Daily Hints For the Cook

DUMPLINGS FOR STEW. Two cups flour, ½ teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder (not heaping), milk enough to make soft dough. I mix with a silver knife and handle very little. Roll out and cut in shape and steam in a greased colander over boiling water 20 or 25 minutes.

COLONIAL FRITTERS One cup of fine bread crumbs, heat a cup of milk and pour over them, and set aside to cool, then beat smooth, and add yolks of 2 eggs beaten with a tablespoon of sugar. Sift together 1 cup of flour, a little salt, about ¼ of a teaspoon of grated nutmeg and cinnamon, 2 teaspoons of baking powder, and add to the mixture. Beat well, then fold in the beaten whites, beaten to a stiff froth. Fry in deep fat, roll in powdered sugar and serve with a sauce. Half a cup of currants, floured and added to the mixture. makes it nicer.

"Ladies and gentlemen, today's game is postponed until further notice on account of darkness."


