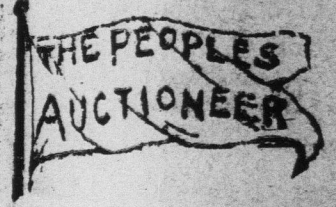

Household Notes.

- Use boiling water for tea stains.
- Use salt and lemon juice on ink stains.
- Mud stains should be soaked in kerosene.
- Rub grass stains with molasses and wash.
- Turpentine or benzine will remove paint stains.
- Scorch stains, remove by exposing to the sunshine.
- Tar-stains should be soaked in warm milk and salt.
- To remove acid stains, use ammonia or chloroform.
- Perspiration stains will be removed only by boiling.
- Fruit stains should be soaked in milk or use oxalic acid.
- Chocolate stains, soak in kerosene and wash by cold water.
- Blood stains should be soaked, when fresh, in cold water.
- Put dry salt on fresh wine stains and warm milk on old ones.
- Coffee stains should be treated with boiling water when fresh.
- Tops of old shoes, cut into shape and covered, make excellent tin holders.
- A cut lemon will remove the mark made by striking matches on white paint.
- Never allow a mirror to hang in the sunlight, or the backing will become clouded.
- A pineapple is ripe if the leaves pluck easily; if they do not, the pineapple is green.
- Equal parts of beeswax and turpentine rubbed on dull floors will brighten them.
- A quantity of quicklime put into a damp cupboard for a few days will absorb the dampness.
- Satin after washing, will retain its gloss if a little borax is put into the last rinsing water.
- A little turpentine put into the water for washing windows or mirrors is an excellent method.
- To soften brown sugar when it has become lumpy, stand it over a vessel filled with boiling water.
- Brown bread, instead of white, when making bread pudding, gives a most unusual and delicious taste.
- A berry pie will not run over when baking if you add a pinch of soda before the upper crust is put on.
- Mildew is obstinate and difficult to remove. If a lemon and salt or farnelle water do not remove it, nothing will.
- When plants droop, try adding a teaspoonful of ammonia to three quarts of water, and water the plants fully.

Fiddle Worth \$5,000.

Harrister Finds Out Value of a Boyhood Purchase.

It was only an old ragtime fiddle, and when after fourteen years of use one of the strings broke, the question of having it repaired or chucking it up in the attic with the broken furniture and the what-not, was with the owner, purely a sentimental one. But when a man has had an old friend like that for nigh on a decade and a half to cheer him during his lonely student days and to sympathize with him in his pensive moods, the matter of sentiment looms mighty big. So it was with Joseph J. Hubbard, a Toronto barrister. Fifteen years ago, as a schoolboy in Orangeville, Hubbard bought the fiddle from William Harrington, who keeps the music store, paying \$8 for it. When he repaired it and walked down the street the other day to have it repaired, he was astonished to learn from the representative of one of Toronto's largest music houses that the old fiddle was worth five thousand dollars.

"What's that?" he asked.

"We will give you a cheque for five thousand dollars for it," answered the dealer.

Mr. Hubbard didn't sell, not so much in the belief that he could get more for it, but chiefly because he was reluctant to part with his old friend at any price.

"We have come through a great many experiences together," he told the interviewer. "Often after leaving the old High School up on the hill, after a none too pleasant interview with Alex. Steele, the principal, and knowing only too well that a recital of the facts at home would win no sympathy, my only friend was that old fiddle. Out in the shed we would spend our evening together, and then later on when I learned to play it real well, I was invited out in rural festivals, and many's the time we accompanied the swains and dames in such dances as the Lancers, the Scottish reel and then we'd clog to the tune of the Irish Washerwoman."

"When I came down to Toronto to study law it helped me put through many a weary evening, and even since then when things have not gone just the way I would have liked, it proved to be my boon and never-failing companion."

The old fiddle bears on the inside the inscription:

Giovan Gaetano Pazzini,
Allieno del Maggini di Brixa,
Fecit Firenze Anno 1810.

