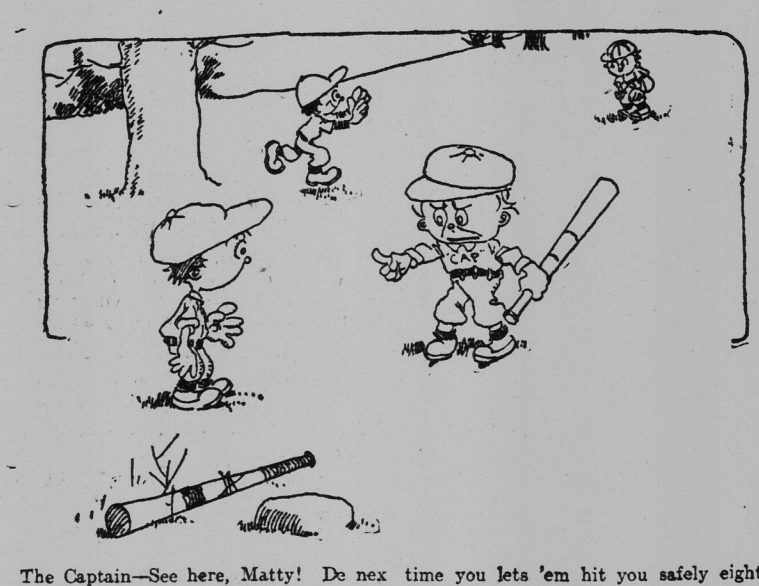

TIME TO GET BUSY

There is a feeling that the dredging on the west side of the harbor is not progressing satisfactorily, if the work on the 600-foot berth is to be forwarded this season. It seems that are being constructed are not sunk in their place, what will happen? Will there be a repetition of the trouble Mr. D. C. Clark had with his cranes? This matter is of sufficient importance to call for prompt action. Does anyone know what course would be the wiser? The harbor committee believe that the Beaver should be sent back to the site of the 600-foot berth, and their delegation will as soon as possible lay the matter before the premier. But aside from this the whole question of dredging, wharf and warehouse construction, track extension and the rebuilding of Union street calls for the most intelligent consideration and the employment of a thoroughly competent director of public works. The Times does not need to offer any other plan than public interest for persistently directing the attention of St. John business men to the unsatisfactory condition of affairs in the public works department.

A SERIOUS THING

Three well-dressed little girls accosted a stranger on the street yesterday and asked him to take them to one of the five-cent shows, or give them fifteen cents that they might go themselves. This case is typical. It is one of the results of the advent of these very cheap entertainments that children are tempted to beg or get by some other questionable method the price of admission. There is, of course, another way of viewing the cheap show. The claim is made that it reduces the temptation to drunkenness, by affording a pleasant means of amusement. Doubtless this is true to some extent. At all events, the five-cent show appears to have come to stay, and the duty of parents is clear. They should warn their little children against begging, or resorting to any questionable means of getting money. They might do more. They might take an interest in supervised playgrounds, and provide the children with a means of healthful pleasure, such as would fill their minds with other thoughts than those engendered amid the idle association of the street. A city cannot afford to neglect its children, or subject them heedlessly to the temptations that lurk in street and alley, in the idleness that breeds mischief.

CROPS AND RAILROADS

The latest crop reports from the west are not so cheering. In some places it is said there is not more than half a crop of wheat, and there is fear lest frost should come before the grain has ripened. As a result of this anxiety the banks have tightened up the purse strings, and there is less doing in real estate in the cities and towns. However, the harvesters who go out will get work. If there is less harvesting there will be more railroading. On this point the Toronto World says: "Railway construction will be pushed forward because labor will be cheaper and thousands of farmers if they should be disappointed in their crops will turn in with their teams and work on the railways. The railway men will spend millions if they can get men and material. The west may have a let-up year, the net effect of which will be to give the country an opportunity to pull itself together again for another phenomenal advance."

Canada, a London weekly, publishes an interview with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, from which the following is an extract: "Being asked what he thought of the possible absorption of the Dominion by the United States, Sir Wilfrid replied that he entertained no fears on that subject. Nor could such an apprehension find a place in the mind of anyone who fully understands the gravity of the situation in that country where serious problems are at this moment awaiting a solution; while new difficulties, due to the feverish haste of the general onward movement, are constantly springing up. The onward movement is slower, though quieter and apparently slower, is more sound and normal; and the Canadian population is less mixed, and the different elements of which it is composed have already commenced to unite together to form one race; and in this connection we are more advanced than are our neighbors, who are still in a chaotic state. This is well understood by the public men of the republic, who are making an effort to restrain immigration to that country."

