when suddenly, to her amazement, she saw her own name.

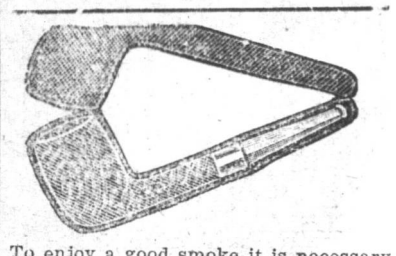



A few days ago I read in the newspapers the story of how a beautiful young woman had come to the verge of starvation in the city of New York. Did it make my blood boil to think that such things could be in a civilized community?

No, I was simply thoroughly indignant at and disgusted with the young woman.

A queer way to feel? Not at all.

For the young woman was Mabel Gilman Corey, the former chorus girl, now mistress of millions, and the starvation was self-inflicted and was for the purpose of maintaining the hipless, curveless, unnatural figure that is considered so indispensable nowadays.

Imagine being possessed of wealth and health to enjoy to the full all the pleasures that wealth could buy, and deliberately destroying such great opportunities for happiness, simply in order to be thin.

Nor is Mabel Corey's case a very extraordinary one. Every now and then the papers chronicle the sickness of some society woman who has broken her health trying to be thin.

"Bones," said my dressmaker to me gravely, the other day, "are beautiful nowadays. The girl with the long, thin neck and the bones big enough to hang a hat on is in luck these times."

"A thin slip of a girl like a new moon, Sure to be rounded into beauty soon," wrote Longfellow once on a time, of Agnes Surrey.

Doubtless if he had lived in these days some stylish dressmaker would have told him that he was writing nonsense—that if Agnes were a "thin slip of a thing" she was already at the acme of beauty, and that any "rounding" far from making her beautiful, would make her quite impossible.

And I think it's all perfect nonsense.

Call bones and straight lines and absolutely figureless figures stylish if you will but don't try to persuade us that they are beautiful or artistic.

Health is the first requisite of beauty, and boniness is not healthy.

"The anxiety to lose weight for a fashionable figure is positively dangerous," said a prominent doctor lecturing at Harvard Medical School the other day. "Some people think fatness is a disease that will go on and destroy the system, while on the contrary it is generally a sign of health, nature's reserve, and is just as desirable as money in the bank."

Now I am not blowing the horn of the woman with the redundant figure. There is nothing I dislike any more than what the last generation used to term "a fine figure of a woman."


But I do maintain that reasonable curves and plumpness are just as beautiful to-day as they ever were, that this bone fad has gone on quite long enough, and that it is time the women of America revolted against it, and set up the normal figure again as the standard of beauty.

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Green mayonnaise is a tempting novelty to serve with cold boiled white fish or vegetable salads. It is made in the usual way, tinted with scaled and chopped parsley, and with a few chopped olives mixed in.

A nice sandwich mixture that is particularly suitable for summer teas is made from ripe, red currants, mixed with cream cheese. Strain the juice from the currants and mix with the cheese to a soft paste.

A fat trunk tray kept in the laundry will prove a great convenience. The napkins, doyles, lunch cloths, etc. may be laid out on it in neat, separate piles.

As water evaporates from the plum pudding, more boiling water should be added so as not to check the cooking, which must go on steadily all the time.

Some housewives always make their ironholders of marble cloth, using suitable material for interlining. The advantage is that they may always be wiped off when soiled.

Pecan and English walnut meats, chopped and halved, and laid over the top of a pumpkin pie just before it goes into the oven, makes fine seasoning, rich and well-flavoured.

A tried cement for cracked china is this: Mix the white of an egg with sufficient powdered lime to make a paste. Apply it to the broken edges, press firmly together and place the article where it will not be disturbed until the paste has hardened.

For an apple and lemon filling for cake, grate two apples and scald them with two eggs, and the rind and juice of a lemon. Stir in a cupful of sugar. When the mixture cools use as a filling between layers. Cover the top of the cake with whipped cream.

If there is a bit of cold ham left over, chop it fine, add an equal quantity of mashed potatoes and bind together with an egg. Shape as one would potato cakes and saute in butter. This makes an excellent luncheon or breakfast dish. The addition of a little green pepper is tasty.

For a delicious fruit punch, mix half a can of shredded pineapple with the juice of three lemons and four oranges, add two sliced bananas and a cupful and a half of sugar, and turn into a bowl with a large piece of ice. Let it stand until time for serving. Then turn in a pint of mineral water.

