

AWAITING THEIR ARRIVAL

TORONTO READY TO RECEIVE HER GALLANT VOLUNTEERS.

The City Magnificently Decorated—The Troops Expected Between 3 and 5 This Afternoon—Reception Echoes—The latest and most reliable news that we have concerning the arrival of the Toronto troops is contained in the following despatch from Owen Sound last night: 'The Athabasca is expected at 8 tomorrow (Thursday) morning. The train will leave here about 11, and reach Toronto between 3 and 4.' Of course standing on the upper lakes is very uncertain, and delay may be caused by adverse weather, but it is to be hoped that the good ship, propitious and bringing the good ship, with her precious cargo of gallant volunteers, will arrive safely and speedily. Locomotives and trains are lying in wait for them at the Sound, and every facility will be afforded for the rapid transit of baggage from water to land. So the best and in fact the only thing the people can do is to wait patiently with the assurance that their patients will be brought back to them with the least possible delay. Look out for the Queen's Own and Grenadiers any time between 3 and 5 o'clock this afternoon. As for the Governor-General's body guard, it is about time to give up preparing for their arrival which will be a matter of an hour or so, only to be altered to a later period, that it is exceedingly dangerous and unpleasant to trifle with such an unknown quantity. Yesterday evening something definite was announced as to the arrival of the troops. The enthusiasts who went up to North Toronto to welcome the volunteers, were disappointed; the general public, the gallant colonel and his guards falling to the ground. The latest bulletin from Owen Sound is that the train will arrive here at 10 o'clock this morning. The volunteers will be met at the wharf and they will disembark at the Queen's wharf and go into quarters at the Exhibition grounds pending dismissal. The guards will go on at Humboldt and other places during the campaign; they ought to have a prominent place in the demonstration.