The Canadian immigration department is determined to put a stop to the slandering of Canada by disgruntled immigrants and other persons who send false statements to the British and United States press. The Ottawa Journal tells that one Hoagland of Taber, Alberta, has been fined \$200 for having had printed in the United States circulars and fraudulent advertisements warning Americans that laborers were not wanted in Canada. The matter was taken up by Immigration Commissioner J. O. Smith, of Winnipeg, and the Lethbridge board of trade, and a prosecution was begun by the attorney-general of Alberta. The matter will be further looked into by the minister of justice, the Journal says, and legislation may be introduced at the next session of parliament to impose a substantial penalty on anyone who wilfully and publicly slanders Canada.

Collier's Weekly makes short work of the "southern chivalry" which makes the unwritten law a justification for murder. Of the case of Judge Loving of Virginia it says: "One Virginia gentleman, buggering with a bottle in his hip-pocket, gave a drink of whisky to a Virginia lady whose appetite for it was inherited from her father, a second Virginia gentleman with a record for delirium tremens. The murder which followed was cowardly, and the trial which followed the murder was a case of shame to the state."

A curious phase of the immigration movement is set forth in the following paragraph from a Toronto paper: "To induce Canadians to go to Virginia and engage in farming there is the object of the visit of Dr. Henry Smith, of Norfolk, the representative of the State Board of Agriculture, in Toronto, and visited the immigration offices on his search for farm help. He stated that he could secure all the men he required here."

Thursday's Montreal Witness gives the following statement of attendance at the five supervised playgrounds in that city for the preceding two weeks:—Royal Arthur, 894; Montclair, 1,094; Berthelot, 1,179; The Dykes, 2,284; Charlebois, 3,884. The Witness invites the citizens to provide balls, lacrosse sticks, croquet sets and one or two tents for the grounds. The supervised playground has come to stay.

The Douks are at it again. The following picturesque despatch from Makinak, Manitoba, tells the story:—"Clothed in sanctity, straw hats and nightdresses, thirty Doukhobors passed through here this afternoon on their long pilgrimage to Winnipeg and the warm country where they expect to find Utopia."

Says the Toronto Globe:—"A farm has been bought near Montreal to be used in connection with a reform school for boys. This is in accordance with the best modern ideas in dealing with those who have failed to conform to society's many necessary restraints."

There appears to be a dispute between the cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis as to which has the most dogs. Now when it comes to dogs the west must abandon the field. St. John has all the dogs except a few that escaped some years ago on an emigrant train.

The latest news from Rome is a further illustration of the weakening hold of dogmatic religion upon the minds of men. The process is not revolutionary, but of slow development through centuries of time, having its effect upon all churches.

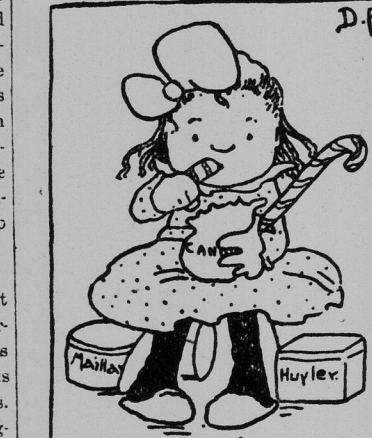
St. John bankers are not very communicative when approached by the reporters, but it is quite clear from their remarks that the money market here, as elsewhere, feels the effects of the passing stringency.

SLANT EYED ORIENTAL BEAUTY TAKES TOLL OF HUMAN LIVES

Two Admirers Have Shed Their Blood for Ohe Fah Wong and a Tong War is Raging in Three Cities

---Graphic Tale of Chinatown in New York, Philadelphia and Frisco.

(New York American)

Locked in a little room at No. 22 Pell street in heart of Chinatown, east Ohe Fah Wong, an eighteen-year-old celestial slave girl, whose beauty has caused a mad passion in the hearts of thousands of Col's to descend upon two Chinese admirers already, and over whose possession another Tong war is imminent.

It is developed that the killing of Wong Luck, an actor, and Lung Kee, a barber, in the Philadelphia Chinatown Sunday, was because of little Ohe because of her, too, it is known that half the flowing sleeves in Mott and Pell streets are concealing long black guns of Tong warriors.

Two men are guarding the entrance to Ohe's place of concealment with revolvers in their blouses. Two more sit outside her door, similarly armed. Rich merchants in the colony are bidding for her. Already she has been offered and refused. Not less than \$2,500 will buy her.

Centres of Tong Wars. She is being held by the powerful On Leong Tong. The rival Hip Sing Tong intends to fight to win her and to avenge the death of Lung Kee, a Hip Sing man. The story of Ohe up to date abounds in intrigue, with its ups and downs and deaths. And Chinatown knows that there will be more chapters written before "this."