The money was turned over to the police and will probably be returned to Miss Sullivan. It is thought the stove had been used as a safety vault by her brother-in-law, who died several years ago.

Unless citizens are earnest about such matters, Councillors will not be over-zealous, and the city will continue to drag on in its old unsanitary ways, and citizens will continue to pay the heavy toll of illness and death, 50 per cent. of which is preventable.

Going to New York.

Trade Disputes.

BOSTON, May 1.
 May day, generally regarded as the first day in the industrial year, finds in New England numerous disagreements. Nearly 10,000 working people were to-night at odds with their employers largely because of demanded wage increases. The 4,200 Union Trolley Men employed at Springfield, Worcester, and other places in Western Mass., and in Connecticut on street railway lines operated by the New England Investment and Security Co., a trolley holding concern for the New England New Haven and Hartford Railroad, awaited to-night only the sanction of the national officers before calling a strike in furtherance of their demands for an increase in wages.
 The building trades in Providence, Pawtucket, Newport and Auburn in Rhode Island and in Fall River will be crippled to-morrow morning by the declared strike of about 2,500 Carpenters and Laborers seeking increase in wages. Strikes which were in progress prior to that date are several. The trouble in the Mills of the International Paper Co. now several months old still continues although only a few men are now out. The same number of operators at Roxbury Carpet Mills has been out two weeks following their demand for a 25 per cent increase in wages.

Will Buy Schooner.

Capt. W. Carroll will go to Placentia to-morrow. He will leave for Halifax by next Red Cross boat. From Halifax he will go to New Brunswick to purchase a new schooner in which will be installed a gasoline engine. On returning to St. John's the schooner will be used by Job Bros. & Co. in the general freighting of the country. Capt. Carroll has a half interest in her.

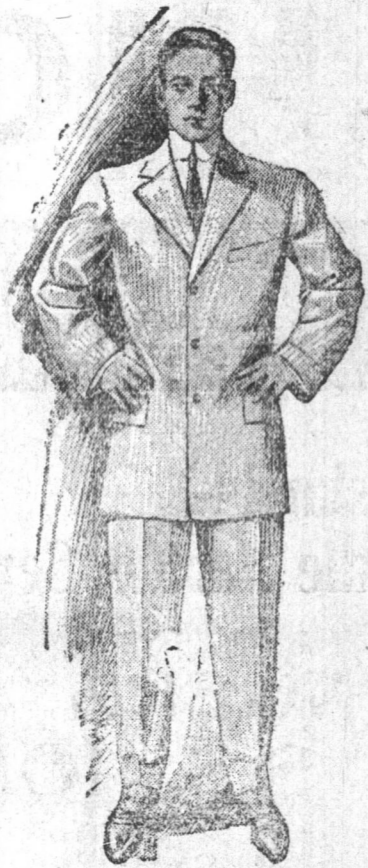

R. C. Cathedral.

Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche preached at the R. C. Cathedral last night. Taking his text from the Epistle of St. James, 1st chap. 22 to 27 verse: "Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only deceiving your own selves, etc."

The preacher then in eloquent terms went on to show that our Divine Saviour's Gospel of charity and the doctrine of almsgiving had reformed the world. Under the old law bloodshed and cruelty were quite common, and men delighted in acts of torture. The teaching of our Saviour changed all this, and the first Christians were the great models of charity and brotherly love. The necessity of giving alms was inculcated by the preacher, for our Lord said: "Faith without good works is dead." There should be more consideration for the poor and destitute, and those who have riches, more than they require, should give of their abundance; they should be doers of the word and not hearers only. Some people excuse themselves from giving alms on the grounds that the recipients may not need assistance and they may be acting the part of impostors. The giving of alms even then will not lose its merit as far as the donor is concerned. It is better to give even to one who imposes on the donor than not to give at all. The rich should give of their abundance to help the poor. The application of the Gospel of Christ was the only remedy for bringing about amelioration in their condition. The poor, said Our Divine Lord, are always with us, and thereby an opportunity is given to the rich to acquire most in the sight of God by being kind and charitable to them. The teachings of so-called Socialism are ineffectual and founded on wrong principles. The Monsignor quoted in a ready and learned manner from the scriptures the principal texts bearing on the subject and so made it quite clear to the congregation that the greatest of the virtues was charity, and that when St. James spoke of "doers of the word he meant people who helped the poor."

