The production of gold continues to increase, but Ontario's reputation as a mineral country will be derived more from its nickel, copper and iron than from its gold mines.

The adoption of a policy compelling the refining of the matte to be carried on in this country would increase the employes from 800 to three times that number.

COL. PICQUART SPOKE FOR FIVE HOURS.

Continued from Page 5.

When he resumed his deposition, the witness said he regretted he had not been given the opportunity to contradict his accusers at that court-martial. "I have almost finished my task," added Picquart, "but I ask permission to refer to the way the bordereaux came to the War Office. I have doubts in regard to the person who brought the bordereaux. Two quite different persons could certainly have delivered the bordereaux in 1894, but if an intelligent person had delivered it, he would

certainly have insisted on the value of the contents."

ROGET WANTED TO REPLY.

He Was Not Satisfied With What Picquart Said About the Queneill Case.

General Roget and Mercier having intimated a desire to speak, Col. Jouanast asked Dreyfus if he had anything to say, and the prisoner replied in the negative. General Roget then mounted the platform and asked Col. Picquart for explanations regarding the Queneill affair. "Colonel Picquart," said General Roget, "attached me this morning in regard to my speech before the prosecution yesterday on the subject of the Queneill case. His suit he was not present at the Ministry of War when Col. Picquart read the bordereaux and he ascribed Col. Picquart. If he denies this, I ask the public prosecutor to produce the document which he writes to the public prosecutor a second time July 13. If he denies this, I ask the court to send for Marchal and the dossier in the Queneill affair."

No Need to Threaten. Col. Picquart replied that there was no need to threaten to produce the dossier in order to make him reply. He added: "I did not say I was absent during the Queneill case, and that I had not participated in it, as I would otherwise have done."

"Did you write these letters?" asked Col. Jouanast. "Yes," replied Picquart. "I remember writing letters in the case, though I do not remember exactly their terms or dates."

Col. Jouanast then said: "General Roget asks if you deny you wrote a letter reading Galtani to Switzerland."

"Galtani," replied the witness, "was an agent, who gave information about the Italian forts in the neighborhood of Belluno. Finding ourselves on the point of being discovered, we naturally took measures to avoid it. That is why Galtani was sent to Switzerland."

"Then you wrote the letters," said General Roget, "and I add that Col. Picquart was not concerned in this affair. He was sent to Belfort against his will by Col. Picquart."

He Wrote Some Letters. The witness acknowledged writing some letters, but wanted to know their text. He said he would like to see them, so that he could be more precise. "Yes," he said, "how much falsehood there has been in this."

In reply to further questions, Picquart admitted sending documents to Belfort for the use of the Queneill case. Col. Picquart added, "they were handed to the public prosecutor."

General Roget's questioning was evidently with the view of eliciting the confession from Col. Picquart in regard to the documents unknown to the judges. He accuses the general staff of doing in the Dreyfus case.

The general concluded with angrily repelling various statements of Picquart in regard to his connection with the present and a dialogue apparently wholly unconnected with the present trial followed.

MERCIER'S FLAT DENIALS.

A Case of "You Did" and "I Didn't" in Regard to Sending Certain Documents.

General Mercier promptly replaced General Roget. "Col. Picquart," Mercier said, "has stated that I ordered him to convey documents to Col. Maurel. That is false. I never handed any packet to Col. Picquart for Col. Maurel. I never mentioned secret documents to him."

In reply Col. Picquart said: "I remember perfectly handing a packet to Maurel." General Mercier next denied Col. Picquart's statement relative to meeting with General Gouse, during the afternoon of Jan. 6, 1895, when the latter was greatly excited at the prospect of war.

"That cannot be the case," said General Mercier. "General Gouse will make a statement on the subject. I do not know what he will say. But he could not be apprehensive of war that afternoon, since, myself, Gouse was excited."

Col. Picquart replied that he adhered to everything he had said. General Gouse, the witness explained, was excited because he knew of the action of an ambassador towards M. de Saint-Ferrier, then President of the Republic.

