FEAR FOR RUSSIAN FLEET?

New York, Sept. 6-A special cable to the New York World from London says grave fears are expressed there regarding the possible fate of the Russian fleet, for its safety depends on the stand being made by the Russian armies. "Germany has her eyes on the Russian fleet," the cable says, "and its early
