



## Modern Appliances In New Telegraph Work Rooms



one will see, side by side, two machines one with a keyboard like that of a typewriter, the other with a little type-bearing disc touching a These two machines are The two haives, as it were, of one of the most wonderful contrivances in existence—the automatic printer.
Messages tapped off, letter by letter, on the keyboard of the first machine, are written out, by impulses which travel thousands of miles over the wire, on telegraph blanks slipped under the type-disc of the second machine. That is to say, the keyboard machine in the picture may be operating a type-disc machine in Montreal; and the type-disc, machine in the picture may be printing a message that is being tapped off on a keyboard machine in Calgary.

The operating room, on the second floor of the new home of the C.P.R. Telegraphs, is 132 feet deep and 28 feet wide. Immense windows in two tiers, the lower of clear glass and the upper opaque, flood the apartment with light by day; and by night, a system of indirect ( lighting gives ample illumination without glare. 

## New Giant C.P.R. Locomotive



Ten of the largest locomotives ever built for use on Canadian railways have been under construction for some time at the C.P.R. Angus Shops in Montreal, and one of these, No. 5302, was inspected the other day by President E. W. Beatty, and Vice-president Grant Hall. These locomotives are of the heavy Mikado type and are intended for freight service, being designed and built under the direct supervision of Mr. W. H. Winterrowd, the Chief Mechanical En-

The weight of the engine and tender in working condition is 500,000 lbs., the engine alone weighing 323,-000 lbs. The diameter of the driving wheels is 63 inches. The cylinders are 251/2 inches in diameter by 32inch stroke, which with 200-lbs. boiler pressure makes these locomotives capable of exerting a maximum tractive effort of 36,000 lbs. The diameter of the boiler is 80 inches at the front end and 90 inches at the back end. The fire box is 84 inches wide and 120 inches long, and the grates are moved by steam grate shakers.


The cab is of the vestibule type, which is the C.P.R. standard, and every effort has been made to make accommodations for the enginemen as comfortable as possible. One side of the cab is fitted with a clothes locker 14 inches by 20 inches wide, in which clothes can be hung and lunch pails carried.

The tender has a capacity for 12 tons of coal and 8,000 Imperial gal-



(Winnipeg "Tribune" Not one, but several denominations are agitating over this continent for better pay for the average preacher. A valued contributor vouches for the fact that the average salary for preachers in twelve leading denomina-

tions is less than a thousand a year. The average preacher is married. Most of them are raising children, feeding them, clothing them, buying medicine for them and sending them to school. The average preacher works seven days a week. He must wear good clothes; his wife must dress well, and his children cannot appear

in tattered and torn rags. His congregation insists that the preacher and his family must not display any sign of poverty, and the preacher must wear a smile-always. He must have a cheery word for every man, woman and child he meets. He

must not complain. Once in a while a preacher quits the and takes another job-one which will leave something in his pay envelope after taking out the tells of butcher, candlestick maker and the baker. Then his congregation speaks

of "his fall from grace". A preacher ought to preach. What ight has he to stew and fret about shoes for his children, food for his table and the declining years of his

And above all a preacher should never mention his pay envelope, for his cougrtgation has arrived at the conclusion that their pastor will reap his reward in the hereafter than which no human being could desire a greater

So the congregation distributes haloes, passes to paradise, and reserves seats in heaven to its pastor. Having been thus generous in the matter of spiritual rewards, the members of the average congregation hand over about two or three cents a day which totals the munificient sum of less than \$3.00 every twenty four hours for the preacher.

You know, the average congregation imagines its pastor never would get to heaven unless it permitted him to preach to it each Sunday. That's the impression the preacher must receive every time he gets his lean pay envelope. So he goes on preaching and

praying for his employers, and for everybdy else under the sun. There are times, of course, when a preacher gets to pray for himself and preach to himself. Usually, though, the preacher average. hands full preaching and praying for

his congregation. When he's not preaching and he is visiting the sick and praying helpless, the aged and he back-licer Aside from these duties he has nothing else beyond attendig to the social; the half dozen or so mie societies; the boys and girls, the Sunday school; soliciting money for a new church; collecting for home foreign missions; burying us marrying us: baptizing us and converting us. Once in a while the average \$3.00 or less congregation will permit its pastor to take exer-

mowing the church lawn of weeping snow off the sidewalk.. Truly is the "laborer worthy of his hire". The only trouble is the matter of the preacher's hire is that his congregation expects in , ord to pay about 80 percent of the hire.

It is better to increase the contents of the preacher's pay envelore than to contribute for homes for aged pasors, and it is more pleasing to preachers to get regular sized pay envelopes while they live than bronze ablets after they're dead.





Sgt. Young's Welcome at Hillsburn

Hillsburn has proudly welcomed home its hero in the person of Sgt. Reginald E. Young, 283409 of the 85th, Nova Scotia Highlanders after three years of glorious service for King and Country.

Sgt. Young joined the colors on the 6th of April, 1916, attaching himself as a private with the 219th Battation later transferred to the 85th. The battalion embarked at Halifax, N. S., and sailed for overseas on the 13th of October the same year. Early in the spring of 1917, after a few months in the different training camps of England, he moved, with his battalion to France, where he received his baptism of fire at the battle of Paschendale. A few months later, in a raid on the Vimy Ridge front, he displayed a bravery that won him the Military Medal. Sgt. Young received slight wounds in this engagement, but, nothing daunted, was soon "doing his bit" with a determination and courage that again brought him distinction. At the battle of Amiens he was awarded a further 'Bar" to his medal, for valor. Then followed the battle of Arras and Cambria, with many minor engage-

On the 24th, of October 1918, after nineteen months of galant service at the battle of Valenciennes Sgt. Young received the wound that almost proved fatal. He with his platoon, were on their way to a much needed rest, when word came of casualties down the line. Reinforcements were badly needed, and he with his men voluteered. On emerging from an old cellar, where an outpost was stationed a machine gun opened and Sgt. Young went down, comrades bore him away; a hurried examinat-

ion showed the seriousness of his wounds, and he was rushed to the base. As speedily as possible he was removed to England, and placed in the hospital there one 24th, November, 1919 After many serious operations, when life so often hung in the balance, he began gradually to regain his health. He was invalided home on the S. S. Megantic, arriving at Quebec on the 3rd inst,

and home on the 5th. On Friday evening. at the home was given in his honor of his wife's mother, Mrs. James Halliday. The house was tastefully ecorated with Maple Leaves and in seemed as if nature had arrayed hereself for the occasion. A particularly beautiful evening invited his friends to take part in the many festivities. The evening was a very enjoyable one and old friends listened with interest to the vivid stories of "Over There" that Sgt. Young was induced to tell. Favorite songs were sung, interpersed with impromptu readings and speeches Dainty refreshments were served. A pleasing feature of the evening was when Mr. P. W. Halliday, in a few chosen remarks, presented Sgt. Young with a purse of money. Though taken by surprise the recipien responded with a splendid speech thanking all for the Royal welcome given and the kindly way in which they had remembered him. The

evening concluded with the sing ing of the National Anthem. Sgt Young was the only soldier, this district to see active from service.




