A.—until the 3rd April, it will be an Evening Star. After that a Morning Star from April 16th, until the beginning of June; an Evening Star from June 22nd until about the second week in August; a Morning Star from August 24 until September 21, and an Evening Star from 8th November. Mercury will be in conjunction with the Sun February 24, April 8, June 11, August 16, September 27, and December 3.

♀ VENUS.—Until about the 10th February Venus will be an Evening Star. It rises, February 27, 1 h. 20 m. before sunrise; then continues a Morning Star until the end of October. It will be at greatest brilliancy January 13, and March 25, and in conjunction with the Sun February 18 and December 3.

♂ MARS.—January 1, Mars rises 10h. 25m. A., souths, 2nd, 4h. 48m. M.; will be a Morning Star until about the middle of March, and after that an Evening Star throughout the remainder of the year. From January 3 to end of May Mars will be above the horizon between 6 and 12 hours every night.

♃ JUPITER.—On 1st January Jupiter souths 2 hours before sunrise and will be a Morning Star until 24th March, when it rises 5h. 50m. A. and sets at sunrise; it will then be an Evening Star until the end of September, and in conjunction with the Sun October 9th. It rises an hour before the Sun October 25, and continues a Morning Star. Jupiter will be above the horizon between early evening and sunrise from middle of March to the end of June.

♄ SATURN.—Will be an Evening Star until the last week in June; in conjunction with the Sun July 3, and a Morning Star from 17th July until the end of December. From 1st January to the end of March it will continue above the horizon from 6 to 15 hours after sunset.

will thus be seen that the Notes are not written for the purpose of furnishing new or original or theoretical information, but rather as reminding hints to intelligent Agriculturists already familiar with the science and practice of their profession. The notes, in fact, are to be used on the farm to assist during the progress of the season, in arranging the farm work and business. A fact known to every farmer is that no two seasons are the exact counterparts of each other, and the farmer or gardener or fruit-grower will be most successful whose crops are selected and operations carried on in view of the season proving either good, bad or indifferent. Crops that ripen well one season may not do as well on the same farm the next, and hence a judicious choice should be made. The same applies to modes of culture, and to times of preparing the ground and

sowing. These two last operations should always, however, be performed as soon as the soil and weather are fit. It is at this comparatively idle season that a plan of the year's work may be carefully prepared, and we commend this as an exercise well adapted for occupying the leisure evenings of January.

FEBRUARY is the trying month for cattle. We cannot too strongly impress the necessity of care in their feeding, watering and general treatment, at this season of the year. When they once begin to fall off, it is uphill work to attempt to stop it. Barns may be faulty, and the cold is severely felt, and yet this is one of the least evils in Nova Scotia, for horned cattle require plenty of fresh air, and the winter and spring rates of mortality in cows in the country barns is very low compared to that of the apparently comfortable, substantial, wind-tight stables of the City of Halifax. The root cellar may be troublesome to get at, and the animals miss an occasional meal; the wells may be frozen and the way to watering

places may be so slippery that the cattle cannot reach them without discomfort or positive accident. In order to overcome these and many other difficulties that appear in February, it is a good rule to give extra time and attention to the stock. In feeding grain and meal always mix them into cut hay, moistened, otherwise they do not undergo the proper mastication, but pass through the alimentary canal before a large portion of their nutritious materials has been absorbed.

MARCH.—The nature of our climate necessitates the use of a hot-bed for raising seedling plants of those crops that require a long season to mature. A hot-bed is made by piling on successive layers of well chopped horse dung obtained from a stable where oats are freely fed. The manure may be raised to a height of two or three feet above the surface of the soil. On top, spread four or five inches of very fine and rich soil mixed with sand; this should have been prepared in the Fall, and kept dry under cover all winter,—otherwise it is likely now to be in a hard

frozen mass. The glass sashes are then to be put on and kept close till the hot-bed heats; the steam and heat will start the seeds of weeds, which may be allowed to grow. Air is then given, and when the heat modifies, weed and rake the surface; and sow your spring seeds,—cauliflowers, cabbages, celery, tomatoes, &c., for the kitchen garden; and stocks, verbenas, petunias, asters, balsams, and such-like annuals for flower garden ornament. The seeds will bear a good deal of heat before they emerge from the soil, but, as soon as the first leaves begin to appear, the frame must be aired daily, taking care to avoid cold draughts. As the young seedling plants have to be pricked out when large enough, it is a good plan to sow the vacant ground in the hot-bed (intended for this purpose) with lettuces or radishes,

or other early salads, these speedily come into use, and may be cleared away in time to transplant on the ground they occupied, the phloxes, stocks, asters, petunias, zinnias, verbenas, and other plants requiring such treatment.

APRIL.—The serious work of cultivation or raising of Field Crops begins with the advent of April. No time should now be lost in performing needful work. Manure under cover may be carted out on the frozen soil to where it is to be used. In fields seeded down with timothy last fall, it will now be time to sow clover,—a mixture of red and alsyke is the best for hay, as the white clover does not grow tall enough for cutting. When early potatoes are required, the seed should be kept in a warm place so as to start the eyes, and whenever the ground is dry

enough, they may be planted. Peas and Broadbeans may be sown at the very beginning of the month. Onions, parsnips and carrots also should be put in as soon as the ground is fit to give them the more delicate seed-bed they require. Beets and mangold wurzel are usually sown at the end of the month or early in May. All gooseberry and currant bushes should be dressed, apple and pear trees gone over, and generally the whole kitchen garden and orchard thoroughly cared for. Remove the boughs from the strawberry plants gradually, and make the flower garden neat and trim.

MAY.—The work of crop raising commenced in April has now to be carried on with increased vigour. The success of the farmer's year depends so much upon the month of May and the work that can be then accomplished, that every hour

should be highly valued. If any ploughing has to be done, let it be done at once; if manure has to be taken out for crops, don't wait for a more convenient season; if the weather is not all that can be desired, proceed nevertheless with your work, vary it to suit the state of the soil and the atmosphere. Men cannot fight against the operations of nature, but they can very often turn them to advantage by consideration and forethought. What has to be sown and planted this month? *Everything* except what has either already been committed to the soil, or is too tender to withstand the coldness of the soil, or the probable frosts of June. Such exceptional crops are bush-beans, pole-beans, corn, tomatoes, cucumbers, squashes; it is only in warm sandy soils that such things can be safely put out before the end of the month. Turnips also should *not* be sown in May. Finish all top

dressing of grass lands, keep down weeds in gardens, give more air to frames so that the plants may grow strong and hardy, see that all fences are secure before you let out any cattle into the pastures, clear out cellars and yards, whitewash buildings, and put the whole homestead into summer order.

