





Efforts towards peace in the Balkans made no visible progress vesterday. An exchange of artillery fire and an infantry reconnaisances proceeded along the Tchatalja lines. Nazím Fasha, in a despatch to Constantinople, claims an infantry battle occur ed at the front center of his position and that the Bulgarians left several thousand dead before the Turkish out er works. Not much credence placed on this report however. Else where in the war zone, the Military situation remains unchanged. Servian forces advancing to Waid City are meeting hardships in a barren moun tainous country which is buried deep snow and the Allies are still harrassing what remains of the Turkish army that was driven from Monastir. The Bulgarians occupied the important town, Dedeachatch, ternminus of the Saloniki railway on the Aegean sea. The report that Turkish cruiser Hamadier came into por of Constantinople crippled Bulgarian torpedo boats with which she was in ngagement is not confirmed
