THE PARLIAMENT.

THE Canadian Parliament has opened but nothing beyond a course of desultory bickering may be expected for a week or so. The speech from the Throne seems to outline a session of great moment, and points to a policy that is progressive and far sighted. A number of important bills will come up, and they are denominated as follows:

Bills for the better organization of the civil service, for the consolidation of the Inland Revenue laws and for the amendment of the acts relating to the Dominion lands, to the public works, to the Indians of the North West, and to the Mounted Police Force.

The first of these bills seems a quite important one; and the object is to reach a greater state of efficiency in the civil service. We presume that such branches of the public service as demand officers of professional skill is specially in mind, and that proper examinations will have to be successfully undergone before any candidate will be qualified for the position sought. This would seem to be a blow aimed at the promotion "by letter and preference," and the unsound and inefficient state of the public service as built up through political influence. But Canada has not taken the initiative in this; England has led off, for now money or influence can obtain a position in the army unless the cadet pass a satisfactory examination, while the same principle is in operation through the other public departments of the kingdom. All Canada will hail the passage of such a bill, and the rigid enforcement of its conditions.

We cannot say at present what is in view in the consolidation of the Inland Revenue Laws; but from the rapid growth of our inland country it would seem that the laws passed when it was in a state of savagery, requires readjustment at least.

The Bill relating to the Dominion Lands will be a very important one because it will deal with the settlement of the country and the reception and accommodation of immigrants. There is no more important measure than this for the consideration of the parliament.

A Bill which would convert the nomads of the North West into thrifty tillers of the soil would be a task that Lycurgus or Solomon himself might well shrink from. Yet we have no doubt but the very best will be done to make the dispossessed savage happy and prosperous. But while we believe this, we can't help being impressed that the ink that writes the obituary of Sir John, Sir Leonard and Sir Charles will long be dry ere the red man will have learnt to sit him peacefully down and turn his reserve into a blooming garden.

The Bill regulating the Mounted Police Force will be less important. The subject of an expansion of the currency will come up as the Bank Charters will expire next year; and while it is not likely the Government will adopt the Rag Baby we have no doubt but an issue of currency sufficient to meet immediate wants, and on a sound basis, will be authorized. The silence of the leading Government press on this question has been ominous, but we notice the *Star* in its last, taking its cue from the *Mail's* article published about a month ago, advocates a moderate expansion on a "gold basis." Though it seems paradoxical to us to speak of an "expansion" on a "gold basis," yet since the *Star* is the author of the saying, it must be all right.

The Government, we are happy to say, have not closed their ears to the cry of distress coming to them from across the Atlantic, and have with praiseworthy human heartedness made the "destitution" of "our fellow subjects in Ireland" the substance of a paragraph in the speech. We know not

what the Government will do to relieve the sufferers, whether grant them a sum of money or not; but we do know what they ought to do. The distress of Ireland should come under the Immigration head, the Government bringing some of the tenant farmers across and settling them on their wide prairies. The money granted this winter might be as badly needed next winter, but the tenant farmer established on his 400 acres beside the railroad, with his flourishing fields of corn and wheat, might trouble himself little how the rents went, or how far Parnell's scheme was potent to make better his countrymen.

Mr. Mackenzie seems quite glum, and acts spitefully as ever. It appears he has "kept it in" for McDonnell since last session, and true to his nature lost not a moment after the House opened to bring it before the members. Sir John informed him with the most provoking indifference that he had forgotten all about it; but would give an answer to-day. Probably the cause of Mr. Mackenzie's biliousness is that Mr. Blake is supplanting him as leader of the Opposition.

GEMS FROM THE PRESS.
The Ottawa *Free Press* states that Mr. Peter Mitchell was offered the Governorship of New Brunswick but declined it.

A writer in the *Wolfville Star*, which is evidently the Editor, signs himself "Ignoramus." The peculiar appropriateness of the *nom de plume* struck us instantly on reading the letter.

The *St. John News* makes a murderous attack on the *St. John Telegraph* in yesterday's issue. It states that the beet industry in Maine is a decided failure, and will have to be abandoned.