JUNE.—Some field crops are grown for the purpose of furnishing summer feed and winter fodder for the animals of the farm; these are used on the farm. Other crops are sent directly to the market, and are thus called "paying crops." One of the most important of these to the Nova Scotian farmer is the Potato. With us, potatoes are usually planted early in June, say from 1st to 15th. Different methods are adopted in different localities; in light land the manure is

oughed in, on heavy land it is laid in the drills. Superphosphate and kaint greatly increase the yield, which varies with the different varieties. Where the Colorado bug appears, pick off by hand, or dust with Paris Green before the dew has gone off the vines. As soon as the currant and gooseberry bushes have pushed out their first leaves and early blossoms, it will be found advantageous to give them a sprinkling of white hellebore powder in the early morning before the dew is off. This will destroy the first crop of currant worms, and thus preserve the bushes and the fruit crop for the season. If this were done every year, in every garden throughout the Province, it would require only a very few years to rid the Province of this pest, and then, by raising our own bushes, instead of importing, we should be no longer troubled with currant worms.

JULY.—Ploughing, sowing and planting have been completed in the months of May and June,—this month is especially devoted to the cultivation of the various field crops. Cultivation, in this restricted sense, means the hoeing of crops, stirring by cultivators and harrows and such like implements, between or over the drills, hilling up and moulding. The object of these operations is to destroy weeds, to keep the soil open, and thus to promote the decomposition of the manure, enable the soil to retain moisture, allow free access of air, and by these means to ensure the growth of the crops. We are apt to have a good many rainy days in July, and, as most of the hoeing work has to be compressed between planting time and haying time, haying has occasionally to be begun before potato hoeing is completed; this occurs on many of the best regulated farms.

In ordinary seasons it is sure to occur on a farm where foresight is not shown, hence the miserable root crops we so often see. Let our farming readers then be careful to forecast the weather probabilities in light of the July work to be done on the growing crops, and thus avoid the disastrous loss that comes from a neglected crop. The sowing of turnips is usually recommended for the month of June, but, as the ground has to be remarkably fine for this crop, and as turnips are often put in to fill up land that was originally intended for the earlier sown roots, it frequently happens that turnips have to be sown in July. Some even prefer to sow their Swedes this month, and the soft turnips for immediate feeding need not necessarily be sown till the end of July. The ground should have undergone a thorough pulverization. Light sandy soil is the best for Turnips. They start best after the ground is warm, but the bulbs swell most rapidly during the

cool dewy nights in Autumn. The soil cannot be worked too deep or made too fine for Turnips. Town manures are valuable for this crop; and crushed bones have been applied with the best effects, either when covered in the drills in the manner of ordinary dung, or when sown by machine along with the seeds, so as to be in immediate contact with the latter. Guano has been largely used but not so much of late years. Superphosphate is very efficacious. One point of Turnip culture that is often neglected in Nova Scotia, although well understood elsewhere, is that the seed should be put in the moment the soil is prepared. If the earth of the prepared drills gets dried up in the sun before the seed is

August.—Haymaking usually begins about the second or third week of July, sooner or later according to locality, climate and season, but it is in most districts carried over into the month of August. Where suitable implements and appliances are used there is now no difficulty in securing the crop. We have in former years recommended our readers to note at this season how convenient it is to have a field of tares or green oats or barley or Indian corn or rape, or any other green

etable thing for the cattle to grow or fatten upon when the pastures are all burnt up. After haying there will be work in the garden, and especially in the orchard. Look after the ripening fruit, destroy caterpillars, if any still remain; pick the early August apples, and send them into a local market, or to the picnic. When the rains come, beds of strawberries may be made up. See that the ground is well drained and enriched with old manure. Mushrooms now appear in the horse pastures, house flies become troublesome, and the swallows congregate in flocks and leave us. The calving of cows for the season will now be over. All thorough-bred calves should be at once registered in the official Stock Register. For grade stock the farmer should keep a record for after reference.

SEPTEMBER.—Within the last two years the importation of English Horse Beans has led to the cultivation of this crop, but we regret to say that, although the climate of Nova Scotia, unlike that of the United States and Ontario, is admirably adapted for their production, yet Horse Beans still remain little more than a curiosity with us. This is a great misfortune, as there is an unlimited demand for these Beans in England, and there is no better feeding stuff on our own farms for all kinds of stock. There is no mystery and no difficulty in the cultivation of this crop, the Beans may be sown in drills or broadcast, and treated either as we would common grain or a root crop,—in fact very much like ordinary beans, or as Indian corn, with this difference, that the Horse Bean can be sown as soon as the ground is fit, for the bean is hardy, and such slight frosts as we have in the

months of May or June will not harm it. The harvesting and the threshing are the two processes that our farmers do not yet quite perfectly understand. The heavy stalks should be cut or pulled up by the roots and tied in bundles, and left on the field to dry. They will not suffer from the autumn rains; the stalks and pods naturally become black. After being apparently well ripened and dried, (having lain a week or ten days in the weather) they are removed to the barn. These bundles should remain there till the dry frosty weather of February. By that time the beans will have become hardened, and fit for threshing. If threshed before, they will likely be either mashed and injured in the process, or else they will mould and decay. The bean stalks make coarse but useful fodder. The beans can be mixed with oats for horses, or boiled and fed to cattle, pigs or poultry.

OCTOBER.—Now that the farming season's work is well nigh over, the young man on the farm may repair to the Normal School at Truro, where special instruction is given in the Art of Agriculture and the sciences bearing upon it, by the Lecturer on Agriculture. The Fruit Crop is yearly acquiring increased importance in Nova Scotia, now that the markets of the world are open to our fruit growers. to our orchardists at this season than that which appeared in the London Garden from a prominent London firm of fruit dealers:—"New York State Apples a few years ago occupied the leading position in the trade, but have been steadily losing prestige, and goods packed in the Western and New England States and Canada have steadily gained in popularity and prices. These results have been caused by the style of packing; the New York barrel contains about 2½ bushels, has flat hoops, whilst the others hold fully three bushels and have round hoops. Baldwins in the former sell in London at 18s. per barrel, whilst in the latter they bring only 15s., 17 p. c. less, whilst the difference in quantity is only 8½ p. c. A large portion of the receipts last season were 'stuffed,' the middle of the barrel containing

inferior fruit." The advice following from all this is, use the right kind of barrel, pack it carefully with honest fruit, and Nova Scotia will acquire a reputation for apples and a potentiality of wealth far exceeding the fondest dreams of avarice.

