## PARISH NOTES.

The Rector sails for England on June 27th for a short vacation of three months. We shall all be glad to hear of his safe arrival there, and still more glad of his safe return. As it is upwards of ten years since the Rector visited the Old Country, the visit will be one of very great interest and in some sort will be of the nature of a family reunion. Miss Cayley accompanies the Rector and we assure them of our constant thoughts and prayers. During his absence Dr. Hare will be glad to receive all communicants concerning church business.

On June 11, St. Barnabas' Day, Holy Communion at 10.30 a.m.

Our congregation is gradually dispersing for the summer resorts. Captain Walker and his family have left for Cobourg; Mr. Clubb and his family for the Island and others are already on the wing. We can only urge those who still remain in the city to be more regular in their attendance at church. They are always missed and it is dreary work preaching to empty pews.

Several members also of the choir have left or are about to leave the city for the summer. Will not those who are still in the city endeavour to attend at both morning and evening services? They have really no more right to absent themselves than the clergy—if absent their duties are unperformed. Men's voices, tenor and bass, are much needed—who will volunteer?

We had only time before going to press last month to mention the election of Mr. R. A. Baines as Churchwarden and Mr. C. D. Heath as Vestry Clerk. We now heartily congratulate both the Parish and the gentlemen concerned. We much regret the removal of Captain Wyatt from the Parish which necessitated his resignation of the latter office.

## ST. AGATHA'S GUILD.

A really successful entertainment has been given under the auspices of the above Guild and under the management of Miss Cayley and Miss Dye. The schoolroom was literally packed and it was found impossible to provide seats for all. The entertainment proper was preceded by a short musical selection admirably rendered by Miss Gosling, Miss Street, Miss Maud Cowan, Mr. Murdock. As ever, Miss Cowan's contributions were enthusiastically encored and Mr. Murdock's rendering of his songs only made us regret that the Sunday evening congregation have not more frequent opportunities of listening to his voice. The children went through their several parts "as to the manner born," and showed that they had been carefully trained and had themselves acquired the genius of taking pains. The dances were most graceful and artistic and, to St. George's Church audiences, novel. As we write, the little patients are progressing most favourably and it is hoped will soon be again pictures of health. It is well to say that the sanitary arrangements of the school are being thoroughly overhauled under an eminent sanitary authority and that by the time for reopening comes round, all possible danger of a

recurrence will be averted and every modern and requisite improvement made. Of course, every one knows that all institutions of the kind are liable to these outbreaks and that the effect is always to make everything more secure.

LATER.—Since writing above the cause of the epidemic has been found to have no connection whatever with the sanitary conditions of the establishment.

#### In Memoriam
