pecial to Evening Telegram. LIVERPOOL, To-Day. A reign of terror existed here last night. Troops are pouring into the city with the object of putting down isorder. A special guard was detailed to protect the landing stage of the transatlantic steamers, which, s asserted, the rioters had planned o destroy by fire. Five prison vans scorted by Hussars, which were carrying miot prisoners from the Police Court to Waltham Jail, were at tacked by three thousand members of the roughest class in Vauxhall street, who tried to rescue the prisoners. The mob attacked the soldiers with missiles of every description. Defending themselves the Hussars fired First blanks were used, then ball cartridges. One man was killed and many were wounded. The troops then charged the mob with drawn sabres and cleared the street. So daring were the rioters that one of them tried to unhorse an officer who was bliged to use a revolver, wounding the man. Another, but less serious affray, in which the troops were again compelled to fire, took place on Bond Street. Only a few persons were wounded here. In each case the troops were ordered to fire. 



Most remarkable, perhaps, is the method of growing grapes—the vines being buried in winter.

They are grown upon arbours over head in summer, but after the first cold snap in autumn they are taken down, pruned, tied together in long bundles, and interred in pits covered with light matting and a couple of feet of soil. A few openings are left to admit air in moderate weather, but these are closed in case it turns very cold. The roots of the vines, of course, are not distured, but are swathed in matting and covered well with earth.