NOVEMBER.—The improvement of cattle has at length taken a secure hold upon the people of Nova Scotia, and is carried out to some extent through the agency of Agricultural Societies. Every Society keeps, or ought to keep, a sufficient number of male animals for the use of members. If the selection and purchase of these be deferred till Spring time, large prices have to be paid, and suitable animals are not always obtainable. For beef cattle the Short Horn Durham breed

is the best; their growth is more rapid than that of any other kind. For milk alone, Ayrshires are to be preferred, Devons make the best working oxen, are quick, active, and easily fed, and soon fatten in the wild pastures for beef. For domestic cows in the city the creamy Alderneys or Jerseys are most suitable. The Jerseys are at present the greatest favourites, and their increase, whilst it will promote the manufacture of butter, threatens to lessen our capacity for beef production. Holsteins are also, however, becoming great favorites in a few localities, and the same may be said of Polled Angus. Herefords have not yet made their mark. There is a danger that in increasing the number of kinds in our small country, we are rather tending to convert the Province into a very interesting Zoological Garden, than to direct the Dairy and Beef Industries

into the most profitable channels. But our people are quick to learn by experience. As soon as the root crops are all cleared off the fields, and the weeds and potato vines are put in heaps to rot, the farmer should employ his whole strength of man and beast in fall ploughing. Whether on old or new land fall ploughing is a most important operation. Without it a farm cannot be worked to advantage. After ploughing, do not forget to go carefully over the water furrows to make way for the exit of the floods of rain and melting snows that are sure to soak your fields before seed time. A well ploughed, well-drained field may be sown in spring as soon as the frost is gone, whilst one that is irregularly ploughed, or has no water furrows, may long remain a puddle, defying every attempt to improve its condition. The best part of what is too often left to be "Spring

the Provincial Treasury an annual grant in aid to promote its operations. The special purpose of a Society is to improve the live stock of its district, which is accomplished by obtaining and keeping for the use of members, superior male animals, such as bulls, rams and boars. Societies may also introduce seeds of new varieties of grain, roots, and also improved implements, and sell them to members at cost and charges. Exhibitions are held by the Societies of a District, embracing two or more Counties, combining. The whole of the Societies of the Province meet on the first Tuesday in December, each in its respective District, when the members receive the Director's Report, and select officers for the ensuing year. Full information as to the method of organizing Societies may be obtained on application at the Office for Agriculture, Province Building, Halifax.

Bushel, half bushel, peck, gallon, may be of (1) Bronze or Brass Cast; (2) Hammered Sheet Brass or Copper, strengthened by rims of similar metal, and upright straps; (3) Sheet Iron, when of sufficient strength to retain the form of the measure under ordinary usage, either with wood or iron bottoms; (4) Wood, of any suitable quality, with iron or hardwood rim. When of Wood, the edge to be sufficiently thick to receive the brand.

Gallon, half gallon, quart, pint, half pint, gill, half gill, may be made of (1) Bronze or Brass, cast; (2) Hammered Sheet Brass or Copper, with suitable rim of similar metal; (3) Hard Pewter; (4) Stout tin plate of approved thickness.

No measure of capacity of which the sides or bottom are indented, battered, or knocked out of the regular form, will be admitted to verification, nor any whose bottoms are not sufficiently strong to carry the contents without changing their form.

Postage Stamps, Post Cards, etc., issued by the Canadian P. O. Department.

The stamps issued by the Canadian Post Office Department, are of the following denominations, viz.: postage stamps, $\frac{1}{2}$ c., 1 c., 2 c., 3 c., 5 c., 6 c., 10 c., 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. and 15 c.; registered letter stamps, 2 c. and 5 c.

Post Cards are issued at one cent each, and may be sent to any address in Canada or United States. Reply Post Cards (2 cts.) may be sent to any address in Canada. Post cards are also issued at two cents each for transmission to the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, St. Pierre et Miquelon, and certain foreign countries. Post Bands are for sale at the rate of \$1.25 per hundred.

Rates of Postage within the Dominion.

LETTERS.

To places within the Dominion of Canada, 3 cents per half oz. each. Letters paid less than one rate will not be forwarded. Other short paid letters will be taxed with double the amount of the deficient postage.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it, commonly known as Local or "drop letters," the rate will be 1 cent per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; to be in all cases prepaid by Postage Stamps affixed to such letter when posted.

Re-directed Letters will be forwarded without any additional charge if not taken from the office or if handed back at the moment of their delivery, but if taken from the office and subsequently re-posted they become subject to a new rate of postage, in default of which they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by Post from the Office of publication to regular subscribers in Canada free.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, will be sent at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp. Newspapers and Periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, prepaid by postage stamp, one half ct. each.

MISCELLANEOUS MAIL MATTER.

Periodicals, Books, Pamphlets, and occasional Publications, Books and Newspaper Manuscript, Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings; Music, Packages of Seeds, Cuttings, Roots, Scions, Grafts, Botanical Specimens, etc., and patterns or samples of merchandise.

To any place in Canada, 1 cent per 4 oz. each packet, Books, Circulars, Music, etc., must be put up open at both ends.

PARCELS.

To any place within the Dominion 6 cents per 4 ozs., which must be prepaid. Parcels must not exceed 5 lbs in weight, excepting those addressed to British Columbia or Manitoba, other than Winnipeg City, the weight of which is limited to 2 lbs. 3 oz.

REGISTRATION FEE.

To places within the Dominion, 2 cents each letter or post card, and 5 cents each parcel or packet of sample.

Information in regard to the rules governing registered correspondence, etc., may be had at any Post Office.

Newspapers if sent singly, must be prepaid at the newspaper rate, but they may be sent in packets paid collectively at book post rate, or by newspaper rate, but if at newspaper rate, each paper must be paid the same rate as if sent singly.

Further information in regard to the rates of postage to British Colonies and foreign countries, via England, or the United States, inland and foreign mail connections, the rules governing letters, newspapers, books, periodicals, samples and parcel post, and the transmission of post cards, ships letters, free matter, &c., may be obtained at any Post Office.

LIGHT HOUSES.

