GOVERNOR IS STRUNG UP FOR

Convicted of Being Responsible for Armenian Deportations and

Constantinople, April 14.- Kemal Bey, governor of Diarbekr, has been publicly hanged in Bayazid square in stamboul in the presence of the miliary governor of Constantinople and other high officials. Kemal eBy was entenced to death as one of those esponsible for the Armenian deportation and massacres in the Yozghad district. The former commander of the Gendarmerie in Yozghad was senenced to fifteen years' imprisonment in the fortress. These sentences were confirmed b

an imperial irade.

The trial of those responsible for the Armenian massacres by the Turks egan early in February at Constan tinople. The prosecutor declared that it was necessary to punish the authors of the massacres, which had filled the whole world with a feeling of horror.

IN RIOTS IN CITY OF CAIRO

Over 100 Wounded in Two-day Fight in the Streets. Soldiers are Charged With the Responsibility.

Cairo, Egypt, Friday, April 11._In wo days of rioting here, ended at noon on Thuriday, 38 persons were killed and 100 wounded, it is announced in 'o-day's official communique. Armenians were chiefly the object of the nob's attacks, and seven of those killed were of that nationality. In rloting in Alexandria three pursons were killed and six seriously injured on Saturday norning, while a continuation of atttacks on the troops resulted in the 'cilling of seventeen other persons during the afternoon. The text of the statement reads:

"There was further rioting in Calro yesterday. The mob, armed with knives and hatchets, made attacks largely directed at Armenians. The police report 3 killed and 100 wounded during the 48 hours, ending at noon yesterday. and four Greeks. Military measure's were enforced and the night passed off qui tly.

BIG LOSS IN GRANARIES

Bad Weather and Mice Destroy Much Grain.

construction of granaries and bins for loose grain is to be sure that the structure is designed with sufficient strength to prevent buiging of the sides and springing of the floor, for grain, owing to its enormous outward thrust, corresponding somewhat to that of water, has a tendency to burst the sides unless well braced or supported. Timber con-struction requires frequent repairs to prevent decay and general deprecia-tion from use. It is always liable to climate conditions. The boards will crack and shrink in the summer when the bins may be empty, and when the new grain is dumped into the bins an enormous quantity promptly dis-appears into the cracks and crevices and through mice holes, entailing the consumer and to the nation. Care of Ewes After Weaning. In order to avoid udder trouble it is necessary to keep a close watch of the ewes for a few days after they are separated from the lambs. No a few cases of defective udders can be traced to the want of a little care in this respect. Milk out just enough to keep the udder soft the day after the lambs have been weaned. After two days time they are again milked out. Some ewes do not need any more attention after the second milking. Such ewes may be marked to indicate that they are dry. Three more days should elapse before the next milking is done and this method followed until it is certain the entire flock is safe. In con-junction with the method outlined above the ewes should be separated some distance from the lambs, and be on scant pastures until all are perfectly dry. This is a good time to go over the flock and cull out all undesirable members. Non-producers and those with broken mouths and poor udders should not be retained. A good deal of the success of the subsequent lamb crop will depend upon the treatment the ewes receive from time of weaning until after they are bred. They should have good pastures and be given an opportunity of putting on flesh. This is what is commonly called "flushing." Nothing is better for this purpose than rape pasture. It is usually from six weeks o two months from date of sowing that rape is ready for pasture. If rape pasture is not available new seeding or second crop of clover will serve fairly well. Stock should not be turned on rape or fresh clover for the first time when the leaves are wet from rain or even dew, in order to avoid trouble from bloating.—





Canadian Masons In England

the United Grand Lodge of England was founded in provide a Masonic

centre for Cana-dians resident in Great Britain and Brethren from the Dominion visiting the Old Country.

The object of the founders was also to form a bond of union between the Brethren of the Dominion and the Brethren of the United Kingdom in the strong hope and confidence that Freemasonry might so even still further assist in the great work of forming these bonds of "indissoluble attachment" which shall forever unite the component parts of the British Empire. The Lodge has now 282 members, many of whom are Dominion members resi-

dent in all parts of Canada. No fewer than 150 are initiates of the Lodge. 205 members of the Lodge are on active service in H. M. Forces. Mr. Hugh Strain Carmichael, the newly-elected W. M. of Canada Lodge, is a native of Giasgow. He has been connected with the Transatlanite steamship trade since 1888, when he joined the staff of the State Line, which in 1891 was taken over by the Allan Line. In 1895 he commenced his long connection with the Canadian Pacific Company at Glasgow, transferring to its Liverpool office in 1903, when the company established its transatlantic passenger service. In 1908 he was promoted to be general passenger gent for Great Britain and Europe. Since the establishment, in 1915-16, of the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, Ltd., which manages the entire fleet of the C. P. R. and Allan Lines, Mr. Carmichael has occupied the position of passenger and freight manager, and has his head-

Var to Peace

Bringing Our Soldiers' Dependents to Canada

TN England, there is a colony of Canadian women who went overseas in I order to be near their husbands. There are also in England and France many women who married Canadian soldiers and have never seen Canada.

It is one of the duties that Canada has incurred through the war to bring back these dependents of our soldiers with all speed, and to help establish their home life.

Up till the time the Armistice was signed, some 22,000 women and children were returned. There still remain about 50,000 to be brought back.

These 50,000 soldiers' dependents will be returned to Canada at the public expense. Those who have already arrived in Canada since November 11th, 1918, will have their ocean and railway fare refunded by the Government.

