Editor World: General Lord Kitchener has proposed that "at Khartoum there should be founded and maintained with Bri-tish money a college bearing the name of the Gordon Memorial College, to be a pledge that the memory of Gordon is still alive among us, and that his aspirations are at length to be realized." The college is intended to inaugurate the education of the 3,000,000 inhabitants of the Soudan; it will be under the direction of the Governor-General of the Soudan, and the principal teachers will be British. There will be no interference with the religion of the Inhabitants. the principal teachers will be infinite religion of the inhabitants. Lord Klitchener has telegraphed to the Governor-General that he hopes the Cana-dian public will support his proposal, and His Excellency believes that the people of Canada will gladly welcome an opportunity of doing 80. With this view an account has been open-ed in the name of Major Drummond, Gov-ernor-General's secretary, at the Bank of Montreal, and all its branches throughout the Dominion, to which account subscrip-tions should be paid.