On the Coasts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

GEORGE'S ISLAND, west side of Island, Halifax Harbor, lat 44° 38' 30" N., lon 63° 33' 20" W., two fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 20 feet apart, 50 and 30 feet high, drab square building, 21 feet high. Lights show seaward on the S., and into harbor on N. side; on W. side the upper light only can be seen. Vessels going into Halifax Harbor, passing Meagher's Beach, will keep the light on starboard bow. The light is for the purpose of guiding vessels in and out of the Harbor, through the channel west of the Island. These lights open to westward of Meagher's Beach, clear the westward of Thrum Cap Shoal.

EAST FROM HALIFAX.

MEAGHER'S BEACH, Sherbrook Tower, east side of entrance to Halifax Harbor, lat 44° 36' N., lon 63° 31' 50" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 58 feet high, building white with red roof, granite, height 48 feet. When Sambro light bears W. S. W., this light should not be brought to the westward of north, which clears the Thrum Cap Shoal. A fog bell here, strikes 7 times in each minute.

DEVIL'S ISLAND, on south point of Island, at the eastern entrance to Halifax harbor, two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontally, E. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., and W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S.; 175 yards apart, visible 13 miles, the light E. 59 feet high, W. light 52 feet, both buildings white, octagonal, wood, height E. 53 feet, W. 45 feet, lat 44° 34' 50" N., lon 63° 27' 15" W. The eastern light opens to southward of western, clears to the southward of the Thrum Cap Shoal. Pilots are stationed here.

JEDDORE ROCK, on summit of rocks about 22 miles east of Halifax, lat 44° 39' 45", lon 63° 0' 22" one fixed red light, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, dwelling attached, 86 feet high.

EGG ISLAND, centre of island, lat 44° 39' 50" N., lon 62° 51' 32" W. catoptric light, alternate red and white, revolving every minute, visible 15 miles, 80 feet high, octagonal building, black and white vertical stripes on seaward side, height 45 feet. Visible around horizon. A bell buoy about 200 yards south of the Brig Rock, W. by S. from the light house, about 2 miles.

POPE'S HARBOR, on west point of Harbour Island, lat 44° 47' 40" N.; lon 62° 38' 50" W., fixed red light, catoptric, visible 9 miles, 45 feet high, tower white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, height 37 feet.

SHEET ROCK, at the entrance to Sheet Harbor, lat 44° 49' 55" N., lon 62° 29' 40" W., revolving red light every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles. White, square, wood, with dwelling attached. 75 feet above high water mark.

BEAVER ISLAND, S. E. part of East Beaver, or William Island, lat 44° 48' 10" N., lon 62° 20' 30" W., white catoptric light, revolving every 2 minutes, visible 12 miles, 70 feet high; white building with two black balls to seaward, S. S. W., 35 feet high.

LISCOMB, on island, lat 44° 29' 20" N, lon 61° 57' 50" W., red and white catoptric light, alternating every two minutes visible 15 miles, 64 feet high, white square wooden tower, with dwelling attached.

WEDGE ISLAND, mouth of St. Mary's River, lat 45° 0' 35", lon 61° 52' 35", one revolving red light, shows 1 minute in 3 minutes, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, catoptric.

HOLY POINT, west side of entrance to Isaac's Harbor, lat 45° 10' 0" N., lon 61° 39' 12" W., two fixed white catoptric lights vertically, 20 feet apart, visible 9 miles, 80 feet high, square white building, 20 feet high, with dwelling attached.

COUNTRY HARBOUR, on Green Island, Guysboro' County, lat 45° 6' 15" N., lon 61° 32' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 to 16 miles, 51 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 23 feet. Coast light, and to guide vessels frequenting Country and Fisherman's Harbors.

TOR BAY, on eastern point of Barry Head, W. side of entrance to Bay, Guysboro' County, lat 45° 11' 37" N., lon 61° 18' 35" W., fixed catoptric light, red to seaward, white northward into Bay and towards Molasses Harbor, visible 10 miles, square wooden building, with dwelling attached, white with vertical red stripes, top of lantern painted black. Height of lantern 51 feet, tower 36 feet.

THREE TOP ISLAND, on the south-east point of Three Top Island Whitehaven, Guysborough County, Nova Scotia, lat 45° 12' 40" N., lon 61° 9' 40" W. The light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 48 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 11 miles. The building is a wooden one painted white, and consists of a square tower 32 feet high from base of building to vane on lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels into Whitehaven, and in order to point out the dangers on the northern side of the Western Passage is obscured when bearing to the eastward of N. E. by E. It is visible from all other points of approach except when intercepted by the high land of Whitehead Island.

WHITEHEAD ISLAND, S. W. extremity of Island, Guysboro' County, lat 45° 12' N., lon 61° 8' 15" W., white catoptric light, revolving every 20 seconds, visible 11 miles, 55 feet high, pyramidal wooden building, 35 feet high, with dwelling attached, octagonal lantern. Light not totally obscured during the eclipses; 10 seconds duration of flash, and 10 seconds eclipse.

CANSO CAPE, north part of Cranberry Island, lat 45° 19' 50" N., lon. 60° 55' 25" W., two fixed white lights in one tower, vertically, 35 feet apart, upper visible 15, lower 9 miles, 75 and 40 feet respectively, high, octagonal wooden building, horizontally striped red and white, with dwelling house attached. A steam fog whistle, near the light-house, in thick weather sounds a blast of 8 seconds in each minute.

An automatic signal buoy in 20 fathoms, 1½ miles E. S. E. of Grimes Rock, taken up about December.

CANSO HARBOR, on Hart or Cutler Island, lat 45° 21' N., lon 60° 58' 30" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 42 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 ft.

CROW HARBOR, on Rock Island, Chedabucto Bay, lat 45° 21' 5" N, lon 61° 16' W., fixed white dioptric light, visible 8 miles. Square wooden tower with dwelling attached, painted white.

GUYSBORO' HARBOR, W. side of entrance, near Peart Point, Chedabucto Bay, lat 45° 22' 50" N., lon 61° 29' 10" W., fixed white catoptric

A black can buoy is moored off the extreme end of Sand Spit.

POINT TUPPER, Ship Harbor or Port Hawkesbury, lat $45^{\circ} 36' 40''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 22' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 7 miles, 44 feet high, white square building, height 24 feet. In consequence of the intervention of the land on the south side, can only be seen three miles in that direction.

CREIGHTON'S HEAD, on the north extremity, lat $45^{\circ} 30' 40''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 6' W.$, white catoptric light, revolving every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles, 29 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Little or West Arichat. Three buoys placed to mark the dangers off the harbor.

