THE INTERCOLONIAL ROUTE. The Duke of Buckingham has one more spoken on things Colonial, and it is evident that he has lost none of his arrogance since he spoke before. It is per haps too bad to throw all the blame of his absurd dispatches or his shoulders since he must know compara tively little, and that little theoretically of most of the subjects on which he writes, and therefore, in homely but expressive phrase, he only shoots the balls which are made for him by others. After all the anxious speculation and dis-cussion on the Intercolonial route it is evident that the one which was first marked out by Major Robinson is the favourite. Most people have had no doubt for a long time past that it would be the eventual selection, and their conjectures ecame almost a certainty when Mr Rose put the first instalment of the loan for the construction of the road on the London market. With our warlike ministers military considerations outweigh everything of a commercial nature -the latter smacks too much of business a phrase peculiarly disagreeable to the nice ears of new fledged baronets. The Intercolonial railway must be a military work, and to grathy the caprices of a clique its location must be the most disadvantageous to the country which could have been assigned it, and the Dominion must pay for working it and keeping it in repairs, for the traffic by the Robinson route will scarcely purchase grease for the axles. But this is the way that matters are managed in Canada.

The Colonial Secretary says that the shortest of the three routes, that on the frontier, could not have been approved by the Imperial Government, even if it had been selected, because, don't you see, it got on the wrong side of the St. John river, and the road would be taken posses sion of instanter in case of war with the Yankees, by their troops, who are adepts at destroying railways or turning them to their own advantage. It has long been no secret that this argument, though it will not hold water, would be fatal to the frontier route. To take pos session of the road if constructed by the Robinson route would be simply a question of a little longer time, and a few more men, (for the location does not render it altogether impregnable) but it is far from probable that such a contingency will, ever arise, and should it, there is another road through Maine against which the Americans might have designs There are no objections urged in the despatch against the central route through New Brunswick, but the Canadian Govnment is congratulated on its wisdom in choosing the other, which is remote from the American frontier and which is the only one of the three that "provides national objects involved in the undertaking." The greater part of which we conceive to be undiluted bosh, although written by a Duke. The "national object" was to have a road of our own to the sea at all seasons, the military conbeing an afterthought of our warrior legislators. They have acquitted themselves admirably, but that is no novelty.

The Intercolonial Railway. Lord Monck has received the following despatch from the Colonial Secretary, on the subject of the Intercolonial R. R.

"My Lord,—I have received your Lordship's telegraphic message that the route of the Bay of Chaleur has been selected by the Canadian Government as the one to connect Truro with Riviere du Loup, and thus complete the Intercolonial Railway. I understand three routes have been under the consideration of the Government of Canada,—namely, one crossing St. John River, either at Woodstock or Fredericton; the second in a more central direction, through New Bruns wick; and the third following the line selected by Major Robinson in 1848. The route crossing the St. John River either at Woodstock or Fredericton is one to which the assent of Hér Majesty's Government could not have been gi en. The objections on military grounds to any line on the south side of the St. John River are insuperable.
