AUTONOMY BILL ON TO-DAY SEPARATE SCHOOL CLAUSE

Acting on the inspiration of ministerial sources, newspapers friendly to the government are saving that the debate eed not be a long one. It is admitted, owever the bill will reenact the clause which guarantees separate schools to the territories. The government's defence of this course is indicated by an editorial published to night in The Free Press, the government's Ottawa organ-The Free Press says: "A great deal of oratorical bombast is being used to try to convince the people that people are heing coerced into accepting a school system which they do not want Everyone who looks into the question will see that there is no coercion whatever. The clause relating to the schools, which it is understood will be introdu in the existing constitution of the tervince absolutely untramelled in the