For more than three hundred years the old violin has been in existence, and during that time it has probably gone through many vicissitudes. Its history is largely problematical, but from what is known of the price of such violins back at the time of its manufacture, it has been assumed that it was the property of some pretty well-to-do Italian or European. Probably sold from time to time, it finally reached Canada.

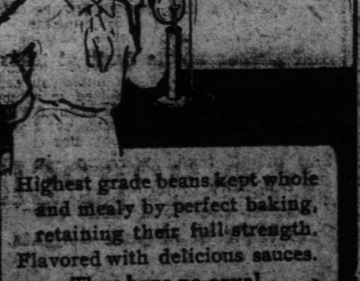

Rain.

It is estimated that one inch of thick and contiguous rainfall is worth a million dollars to any country with an annual mean precipitation of four pints.

For a great many years the process of manufacturing rain was a great mystery to the birthplace of Darwin's original ape. People used to think it was caused by two clouds trying to pass on the same track, producing a heavy and sustained leakage which could be felt at every Sunday school picnic which happened to be located near the right way. SHANGHAI, To-day. Admiral Yseng, Commander of the Government fleet has formally notified the Consular Customs official of his intention to bombard Wu Sung forts to-night. All the Northern reinforcements have arrived at the Arsenal, and 2,000 loyal troops from Hankow have arrived at Shanghai.

THE HAGUE, To-day.

Dr. Bos, Liberal democratic member of the Chamber of Deputies, who for some time has been endeavoring to form a coalition Cabinet, was relieved of his task by Queen Wilhelmina. Bos was unable to carry out the wishes of the Queen by reason of the fact that the Socialists declined to accept portfolios in the coalition Ministry. The formation of a new Cabinet made necessary by the resignation in June of Premier Hoensbroek and ministers following the elections in the second Chamber of States, the general result of which left the coalition parties supporting the ministry without a majority in the Chambers.

SASKATOON, To-day.

Local militia was in a ferment yesterday morning over a flag incident which disturbed the parade of the 106th Fusiliers. When the parade was passing down Central Ave., a young girl passing in an auto waved an American flag in front of one of the members of the Bugle Band of a regiment. The man broke the ranks, and snatching the flag, broke the staff in two and trampled it under foot. The majority of the regiment passing over it. The young man instantly was taken from the ranks. At the conclusion of the parade, he was court-martialed and discharged from the regiment. The rest of the members of the Bugle Band threatened to resign permanently if the decision was allowed to stand. The regiment held a consultation, and the man was reinstated. The second decision was the signal for a triumphant outburst which lasted until late. The members of the regiment in uniform marched through the streets near the arena, with the Union Jack at their head bringing, "God save the King" and "Britannia."

PEKING, To-day.

An announcement from Canton that three divisions of Cantonese troops are preparing to march against the Northern forces is welcomed at Peking. The government say they will anticipate their coming. It will enable the government troops to inflict a crushing defeat on the rebels without risking the sacking and perhaps the burning of Canton City and disorganizing the Southern trade. Provisional President Yuan Shih Kai issued a manifesto which asserted that most of the supporters of the rebellion belonged to Kwo Ming Fung party. He demanded a cancellation of their membership, threatening the law would be sternly enforced if he received an unsatisfactory reply. The President also ordered General Tuan Chi Kool, Commander-in-Chief of the Government forces at Yang Tse River region to arrest and punish rebel leaders. Dr. Sun Yat Sen, as in the previous proclamation issued by the Government, is again mentioned in President Shi Kai's manifesto.

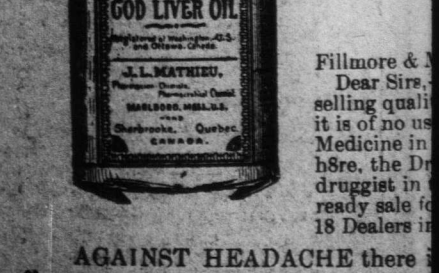
Cyclist Killed.