The *St. John Telegraph* by way of asking a question of the *Halifax Herald* insinuates that Mr. Tilley has promised the portfolio of Militia and Defence to Major Domville. We do not believe Sir Leonard has done anything of the kind, and our *St. John* contemporary has simply been hoaxed.

By far the best article we have seen on the late Governor Chandler appeared in the last issue of the *Chignecto Post*. It is written in an interesting manner, and deviates wide from the beaten track of following a lot of dry figures and events. If friend Milner had only a daily paper on which to expend his scholarly genius, he would be useful in the newspaper world.

The *Religious Intelligencer* attacks the *Freeman* in a very rabid, and extremely vulgar article. But it is good enough for the *Freeman*, for picking a quarrel with such a newspaper. Henry Ward Beecher once wrote: "I foolishly got into a quarrel with a polecat, and though I hurled a thousand volleys at his head, he worried me in the end." If Beecher did not say this, it makes little matter. It suits our purpose.

The *Moncton Times* has stolen an hour from the political fight to urge the youth of Moncton to literary pursuits. It presses them to give more attention to debating societies, and advocates the establishing of a public reading room and lyceum. A great American writer, Mr. Matthews, does not agree with the *Times* as to the importance of debating schools. He says it makes young men too gabby, and that every young lad, and notably every politician in the United States can spot, and that in fact the ready flow of language—running at the mouth—is becoming an epidemic. We leave the question between Mr. Stevens and Mr. Matthews.

Another newspaper has been born, and we welcome it into the world. It comes from Rapid City, N. W. T., 150 miles west of Winnipeg, on the Canada Pacific R. R. Only a few years ago, the fertile region in the midst of which stands Rapid City, was one unbroken wilderness, where the buffalo grazed and the Indian hunted; but now on every hand is heard the bustle of business, the cheerful tones of the pioneer, and the shrill whistle of the iron horse. We commend the daring and far-seeing enterprise of Mr. Pim, the editor of the new journal, for selecting this spot on which to establish a paper that may, some day rival some of its eastern contemporaries. The name of the paper is the *Rapid City Enterprise*, a name well chosen and well deserved. Wishing it success, we do not know but some day it will decree that we shall take the *Star* out west and settle down in fraternal love beside our brother of the *Enterprise*.

O, how quickly Duncan could suit himself in Fredericton!
Mr. Vanwart sat a Brahma hen the 28th January with some 15 eggs, which appears to be doing well.—Woodstock *Cor.* to-day's *Telegraph*.
It is evidently either the hen or the eggs that is doing well; very likely the eggs: unless the correspondent has been peeping through the shells and is enabled to report the progress of the

chickens. It is a pity the correspondent could not help the chickens to get out of the shells. However three weeks will soon slip by, when we shall be glad to hear more. Meanwhile it is gratifying to know that the hen "appears to be doing well."

But we should like to know what that hen is doing that any other hen doesn't do. She sits on her eggs, we suppose, but all hens, as a rule, do that. Does she squat lower on the eggs, or what does she do better than her neighbors? There is a tremendous mystery connected with the operations of this hen.

QUERIES

There are many things we should like to know. We should like to know what the local government is going to do with Mr. Julius L. Inches; and what they are going to do with his department. We should like to know if Mr. Fraser's personal regard for Mr. Inches is of more importance to the country than that the agricultural department should be conducted honestly and in the interest of the Province of New Brunswick. We should like to know if the Government of New Brunswick will grant any money this year to Mr. Inches to buy cuts to advertise the agricultural implements of an Ottawa foundry, and we should also like to know if they intend paying a thousand dollars, as they did two years ago, for the publication of a report which was nothing more than a huge advertisement for Cossit Brothers. We do not intend to act with undue haste at all, nor can we expect the Government to disestablish and reconstruct all in a week or so; but we do ask and earnestly hope that the personal regard of any member of the Government shall not stand in the way of justice to the duty which the Government owes the Province. We do not censure just now; we merely warn, and with the poet,
"we are cruel only to be kind."

Those who "solemnized marriage" about Fredericton and up along the river, since the Governor's death, have "dated back" their licenses.

Just imagine the daily press of the Province quarrelling about bore bones every day and not saying a word about wheat!

Just imagine the *St. John Telegraph* jubilant about bees and silent about the wheat industry!

SUPREME COURT.