JERSEYMAN ISLAND, Arichat Harbor, lat $45^{\circ} 30' 20''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 3' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 39 feet high, white square wooden building, height 28 feet. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels through Crid Passage, in and out of Arichat Harbor. There is also a Range Beacon on the S. E. Point of Jerseyman's Island, that marks Hautfond Shoal, off the entrance to Arichat Harbor. When the beacon and spire of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Arichat are in range, it leads over the West Part of the shoal in 10 feet of water. Vessels bound into Arichat, Cape Breton, should pass to the west of the shoal, or bring the beacon in range of the cupola on the Convent, which stands 130 yards east of the R. C. Church, which will lead in clear of the shoal. Only those well acquainted should pass to the eastward of the shoal, or bring the beacon to bear to the N. of N. E. An Iron Can Buoy painted red has been placed about one cable's length S. W. of the Hautfond Shoal in six fathoms of water. The buoy will be placed on or about the 1st of May in each year, and taken up about the 10th December.

ARICHAT, Marache Point, south entrance to Madame Island, lat $45^{\circ} 29' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 1' 50'' W.$, fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 34 feet high, square white wooden building, height 25 feet.

PETITDEGRAT, on Big Arrow Rock, south-east of Madame Island, lat $44^{\circ} 29' 54'' N.$, lon $60^{\circ} 57' 30'' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 38 feet high, white square tower, with dwelling attached, height 31 feet.

GREEN ISLAND, summit of Island, lat $45^{\circ} 28' 50'' N.$, lon $60^{\circ} 53' 40'' W.$, red and white catoptric light, revolving alternately every 45 seconds, visible 14 miles, 70 feet high, white square wooden building, height 31 feet. Light, centre of keeper's dwelling. Visible around horizon.

CAPÉ LA RONDE, west side of entrance to St. Peter's Bay, lat $45^{\circ} 34' 45'' N.$, lon $60^{\circ} 53'' W.$, fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 miles, 92 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels into St. Peter's Bay.

OUETIQUE ISLAND, on south point, lat $45^{\circ} 36' 40'' N.$, lon $60^{\circ} 57' 15'' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 9 miles, 78 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels through Lennox Passage.

Three Pole Lights in Lennox Passage. One on Glasgow Point, one on Seal Island, or Dog Island, and one on Grand Dique. Red light

JEROME POINT, east side of St Peter's Bay, lat 45° 39' 5" N., lon 60° 52' W., a fixed red light, visible 8 miles. Square wooden tower, with dwelling attached, painted white.

SAINT ESPRIT ISLAND, east end, lat 45° 37' 30" N., lon 60° 29' 20" W., one revolving white catoptric light, flash at intervals of 30 seconds' building white, with two red bands, square, wood, with dwelling attached. Height of building 55 feet, of light 78 feet. Bad Neighbor Shoal, S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $\frac{1}{2}$ mile from this light is not more than 12 feet below water.

A Bell Buoy off Fourchie Head.

GUION ISLAND, about 230 yards from west end of Island, lat 45° 46' 10" N., lon 60° 6' 20" W., red revolving light, catoptric, attains its greatest brilliancy every 30 seconds, visible 12 miles, 74 feet high, tower white, square, with dwelling attached, height 54 feet.

LOUISBURG, north side of entrance to harbor, 120 yards inshore of point, lat 45° 54' 30" N., lon 59° 57' 15" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 16 miles, 85 feet high, building white, with a black vertical stripe on dwelling, height 35 feet.

An Automatic Signal Buoy in 30 fathoms $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. from light-house.

From this buoy a course N. W. by W. will clear the Broad Shoal, and lead to the fairway of Louisburg Harbor. Taken up about December.

MAINADIEU, on south side of west point of Scatterie Island, lat 46° 0' 30" N., lon 59° 47' 30" W., fixed red catoptric light, 90 feet high, white square wooden building, height 40 feet.

SCATTERIE, north-east point on Trap Rock, lat 46° 2' 15" N., lon 59° 40' 15" W., white catoptric revolving light, visible a minute, eclipsed half a minute, visible 15 miles, 90 feet high, white octagonal building, height 70 feet. The light should never be brought to bear to eastward of N. N. E., or to southward of S. S. W., nor approached nearer than $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile. Visible half minute, eclipsed one minute. A boat is here to render assistance.

Fog Whistle near the light-house. Sounds two blasts of 5 seconds, with intervals of 10 seconds, in every minute.

Cow BAY, on outer end of breakwater. Lantern on frame. Fixed red.

FLINT ISLAND, on island, lat 46° 11' N., lon 59° 46' 50" W., white catoptric light, revolving every 15 seconds, visible 12 miles, 65 feet high, white octagonal building, height 43 feet. Visible around horizon.

LINGAN HEAD, north side of entrance to Bridgeport Harbor, lat 46° 14' 10" N., lon 60° 2' 40" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 50 feet high, white square wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Bridgeport Harbor.

LOW POINT, Flat Point, east side of Spanish Bay, lat 46° 16' 30" N., lon 60° 7' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 miles, 70 feet high, building octagonal, red and white vertical stripes, height 51 feet. Marine Telegraph and Signal Station.

SYDNEY BAR, on west end of South Bar, lat 46° 12' 40" N., lon 60° 12' 40" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 30 feet high, white square wooden building, height 20 feet.

PICKFORD & BLACK, SHIP BROKERS.

POINT ACONI, on high cape, north side of entrance to Little Bras d'Or, lat 46° 20' 30" N., lon 50° 17' 10" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 91 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Little Bras d'Or.

BLACK ROCK POINT, south side of entrance to Big Bras d'Or, lat 46° 18' 30" N., lon 60° 23' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, 45 feet high, white square building, height 23 feet. White cross on red ground.

Three Pole Lights in St. Peter's Inlet. One on Marjorie's Isle, west of Sandy's Point, one on the S. E. point Beaver Island, and one on Gregory Island. Red light shown from lantern hoisted on a mast 25 feet high, with shed painted white at its base. Visible 5 miles.

FRASER'S POINT, on north side of St. Patrick's Channel, lat 45° 57' 45" N., lon 61° 4' 30" W., fixed red light, shown from a dioptric lantern, hoisted on a mast 25 feet high, with a shed painted white at its base, visible 5 miles.

KIDSTON ISLAND, on N. E. Point, at entrance to Baddeck Harbor, N. side of Bras d'Or Lake, lat 46° 5' 53" N., lon 60° 44' 20" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 7 miles, 31 feet high, square, wooden building, white.

