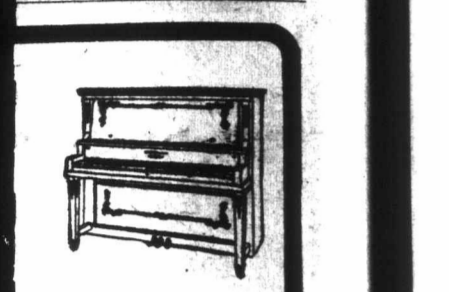
