



AUSTRALIA NOT BOUND BY ANGLO RUSSIAN TREATIES.

EVACUATION OF THE RUHR PRE-SENTS FURTHER DIFFICULTIES.

LONDON, Aug. 14. After two conferences lasting five hours, the French and German delegates to the International Conference, to-night still were deadlocked on the question of time to be allotted for military evacuation of the Ruhr, and it was decided that Premier Herfiot, France, Chancellor Marx, Germany, Premier Theunis, Belgium, and. their associates would meet again at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning in another effort to reach an agreement. Louis Loucheur and several other French political leaders are in London in conference with M. Herriot and the German delegates. These men have induced the French Premier to stiffen up his policy, as he seems more adamant in his contention that a year's time must be left for evacuation, than when he returned from Paris on Monday. During to-day's conferences the French and Belgians waived the claim to main tain their Nationals on German Railways. Agreements also were reached on the amnesty question and other minor matters. At the conclusion of the conference this afternoon, M. Herriot said, "we are in the midst of negotiations which are progressing normally and which will be continued to-morrow." The Germans were not so calm in their estimate of negotiations, which Foreign Minister Stresemann regards as being in critical state.

FLIERS PLANNED TO LEAVE ICE.

Lieut. Lowell Smith and Lieut. Eric Nelson, the United States roundthe-world fliers, intend to hop off tomorrow morning at 8 e'clock for Angmagealik, Greenland, if weather conditions are propitious. To-night they were rather bad. The Navy patrol craft Roll and Billingslev let Reykjavik this afternoon to take their stations along the course over which the airmen will fly towards Freenland. They were followed at 2 'clock this evening by the United States cruiser Richmond, the flagship of Rear Admiral MaGruder, which will take a station 150 miles off the Iceland coast to await the passing of the fliers and then will proceed to Southern Greenland. The plane of Lieut, Nelson which had been on shore for several days for overhau ing, was successfully put back in the water at 4 o'clock this afternoon The machine is said to be in perfect condition for the next hop off.





On motion of Hon. Mr. Morine and with the unanimous consent of the House the Bill respecting Tax on Goods went through all its stages and was passed without amendment.

With the unanimous consent of hon. members the Bill entitled "An Act to amend the Revenue Act, 1905," was read a first and second time.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on this Bill. Committee rose and reported having passed the Bill without amendment. The Bill was read a third time and passed.

In moving the first reading of the Bill entitled an Act for the Encouragement of Agriculture. Mr. Merine stated that the object of the Bill was to do away with two abuses-(1) the appointment of a so-called commisthing of everything else, but which knew nothing whatever about Agriculture; and (2) the seed business, which had been taken out of the hands of those who originally carried on this trade, and turned over to this Department, so that this section of the Department had been turned into a seed shop. The Government, Mr. Morine continued, not wishing to make two bites of a cherry decided

to repeal the whole Act. The Bill passed its second reading. The House went into Committee of the Whole on this Bill and reported having passed same without an amendment.

The Bill was read a third time and passed.

By unanimous consent the Bill respecting Certain Expenditure to be made under the Loan Act of 1923 was read a first and second time. Hon. Sir Patrick McGrath asked

what had been done in connection with the laxity in the public service as disclosed by the Hollis Walker report. Had any changes been made, and if so, what different procedure prevails.

Mr. Morine in answering said that ewing to the many things which the Government had had to deal with, and to the Legislature being in session, it had not been possible to take steps to enquire further into matters. The Government would much prefer, he added, having Mr. Hollis Walker to undertake the enquiry into several departments because of the satisfactory manner in which he conducted the enquiry a short time ago, but Mr. Walker considered it unwise to come, Enquiries were being pursued, Mr. Morine stated, by the firm of Reid, Son and Watson, and many things were being brought to light and a great deal of effective work done. He was of the opinion that the enquiry into the Department mentioned should not be in the nature of that conducted by Mr. H. Walker or by a commission. but rather an enquiry into the system by chartered accountants. The enquiry by Mr. Walkerhad, by showing up much of the looseness, sharpened everyone, Mr. Morine thought, and he believed that nothing was being carried on in this department which was not strict-

The Bill went through all stages by unanimous consent and the House adjourned till to-day at 4 o'clock.

OUTCOME OF RECENT EXPERI-ZOOLOGY, PROF. GAMBLE RE-

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 11 .- The inroduction of experimental methods into the field of zoology has changed the viewpoint of this science, in opinion of F. W. Gamble, D Sc., F.R.S., Professor of Zoology at the University of Birmingham, who outlined his views on the makeup of animals in his Presidential address to the Zoology Section of the British Association today. Taking as his topic, "Construc-

tion and Control in Animal Life," he pointed out that in recent years, students of zoology have come more and more to the viewpoint that animal life is a series of changes, and not a fixed state of affairs, as was at one time supposed.

"The changed attitude is the result of experimentation in the study of living organisms," Prof. Gamble stated. "This line of attack has brought to light many curious and unexpected facts.

"For instance, it is possible to cut the minute eggs of some animals into pieces, and each piece will develop into a perfect animal. Conversely, two eggs may be made to fuse together, and the resulting animal is

"The contents of the egg may be disarranged without untoward efects on the individual that is formed

"How can we explain these apparent inconsistencies?" Dr. Gamble asked. By what means can the egg, thus grievously maltreated, still produce a properly formed animal?"

He suggested that the answer to the riddle was indicated by the work of Professor C. M. Child of Chicago, who has found in the embroyos of many animals a "metabolic gradient," to use his own name. This theory indicates that the parts of an animal & SONS, LTD., opp. Seamen's In-Be lenient when they blunder! are living at different rates. 



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

Empire Cotton

London, July. (By Canadian Press) The British Empire can produce all the cotton required by the Lancashire mills, according to a statement made recently in Manchester by Lord Derby at a gathering of members of the British Cotton Growing Association. The ideal of independence in respect of the raw material required to keep the mills going, he said, was not an unrealizable dream, but one that in ime might mature.

British successes in the line of cotton growing, Lord Derby said had been mainly in Uganda, the Sudan and Nigeria. By the end of last year, he continued, the British grown cotton crop amounted to 178,000 bales, valued at £3,500,000, all from fields of cotton growing that did not exist 20 years ago. Three millions of that sum were paid to the natives of Uganda. This year their manager was sanguine that they would get 250,000 bales, and in 1925 more, especially from the Sudan, Irak and India. Other factors besides money were required, among the most important desiderata being the more rapid railway development of the Dominions and Colonies, and this was a field in which governments could


