





A SAD ACCIDENT.

Resulting in the Death of T. J. Hogan.

It is our sad duty this week to record the death of Mr. T. J. Hogan, which occurred Wednesday Aug. 22nd.

In our last issue we gave an account of the accident which was the cause of his death.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at St. Mary's cemetery. It will be remembered that the deceased met an untimely death by falling off a freight car, alighting on his head on the rails, which rendered him unconscious in which state he remained till his death.

Local Market Report.

Harvesting throughout Manitoba has progressed favorably during the past week, and wheat-cutting is practically finished. Crop reports indicate about the same yield as last year.

Wheat.—Very little business was done last week. No. 1 hard 59c to 59 1/2c is about the average. No. 2, 56c to 57c.

Corn.—Quotations are about equal to No. 2 wheat, moderate demand.

Flour.—Quotations in broken lots: Patents, \$1.55; strong bakers, \$1.45. Low grades, 75c to \$1, as to quantity.

Oats.—32c to 34c per bushel. Barley.—40 to 45c per bushel.

Butter.—12 1/2 to 15c for good to choice scarce.

Cheese.—8 1/2 to 9c: jobbers selling at 10c.

Poultry.—Turkeys 14c per lb; 10c for live weight. Spring chickens 30c to 35c per pair.

Vegetables.—Onions 3 1/2 lb. cabbage, 40c doz. peas in pod \$1 bushel. Cauliflower, 40c doz., celery 20c doz. radishes, 10c doz., turnips 15c bunch, green corn 8 to 10c dozen ears.

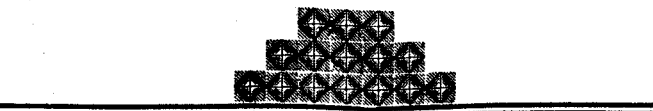

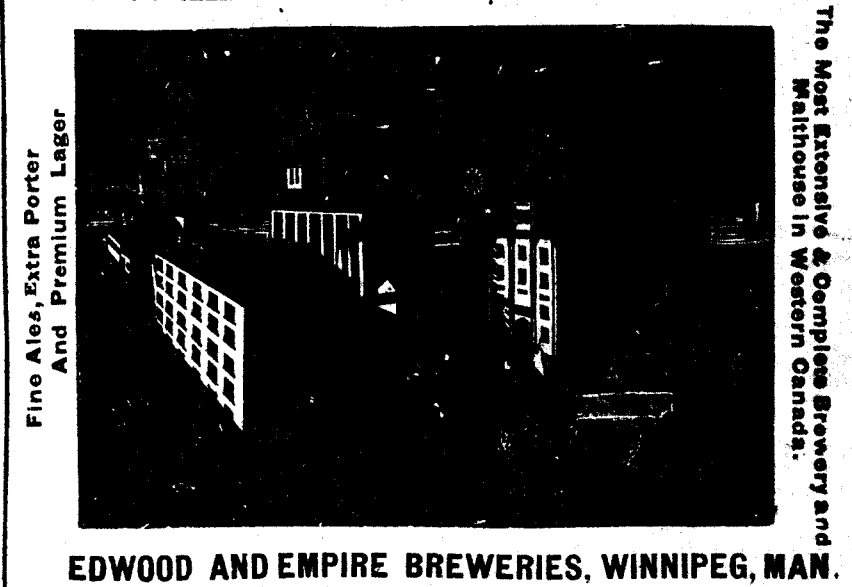

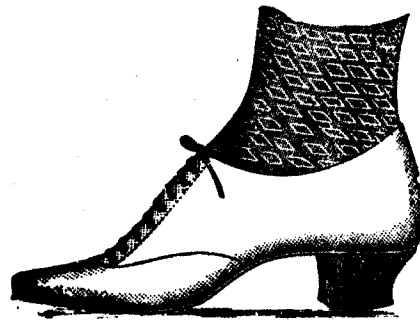
