The Discovery Made by His Wife and a Police Officer—An Inquest.

At Lee's Hotel, Sumner and Gerrard streets to-day there will be an inquest regarding the death of James Lacey, an old man, who was found dead at his home, 178 Oak-street, by his wife, and a police officer yesterday afternoon.

The evidence showed that Mrs. Lacey only owned a portion of the furniture and the magistrate simply granted an order of protection.

Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Lacey, accompanied by a policeman from No. 17 division, went to the house to get her clothing, but was unable to get any reply to her knocks until the door, which was ajar, was opened by the old man dead.

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

FIVE DESPERADOES HANGED
 People Took the Law Into
 Their Own Hands.
FARMERS HAVE SUFFERED
 From the Depredations of a Lawless
 Gang in Indiana.

Burglaries and Daylight Robberies Have
 Been Frequent and the Crimes Could
 Not be Brought Home—Finally the
 People Became Desperate and Took
 Judge Lynch's Method—All Sorts of
 Cruelty Had Been Practised by the
 Robbers on Those Who Were Supposed
 to Have Money.

Osgood, Ind., Sept. 15.—Incensed by num-
 bers of depredations, repeated burglaries and
 daylight robberies, the people of Ripley
 County, Ind., have taken the law into their
 own hands and meted out to the perpetrat-
 ors a punishment greater than provided by
 the law. Five men who have long been
 a terror to the citizens of this county
 were lynched last night and when the citi-
 zens of Versailles, the county seat, arose
 this morning, they found the bodies of the
 five men dangling from the many limbs of
 an elm tree in the centre of the public
 square.

Their feet were but a few inches from
 the ground, while their hands and feet had
 been securely tied with strong rope.
 Versailles is a town of 800 people. It is
 one of the oldest towns in the county and
 it is five miles from a railroad station,
 and has no telegraphic communication con-
 nections. It is still the county seat.

A Record of Crime.
 For four or five years, the farmers of the
 county have been the victims of a lawless
 gang, who lived an outlaw existence,
 robbing industriously and some times
 committing grave crimes. Farmers would
 come into town with a bunch of cattle or
 load of farming products, and next morn-
 ing they would be found robbed and beat-
 en by the ruffians. Old German farmers
 have been visited and both men and women
 have been tortured to make them give up
 their savings. Aged German women have
 been forced to stand in a red-hot stove in
 their effort to compel them to give up the
 hiding place of some treasure in the house.
 These depredations have caused uncounted
 ings. Arrests have been made, but the
 guilty parties have covered up their law-
 lessness, and it was seldom that conviction
 followed.

During the past week, robberies had in-
 creased alarmingly. Saturday night last
 a raid was made by the gang on the store
 of Woodley Bros., at Corbett, Ind., 10 miles
 from here. The sheriff himself was present,
 armed with a rifle and a shotgun, and
 he and the sheriff's posse were in wait for
 the robbers, and Clifford G. Gordon,
 Bert Andrews, William Ankus, and
 Henry Schultze were arrested.

Justice Demanded.
 While the citizens have not been able to
 fix the various robberies upon these men,
 they were thought to be part of a gang
 that has committed most of them. What
