The catch of seals for 1894 was the largest ever made in such a short time. The total Canadian catch was 94,474, a little more than 20,000 more than the catch of 1893.

Glasgow advises that the construction of the new Valkyrie is progressing rapidly. The length of her water line will be 89 feet. Clyde yachtsmen express the belief that the new boat will not differ much from the British ones that she will be improved where the Britannia is weak in running and free reaching.

While addressing a meeting in Glasgow on the evening of the 18th the Duke of Argyle suddenly fainted. He reeled while in the middle of a sentence and lay back-wards on his seat as he saw the duke tottering. For a time it was thought the duke was dead, but he regained consciousness. There was great excitement in the hall and the meeting was dissolved.

Hon. Mr. Laurier has informed the Gaspé Liberals that they will have to look out for another standard bearer. He has not accepted nomination in that county. It is also said that Charles N. Armstrong of the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway, and Mr. F. C. Cotton becomes leader.

Mr. P. H. Armand for many years manager of the office of the merchants' Bank of Halifax, has been detailed to proceed to Newfoundland to look into matters financial in St. John, and perhaps afterwards to establish a branch of the bank there.

On Saturday says a dispatch from St. Stephen, N. B., of the bridge connecting that town with Calais, Me., was completed. The bridge is half by the new Brunswick government and half by the town of Calais.

As will be seen by reference to another column, an unexpected and extraordinary political crisis took place in Paris last week. The downfall of a ministry in France, since the inauguration of the present Republic, has been a matter of such common occurrence, that it came to create but little surprise.

ABOUT A YEAR ago a reduction was made in the salaries of teachers on account of the alteration in the supplementary clauses of the School Act. This reduction chiefly affects the teachers in the towns and villages, but more particularly those in Charlottetown and Summerside.

THE DEATHLESS DEAD.

On the occasion of the State Funeral, commenced in England and terminated in Canada, of the late Sir John S. D. Thompson, P. C., K. C., M. G., Premier of the Dominion (Montreal True Witness).

In the presence of our Monarch, almost at her feet to die! When his sun of life was flashing in the zenith of its sky; When the earthly path of glory, with successful feet was trod; Thus to pass from one palace through the palace gates of God!

As the Church, in woman's greatness, offers up the requiem prayer. With his crucifix behind him, with his cross in his hand; Beside the altar, in regalia as he died. Meanwhile forth an order goeth to Great Britain's iron fleet;

Not the conquering Roman galleys; not the Argosies triumphant, bearing home the Golden Fleece; Not that vessel which, from St. Helena's lonely rock; Not the proudest British warship, thunder-brimmed for battle's shock;

When, at eve, the fiery chargers of the sun have stopped to drink, And the pallid moon is hanging on horizon's dizzy brink; O'er the vastness of the ocean the Almighty seems to bend;

And to watch the funeral vessel as the shades of night descend; Loudly through the steel-clad rigging how the wailing tempest raves; As a billion stars are tracing on the wilderness of waves;

The Two Lourdes. The most striking quality of Lourdes and all things concerning it, and connected with it, is the absolute sincerity of it all.

The expressions of this sincerity of belief in the miracles that have occurred at Lourdes and of the graces and other gifts received here in answer to prayer, cry out from the walls in no uncertain terms and proclaim the glory of the Blessed Virgin of Lourdes in Catholicity, nor even in God.

As time rolled on, the true anti-Christian and anti-social system of the secret society developed and displayed itself more and more fully. Hence, among the grounds of condemnation in the constitutions of 1821 and 1825, we have, 6th, their furious and satanic hatred of the Vicar of Christ; 7th, their league of secret murder; 8th, their avowed atheism; 9th, their conspiracy against all legitimate authority, in the State as well as in the Church, etc.

Reconciliations between divided friends, or in families, are recorded as taking place in answer to prayers offered up at Lourdes. Those who know how bitter, and keen, and severing enmities between dear friends or relations may be, and how hopeless all attempts at reconciliation prove, will best appreciate all the wonder, and surprise, and joy, and love, conveyed in the simple expressions of heartfelt thankfulness written on the marble slabs.

And in this way the place declares itself. It is redolent of piety; and a solemn air seems to fill this whole valley of the swift-flowing Gave; and the snow-clad mountains that enclose the scene, stand like the walls of great natural cathedrals, and help the glorious impressions of the whole site. Any man who has the capacity to be moved by the beautiful in nature or in art, could not look upon this scene without emotion. To the Christian and the Catholic the whole place is as a spacious church, where signs of religion and the presence of God meet him on many sides.

Frenchmen, scholars and savants, who knew his writings, were considering his claim to be admitted a member of the French Academy. For fifteen times he has sought this honor, and fifteen times it has been refused him. Now, in this latest election, he did not even get one vote. In France he is better known than in Italy, and the choicer minds of the nation have shown how they value him. Not one was found low enough to vote for him.

Cambier, who has been charged with the foundation of this new Christian station, arrived on the spot appointed for its erection.

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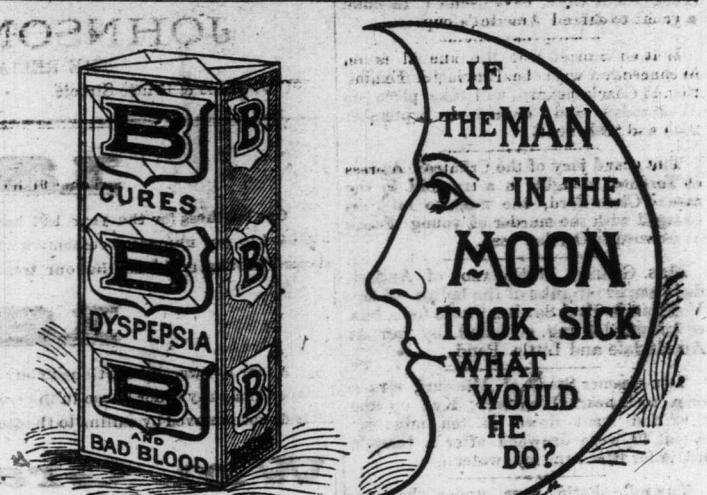

SECRET SOCIETIES. SUMMARY OF THE CHURCH LEGISLATION IN REGARD TO THEM. As supplementary to our editorial article of last week we give here a syllabus prepared in 1866 by the late Very Rev. Dr. Murray, of Maynooth, and printed as an appendix in Robertson's "Lectures on Modern History and Biography," Dublin, 1864. With the subsequent condemnations by Pope Pius IX. and His Holiness now gloriously reigning, our readers are no doubt acquainted. Dr. Murray wrote as follows:
