RECIPROCIITY AND THE ORCHARD

The Globe has taken as a text the prospectus of the National Land, Fruit and Packing Co., Ltd., to uphold the reciprocity treaty.

The Globe tries to show that it is in the interest of the fruitman to oppose reciprocity because it would lower the price to the consumer, and raise it to the fruit-grower. The Globe quietly ignores the fact that the company it attacks as a jobbing company is itself a producer company, owning 1,400,000 apple trees.

There is upland land in the fruit areas of 450 square miles between Niagara and Toronto sufficient to supply all America. There are not more than 12,000 acres of peaches in Eastern Canada now, and this supplies the demand.

There is certainly not for Canadians who have so many of their own native born sitting in the British House of Commons to object to British born Canadian citizens taking a direct and intelligent interest in Canadian politics.

GUARD THE CITY IN THE NORTH. If anything more was needed to convince the aldermen opposed to annexation that the measure is absolutely necessary for the protection of the city in the matter of franchises, the proceedings before Chief Justice Falconbridge yesterday should supply it.

WHO PAYS THE DUTIES? The Globe is evidently quite convinced now that it is the seller who pays the duties, and has totally abandoned its former theory that the consumer pays duties.

On Tuesday, in a front page editorial, The Globe delivered itself to the following effect: "Under the reciprocity agreement," it remarked with that air of omniscience which clothes it like a garment, "Canadian beans have

access to the United States markets free of duty. This means that the 45 cents which the Canadian farmer now pays to Uncle Sam in tariff duty upon every bushel of beans he markets in the United States will remain at home in his own pocket."

On Thursday in a common or garden editorial The Globe made a complete volte face over the question of who pays tariff duties. The people of Canada, it now asserts, have been paying their own large and increasing revenue, every dollar of it—including, that is, the duties paid, as it affirmed on Tuesday, by the foreign shipper.

THE BRITISH BORN AND ANNEXATION. A correspondent who protests against some alleged suggestions that the British born are superior to native Canadians is evidently laboring under a misapprehension.

No one who understands the situation in which Canada stands with the United States doubts for a moment, whatever be the merits of the reciprocity controversy, that entangling agreements between the two countries mean the eventual precipitation of Canada into the maelstrom of United States politics.

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These things are not said in Canada by the materialists, because they dislike to see our jingoes howling in protest that things amount to an attempt to bulldoze them. They are true all the same.