Concert at Grate's Cove
Wednesday night, the 20th ult., at Grate's Cove was a night of enjoyment. The members of St. Joseph's Club accompanied by some of the most popular ladies of Grate's Cove, and also a number of school children, presented themselves at the second concert this year. Songs, recitations, solos, duets, dialogues and marches were given. Interesting features were a drill and an illustrated song, "Nothing bothers."—Com.

The address, which was impromptu, was very interesting. Mr. Lowther showed that religion and art could not be separated in the consideration of eternal love and eternal truth. A delightful solo was rendered by Mr. S. J. Tucker, whose singing of "Abide with Me" to a new setting was a real treat. Mr. R. Kendall presided at the instrument.

No News of Him.
I. G. Sullivan Saturday had a wire from the friends of Thos. Russell, of Bonavista, who is missing from the Aurora, asking if there was any news of him from the Neptune. Serg. Byrne repaired to that ship and closely questioned the officers and most of the members of the crew, but none had seen the man while the ship was at Pool's Island before starting for the sealfishery. The belief is now entertained that Russell accidentally and unobserved by others of the crew fell overboard from the Aurora while she was proceeding north from this port and was drowned.

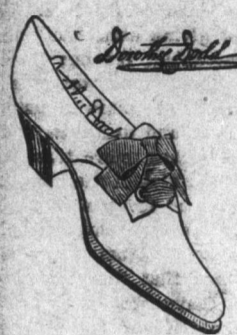

The Adventure In Port.

Hails for 9,600 Old and Young Seals--
Leaking Badly--Loses Two Propeller
Blades and Narrowly Escapes
Destruction.

The s.s. Adventure, Capt. Henry Dawe, arrived here from the seal-fishery at 8.30 a.m. yesterday after a very trying experience. The vessel hails for 9,600 old and young seals. After leaving here on the 12th March the ship was in company with the Bosphoric and Bellavente until the night of the 13th, when it became stormy with thick snow and she lost sight of both vessels. She ran down off the Funks and several old seals were seen, and the first white coat was taken on the 22nd. The vessel had steamed in towards the main patch in company with the Aurora, Erik Hanger and Bloodhound, and getting to the eastern end of the big patch secured about 600. She then steamed further in and passed the Newfoundland, Florizel, Bellavente and Algetine all with their flags out and most of the patch cut up by them. By this time the ship had 2,000 seals, and one night in the latter part of March, the men worked by moonlight and secured about 2,400. In this ice the vessel secured about 7,500 young seals and then went in search of the old fat, steaming down some miles to the north of the White Bears on the Labrador Coast. The seals were fairly plentiful all the month of April but the ice was loose and no chance could be got to kill any great number. As a matter of fact the old seals killed were shot from boats in the water and picked off the scattered ice. The ship bore up for home Friday morning last, and though she had lost two blades of her propeller, one on either side of the "boss" in forcing through heavy ice during the spring, she made good speed and it looked like a quick run to port. Shortly after noon the weather became thick, a gale of E.N.E. wind sprang up and soon a regular blizzard set in. For nearly two hours one could hardly see the length of the ship ahead, but a bright look-out was kept. Suddenly, at 4 p.m., one of the crew who was standing on the deck caught a glimpse of land dead ahead of the ship and instantly gave the alarm. This proved to be Belle Isle in the Straits, and the ship was almost in on the north eastern end of the island, with the wind blowing a gale dead on the land and a big sea running on the cliff. This is the highest part of the island and the ship