JUDGMENTS have been delivered in the first division of the Court in the following cases:

PURCHASE vs. SEELY.—The question in this case was whether the "Town of Portland Civil Court" had jurisdiction to try a case when neither the plaintiff or defendant resided in Portland, but one of them resided in the Parish of Lunenburg. Held: that the Court had jurisdiction under the Consolidated Statutes, cap. 57, § 3, which enacts that the sitting magistrate in the police office in Portland shall have civil jurisdiction in the town of Portland and in the parishes of Lunenburg and Simonds, in all actions in which a justice of the peace has civil jurisdiction.

DEVEBER vs. LARKINS.—The defendant's property was attached under the Consolidated Statutes, cap. 42, and some expenses were incurred by the sheriff in securing the property attached. The defendant afterwards became insolvent under the Insolvent Act of 1875. Held: that under the 55th section of the attachment Act, the attachment must be dissolved without any condition as to payment of the sheriff's fees; that if the sheriff had any lien on the property for his fees, the order discharging the attachment did not affect it, but such lien could only be enforced in the Insolvent Court. Palmer J. considered the question as decided in a previous case. If it had not been so, he would have inclined to make the payment of the sheriff's fees a condition of setting aside the attachment.

PRICE vs. WHITING.—In March, 1867, the defendant, one Benjamin Price, gave the plaintiff a joint and several promissory note for \$300, payable three months after date. Ben. Price paid the interest on the note up to November, 1872, and shortly afterwards became insolvent. Held: that the payment of interest by B. Price did not take the case out of the operation of the Statute of Limitations as against the defendant Whiting, the other maker of the note, and that he was discharged—the action not having been brought within six years after the note came due.

EX PARTE BOWES.—Action for rent, tried before a Justice of the Peace, in which the jury found a verdict for the defendant. On a review of the case before a Judge of the County Court, under the Consolidated Statutes, cap. 60, § 48, he reversed the judgment, and directed the verdict to be entered for plaintiff for a certain amount, and remitted the cause to the Justice to issue execution for the amount so awarded and costs. Held: that he had power to make such an order, and that the words, "affirmed on review," were not to be construed literally, and applicable only to cases where the judgment in the Justice's Court was sustained.

WILBUR vs. JONES.—This was an Equity suit in which the plaintiff had served the defendant with notice of hearing at the May Sittings. The defendant attended on the day with his witnesses, but the plaintiff did not appear, and the Judge thereupon made an order that the plaintiff should pay the defendant his costs of attending on the notice. The plaintiff appealed from this

order on the ground that it was improperly made without notice to him. The Court dismissed the appeal, being of opinion that when the plaintiff failed to proceed with the hearing of the case pursuant to his notice, the Judge had a right to order him to pay the costs which the defendant had incurred in consequence of it, and that it could not be considered as an *ex parte* order.

MCLAUGHLIN vs. MCLEOD, ASSIGNEE.—The defendant was the assignee in insolvency of Messrs Everitt & Butler, who occupied a store as tenants to the plaintiff for a term of 5 years, from the 1st May, 1878, rent payable quarterly, and which lease had not expired at the time of their insolvency. The only question was whether the assignee, under the direction of the creditors, had a right under the 71st section of the Insolvent Act of 1875, to terminate the lease at any other time than the end of a current year. Held: that he has not and that he was liable for the rent up to the 1st May next, and had no right to terminate the lease on the 1st November last.

MCGORLEY vs. THE MAYOR, ETC., OF ST. JOHN.—Action for false imprisonment. The defendants pleaded in justification that the plaintiff was arrested for non-payment of the sum of \$419, assessed upon him by the Commissioners appointed under the Act 41 Vlot., cap. 9, for the extension of Canterbury street; that all things were done as required by the Act to make the plaintiff liable; that he did not pay the rate on demand, whereupon an execution was issued against him, and for want of goods and chattels whereon to levy, the marshal arrested and imprisoned the plaintiff. This plea was demurred to on several grounds, the principal of which were: (1) That it did not state that the plaintiff was the owner of, or interested in, any lands fronting on Canterbury street, and therefore liable to be arrested; (2) That it did not state that the corporation had appointed any person to receive the rate, as directed by the 14th section of the Act, and that such person had demanded it; (3) That the general allegation of performance by the corporation of the requirements of the Act was bad, that the plea should have stated the facts particularly. The Court held the plea bad for not averring that the corporation had appointed a person to receive the rate, and that he had demanded it from the plaintiff, who refused payment; that the 46th section of the Com. Law Procedure Act (Con. Statutes, c. 37) did not apply to this case, and therefore that the general allegation of performance was not sufficient. The Court also inclined to the opinion that the plea should have stated that the plaintiff was an owner of, or interested in, lands fronting on the extension of the street. Judgment for the plaintiff, with leave to the defendants to amend their plea on payment of costs.

