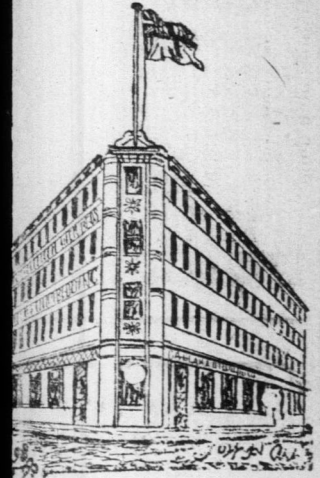

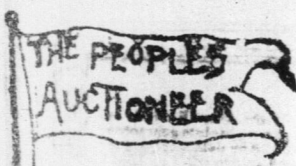

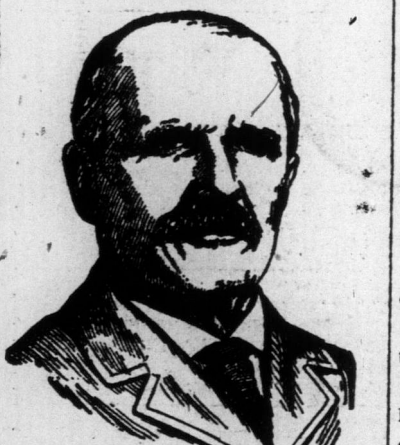
Barostan turned away from that gaze.

Barostan drank the coffee that she gave him, but ate very little.

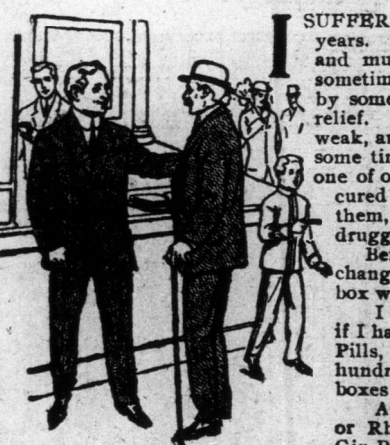
He arose after a while.

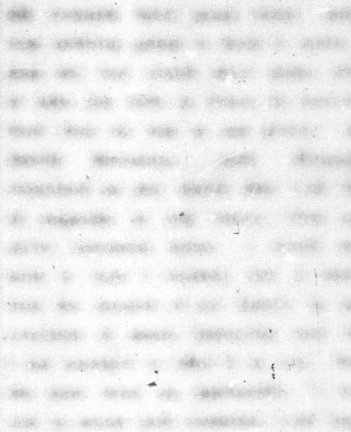

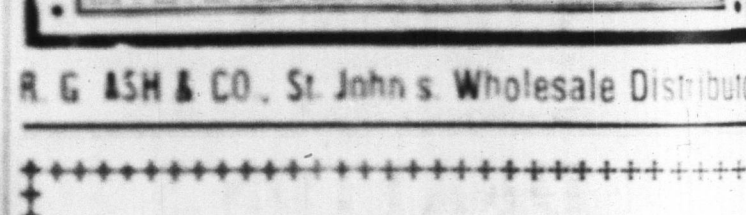

Mr. Ruby Writes On Farming.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—In the Daily News editorial, November 19th, in speaking of the rise on the price of milk the writer says it is simply a question of supply and demand; if the supply becomes greater than the demand prices will quickly tumble, not even combines can fight successfully against competition, and competition will come if remunerative results are in sight.

Now to bring remunerative results in sight the producer and consumer must work together. The case in power must use their influence and rise agriculture on a level with other industries. Large sums of money have been spent to build lighthouses and breakwaters—safeguarding the seafaring men that were required. Millions of dollars have been spent building railways—God speed the railroad. It is the building up of the country. Now let us spend one million dollars on agriculture and in three years there will be competition enough in the market to reduce the cost of living to one half the present cost.

The first thing to be done is to increase the fertility of our soil; our soil can be made very productive. We have fertilisers in the country, some lying dormant, others going to waste.

In Illinois on the Vienna Experimental Field in Johnston County, ten years ago, nine tons per acre of ground lime stone were applied at the rate of \$1.25 per ton. This would amount to \$11.25 and the returns from this investment have paid for the limestone three times over. That's better than putting money in the Bank. This fact should be sufficient to justify others to spend money in the same way.

If something substantial is not done the money will be going out of the country.

The Hudson Case

Yesterday Mr. Hudson, of Pouch Cove, called in the Evening Telegram Office and told us the story which we published in our issue of the same day.

Mr. Thomas Hudson, his nephew, called on us this morning and pointed out that we must have misunderstood his uncle in one particular, and that was that the latter did not look after the light in the lighthouse.