was not much more than twice the length of herself from it when the helm was put to port just in time to clear it. Second-hand Parsons had the bridge at the time and manipulated the ship with consummate skill. Members of the crew say that had the accident occurred at night or had the land been so quickly observed the ship would have been dashed to pieces and not one of the 203 men on board could have been saved, as no boat could live in the high sea which ran on the island. When the alarm was raised, Capt. Dawe ran to the bridge and took charge. Navigator Newhook also helped materially to get the vessel into a position of safety. The ship answered her helm "luckily, and then a big iceberg was descried quite near her, and much trouble was experienced in trying to work clear of this also. After getting the ship's head round, so heavily did the wind and sea sweep towards the island that with every pound of steam on her it took fully two hours before the ship was out of perilous proximity with the land. Most of the crew were below, and rushing on deck and witnessing the terrible predicament in which they found themselves, some looked pitiously, while others stood mute and horror-stricken at the awful possibility of being dashed to death against the foaming cliffs. Chief Engineer D. McFarlane, Second Engineer C. Ellis and frames Mark Abbott and Alf King, who were on duty in the engine room, realizing their responsibility, stuck to their posts and are regarded as heroes by the crew, for had they left the engine room for a minute when the panic began nothing would have saved the ship. Firemen Dormidy, Roberts, Hynes and Stamp also rushed into the engine room and rendered valuable help to their mates. In the midst of this several heavy seas struck the ship and came on board. One running forward struck the carpenter, Mr. Parsons, and hurled him with terrific force against a winch. His lip and nose were laid open and he was severely cut about the head. Another man named Rex was badly hurt about the legs and body. Both were looked after by stewards McCrudden and Baker. Besides the damage to her propeller the Adventure is also leaking and pumps are kept going on her. The ship saw the Aurora about two weeks ago, just north of Belle Isle, and she reported then for 7,000 old and young seals. Some of the crew of the Ranger were on board the ship Sunday week and reported for 5,000. Tuesday last the Bloodhound was seen off the Round Hill Islands, and seemed from her appearance to have a good trip of fat. The Diana was seen two weeks ago and has 7,000 seals. None on the ship will ever forget the terrible experience when the ship was under the cliffs at Belle Isle.

Died in Exile.
KINGSTON, May 1.
The ex-President of Hayti, died here to-day. His death occurred after a brief illness. His health, however, had been considerably broken by the experiences of the last year and a half, for he was deposed from the Presidency and sent into exile. He had been a refugee here since the revolution in 1908, and was possessed of considerable property in Kingston. A picturesque ruler was removed from office when Nord Alexis was compelled to flee from Hayti on December 21st, 1908. Port au Prince was then in the hands of the revolutionists and Gen. Antonine Simon, who afterwards became President, was marching up with an army of 5,000 men. Nord Alexis was variously estimated at from 90 to 100 years of age. He was a descendant of one of the oldest families in Hayti. Nord Alexis became President of Hayti in 1902. His term was to have expired May 15th, 1909, but his administration was not successful. Prominent politicians grumbled because he did not give them what they considered their fair share of the spoils and punished some notorious looters of the National Treasury. Early in 1908 the movement against him had gained great strength and in March a reign of terror was subsequently inaugurated in Port au Prince. The Government sent out troops who seized many of the revolutionists and summarily put a number of them to death. Warships of several nations hastened to Port au Prince, and their arrival secured the lives and property of foreigners. For only a few months however did Alexis maintain his rule. In November he ordered Gen. Antonine Simon, Commander of the South of Port au Prince, to confer with him on the situation. Gen. Simon refused to comply and took up arms against the President. His march to the Capital was a triumphant one and on his approach to Port au Prince, the people of that city turned against their President. The surrounded the palace and took possession of the city.

Alarm of Fire.

Seeing smoke for a moment envelop the roof of Mr. E. Sinnott's house, Circular Road, a young man passing there at 6.12 p.m. yesterday turned in an alarm from box 221. The Central and Eastern firemen responded but there was no need for their services. The wind blew the smoke from the chimney down on the roof and gave the person who rang in the alarm the idea that it was on fire.

ANXIETY ABOUT PARENT.—Yesterday at 1 p.m. two little boys of the West End visited the lockup and asked the guard if their father had been arrested Saturday night. They were very anxious about him as he had gone out Saturday evening and had not put in an appearance at his home up to the time of their enquiring for him.

May day in Paris passed off quietly. The Government has taken the strongest precautions and troops patrolled Bois de Boulogne and the Boulevards, but their services were not required. The general federation of labor in the face of Premier Briand's energetic attitude last evening did not attempt to carry out its threatened demonstration. Throughout the provinces also quiet prevailed.

Massacre at Nyassa.

PARIS, April 20.
There is a serious uprising of the natives at Nyassa, Portuguese East Africa. King Munro at the head of the tribes has massacred the people, pillaged and burned the settlements, and destroyed Empogua.

Stronghold Abandoned

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 1.
Late official despatches received here state that fighting between the Turkish troops and the Albanians lasted 13 hours. Finally surrounded on all sides the Albanians made a disorderly retreat leaving many behind who were made prisoners. The Albanians lost 500 men and the Turks 100. It is believed by the officials here that the retreat from this important pass has broken the back of the rebellion.