Benjamin Wilson Hit Fence Post Head First When His Machine Swerved.
Toronto, July 28.—After daring death scores of times, Benjamin Wilson, aged 32, a motor cyclist from Rochester and a former Toronto boy, was killed instantly when he lost control of his motorcycle and crashed into the fence at the races held at Exhibition Park on Saturday under the auspices of the Ontario Motorcycle Association. A crowd of six thousand people was present.

The accident occurred at the seventh lap of the five mile race. Wilson, who was demonstrating the Jefferson machine, and who was one of the last to come on to the stretch, tore down the track at 45 miles an hour and when he hit the curve his machine bore straight for the high board fence. He swung round the grass, when the machine swerved again and crashed into the fence. Four posts were broken off and 45 feet of fence was torn away by the impact.

Cyclist Killed.

Benjamin Wilson Hit Fence Post Head First When His Machine Swerved.

Toronto, July 28.—After daring death scares of times, Benjamin Wilson, aged 32, a motor cyclist from Rochester and a former Toronto boy, was killed instantly when he lost control of his motorcycle and crashed into the fence at the races held at Exhibition Park on Saturday under the auspices of the Ontario Motorcycle Association. A crowd of six thousand people was present.

The accident occurred at the seventh lap of the five mile race. Wilson, who was demonstrating the Jefferson machine, and who was one of the last to come on to the stretch, tore down the track at 45 miles an hour and when he hit the curve his machine bore straight for the high board fence. He swung it onto the grass, when the machine swerved again and crashed into the fence. Four posts were broken off and 25 feet of fence was torn away by the impact.

When the machine hit the fence the rider shot into the air, turned a double somersault and hit one of the posts head first. The machine bounced into the air, somersaulted and struck Wilson as it fell. Death was instantaneous, the skull having been fractured in several places. The other riders continued the race, and at its conclusion the meet was called off.

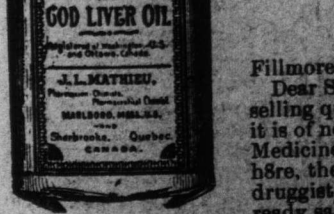
An inquest was opened on Saturday night and the jury brought in a verdict of accidental death, expressing the opinion that a mechanical defect had occurred in the machine which caused Wilson to lose control of it.

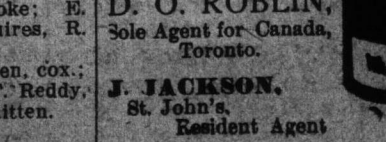

Notes and Comments.

It would appear that something in the nature of a European boycott is developing in regard to the Panama Exhibition. Press dispatches state that Britain will take no part in it, that Russia is following Britain, and that Germany may follow suit. In spite of these declarations, we remain sceptical. It is said that the boycott is due to the Panama dispute. We cannot believe that the leading European nations will act in this manner if the States agree to a full submission of the whole dispute to arbitration. If, on the contrary, America should decline to do so, as was urged by some of the leading politicians in the heat of the last Presidential campaign, the European Powers would be quite justified in doing so. Those Powers would not be overstepping the bounds of international comity, should they decline to take any steps towards taking part in any celebration until the States have agreed clearly and definitely to a frank and full reference to the Hague Tribunal or some such international tribunal. As soon, however, as the reference has been agreed upon and the terms of the submission settled, there would appear to us no good ground for a boycott. At the first blush it appeared that the action of the States in regard to Canal tolls was a willful tearing up of a treaty in order to gain a natural advantage. If a treaty is to be denounced by America immediately it becomes disadvantageous to them, it is no use making a treaty with America. No nation can admit the propriety of America holding to a treaty so long as it is advantageous to them and denouncing it immediately it becomes disadvantageous.

