BRITISH STAMPS IN U.S.

Red Edwards' Curry Letters Just Like Red Washingtons.

New York, May 22.—The Sun today received a letter from a man in this city, calling attention to the similarity between our new two-cent postage stamp, with Washington's likeness on it, and the English one-penny stamp, bearing the likeness of King Edward VII.

Accompanying the letter were four of the English stamps, which had been passed thru the New York post-office on letters without being detected, and without the least delay.

Three of the stamps went thru the office on Wednesday, within a few hours of each other. The man who tried the experiment did so to convince some of his friends that the stamps were too much alike.

Both are of light red, and look in fact, in this respect, as if they might have come from the same press. They are of the same size. In other particulars, the striking resemblance is close inspection, but are enough alike in general appearance to pass in the hurried examination which letters get in going thru the ordinary delivery service.

Assistant Postmaster Morgan, when told yesterday that the English stamps were passing thru the New York post-office, made a memorandum of the fact, and had the different departments of the strike examined by him.

The striking resemblance in the color, he said, could be accounted for partly, at least, by the fact that at the present time the stamps in the money of each country, should be prepared, as far as possible, in the same colors—stamps of a value of 25 centimes, or 10 centimes, in dark blue; those of 10 centimes, or two cents, in red, and those of 5 centimes, or one cent, in green.

SIMCOE MONUMENT UNVEILING.

Outline of Program for Ceremony in Queen's Park Next Week.

The unveiling of the Governor Simcoe monument in Queen's Park on Wednesday afternoon next is an event of considerable historical importance. It is now upwards of a hundred years since Col. John Graves Simcoe landed in Toronto, having chosen this spot as the site of his future capital.

The statue is of heroic proportions, 9 feet in height, and stands on a beautiful pedestal of Sturtevant Quebec granite. It will be unveiled in the presence of the Governor-General and the Countess of Minto, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Mortimer Clark, His Worship the Mayor and Mrs. Urquhart, and others, including Hon. C. W. Ross, who will deliver a brief historical oration.

Hon. Richard Harcourt will preside, and Col. W. D. Otter will read the inscription. Honorary members of the Dragoons, the Royal Canadian Regiment, and the band of the Royal Grenadiers.

REV. DR. ROBERTSON, J. Manson Will Take Charge of the Ontario Division of C.P.R.

Montreal, May 22.—Two further appointments to superintendencies on the system as the result of the recent arrangements in the higher official ranks were announced today by D. McNeill, second vice-president and general manager of the Canadian Pacific. Superintendent J. Manson has been transferred to the Ontario division to replace Superintendent Price, who went to Fort William to succeed Mr. Brady now general superintendent of the western division.

George Spencer has been promoted to the position of superintendent, and he will take the place vacated by J. Manson on the line in the Ontario division east of Toronto.





New York American.—The season's drownings have begun. As summer advances the seaside resorts doubtless will add their customary scores to the death list—a ghastly roster made up year after year by persons who, nine out of ten, lose their lives needlessly.

More drownings are to be attributed to vanity than to any other cause. Young men, and some not young, are eager to display their skill and strength by swimming out long distances, and when fatigue or a cramp comes they are unable to make shore, and perish.

Poor swimmers, male and female, can insure themselves absolutely against danger by putting on a pneumatic collar. It is not pretty, but it does wear it can sink.

The deadly "boating accident" is due. The rash fool who does not know how to manage a boat, but goes boating nevertheless, and the humorous fool who plays practical jokes about to frighten the girls, are responsible for most of the casualties. No way to abate them suggests itself except to prohibit and send to jail an occasional survivor when it can be done.

The parent will allow his daughter to go sailing without being sure of the ability of the man in charge to handle a boat as to be cleared among the fools, too, a fool whose terrible grief when disaster follows is a punishment worse than death.

A little good sense, a little prudence, would save hundreds of lives yearly, but good sense and prudence are plentiful, and the desire for pleasure is strong in the young. The duty is imposed on their elders to be watchful for them.