TAYLOR vs. LIPSEY and HATT.—Action against the Chief and Assistant Engineer of the Fire Department in Fredericton, for refusing to allow the engines to throw water on the Plain Mills building, when on fire, whereby it was destroyed. The def., Hatt, demurred to the declaration on the ground that he, as Assistant Engineer was not liable for refusing to work the engines at a fire when the Chief Engineer was present. Held: that the declaration only charged an omission of the defendants to perform their duty under the by-law: that by the by-law the Assistant Engineer had no authority to act at a fire except in the absence of the Chief Engineer, and as it was not stated that the Chief was absent at the time, the def., Hatt, was not liable for omission to act. Judgment for the def., Hatt, on the demurrer, with leave to plaintiff to amend the declaration.

WILLET vs. LOCKHART.—This was a question of pleading. Judgment was given for the plaintiff on demurrer, with leave to the defendant to amend his plea on payment of costs.

HILYARD vs. WOOD.—The question in this case was, whether when an attachment was issued during the progress of the suit, under the 65th Sect. of the Attachment Act, (Consolidated Statutes, c. 42) for a cause of action for which the plaintiff could have issued an attachment concurrently with the summons, without a Judge's order, it was necessary that his affidavit should state anything more than was required by Sect. 3, of the Act: Held: that it was not; that the words of Sect. 65, "order of a Judge as aforesaid," did not refer to the order under the 4th Sect. of the Act.

LAW vs. HARDING.—Action for wages, tried in the Queen's County Court. The plaintiff's statement of the agreement was that he hired with the defendant for six months for \$80, with the understanding that if anything occurred to prevent his completing the term, or if the defendant was dissatisfied with him, he should be entitled to leave the employ, and was to be paid for the time he worked. The defendant denied that there was any such understanding, and said that the hiring was for six months for \$80, and that the plaintiff, not having continued till the end of the term, was not entitled to any wages. The plaintiff left at the end of three months; in consequence of sickness, and claimed payment for that time at the agreed rate. The Judge nonsuited the plaintiff, on the ground that he could not sue for any wages till the end of the six months. Held, on appeal, that the nonsuit was wrong—that it should have been left to the jury to find what the agreement between the parties was; and if it was as stated by the plaintiff, whether the wages were not payable when he left the defendant's employ.

Nonsuit set aside, and a new trial ordered.

New Church.
A neat and commodious Episcopal Church is to be put up at Jacksonville. Operations will be commenced about 1st of May.

Accident.
A man named R Burns, teamster in the employ of Mr H Turbull, who lumbers on the Clearwater, branch of the S. M. Railroad, on the 8th inst, met with a very painful accident. He had just unloaded his sleds when the horses becoming started by one of the logs tumbling off the "brow," turned quickly around and Mr B was caught between the two bobs and his right leg broken short off. The unfortunate man was driven on a sled all the way to Stanley, some thirty or 40 miles, where, under the skillful treatment of Dr Moore he is in a very fair way for recovery.