The rights are mutual and the obligations are mutual. But a dispute as to interpretation may arise in good faith, and when such a dispute arises the only course is to settle it by a reference to a proper tribunal. Unwillingness to do so and tardiness in doing so destroy credibility in the honesty of purpose of the offender and may justly be visited by conduct which expresses appropriately the displeasure of the offended party. Britain cannot with honour take part in the Panama Exhibition if the States continue to treat her dishonourably. Nor can other nations similarly treated. If however the States show bona fides by a prompt and unequivocal agreement to refer the whole dispute for impartial settlement, a boycott of the Exhibition would be churlish. For after all the cutting of the Panama Canal is one of the wonders of the age with extraordinary potentialities for the future and is well worthy of international celebration.

Lunatic at Large.

An inmate of the Lunatic Asylum, named Reeves, of White Bay, escaped from the grounds of the institution about 5 p.m. yesterday. He was at work in a cut and slipped clear of the keepers and ran for the Topsail Road. The police were notified and had men after him last night, but did not succeed in catching him.

Cable News.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM.
LONDON, To-Day.
The allies in their demands presented to the Peace Conference, proposed the establishment of a frontier, starting east from Struma River and running midway through Rumania, reaching the Aegean Sea sixteen miles west of Dodegatch. This would leave Bulgaria with a coast line in the Aegean Sea of less than thirty miles. If these drastic terms are accepted Bulgaria will lose from the two wars a little larger than when she entered into them, but she will have to abandon a large amount of territory to Roumania. In addition the allies maintain their demand for an indemnity. It is probable the negotiations will be protracted and an armistice of five days will be renewed. No objection is likely to be raised to its renewal for it seems evident that both the Serbians and Greeks fought themselves to a standstill. A despatch to the Telegraph from Belgrade asserts the casualties in the Serbian army in the past month's fighting aggregate nearly 35,000.

SHANGHAI, To-day.
Dr. Sun Yat Sen, one of the leaders of the Southern rebellion, declared the occupation of the city of Nanking by the Government force is temporary. The spirit of the Southern, he announced, is undiminished. They hope to renew the struggle when arrangements with Kwang Tung and other Southern Provinces have been completed. Dr. Sun Yat Sen leaves Shanghai to-night for Hong Kong, where personally he will make an appeal for further support in his campaign to overthrow Provisional President Yuan Shi Kai for crimes which the Southern leader claims have been committed by President, namely—illegal execution of military officers, assassination of the Nationalist leader General Sun Chao Jen, issuing unconstitutional mandates, exacting laws without consulting parliament.

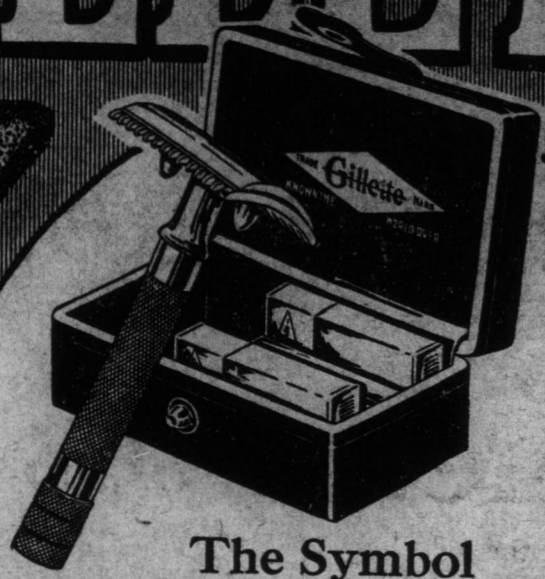

Tory Member Is Up For Contempt.

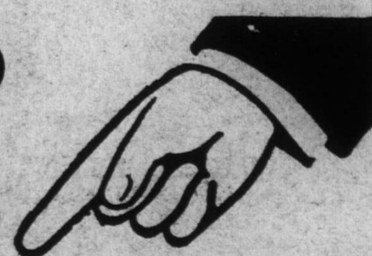

Tar-Dust Clouds

KILL PARIS TREES.

Keeper of Bois de Boulogne Sounds Warning Against Treatment of Roads—Favor Bitumen Pavement. Scientific Commission Reports Final Destruction of Trees by Tar Inevitable.

