





Two Flee When Real Patrolman Appears and Stolen Truck Crashes Into a Store-One Caught.

New York, July 20.—A truckload of silk, valued at \$50,000, was stolen in the Bronx by six men, one of whom wore a fake policeman's uniform, with a counterfeit badge. All of them were in a touring car with a Police Department

Four of the men "arrested" the driver of the truck and his helper, and drove them about the Bronx, holding them until they received word from "headquarters" that the men were all right and should be let go. The other two started to drive off with the silk, but had to abandon the truck and its but had to abandon the truck and its loot when a real policeman came along. The robbers jumped off the truck, letting it smash a water hydrant and run up on the sidewalk, endangering passersby. One of them was caught after a chase and was held without bail.

The police think that the same band which attempted this daring robbery was guilty of a successful \$50,000 silk robbery in lower Manhattan, when a truck was held up, the driver and his helper ordered out of it, and the fruck and tits load stolen.





—Value of merchandise exported from Canada in June exceeds the value of imports by \$10,087,892, according to a statement issued yesterday by officials of the Dominion Government. Imports are classed as follows:

Dutiable goods imported \$55,541,608, as compared with \$42,046,205 in June of the preceding year.

This brings the total of goods imported during the month to \$84,582,624 as compared with \$61,668,729 in June of 1922.

Last month \$93,750,837 worth of Canadian produce was exported as compared with \$71,760,563 in June of the preceding year. With foreign produce added the total figures reach \$95,-087,892. In June 1922 the total figure was \$73,107,055.

In the report it is shown that salmon brought \$464,404 during the time covered by the figures; newsprint paper was valued at \$7,006,722; wheat at \$26,463,416 and cheese at \$1,137,650.

In the case of all commodities substantial increases in value were shown

In the case of all commodities substantial increases in value were shown over the figures for the corresponding month last year.

A satisfactory feature of the trade showing is that the increase in exports is much more rapid than that in imports, and that Canada's trade balance is on a fair way to being favorably restored.