It appears that Mr. Hudson, sr., gave up his property to the authorities on condition that he was to have all the work incidental to the upkeep of the light, except that of actual lightkeeper, as long as he was alive.

The bargain was made by Mr. Neville on behalf of the Government and Mr. Hudson, and was kept until some three and a half years ago. At the time Mr. Thomas Hudson was assistant lightkeeper, and the lightkeeper his superior, was pensioned. A new keeper, Mr. Noseworthy, was appointed. Mr. Thomas Hudson being kept on as assistant. The latter resigned his position, after a service of twelve years, in October last, owing to trouble with his right eye, and he has every reason to believe proper consideration will be given to his case.

Mr. Hudson, sr., the party to the agreement, considers he has been badly treated and that his bargain with the Government has been broken by them. He gave up his property to them on consideration that he was to have for his lifetime certain returns of a remunerative kind.

For thirty-four years every Government, whether Liberal or Tory, honourably observed the agreement, and he obtained what he had bargained for. The present Government broke the bargain and he has lost the business advantages for which he gave up valuable consideration to the Government. Surely it is the bounden duty of the Government to look into the matter again and observe properly their obligations. The Minister of Marine should look into the matter and insist on fair play. He was keen enough on seeing that the consideration he held due to him as Minister was given to him in the matter of the Dredge Picnic. Surely he will extend the same consideration to Mr. Hudson, senior.

The unusual spectacle of liberal and national leaders on the same platform at a political meeting was witnessed last night when Asquith and Jno. Redmond addressed an audience here on Home Rule. The Premier also dealt with the war in the Balkans and other questions of the day. Asquith's reference to the war in Southeastern Europe was very diplomatic. He believed it would be the opinion of Europe that the victors are not to be robbed of what was won so dearly. Asquith said we are anxious to stop further effusion of blood between combatants and have been anxious to limit or circumscribe the field of possible conflicts. The Powers are working together to that end. Pledging the liberal party to continue its efforts for Home Rule, Asquith declared he would not be discouraged by any passing incidents which would be forgotten to-morrow, but was determined to proceed with the fight to the end. Redmond in his address said Home Rule was on the eve of final victory. He also declared the nationalists, in addition to the Home Rule measure, would support other features of the liberal Government's program.

LONDON, To-day.
Efforts towards peace in the Balkans made no visible progress yesterday. An exchange of artillery fire and an infantry reconnaissance proceeded along the Tcharja line, Nazim Pasha, in a despatch to Constantinople, claims an infantry battle occurred at the front center of his position and that the Bulgarians left several thousand dead before the Turkish counter works. Not much credence is placed on this report however. Elsewhere in the war zone, the Military situation remains unchanged. Serbian forces advancing to Waid City are meeting hardships in a barren mountainous country which is buried in deep snow and the Allies are still harassing what remains of the Turkish army that was driven from Monastir. The Bulgarians occupied the important town of Bledenchatch, terminus of the Saloniki railway on the Aegean sea. The report that Turkish cruiser Hamatler came into port of Constantinople crippled Bulgarian torpedo boats with which she was in engagement is not confirmed.

SYDNEY, To-day.
Brooklyn Hospital had a narrow escape of being destroyed by fire last evening, the Nurses' Wing being gutted.

LONDON, To-day.
An unsuccessful attempt was made on Monday to wreck a train on which the Czar and his family were travelling from Spole to Tsarskozele by tearing up the rails. The would-be wreckers, owing to misinformation, tore up the rails after the train had passed the spot picked out for its ditching.

NEW YORK, To-day.
Some coal dealers who gave short weight were given a sentence of 20 days in prison and fined \$5.

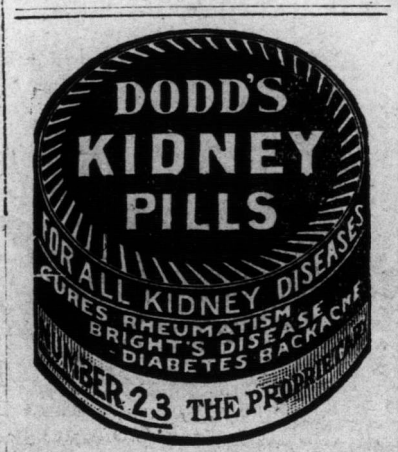

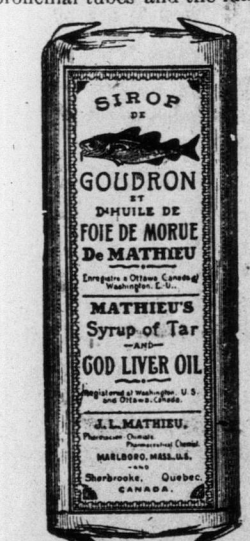


