THURSDAY EVENING, FEB. 20, 1873 An Act Respecting the Public Health.

We have received a copy of the bill, introduced by Mr. Mowat into the Ontario Legislature, entitled an Act respecting the Public Health. The bill provides that the health officers may enter and examine pre-mises, in the place for which they hold office, as often as they deem it necessary, and should the premises be in a filthy or unclean state, may order the proprietor or occupant to cleanse them, and in case of refusal the officers shall have the power to cause it to be done, in the interest of the public health. In case a dis ease of a malignant or fatal character is discovered to exist in overcrowded tenements, the health officer may, at the expense of the municipality, re-move the occupants to a more salubrious situation, until measures car be taken for the immediate cleansing of such dwelling. Medical men may be authorised by the officers to ex amine any premises with respect to the state of health of persons therein, and have infected persons removed at once to some hospital in order to guard against the spread of disease in the neighborhood. The members of the Municipal Council of Town-ships, Cities, Towns, and incorporated Villages shall be health officers with in their respective municipalties.

Whosoever wilfully disobeys or re sists any lawful order of the health officers, or wilfully obstructs any person acting under the authority or em ployed in the execution of the Act either before or after the appointment of a central board of health, or wilfully violates any regulations made and declared by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, or issued by the central board of health under the Act, or neglects or refuses to comply with such regulations, shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars. AH penalties recovered shall be paid to the treasurer of the municipality in which such penalties have been in-
