



A DANGEROUS GAME

During the past few weeks there has been carried on among French-Canadians an industrious and systematic propaganda against National Service. Quebec audiences have been told that the Borden Government is using National Service as a stepping stone to conscription; that National Service cards are being issued under false pretences; that those who sign them are made liable for compulsory military service; and, finally, that the one way out of the difficulty is to refuse to sign the cards and work for the re turn to power of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. At the present time the cities of Quebec and Montreal are placarded with posters denouncing the Government for attempting to bring about conscription, and mass meetings are being daily held, addressed by Liberals and Nation alists, inflaming the puble mind against the Administration. Within the past week alone meetings of this character have been addressed by one of the most prominent of Quebec Liberal members of Par liament-Alphonse Verviile- as well as by the official Liberal can didate for a constituency in Montreal, and a score of others who are well known among Sir Wilfrid Laurier's workers in Quebec. Thero is all too good reason to believe that this sinister activity is being engineered from Ottawa, and that it is not being carried on without the knowledge and consent of Liberal leaders outside Que bec. The other day, for example, the Montreal Herald Telegraph. of which Hon. George P. Graham is the editor, contained a double column front page editorial denouncing any attempt to enforce con

The time has come in Canada for plain speaking. The truth is that a few mad partisans in the Liberal party are scheming to plunge this country into the turmoil of a war election, hoping thereby to be placed into power by the votes of the foreign ele ment in the West and a disloyal minority in the Province of Que bec. We do not affirm that this madly partisan scheme has the sanction or support of the rank and file of Canadian Liberals. The Crown Lands of the Province of New Brunswick consist of 71/4 million acres of which 61/2 million The revenues from these Crown

Lands pay most of the costs of public administration.

In common with other parts o Eastern Canada the quality of New Crunswick forests has been steadily deteriorating. In 1825, 400,000 tons of squared white pine was the export crop of a single season. White is almost an extinct commercial

A few years ago, hemlock was valued only for its bark. Today it is very scarce at \$12.00 to \$14.00 per housand feet for the round log.
The Government's minimum m urements for the spruce log have be n lowered, for the reason that the spruce stands were no longer equal

to higher specification.

The devastation of the forest areas by fire has reduced the stock of wood supplies much faster than have umbering operations.

Thousands of acres of timber land, where the soil could not possibly produce field, crops, have been taken up under pretense of settlement. The clearing fires of the temporary 'farm er' have spread into surrounding tim ber, taking a vast toll of badly need cd forest material. What the so call ed 'farmer' gained from clearing such land was but a fraction of what the irovince lost through his fires. More over, the toleration of settlement on lands unfit for agriculture is prepos terous from every point of view. The land is deprived of its only crop; the surrounding timber is frequently ruined; the 'human crop' is demoral ized by its shiftless purpose and in evitable poverty.





### WATCH ON CITY'S MILK

No Half-Measures When Inspectors Find Dangerous Practice

"Dump that milk out!"

in the pasteurizing plants.

Even before the milk leaves the cow the department has something to say about it. Twice a year, under the authority of the Ontario Milk Act of 1911, its veterinary inspectors—there are four of them—visit the dairy farms supplying Toronto. They test the herds for tuberculosis; observe the general cleanliness or otherwise of herds, stables, milking utensils, and the milkers themselves; point out, sometimes enforce, necessary improvements; and report to the laboratories in Toronto. In the laboratories a eard index record of every farm is kept, on which is noted the condition of that farm at each inspection. If it fails to conform to the standard of the milk supply is excluded from the dity.