About two weeks ago the rich On Leong Tong in this city heard there was a girl of rare Oriental beauty in Los Angeles, Cal. A travelling merchant who had passed through there saw and described her. But she was not for sale, he learned, else he would have bought her himself.

Wong Luck, who had never before been recognized socially by the On, was chosen to do the job. He was an actor in the Doyar Street Chinese Theatre; therefore was he a low caste man, ranking below the barbers and fishermen. But he was skilled in playing parts, especially female parts, so the Tong employed him. With costume and make-up in his trunk, Wong Luck journeyed to Los Angeles and appeared as a woman in the Chinese opera. Soon he read the presence of little Ohe Fah Wong, and the first part of his duties was over. The arrangement with the Tong was that if he should, in a woman, convince Ohe of the charms of New York's Celestial life.

Love Poiled Deep Plot. But there was one thing the Tong overlooked. They never dreamed that Wong Luck, dog of an actor, social outcast, might aspire to the possession of Ohe himself. Nor did it occur to the plotters that maybe Ohe might fancy him, degraded as he was. That was exactly what happened. Early last week Wong Luck cast aside his disguise and pleaded his love for the diminutive Ohe. Soon she read the news when the Los Angeles Chinatown quieted down, save for the fan-tan players in the parks, Ohe and Wong Luck, on Thursday morning they arrived in New York and went together to a little flat

which Wong Luck had engaged in East One Hundred and Eighteenth street. But just for one day were they happy. So thoroughly does the On Leong Tong cover the city with its spies that on Friday morning a committee of three visited the bridal flat.

Told Bridegroom to Go. Very quietly the Tong men told Wong Luck what to do. He was such a low caste pig, they said, that they would not waste the ammunition of their smoke-guns upon him. But he must leave New York never come back. If he came—the spokesman drew his hand across his throat with grim significance. And he must not commingle with Ohe. If he was in New York three hours later he died, they threatened.

Luck packed his things together and started one way; the Tong men put one into a carriage and went off in another direction. But Ohe had not been in the room of Mrs. Nom Wah, at No. 7 Pell street, an hour before the persistent Wong Luck had seen her and talked to her. Defying the dog of the powerful tong, he went directly to Chinatown, bribed Mrs. Nom Wah, and made arrangements with Ohe to deal her from the very stronghold of the On.

TEMPERANCE SENTIMENT

Remarkable Changes in Conditions in the Southern States in Recent Years.

(Christian Advocate, Nashville.)

How wonderfully changed are the conditions! It seems scarcely the same land—this broad, prosperous, smiling one, above which the star of temperance glows with such promise. By careful estimate it is shown that fully one-half of the countries of the states that lie south of Mason and Dixon's line are prohibition counties. Best of all, in most of them it is prohibitory rather than temperance. Mississippi takes the lead. In ninety per cent of her territory liquor has been voted out, and the unvarying vigilance of her people keeps it so. All but five of the seventy-seven counties of Mississippi are prohibitory counties. In all the others high license prevails. In Kentucky, where the liquor tax year tax to open a saloon in some, and in others one thousand five hundred dollars in January, liquor has been voted out.

Of the one hundred and one in Kentucky, Virginia, seventy-four of them have voted out whiskey. Others will not doubt soon follow this example and set themselves free of the rum curse.

A most astounding showing is made by the prohibition forces. Out of Kentucky, the very name of which has for years been synonymous with temperance. The time is still fresh in the memory when whisky flowed like water in Kentucky. The state boasted of its fine horses, fine whisky, and fine women. Now ninety-six of Kentucky's one hundred and one counties have declared for prohibition, while in several others the prohibition sentiment is growing stronger every day.

The prohibition forces in Georgia, eighty-five per cent, of the territory of that state is now under temperance laws. A remarkable record has been won by fourishes in but few of the larger cities. Tennessee is a close second in this list of honor, if she has not recently won first place. In only eight or nine of her larger cities and towns is the sale of liquor allowed. Strong prohibition forces are at work to secure legislative enactment tending to a general statutory provision whereby whisky will be banished from the entire state.

Texas, too, is fast coming over to the prohibition column. Out of her two hundred and twenty-four counties, one hundred and forty-seven are now in prohibition ranks. That others will steadily follow is a foregone conclusion.

The dispensary system, after a test of twelve years in South Carolina has proven anything else than the "stepping stone," to prohibition, as was predicted by its supporters. With the dispensary system removed, the struggle will be by the prohibition forces throughout the state to gain control of the whisky evil, and it is believed that they will succeed.

