Senor Dominguez, the St. John's Agent of Messrs. Lazo and Company, Fish Merchants of Seville, Spain, is in receipt of a cable message from his principals which reads:-

"All Fish Merchants in Spain and the Board of ion at the behest of the Hawes-Trade and Commerce at Madrid have cabled to the Governor of Newfoundland, Sir Charles Harris, protesting against the Fishery Export Regulations now being enforced in that Dominion, and requesting the withdrawal and cancellation of same. Should this not be done and these injurious Regulations continued, the Spanish Government will be asked to prohibit the sale and exportation of salt from Spain to Newfoundland, and also to increase the present import duty on all fishery products entering Spain from Newfoundland."

> It would be superfluous to offer any comment on the above communication. In plain language a discrimination against Newfoundland is threat- Independent ened. Re-Establishment Meeting.

A special meeting of the Civil Re-Establishment Committee was held yesterday afternoon. Hon. Justice Kent the President, being detained at the Court, Mr. H. E. Cowan, presided. Eleven applications for courses in retraining were granted and several were deferred for investigation. Reports were presented showing that 18 men had received employment since the New Year and that 97 were still without work. It is likely that an experienced assistant will be procured from Canada to train men confined to their beds in hospitals and elsewhere, in occupational work. The Government will be again written to, with regard to giving preference to returned veterans in the case of vacancies in the civil service. 