MCNEIL BEACH, Big Bras d'Or, a pole light. Red.

ST. PAUL'S ISLAND, on rock off N. E. point of island, lat 47° 13' 50" N. lon 60° 8' 20" W., fixed white light, dioptric, third order, visible 20 miles, 140 feet high, white octagonal building, height 40 feet. Obscured between N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ and E. N. E.

ST. PAUL'S ISLAND, S. W. point of island, lat 47° 11' 20" N., lon 60° 9' 40" W., white dioptric light, third order, revolving every minute, visible 20 miles, 140 feet high, white octagonal building, 40 feet high. Obscured when bearing from S. S. E., to W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. A fog whistle on the S. E. side of the island, S. W. of Atlantic Cove, about half a mile from the Humane Establishment, sounds once for five seconds in each minute during thick weather and storms.

MARGAREE HARBOUR, on outer end of breakwater pier, lat 46° 26' 35" N., lon 61° 6' 50" W., seaward light fixed red, white light eastern and western sides lantern, visible 7 miles, 29 feet high, square white building.

CAPE ST. GEORGE, north side of Cape, lat 45° 52' 30" N., lon 61° 54' 40" W., white catoptric light, revolving every half minute, visible 25 miles, 350 feet high, white square building, height 39 feet.

MERIGOMISH, on King Head, entrance to harbor, lat 45° 39' 20" N. lon 62° 28' 30" W., red, fixed, catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 105 feet high, white, square wooden building, 40 feet high.

PICKFORD & BLACK, SHIP CHANDLERS.

PICTOU ISLAND, south-east point, lat 45° 49' 10" N., lon 62° 30' 30" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 52 feet high, square white building.

In tower of new Custom House a fixed white light, in range with lights at the entrance to harbor, leads through the channel up to the bar.

Red light, shown from window in keeper's dwelling. Two lights in one, form a range to lead across bar, and in channel up to Mullin's Point.

A red can buoy marks entrance to channel, and two fairway buoys.

PUGWASH, in harbor, lat 45° 52' 30" N., lon 63° 40' 20" W., fixed catoptric light, red seaward, white towards harbor, visible 8 miles, 48 feet high, white square building, height 44 feet. Black buoys to be left on port hand, and red on starboard when entering the harbor.

WEST FROM HALIFAX.

CHEBUCTO HEAD, west side of entrance to Halifax Harbor, lat 44° 30' 20" N., lon 63° 30' 50" W., white light, revolving every minute, visible 18 miles, 132 feet high, white square wooden building, height 22 feet.

An Automatic Signal Buoy, placed in lat 44° 31' 42" N., lon 63° 29' 28" W., in 21 fathoms of water, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Chebucto Head, sounds a ten inch whistle. From the buoy Chebucto Head bears S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., magnetic $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile. Sandwich Point, N. by W., 4 miles. Passing to the westward of the buoy at the distance of half a cable and steering a N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. course magnetic, will lead up the harbor to the eastward of the Neverfail Shoal, and at a distance of two cables to the westward of Meagher's Beach light-house.

A similar buoy in lat 44° 28' 25" N., lon 63° 22' 10" W., in 36 fathoms, from this buoy Sambro Island light W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Devil's Island light N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and the inner signal buoy N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 6 miles.

The Portuguese Buoy is colored red and black horizontally; the Rockhead Buoy black and white vertically. The other buoys of Halifax Harbor are colored red on the starboard hand and black on the port hand, entering the harbor.

SAMBRO, middle of Island, lat 44° 26' 10" N., lon 63° 33' 30" W., fixed white dioptric 2nd order light, visible 20 or 21 miles, 115 feet high, building white, octagonal, 60 feet high.

A steam fog whistle, erected on south side of island, and elevated

A Bell Buoy, painted black, placed S. E. of the Blind Sister.

A Spar Buoy has been placed off the S. W. Breaker, Sambro, and one on the Pollock, and another on the Whippey Shoal, near Sambro.

SHIPLEY HEAD, Terrance Bay, lat 44° 27' 40", lon 63° 42' 8", fixed red, on mast, 55 feet high, visible 7 miles.

BETTY'S ISLAND, on Brig Point, near Prospect, lat 44° 26' 22" N., lon 63° 45' 54" W., revolving red catoptric light, greatest brilliancy every two minutes, 75 feet high, visible 14 miles, building white, with two horizontal red bands, square, wood, height 54 feet, dwelling attached. Coast light.

PEGGY POINT, east side of entrance to St. Margaret's Bay, lat 44° 29' 30" N., lon 63° 55' W., fixed red catoptric light, 65 feet high, building white, square, 26 feet high. Lantern on dwelling.

CROUCHER'S ISLAND, on south point of island, lat 44° 38' 24", lon 63° 57' 20", fixed white light, visible 15 miles, square tower, 40 feet high, with dwelling attached, painted white.

WESTHAVER'S POINT, W side of entrance to Hubbard's Cove. Lighthouse in course of construction

MARGARET'S BAY, on Green Island, Lunenburg County, lat 44° 23' N., lon 64° 2' 45" W., red and white catoptric light revolving alternately every one and a-half minutes, building white, square, wood, 28 feet high, with dwelling attached. Coast light.

HUBBARD'S COVE light house in course of erection.

CHESTER, E., Ironbound Island, a little to the eastward of centre of island, in Mahone Bay, lat 44° 26' 10" N., lon 64° 4' 50" W., fixed white dioptric light, visible 16 miles, 150 feet high, white oblong tower on dwelling, 46 feet high, wood, lantern. Seen from all points of approach. The lantern alone is visible, building hidden by trees.

QUAKER ISLAND, on highest part of island, lat 44° 30' 55", lon 64° 13' 50", fixed red light, visible 11 miles. Square tower, 35 feet high, with dwelling attached, painted white. To guide into chester Basin.

CROSS ISLAND, east point Lunenburg Bay, lat 44° 18' 45" N., lon 64° 10' W., 2 white catoptric lights vertical, 35 feet apart, upper intermittent revolving every minute, and visible 14 miles, 100 feet high, lower fixed, visible 6 miles, and 65 feet high, building red, octagonal base, height 53 feet. Pilots resort here, and vessels may take refuge in case of necessity. Upper bright 45 seconds, dark 15 seconds. A fog trumpet has been erected here, sounding blasts of 10 seconds duration every 1½ minutes.

