When the Fire and Light Committee really gets down to business and refuses to waste time considering communications forwarded by tenderers, it will make a recommendaby tenderers, it will make a recommendation to the council that a bylaw be submitted to the people for raising \$250,000 or \$300,000 to be devoted to the purchase of a plant. The report of the City Engineer on the offer of the Bertram Engine Works was yesterday, brought before the committee; but it was not discussed owing to the fact that at the same meeting was read a letter from John Inglis & Sons containing a comparison of the Inglis and Bertram tenders for engine equipment, favorable, of course, to the former.

"I beg to say that, basing an estimate on the tenders received last September, the total cost of construction, exclusive of buildings (which are estimated to cost about \$42,000), would be approximately, \$249,000. 