WHOOPIERS WHOOP FOR PRIZES AT WHOOPING COUGH LAWN PARTY

Pittsburg Victims of Epidemic Whoop Things Along, and Arrange to Whoop Again.

PITTSBURG, July 17.—Pittsburg's whooping cough epidemic has been pressed into service as a hot weather social feature. This afternoon Mrs. W. H. Parker, of Grandview avenue, Duquesne Heights, gave a lawn fete, restricting her guest list to whooping cough patients. She contracted it from him. On behalf of her son she gave the lawn fete. Mothers who have contracted the disease from their children accompanied the youngsters and several fathers were present to whoop things along.

During the serving of luncheon a creosote mixture was the most popular refreshment so to the guests of the occasion, attractive prizes were offered for the child who whooped the longest and loudest and booty prizes to those who whooped the least. The fete proved such a successful novelty that nearly all the guests proffered return invitations. As all the whooping cough patients, who are anxious to see the return of the local baseball club, when they will go out in force and whoop vigorously.

BUTTER AND POTATOES

Slump in Butter Market--Increase in Potato Farming.

Indications point to a slump in the butter market. The exports to Great Britain have dropped off tremendously lately. The English market is said to be flooded with butter from Scotland, Ireland and Denmark and as a result the exports from Canada for June this year were 16,900 packages below last year.

In June, 1906, 19,005 packages of butter were exported to England, as compared with about 3,200 for June of the present year. In the province of Quebec 35 cents a pound was being obtained for butter last year for several months, the price now down to 20 cents, and is expected to go much lower as there is no opportunity for shipping it away.

The growing of potatoes has now become a very important factor among the farmers of Carleton county. It is stated that the crop of tubers from this county will this year far exceed all previous records. The yield, it is said, will be about double that of last year, which was the best on record. Timothy Collins, of T. Collins & Co., North Market street, who handle a large quantity of potatoes every year, was up in Carleton county a couple of weeks ago and he says the crop will be enormous. One man alone has put in fifty acres of potatoes, planting 450 barrels of seed. Farmers who last year ploughed five acres were this year planting ten acres, and so on all over the county. Lots of farmers, he said, have planted 100, 150 or 200 barrels of seed.

The farmers are selling their cattle and going in for potatoes altogether. Hay is being grown very extensively. The farmers say that they can make a good profit if they sell their potatoes for 30 or 35 cents, but the present great quantities were sold at \$2.40 and \$2.50 a barrel. The great demand in the west has caused this branch of agriculture to take a great boom. Many New Brunswickers who went into Maine a few years ago, are coming back and buying farms in Carleton county and, as a result, farms that would have been sold for \$5,000 a year or two ago, are now being taken over at two or three times that price.

THE STATE OF THE FISH TRADE

Shad a Failure, Gaspereaux Small Catch, and Salmon Scarcely an Average.

The fishing trade as a whole at this port is not up to the standard. The line fishing for cod and pollock along the Bay of Fundy coast is, however, better than it was last time last season. Gaspereaux fishing was not as good as last season, and was away below the average yearly catch. Gaspereaux are for \$3.10 per barrel, selected. Some lots have been sent away to the West Indies. The salmon fishing, although not finished, is not as good as it was last year at the same time, but this last week there was some improvement and it is expected that this season's catch will be a most gratifying increase.

The opening of river navigation the shipment of lumber to the United Kingdom is just about the same as at this time last season, but throughout the past winter the deal shipments by liners was heavy.

Overwise freights are ruling at \$3.50 and \$3.75 per thousand feet for New York, Philadelphia and Washington. There is now a steady demand for schooners from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia ports, and in some directions showing quite a large increase in departments of the shipping trade. Lumber shipments in particular have been stopped during this month of July, into the New York market.

The amount of lumber shipped from this port this season to the United States shows a slight increase, while the shipment of pulp wood has more than doubled. This branch of business is increasing, also the shipment of cedar shingles, which always find a ready market.

The outlook all along the line looks bright, with all the mills cutting and the future lumber trade out of this port will be heavy.

MAY ACQUIRE BOYS COLLEGE

Rumor of a movement towards the acquisition of the Robtson College for Boys by the Church of England in New Brunswick, has been current for some time. The present proprietor, James F. Robertson, has been inclined to name a figure which he will sell. The matter will likely come up at the synod meeting in October.

THE YACHTSMEN

The R.K.Y.C. fleet of the annual cruise, was at Oak Point last evening. Rev. Dr. Lindsay Parker, of Brooklyn, N. Y., chaplain of the club, joined the fleet at the mouth of the Belleisle, in the Alanna. The yachts are today sailing to Carter's Point, where the annual Sunday service will be held. A very handsome souvenir programme has been prepared and the service is likely to be very largely attended.