General Mercier next referred to Picquart's statement that the D'Armenon document was communicated to the court-martial in 1894. He said: "I deny it positively; the only documents communicated were the Panizzardi telegram, Du Paty de Clam's commentary, the note of the Italian attaché in regard to French railroads and the report of Gouse."

Picquart here pointed out that he had expressed his belief on this subject. "In regard to the bordereaux," General Mercier affirmed that it reached the Ministry through the ordinary channel. "Matre Demange at this juncture commences a commentary, to which General Mercier answered: 'The commentary was prepared for me.'"

Counsel, however, insisted that, although it was prepared for General Mercier, the commentary was included in the dossier, and ought to be forthcoming.

The court then adjourned for the day.

THE CENSOR AT WORK.

Mercier's References Toned Down—The Tide Believed to Be Turning Toward Dreyfus.

London, Aug. 18.—A despatch to The Morning Post from Bernese indicates the activity of the censorship here. General Mercier's insulting references to Emperor William, and certain allusions to the secret dossier, were suppressed, while General Mercier's utterances were toned down.

The correspondents of the London morning newspapers are, however, unanimous in the opinion that the tide has finally turned in favor of Dreyfus. The evidence given Thursday was so favorable to him that even some of the anti-Dreyfusites would fain admit that the scales are falling from their eyes.

Madame Henry's dramatic characterization of M. Bertullus as "Judah" failed of the intended effect, because he immediately handed Col. Jouanast, president of the court-martial, an anonymous letter he had received, proving the whole scene prearranged. All the correspondents remarked, also, the grateful demeanor of Dreyfus on hearing for the first time witnesses in his favor.

Thinks a Second Conviction Probable. The correspondent of The Daily Chronicle predicts that Dreyfus will be re-convicted, and that the sentence will be immediately commuted through fear of excitement and uprisings incidental upon an acquittal. He believes that the latitude allowed the generals in court points to submission to what France is a sacred honor, "reasons of State."

The correspondent of The Times comments upon the change that came over the aspect of affairs when Matre Demange began tentatively to cross-examine the witnesses, his question being General Roget's utterly discredited. He remarks, too, upon the fact that Col. Jouanast failed to confront Roget with Bertullus, whose evidence, therefore, had its full effect.

BOARDS AT LOGGERSHEADS.

Controllers Decide Only to Pay Actual Expenses of Branch Libraries.

"PARAGON" HOSE WINS THE DAY

Contract Awarded to Gutta Percha Company - New Pavements - Firemen's Clothing.

At a special meeting of the Board of Control yesterday, the Mayor read the letter from Secretary Eyerson of Public Library in reply to the resolution of the City Council, which relegated to the Board of Control the provision of funds for the re-opening of the northern and western branch libraries.

Evades the Point.

Controller Woods objected to the tone of Secretary Eyerson's letter, which he considered conveyed a threat to the City Council. The Mayor said the Board of Control asked for a statement of the expense of running the two branch libraries. This the secretary had not given.

Controller Burns, too, remarked that the secretary was not entitled to speak for the Library Board. It was a whip to the aldermen.

Standing on their Dignity.

Controller Woods' Library Board are standing on their dignity and demanding money from the Council, because they are not responsible to the ratepayers.

Controller Lynd said there was no occasion for the secretary to send the board a copy of the original estimates. Looking at this, it appeared that only 20 per cent. of the money was spent on books and newspapers, whilst \$12,000 went for salaries.

Secretary Littlejohn was directed to write to the Library Board that the Board of Control would grant the necessary sum for keeping open the northern and western branch libraries till the end of the year, provided the statement of the cost already asked for were given to the board.

The Fire Hose Contract.

Graham of the Fire Brigade appeared before the board to explain why he had recommended the "Paragon" hose of the Gutta Percha & Rubber Company, in the awarding of the contract for 3000 feet of hose.

Ald. Burns was emphatic that the letter of the Chief was not a report, but merely a recommendation. Price, quality and lasting power were not mentioned, nor a comparison with the tender of the Canadian Rubber Company.

