





A Bottle of Whiskey.

If the drinkers of whisky ever co sider the intrinsic value of their tipple the result must be distinctly sobering. There has been a good many prosecu-tions in London recently of hotels and restaurants for giving short measure or exceeding the legal maximum price. The manager of a music-hall was summoned and some interesting facts were mentioned in the course of the evidence. Whisky as retailed in "small" or "large Scotches" over a bar works out at \$5.20 a bottle—which is, at the maximum price, which is also, of course, the minimum. This would not show a bad profit if the bottle were bought by the retailer at the same controlled price \$3.00, at which it is nearly \$5.20, was bought by the musichall for \$2.40. Presumably that is the interesting calculation can be made. Distillers have frequently explained that out of every \$3.00 paid for a bottle of whisky, \$2.10 goes direct to the Government in taxation . At \$2.40 per bottle to the retailer, that leaves 30 cents to cover distillers' profit, the cost of bottles, packing and distribut-ing charges—and the value of the whisky. It looks as though 12 cents would be a generous estimate of the



real value of a bottle of \$3.00 whisky.





Sable I. Arrives.

After a run of 39 hours from Louisburg, S.S. Sable I., Capt. Murley, reached port at 1.30 a.m. to-day. The run down was quite a good one and no ice was seen on the voyage. 

He says the moon was not once part of the earth, but was a sun that once aided in warming the earth.
