The rich should give of their abundance to help the poor. The application of the Gospel of Christ was the only remedy for bringing about amelioration in their condition. The poor, said Our Divine Lord, are always with us, and thereby an opportunity is given to the rich to acquire most in the sight of God by being kind and charitable to them. The teachings of so-called Socialism are ineffectual and founded on wrong principles. The Monsignor quoted in a ready and learned manner from the scriptures the principal texts bearing on the subject and so made it quite clear to the congregation that the greatest of the virtues was charity, and that when St. James spoke of doers of the word he meant people who helped the poor."



Hails for 9,600 Old and Young Seals---Leaking Badly---Loses Two Propeller Blades and Narrowly Escapes Destruction.

The vessel hails for 9,600 old and young seals. After leaving here on the 12th March the ship was in company with the Beothic and Bellaventure until the night of the 13th, when it became stormy with thick snow and she lost sight of both vessels. She ran down off the Funks and several old seals were seen, and the first white coat was taken on the 22nd. The vessel had steamed in towards the main patch in company with the Aurora, Erik Ranger and Bloodhound, and getting to the eastern end of the big patch secured about 600. She then steame further in and passed the Newfound land, Florizel, Bellaventure and Algerine all with their flags out and most of the patch cut up by them. By this time the ship had 2,000 seals. and one night in the latter part of March the men worked by moon-light and secured about 3,000. In this ice the vessel secured about 7, 500 young seals and then went in search of the old fat, steaming down some miles to the north of the White Bears on the Labrador Coast. The seals were fairly plentiful all th month of April but the ice was loos and no chance could be got to kil any great number. As a matter of fact the old seals killed were shot from boats in the water and picked off the scattered ice. The ship bor up for home Friday morning last, and though she had lost two blades of her propeller, one on either side of the "boss" in forcing through heavy ice during the spring, she made good speed and it looked like a quick run to port. Shortly after noon the weather became thick, a gale of E.N.E. wind sprang up and soon a regular blizzard set in. For nearly two hours one could hardly see the length of the ship ahead, but a bright look-out was kept. Suddenly, at 4 p.m., one of the crew who was standing on the deck caught a glimpse of land dead ahead of the ship and instantly gave the alarm. This proved to be Belle Isle in the Straits, and the ship was almost in on the north eastern end of the island, with the wind blowing a gale dead on the land and a big sear running on the cliff. His health, however, had been considerably broken by the experiences of the last year and from office when Nord Alexis was December 21st, 1908. Port au Prince ,000 men. Nord Alexis was variousy estimated at from 90 to 100 years of age. He was a descendant of one of the oldest families in Havti. Nord. Alexis, became President of Hayti in 1902. His term was to have expired May 15th, 1909, but his administration was not successful. Hambourg. even in his finest moments, leaves the sense of the listener unwarmed by any gracious influence. His lack of selfcontrol has long been a besetting sin with him. It leads him to extravagant and bizarre methods of pounding at certain moments and a wooden stodriness at other times. Seldom has one heard a more uneven performanc than his Chopin centenary recital on Monday night. In the famous sonata in B flat minor, for instance, a work which he has played many times in Toronto, he played both badly and well. The first movement was about the most uninspired effort that could be imagined from a man of his fame while the Funeral March and the presto movement were exquisitely and movingly played. At times in the Polonaise in A flat he butchered the work in a manner which recalled Sauer's recent assertion that "Chopin from Heaven looks down deprecatingly on the maltreatment so ofter accorded his works in concert hal! and salon." In certain of the Studies Hambourg achieved sheer loveliness by virtue of his grace and agility of touch. Why then did he not always aim at beautiful effects? The variety and the comparative unfamiliarity of much of the programme which em braced examples of Chopin's work in all modes, showed, how wonderful and poetic a genius the composer was within his chosen field, but for the most part. Hambourg refrained fron playing in a poetic way and ofter seemed to be capriciously experi menting. If it had been possible to find some intimate lover of music who had never heard Chopin and to have taken him to the recital with the information that Chopin was the most poetic of all composers for the pianoforte, he would at many mo-