Paris, June 29.—There is a feeling of dismay over the announcement this week of the keeper of the Bois de Boulogne, M. Le Forestier, that unless the present system of tarring the roadways in the avenues of the Bois is promptly discontinued there will be no trees left at all.

worst spot is at the entrance of the Avenue de Bois, near the Arc de Triomphe, where the once fine chestnut trees are in a deplorable condition and practically denuded of leaves. But all along the thoroughfares of the most fashionable sections of Paris the trees are dying or dead.

More Dead Trees. It is officially stated that since the roadway has been tarred to minimize the dust the number of the dead trees which have had to be replaced by new ones has multiplied by four. Moreover, the young trees which have been planted are unable to flourish, owing to the poisoning of the soil and rapid perishing.

Although a grant of \$6,000 was recently made by parliament for the planting of new trees in the Avenue du Bois, Le Forestier has not yet touched the money, asserting that until some new method is introduced such an expenditure would be throwing the money into the gutter.

Conditions are the same throughout the more frequented roads, which are treated with pitch, and there is a very strong feeling on the part of the public that no time should be lost in radically changing the present methods and ensuring that no further damage shall be done to the vegetation of the historical park.

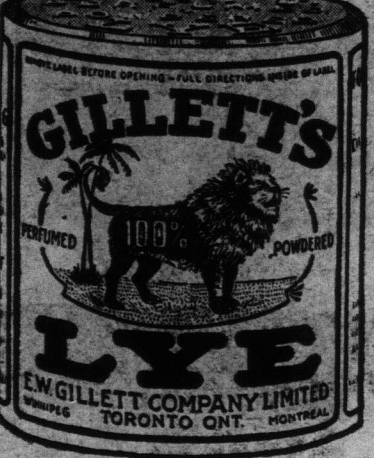
Do Flying Fish Fly.

The much mooted question, "Do flying fish fly?" is dismissed by William Allingham in the "Nautical Magazine." The orthodox scientific opinion is that the "wings" of the flying fish merely serve as a parachute to sustain the fish for a brief period in the air after he has launched himself out of the water by a powerful screw-like movement of his tail.

HONG KONG, August 1. General Yuan Shi Kai with a force of loyal troops is marching on Canton after taking possession of Shi-Wang on the west river. An engagement is imminent between General Ling's Army and troops despatched from Canton by the Governor General of Kwang Tung.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, August 1. After a conference with President Wilson, to-day, Secretary Bryan declared that the United States was in no way being pressed for action in Mexico, and declared the assertion in the morning papers that European Governments were bringing pressure to compel aggressive action in Mexico, was without foundation.

MUNCIE, Ind., August 1. A miraculous escape from death and injury took place to-day, when tender No. 2 of the East-bound train jumped the track in the middle of a 20 foot bridge, five miles west of Muncie. The train ran a third of a mile when four Pullmans left the track. Although two steel rails were driven through the floor of one of the Pullmans, not a single passenger or trahman was injured.

BERLIN, August 1. Although the German Secretary of the Interior declared to-day that Germany had not yet taken any action regarding the question of participation in the Panama-Pacific Exposition of 1915, opinion is freely expressed in official circles that the German Empire will not be represented there. It is pointed out that Britain's decision settles Germany's action, as the only factor which might have induced the German Government to bring pressure to bear on unwilling industrial men to exhibit, was fear of unfavorable comparison with British industry.

At yesterday's session Deputy Mayor Martin presided. Applications from A. W. Radford for sewerage connection on Water St. and from M. Peckham, South Side Road asking for repair to roadway, which was caving in, were referred to the Engineer.

T. P. Hickey was granted permission to repair house on Henry St., and plans of proposed building submitted by P. McGrath were approved. The R. N. Co.'s water car was reported by Water Inspector Baker to be giving unsatisfactory service. The R. N. Co. will be asked to explain.

The oil sprinkling car will be put in operation on Regatta Day. The meeting then adjourned.
