LONDON, ONT.-A petition has been presented to the Ontario Legislature ask ing authority to issue debentures for substitution of iron for wood in the bridges along the London and Port Stanley railway, which the city has leased from the Lake Eric and Detroit River Railway Company. Mr. Wm. Johnson will creek a residence on William street.

BARRIE, ONT. Thos. Kennedy & Co., architects, have received instructions from Mr. M. McConnell, of Toronto, to prepare plans for the erection of a large wing to the Peninsula Park hotel. The addition will contain a large ball room, billiard rooms, parlors and about 50 bed rooms. They have also prepared plans for a five room brick school at Sudbury, Ont., and a brick Methodist church at New Lowell. Tenders for these buildings will be called for immediately.

Scholastique have voted the sum of \$4,500 towards the erection of a new convent in the parish.—The propperty owners along the Cote St. Catharine road at Outremont have signed the agreement allowing the municipality to proceed at once with the widening of the road to eighty feet from St. Louis street to the limits of the municipality. limits of the municipality.

TORONTO, ONT.—A deputation from the township of Tiny, County of Simcoe, waited upon the Government last week asking for power to issue debentures for the construction of a railroad. Their solicitor is William Steers.—Mi. W. E. Redway has again written to the Mayor reging the construction of a dry dock for Toronto. He points out that shipbuilding and repairing to the amount of \$660,000 is in contemplation by Toronto capitalists which would be done in the city if a drydock was constructed.—The owners of the steamship Campana are considering the desirability of making alterations at a possible cost of \$45,000. Calculations have been made during the past six months for the construction of seven new vessels, as follows: Steel dredge for a contractor, to cost \$40,000; two steel passenger steamers for Montreal and Toronto route, \$250,000; steel passenger steamer for Toronto, Hamilton, Niagara steamer for Toronto, Hamilton, Niagara route, \$150,000; two full sized canal cargo seamers of 65,000 bushels capacity, \$200,000; steel sand pump, \$20,000.—
