THE TORY LEADER.

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No journalist in Canada has had better opportunities in recent years of studying the public career of the Tory chieftam than the present editor of the Winnipeg Sun. He has been behind the scenes at Ottawa and Toronto, and writes with an accurate knowledge of the subject he discusse.