The facilities for transporting soldiers and their dependents are limited to about 30,000 monthly. Therefore, women and children will be returned to Canada at the rate of about 5,000 to 7,000 each month. Many of the women will be accompanied by their husbands. On every boat carrying 200 or more unaccompanied women there is a Y.W.C.A. secretary.

At the Ports.

To these 50,000 returning women and children every care is being given. Until they reach the shores of Canada they are in charge of the Overseas Militia Department.

At HALIFAX they are welcomed by the Women's Reception Committee, composed of women who have been engaged in war activities. This committee has been organized for nearly two years and has been doing splendid work.

At ST. JOHN there is also a com-

mittee representing all the organizations interested. This committee, although more recently formed, is giving excellent service. The National Y.W.C.A. has assigned two secretaries for work at this port. On each of these Committees there is

a trained nurse to give necessary attendance.

At the ports the organizations meet every boat. Locate the women's luggage. Take charge of the babies. Bring the women to a cosy rest room. Here cots and baths are provided for the children. Hot lunch can be secured.

Overnight accommodation is arranged. Women who are too sick to proceed on their journey are taken to the local hospitals. Women who are without

money receive assistance from the Patriotic Fund; are provided with lunch baskets and money to buy meals on the

These organizations also secure the railroad tickets for the women, get their money changed, give them such information as they need. . The workers accompany the women to the train.

The Repatriation Committee have a nurse, trained in social work, lent by the Victorian Order of Nurses to act as the committee's representative at each port On the Train.

On each train carrying unaccompanied women and children there is a Red Cross nurse, experienced in social service who has been enrolled by the Canadian Association of Graduate Nurses. This nurse carries with her first aid supplies and an emergency fund of money furnished by the Red Cross Society.

Telegrams are sent ahead to the local branch of the Patriotic Fund and to the local Reception Committees giving the number who will arrive.

The Rotary Clubs of Canada have undertaken to provide motor cars to take the women and children from the station to their homes.

The Patriotic Fund have undertaken to provide temporary accommodation and other necessary assistance at cities and towns en route and at points of des-

The main function of this nation-wide organization is to care for soldiers' dependents. It is therefore fitting that they should be responsible for arrangements for all the returning women and

Many other well-known organizations have been doing admirable work-meeting trains, providing rest-rooms, canteens and hostels and generally caring for the women and children. It is important that these organizations continue this work and co-operate as closely as possible with the Patriotic Fund.



Over 7,500 Persons Were Placed

SMAL TABLETS AFTER MEALS Experience Shows Cold Nights Lowers Milk Flow When Cows Are Left In Fields.

Contributed by Ontario Department a

INCE Oct. 31st, 1917, the Ontario Government Public Employment Bureau have secured employment for 19,000 persons, of which 7 016 were men and 11,984 women. This work has been accomplished for the most part through the efforts of the offices at Toronto, Ottawa, Hamilton and London. Since April, however, new bureaus have been opened at Kingston, Port Arthur and Fort William. In order that the best results might be gained through the campaigns for farm laborers the efforts of the Trades and Labor Branch, the Organsation of Resources Committee and co-ordinated. The province was divided into six districts, each centering around one of the bureaus. The county, through the Agricultural Re-presentative, is kept in touch with one of the Employment Bureaus.
Thus the surplus labor in one part of
the province may be shifted to a
part where a scarcity is felt. Any farmer in Ontario, by communicating for his county, may learn how farm help can be obtained.

To date 7,800 persons have been placed on Ontario farms. Of these some 3,300 were men, 2,140 boys and 1,260 women. Several campaigns have been launched including, "Soldiers of the Soil" (boys between 14 and 19 years), "Haying and Harvest," "Sugar Beet Hoeing," "Threshing and Fall Ploughing," and "Flax Pulling." Over 250 boys were sent to the sugar beet fields of the Chatheld in the Griffin Family Theatre yes- ham district, and 125 are now pull-

Of the 1,260 women sent the malority are on fruit farms. An effort was made at the Toronto office to send women to assist in the farm kitchens with the result that 70 women have gone to this work. During the winter a class was organized for the purpose of giving girls a trainabout 150 women and girls have gone out to assist on mixed farms throughout the province. The results achieved by these women have been satisfactory from the standpoint of the

The season for cold nights will be here all too soon, in this northern climate. While it is true that keeping the cows inside means more labor in cleaning the stable and more difficulty in keeping the cows clean, the extra fertilizing material collected in this way will probably pay for the extra labor. If this does not, the extra supple of milk received by keeping the cows in a comfortable stable at times when the temperature drops below freezing-point, will do so. Experience shows that cold has a very marked effect in lessening the milk flow, particularly for cows that have been milking for some time, when the natural tendency is for the cow to dry up and during which time every means should be adopted to keep the cow milking. Cows should milk at least ten months of the year. Leaving cows out of doors on cold nights, after they have been milking for six or eight months, makes a greater tendency for these cows to go

Where cows are kept inside, the stuble should be cleaned regularly and some absorbent material like sawdust, shavings, chaff, or cutstraw, should be scattered along the passages, on the platform, and in the gutter. This helps very much in cleaning the stable and in keeping


the cows clean. Another advantage of stabling on rosty nights, is that it prevents the cows eating frozen feed, which is generally considered to be injurious to milk cows. They may be kept in the stable or yard until after the pasture thaws, and in this way the animals are protected against digestive troubles, and conditions are more favor able for maintaining the health and milk-flow of the animals. Prevent Great Farm Loss. If, through better care and mangement, the average life of farm machines could be increased by a single year what a tremendous saving would be effected. The amount a farmer loses each year through neglect of his machinery would pay for the erection of a plain weather-proof shed that would keep them in good condition.—Prof. John Evans, O. A.
