

# FIVE DESPERADOES HANGED

People Took the Law Into Their Own Hands.

FARMERS HAVE SUFFERED

From the Depredations of a Lawless Gang in Indiana.

rgiaries and Daylight Robberies Have Been Frequent and the Crimes Could Not be Brought Home-Finally the People Became Desperate and Took Judge Lynch's Method-All Sorts of Cruelty Had Been Practised by the Robbers on Those Who Were Supposed

Osgood, Ind., Sept. 15 .- Incensed by numerous depredations, repeated burglaries and anylight robberies, the people of Ripley County, Ind., have taken the law into their own hands and meted out to the perpetratbis a punishment greater than provided by the law. Five men who have long been a terror to the citizens of this county were lynched last night and when the citivers of Versailles, the county seat, arose this morning, they found the bodies of the five men dangling from as many limbs of an elm tree in the centre of the public

this morning, they found the bodies of the live men daugling from as many limbs of an elm tree in the centre of the public square.

Their feet were but a few inches from the ground, while their hands and feet had been securely tied with strong rope.

Versailles is a town of 800 people. It is one of the oldest in the State, and although it is five miles from a railroad station, and has no telegraphic communication connections, it is still the county seat.

For four or five years, the farmers of the county have been the victims of a lawless gang, who lived an outlaw existence, robbing indiscriminately and some times committing graver crimes. Farmers would come into town with a bunch of cattle or load of farming products, and next morning they would be found robbed and beaten by the roadside. Old German farmers have been visited and both men and women have been tortured to make them give up their savings. Aged German women have been forced to stand on a red-hot stove in an effort to compel them to disclose the h'ding place of some treasure in the house. These depredations have continued unceasingly. Arrests have been made, but the guity parties have covered up their lawlessness, and it was seldom that conviction followed.

During the past week, robberies had increased alarmingly. Saturday night last a raid was made by the gang on the store of Woodley Bros., at Correct, Ind., 10 miles from here. The sheriff heard of the proposed raid and with a posse laid in walt for the robbers, and Clifford G. Gordon, Bert Andrews, Lyle Levi, William Jenkins, and Henry Schultes were arrested.

"Instice" Bemanded. While the citizens have not been able to fix the various robberles upon these men, they were thought to be part of a gang that has committed most of them. When it became known that they were in jail, it was qu'etly suggested by the victims and sympathizers that "justice" be summarily dealt the prisoners. It was 1 o'clock this morning when horsemen seemed to come from all quarters and dismounted on a hill-side near Versailles. Little time was lost