Kite's Narrow Escape.

When the Kite was coming from the Gulf seafishery she had a very narrow escape from going ashore off the Bull, Cow and Calf in a dense fog late on Tuesday night last. The look-out described the rocks just as the ship was in about three times the length of herself from them, and the altering of her helm just enabled her to escape them. The heavy currents setting landward on this dangerous section of the coast, where so many wrecks have occurred in the past, accounted for the proximity of the ship to the land, though Captain Carroll used every care and kept a bright look-out. It was reckoned that the ship was well clear of the land but a more than ordinarily heavy tide set shorewards and dragged the ship in. It was perfectly calm and smooth at the time, so that even had the worst occurred there would likely be time enough for all to escape in their boats.

The Regulus Here.

The s.s. Regulus, Capt. Randall, arrived here from Philadelphia at 7 p.m. yesterday after a run of 7 days. From the time she left there she had strong head gales with a heavy sea and on Friday last the wind blew exceptionally hard from the N.W. reaching the velocity of a hurricane that night. The sea ran mountains high but the ship came through without mishap. She brought a cargo of coal to A. J. Harvey & Co., and also some gasoline.

Dear Sir,—As is my custom nearly every spring, although I must admit later than at this date, I went to Carbonear last week, and I had what people call a really good time. I am well acquainted with many people there and I made an attempt to visit them all, but I failed. I called into the shops of Mr. Duff and Mr. Maddock, and the clerks are so kind like, and seem to never be tired trying to please you. I bought a nice pair of tan shoes at Mr. Duff's store. One thing I noticed there that pleased me very much. A lady came in, and although the clerk was tending this poor old body, he didn't do as I have seen done in a town not many miles away, tried to hurry me off to serve the moneymy lady; and I must also say the lady was truly a lady, as she chatted with me quite a lot. I like to see that, it takes nothing from one's pocket to be sociable and kind to all they meet, even if the other person's frock is not made of as good material as their own, or if the hat or bonnet they wear is of the style worn eight or ten years ago. There was a big pile of sticks on the Beach, and I thought first it was to erect a sawmill they were placed there, but on enquiry I found that a breakwater had been promised the people last year, and the sticks had been sent along to stop their mouths. I was telling Tom about it and he said he expected they would want a lot of junk a couple of years from now.

One of the reasons I went to Carbonear was to see about getting a new bonnet, the one I am wearing now I got it the winter of the Bank Crash, and I paid ten dollars in Commercial Bank notes for it, although they told me it was only two dollars; you know, sir, dollars were only worth 20 cents then. As I was saying I wanted a bonnet and I was almost tempted to go and see Mrs. Joseph Maddock, who was so good and kind when she kept a millinery store here, but I felt too shy. 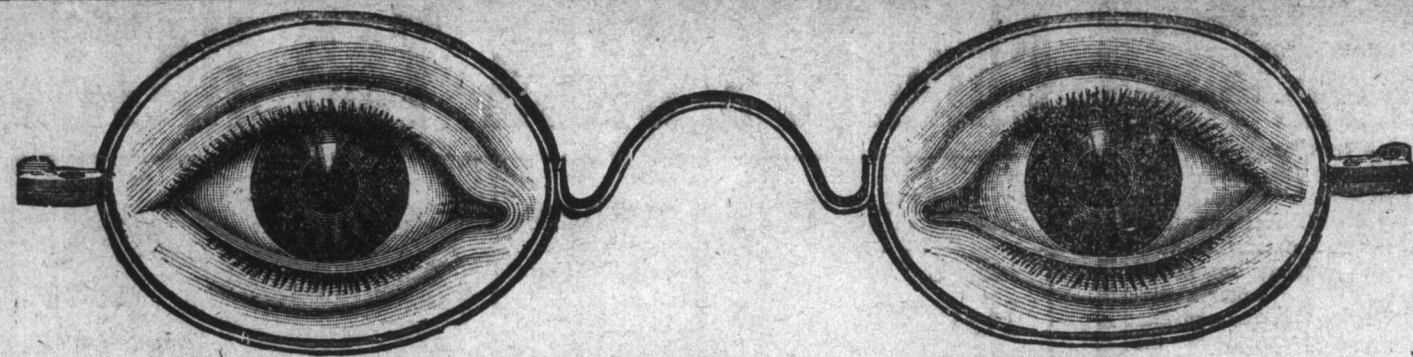