The Mayor: I agree that it was not a report. The Chief simply praises "Paragon," and says the firm have given satisfaction for the last 20 years.

Charges Partiality.

A letter from Alex. Macpherson of the Canadian Rubber Company was read, in which the writer said: "We consider your treatment of the tenders for rubber hose decidedly partial. Your board did not even examine samples when awarding the contract. Had the mere novice looked at the samples he could have seen at once that our goods were decidedly superior. We consider that the manner of treating our tender was decidedly wrong. The public would lose confidence in some of the city officials if the matter were made public. We object to leaving the matter in partial hands, instead of treating it yourselves in a businesslike way, the same as you do other contracts."

Praised His Goods.

Mr. Boyd, representative of the Canadian Rubber Company, appeared before the board with specimens of their qualities of hose. He pointed out their special features, and said no complaint had ever been made of the company's goods, which he

is causing annoyance to those who use the bay for boating. Street Commissioner Jones does not consider the report substantiated that annoyance is caused by boys bathing in the Don. The place is sufficiently secluded.

The Dominion Construction and Paving Company have been allowed to withdraw their tender for paving Russell-street. A letter complaining of the unsatisfactory condition of premises on Parley-avenue was referred to the Board of Health.

The Court of Revision for Ward 5 will meet in the Assessment Department, new City Hall, on Monday.

Close upon \$30,000 was received in taxes at the City Hall on Thursday.

A strong iron box purchased by the city over six years ago and used for the custody of the civic archives has been removed from the old City Hall to the Treasurer's Department in the new building.

SEVEN MEN WERE KILLED.

A Locomotive Exploded in Mexico With Terrible Effect.

Chicago, Aug. 18.—A Special to The Record from Tampico, Mexico, says: By the explosion of the boiler of a locomotive on the Mexican Central, seven men were killed and three others fatally injured. Among the killed are four American engineers, who were in the cab. Their names were Simon, Fitzgerald, Hussey and O'Connell. Another American engineer named Lockhart, was standing near the engine when the explosion occurred. He was hurled a distance of 150 feet, and was fatally injured. The other men killed were three Mexican firemen and wood passers.

Independent Forestry.

Dr. Oronbyahona is vice-president of the Association. The independent Foresters will be represented at the convention by a delegation of 100 men, and will be under the leadership of the directors of the Fair to do away with Society Row. The Supreme Treasurer, H. C. Mackenzie, has been looking after the interests of the order for some time past in the time Provinces, will return home next week.

Opticians at Rochester.

At the annual convention of the International Association of Opticians held in this city in the Chamber of Commerce, Dr. G. Kinsman of Toronto introduced a resolution that would have caused the expression of his disapproval of a Doctor of Refraction who had introduced a convention of such degree as Doctor of Refraction to the Society of Opticians in America.

In support of the resolution Mr. Kinsman read letters from the Attorney-General and Secretary of Education of Pennsylvania, showing that the degree of Doctor of Refraction is not recognized by the State. He pointed out that the most learned opticians in America would scorn to use such titles, which were merely purchased, and not titles of merit.

Mr. Kinsman's speech was well received, and he was congratulated by the Presidents of the Society of Opticians in America, and a strong support of principles that greatly tended to elevate the profession.

Mr. Ed. Culverhouse of Toronto seconded the resolution, asserting that he would be neglected if a duty did not take the opportunity of endorsing the views expressed in the report of the Committee on the hour the resolution was tabled for further discussion.

Bigger Than Ever.

The R. & O. Company is doing more business this year than ever before. The total gross receipts last year were \$728,000. The increase this year is attributed to the better facilities afforded for lake travel by the addition of the Toronto to the company's fleet.

Not So Much Honey.

A number of reports have come in from the beekeepers to the Department of Agriculture to the effect that the honey crop this season is less than half a crop, and if rain does not come, the present estimate will be over-estimated. In addition to the harvest being light, there has been no increase in the bee population. The cause of the famine is the fact that white clover was killed early in the season and the asterfields are up the ladder.
