The Price of Meats May This is General Opinion Reach Lower Level Soon

BEEF HOLDS FIRM

This Year's Fruit Crop Promises to be More Plentiful Than Usual But There Will be Little Change in Prices.

Although little or no change is predicted in the price of beef—particularly the higher grades; there is some indication that there will be a decline in the figures on other meats. Vegetables will be cheaper, especially potatoes, and fruit will, from present projects, be pretty plentiful.

A local meat dealer said today that real good beef would very likely be high in price, but grass cattle would probably be cheaper. Good beef wholesales at present at from 8 to 101-2 cents, and there is little indication of these figures moving downward. Prices differ considerably from those of last year. For instance, beef that in July 1906 could be had alive at 4.3-4 and 5 cents, today commands 6 cents, and stock which sold then at 9c today brings from 10 to 101-2 cents. JAPAN BUYING WAR BALLOONS

ACCIDENT Ten of Them Have Been Ordered from Berlin.

NEW YORK, July 20—A Berlin despatch to the Herald says: The Japanese commission of military experts sent here to order new guns and ammunition worth \$10,000,000, has also ordered ten military balloons. The firm which entered into the contract, Japan has been informed has not acquired patent rights on any of the improvements which proved so successful at the recent trials at Tegal and which the Japanese commission demands shall be utilized in the construction of the balloons ordered. The little girl had been taken from the Boylan home on Monday, as it had been reported that she did not get proper care.




Seven Room Gambrel Roof Cottage,