BATTERY POINT, Lunenburg, lat 44° 21' 45" N., lon 64° 17' 30" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 50 feet high, white, square tower on dwelling, height 24 feet. This harbor is easy of access, buoys are placed in the bay and entrance to harbor on Ovens Reef, Sculpin Rock, Haddock Shoal, Battery Point Shoal, and Head Shoal. In approaching the harbor from seaward, the buoy on Sculpin Rock, painted red and black, in horizontal stripes, may be left on either hand, giving it a

Like a dwelling house. Spar Buoys are placed in the channel to Port Medway Harbor, on the breaking ledges, Nautilus Rock, corner ground and edge of flats off Bang's Point. In passing in from seaward the red buoys must be left on the starboard, and the black buoys on the port hand.

A Red Can Buoy on west side of S. W. Breaker, off Port Medway.

BROOKLYN PIER, on end of Breakwater, Liverpool, lat 44° 2' 45" N., lon 64° 41' 15" W., fixed light, white seaward, green towards harbor, visible 10 miles. Square tower.

FORT POINT, Liverpool Bay, south entrance, lat 44° 2' 30" N., lon 64° 42' 20" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 7 miles, 30 feet high, building white, square, height 17 feet. Left on port side when entering the harbor.

PORT MOUTON, north-east point of Spectacle Island, Queen's County, lat 43° 55' N., lon 64° 48' W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 47 feet high, square wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into harbor.

LITTLE HOPE, nearly on centre of island, lat 43° 48' 30" N., lon 64° 47' 15" W., red catoptric light, revolving every minute, visible 12 miles, 40 feet high, square white building, height 26 feet. Centre of keeper's dwelling, visible around horizon.

SHINGLE POINT, east side of Port L'Hebert Harbor, lat 43° 48' 40" N., lon 64° 55' 30" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 33 feet high, white square wooden building, height 29 feet.

CARTER'S ISLAND, Ragged Island Harbor, lat 43° 42' 15" N., lon 65° 5' 30" W., fixed red light, visible 11 miles, 66 feet high, white square wooden building, height 29 feet.

RAGGED ISLAND, Gull Rock, lat 43° 39' 15" N., lon 65° 5' 50" W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 56 feet high, white square wooden building, height 31 feet.

SAND SPIT, at east side of entrance to Shelburne Harbor, lat 43° 41' 25" N., lon 65° 19' 28" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 47 feet high, white square wooden building, height 44 feet. Built on a pier.

SHELburne HARBOR.—A red Iron Can Buoy has been placed in 4½ fathoms, on west side of Middle Rock Shoal; a red Can Buoy off extreme of Sand Spit, in four fathoms, and a black Spar Buoy on east end of Adamant Shoal.

BULL ROCK, a Spar Buoy painted black has been placed in 10 fathoms water S. S. W. ¼ W., about 150 yards from the Bull Rock, off Western Head, Shelburne County.

CAPE ROSEWAY, near south-east point of MacNutt's Island, Shelburne harbor, lat 43° 37' 15" N., lon 65° 15' 45" W., two white catoptric lights, vertical, 55 feet apart, upper light visible 18 miles, and 120 feet high, lower 65 feet and visible 10 miles, octagonal building, vertical black and white stripes, height 77 feet.

CAPE ROSEWAY, fog trumpet near the light house sounds a blast of 10 seconds duration with an interval of 110 seconds between the blasts.

A black Can Buoy S. S. E. from the Jig Rocks, in 9 fathoms water.

BARRINGTON E. BAY LIGHTSHIP, lat 43° 31' 5" N., lon 65° 34' 25" W., fixed white light, hull and spars painted red, with word "Barrington" in white letters on both sides. Height 30 feet above deck. Moored in 6 fathoms at low water. Wessex' Ledge bearing S. W. by W. ¼ W., distant ¾ mile, Baccaro Light bearing S. S. E. ¼ E., distant 6 and 3-16 miles, and Bantam Rocks, bearing S. by E. ¼ E., distant 6½ miles. To guide vessels into Barrington East Bay, and through Barrington Passage.

In passing through Barrington Pass to the westward, the dangers to be left on starboard hand are marked by red buoys, those to be left on port hand by black buoys.

CAPE SABLE, on Cape, lat 43° 23' 19" N., lon. 65° 37' 11" W., white catoptric revolving light, bright 15 seconds, dark 25 seconds, visible 12 miles, 53 feet high, white octagonal building, 50 feet high. A steam fog whistle on Cape, elevated about 40 feet above high water, sounds in thick weather, fogs and snow storms, a blast of ten seconds' duration each minute, with an interval of 50 seconds between each blast.

BRAZIL ROCK.—A Bell Buoy has been placed here to mark this danger instead of the Can Buoy painted red and black horizontal stripes, moored in about 18 fathoms to southward of Rock.

TUSKET RIVER, Big Fish Island, south-west point, lat $43^{\circ} 42' 10''$ N., lon $65^{\circ} 57' 15''$ W., two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontal, 8 yards apart, visible 12 miles, 50 feet high, white square wooden building, height 23 feet. Visible seaward; in windows each end of a dwelling house.

SEAL ISLAND, south point, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile inland, lat $43^{\circ} 23' 34''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 0' 52''$ W., fixed white light, dioptric, 2nd order, visible 18 miles, 98 feet high, white octagonal building, height 60 feet. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers, the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels ought not to attempt passing between them. YARMOUTH OR CAPE FORCLOU, east cape, south point, lat $43^{\circ} 47' 28''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 9' 20''$ W., white catoptric light, intermittent—light $1\frac{1}{4}$ minute, dark $\frac{1}{2}$ minute, visible 18 miles, 117 feet high, octagonal tower, vertical stripes, red and white, height 59 feet. Fog whistle on west side, sounds in fogs and snow storms, 10 seconds in every minute.

An Automatic Buoy, painted red with letter L, has been placed in 18 fathoms of water, about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile W. by N. from the Lurcher shoal, which lies 15 miles W. N. W. from this light.

W. point of Island, east side of entrance to Yarmouth Harbor, lat $43^{\circ} 48' 30''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 8' 45''$ W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 27 feet high, the lantern on a dwelling house, built on a wooden pier. A red beacon light for the purpose of guiding vessels into the harbor. Visible from the southward between the bearings of N. E. by N. and N. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. It can also be seen over Stanwood's Beech, when bearing from S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. to S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., but can-

The course from Spruce Point to ballast ground is E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., distance 2 miles. From Spruce Point to Mark Point W. N. W., distance 2 miles. A vessel after leaving Doucet Island, to clear the reef, should steer N. until the Spruce Point light bears N. W. by W., and then to take a W. N. W. course.