New Parliament Building.
Through the kindness of Mr Dumaresq we have seen the accepted plans for the new Parliament Building. Tenders will all have been received by the 4th prox., and the House decide as to the future course of building operations.
The building will have a frontage of 144 feet and a depth of 80 feet, with a wing 48x48, and a library 54x42 feet. It is to be two stories in height, of 20 and 22 feet ceilings respectively, with a high Mansard roof, the central portion raised several feet above the other and covered by the Mansard. A massive dome, octagonal in plan, rises above the roof to a height of 150 feet from the ground. A tower with high Mansard roof stand at each of the four corners. The external walls are to be entirely of stone, resting on a granite base about six feet high. There are three entrances at the front, the central or main entrance being through a fine portico with polished red granite columns.
The ground floor contains the assembly room, with speaker's room, clerk's room, committee rooms, reading room, smoking room, coat room, lavatories, corridors, etc., connected with the assembly room. Also a Supreme Court room, with judge's room, barrister's room, law library, coat room, lavatories, etc. connected therewith.
The second floor contains the Legislative Council hall, with president's room, clerk's room, committee rooms, etc.
The Assembly Room runs up through both stories and has a clear height of 42 feet from floor to ceiling. There are galleries on two sides of this room, divided into three apartments. The ladies' gallery has an entrance from the front of the building. The reporters' gallery is reached by a circular stair from the smoking room, and the public gallery is reached by the public stairs at the rear end of the main hall.
The building will be handsomely fitted up internally with hard wood finish, and externally the design is decidedly a noble one.

Beans.
This morning a STAR Reporter dropped in to Mr George Burns' Bean Canning Establishment on King street. In reply to enquiries about his business, Mr Burns said: "We have been running about three months now, and at present have facilities for making a much better quality of beans than when we started. I expect shortly to be able to put up 1,000 cases of beans per month, and if the ventura makes me great strides into the sympathies of the public in the future as it has in the past, these facilities will be totally inadequate for the demand. Last week we shipped 100 cases of beans (400 cans) to the St John Market, where this article bids fair to eclipse all American competitors. In the proper season we intend to can berries, tomatoes and salmon, in which latter I fancy a very decided improvement may be made."
There is no reason why the efforts Mr B. is making and the standard article he has placed before the public should not meet with such response as to make the canning business one of the prominent industries of the country. This afternoon Mr B. sent 10 cases of beans to a firm in Amherst, N. S.

"At Home" by Ladies Tilley and McDonald.

OTTAWA, Feb. 14, 1880.

Relief of Ireland.
Mr. O'Donnell, a barrister at Woodstock, and an unmistakable descendant of the "good O'Donnell stock," sends us the following for publication. The letter has also appeared in one of the St. John papers.
To the Editor of the Star.
Sir,—The cry of distress seems to become more urgent in Ireland, and every day sends across the cable more horrifying news of the extent of the famine ravages in that unfortunate country. In the words of the New York Herald: "For God's sake send us bread or money." Fancy 300,000 people suffering for want of something

to eat while here in New Brunswick our cellars are full of potatoes and our granaries full of grain. From conversation with a number of farmers in Carleton County we find a large quantity of potatoes could be procured, providing arrangements could be made to convey them safely to Ireland. Might not all the counties of New Brunswick contribute towards this very laudable undertaking? The farmers of New Brunswick, although having abundance of potatoes, have not much ready money. It is believed that the railways will carry the potatoes from the various counties to St. John, free of charge, if the matter be laid before the managers. Let the matter be agitated fully through the press. Some farmers in Carleton County already offer 50 bushels and others 100 bushels. Let us hear from different parts of the Province immediately. Will not some men in St. John move in the matter at once?

Parliament of Canada.
Friday's Session, A. M.
Mr Richey of Halifax moved the address in a very able manner, taking the speech up section by section. When he came to the Intercolonial Railway paragraph he pointed out that the expenses on that road had decreased markedly while the receipts were up to the mark.
Houde seconded the address in French.
Mackenzie made the usual complaint that the bill of fare was meagre; and in the most deplorable way told the House the people were leaving Canada for the United States in droves.
Sir John thought the bank system, civil service and railway tariff changes ought to be food for the voracious legislator. He thought it a good thing that farmers used to the country should go to the North-west from Ontario and their places get filled with farmers from England.

Evening Session.
Mr. Bannister and De Cosmos (Smith) justified the policy of the Government to British Columbia, and hoped Vancouver would get a railway.
Mr. Blake made a great plea for free trade, and deprecated the appointment of a resident Minister in England.
Mr. Anglin called for speedy action in the matter of the promised relief for Ireland.
Sir Leonard said we were prosperous, and would and should give out of our abundance. The Government would act speedily.
In the McDonnell matter, Sir John said he would order the issuance of another writ.