SWALLOW TAIL, N. E. part of Grand Manan, lat 44° 45' 52" N., lon 64° 44' W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 17 miles, 143 feet high, white octagonal wooden building, height 50 feet. Visible between the bearings of S. W. round by S. to N. W.

A steam fog whistle on extreme N. W. head of Grand Manan, 80 feet above high water, sounds in thick weather, fogs and snow storms, 3 blasts of 4 seconds duration in each minute, with an interval of 16 seconds between each blast.

A spindle beacon, painted red, placed in 1876 on Old Proprietor Ledge on the S. E. of Grand Manan Island, in lat 44° 33' 10" N., lon 66° 40' W., has a cage elevated 31 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 or ten miles.

Made on Main Signal Staff at Citadel Hill, when Vessels are seen from the Citadel or reported from an Outpost.

When Sailing Vessels are reported from an outpost, the following signals are made on the lower yard:

BY DAY.

- For 1 Square Rigged vessel, 2 balls close up, one on the outer halliard and one on the inner halliard.
 - " 2 Do, 1 ball hoisted on the outer halliard and one close up on the inner halliard; outer ball dropped.
 - " 3 Do, 2 balls close up, one on the outer and one on the inner halliard.
 - " 4 Do, 2 balls separated, and one close up on the inner halliard.
 - " 5 Do, a penant of any colour on the outer halliard, and one ball close up inside.
 - " 6 Do, a penant under a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball at the inner halliard close up.
 - " 7 Do, a penant over a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball close up on the inner halliard.
 - " 8 Do, a penant under two balls close up on the outer halliards with a ball close up on the inner halliard.
 - " 9 Do, a penant between two balls close up on the outer halliard with a ball close up on the inner halliard.
 - For 10 Do, a flag of any colour close up on the outer halliard, with a ball close up on the inner halliard.
- The above balls, &c., are hoisted on the east or west yard arm, according to the *quarter* the vessel first appears in.
- A Ship, a large ball at the end of the yard, with a small one at inner halliard.
 - A Barque, a large do at the end, with a small one dropped at inner halliard.

The upper yard of the Ship Staff is used solely to designate Steam Vessels thus :

Two large balls close up, one at the outer and the other at the inner halliard, E or W, a steamer reported in that quarter.

A small ball at the outer, and a large one at the inner halliard, a very small or regular coasting Steamer.

A large ball at the outer, and a small one at the inner halliard, a large or ocean going Steamer.

Steamers or Sailing Vessels showing owners' or agents' private signal flags, are denoted on the private Signal Staff with a small descriptive pennant underneath the private signal.

When the description of vessel is ascertained, the following descriptive colors will be hoisted at the masthead, and the inner ball taken down :

A Union Jack—a Flag Ship.

Man-of-War Screw Steamer, steamer pennant, over the Union Jack.

Man-of-War Paddle Steamer, steamer pennant under the Union Jack. Troop Ship, white pennant two blue crosses between steamer pennant and Union Jack.

Dominion blue Ensign, under steamer pennant, Dominion Government Steamer.

Foreign Men-of-War are denoted in the same manner as English, excepting that the particular National Ensign is substituted for the Union Jack.

IV.—Drum, with Cone above, the apex pointing upwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a westerly direction.

The Cone, when hoisted by itself, indicates that it is expected that the wind will obtain a velocity of 30 miles an hour, but will not exceed

40 miles; and it is not intended that an ordinary well found vessel should stay in port, but simply as a warning to mariners that strong winds are expected from the quarter indicated.

The Drum will always be hoisted when the velocity of the wind is expected to exceed 40 miles an hour.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 1 and 3, is two white lanterns hanging perpendicular.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 2 and 4, is two white lanterns hanging horizontally.

NOTES.—Mariners will be able to obtain further information from Drum Agents, or by consulting the daily probabilities. Mariners must always bear in mind that the storm signals are merely cautionary, and do not necessarily mean that a storm will occur at the place where the signal is displayed, but that one is expected either there or within such a distance that vessels leaving port would be liable to be caught in it.

TEMPERANCE DIRECTORY.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The first Division was organized at Yarmouth, Nov. 17, 1847. The Grand Division was organized April 22, 1848. There are now three hundred and seventeen Subordinate Divisions (317) with eighteen thousand four hundred (18,400) members,—45 Bands of Hope with 4000 members; and six Sections of Cadets with 260 members; *Grand Worthy Patriarch*, Rev. John Murray, Sydney; *Grand Scribe*, Rev R. A. Temple, Halifax. *Agents and Lecturers of Grand Division*, Thomas Hutchings and Thos. M. Lewis. Quarterly sessions of G. D. are held in different parts of the Province, in January, April and July. The annual session is held each Autumn in Halifax. There has been an increase of *thirty* (30) active divisions during 1885, and *one thousand four hundred* (1400) members.

UNITED TEMPERANCE ORDER (formerly British Templars).—Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia organized in 1863. Has now about 20 Lodges containing about 1000 members. *President*, John H. Taylor, Gays River Road, Halifax Co. We understand this Order has amalgamated with the "Royal Templars."

I. O. C. GOOD TEMPLARS OF THE WORLD.—The first Lodge organized at Economy, Colchester County, July 4, 1864. Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia formed February 5th, 1867; there are now 85 Subordinate Lodges with 3700 members; 9 Juvenile Temples with 250 members; *G. W. C. T.*, B. D. Rogers, Stellarton; *G. W. S.*, J. M. Baillie, Stellarton. The next Annual Meeting will be held at a place and time (summer of 1886) to be named by the Executive, due notice of which will be given in the newspapers.

I. O. OF GOOD TEMPLARS, LOYAL.—Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia re-organized Nov. 21, 1876, 95 Subordinate Lodges, and about 4500 members; 10 Juvenile Temples with 500 members; *G. W. C. T.*, Rev. J. B. Woodland, Yarmouth; *G. W. S.*, P. J. Chisholm, Truro; *Genl. Sup. of Juvenile Templars*, S. Archibald, Watervale, Pictou County. Next Annual Session will be held the first Tuesday of July, 1886.

THE BLUE RIBBON CLUBS within the past ten years have been organized in nearly every County of the Province. The aggregate membership in the Autumn of 1878 was estimated at 20,000. The members of active Clubs has largely decreased, but there are members yet scattered throughout the Counties.
