QUEEN ORDERS THE PRINCE TO RESIGN

Bullington Club at Oxford Barred by Royal Mother... OBJECTS TO JOLLY EVENINGS... Drink and Song the Attractions and Consent to His Joining Was Obtained Only on Understanding He Would Not Take Part—He Did

(Canadian Press) London, May 28.—The young Prince of Wales has just received a reminder that although as Oxford's student, he rejoices in the appellation of a man, his mother at least looks upon him as subject to maternal rules. When the prince went to the university he was anxious to join one of the other clubs which confer a certain sort of distinction to a favored undergraduate. One of the most famous of these is the Bullington Club, in which the membership indicates exceptional popularity among the youths of Varsity. Of course this was open to the prince as any other would be. He had a certain amount of difficulty in getting his parents' permission to join the Bullington club, and eventually only to obtain it on the understanding that he never would join in an evening of drink and song. Unluckily the prince was persuaded to participate in one of these a few weeks ago, and the report was not long in reaching his royal parents, with the result that the prince was directed by telegram to remove his name from the Bullington list. The telegram came from Queen Mary.

McINNIS IS UNDER ARREST

Rough Usage and Excitement Cause of Death in Island Case, Say Members of Coroner's Jury

(Special To Times) Charlottetown, P. E. I., May 28.—James A. McInnis was arrested yesterday at his home in Lakerville, charged with the murder of his cousin, Galen J. McInnis. He denied having committed the deed. At a coroner's inquest yesterday evidence was given by William A. MacDonald, who drove to Souris in company with McInnis to the home of the deceased by Cassie McInnis, the latter's daughter, by his widow and his son James G. The wife and daughter said that the prisoner drove up to the house in a reckless manner, shouting and swearing. He walked in to the bedroom where Galen McInnis lay and made three attacks on him, seizing him by the throat, dragging him on to the floor and sitting on him. The old man vomited three times. McInnis was accusing the deceased of telling lies about him. Galen denied the charges but was unable to offer physical resistance. The women said they were too much excited to notice whether the accused had his hand on the victim's wind pipe or not, but knew he was clutching the night clothes near his throat. He did not seem much intoxicated, though he had been drinking in Souris. He seemed more crazy than drunk. He was able to sort out parcels he had brought in and to hitch up the horses in the dark and drive away after the deed was done. It is difficult at present to find the motive, but it is believed that James A. was offended at Galen being appointed fish warden, a job he wanted for himself. The victim, they said, had a weak heart and the rough handling he received probably precipitated his death. MacDonald dragged James A. away and ejected him. An autopsy will be made today. McInnis is very excitable and violent in liquor. He has been a school teacher and is of good education. He was apparently on good terms with Galen's family, having visited there frequently. The preliminary inquiry will take place today. The coroner's jury today found that Galen McInnis came to his death as the result of rough usage and excitement from assault on the part of James A. McInnis. The autopsy revealed a fatty heart, congested blood vessels but no external marks to indicate strangling.

SUDDEN DEATH OF GEORGE A. MOORE AT CLIFTON SPRINGS, N. Y.

St. John Druggist Had Gone There For Benefit of Health and News of Death Came as Great Shock

The announcement of the sudden and unexpected death of George A. Moore of this city, at Clifton Springs, N. Y., will come as a shock to his friends here. Mr. Moore left St. John about two weeks ago to take a course of treatment at the springs for the benefit of his health. There was no fear at that time that his illness was serious and since then there has been nothing to prepare his friends for the news of his death, which occurred this morning. Mr. Moore, who was fifty-four years of age, was a son of the late William Moore of this city, and is survived by one sister, Miss Emma. He served his apprenticeship in the drug business with the late John Chaloner, who at one time had a drug store in King street in the premises now occupied by the C. P. R. ticket office. On February 1, 1914, Mr. Moore set up business for himself on the north east corner of Brussels and Richmond streets and some years ago erected for himself a handsome, two-story building on the north west corner which he had since occupied. Mr. Moore enjoyed the sincere esteem and respect of all who knew him and his death will be widely regretted.

BAPTISTS PROTEST THIS CHURCH'S ACTION

Saskatoon Body Not Insisting on New Members Being Immersed

Saskatoon, Sask., May 28.—Because the First Baptist church here recently issued a notice announcing willingness to receive members without immersion providing they are professing Christians, a petition is being circulated throughout the denomination in Saskatchewan, calling for the disfellowship of this congregation at the annual provincial meeting. This church, one of the most popular in the city, had trouble last fall when part of the membership seceded and formed a separate church.

LORD AVEBURY DEAD

Banker, Scientist and Popular Author of Nature Studies. London, May 28.—Lord Avebury died of heart disease after a short illness, at the age of seventy-nine years. He was prominent as a banker, famous as a scientist and popular as an author of nature studies. Before his succession to the peerage, Lord Avebury, under his former name, Sir John Lubbock, was probably the most popular man among the working people of the British Isles, for it was he who in 1871, as a member of parliament, succeeded in having enacted the bank holidays act which added four legal holidays every year to the statute books, and these were for a long period known as "Lubbock days." Some of Lord Avebury's works, especially on finance and education, have been translated into nearly all the languages of the world.

JOE TARBELL TO JOIN GREEKS IN CITY THIS WEEK

Popular Pitcher of Last Year Secured—Hoffman Released to Fredericton

St. John fans will be pleased to learn that Joe Tarbell, the Indian twirler who pitched snappy games for the Marathons last season will be on their line-up again this year, and that he is due to arrive here tomorrow. His home is in Ogdensburg, N. Y., but he is now in Montreal and will leave that city for St. John this evening. He will be a strong and valuable addition to the pitching staff. Hoffman, who was released as a centre fielder, and who is reckoned as a very good player, has been released to Fredericton, as it is considered that "Butt" Riley can cover the middle garden to the satisfaction of all concerned. There is a probability that Watt, who is well known in the N. B. & M. League circuit, will be signed with the team this week. He is a catcher and first baseman. In the game this afternoon either Deitch or Woodbury will pitch, otherwise the line-up will be the same as in yesterday's contest.

WINNIPEG WANTS TO GO INTO THE BANK BUSINESS

Winnipeg, Man., May 28.—Controller Midwinter is urging members of the city council to unite in an application to the federal government for legislation giving the city authority to establish a public savings bank.

The controller declares that this would make possible the financing of the city improvements with the citizens' own money and says the city is now paying too much for financial accommodations.

MUST ASK PERMISSION TO OPEN CITY STREETS

A report was submitted to the city commissioners this morning by the recorder on the right of the St. John Railway Company to open the city streets without permission, as was done recently. The recorder informed the commissioners that the company must apply to the city, giving twenty days notice, and that their application must be approved by the commissioner of public works before the company can proceed with the work.

ASSAULT CHARGED IN FAIRVILLE CASE

An assault case which has aroused much interest in Milford and Fairville was given its first airing in the Fairville police court this morning before Justice Allingham. The defendant is John Burns and he is charged with assaulting Miss Agnes Green, her father, Allan Green, preferring the charge against him. The case was postponed this morning, after her evidence had been taken, until Friday at 10 o'clock. Miss Green said that on the night of the alleged assault she was going from the Milford ferry and that the defendant caught hold of her. J. A. Barry is acting for the defence, and D. Mullin, K. C., for the plaintiff. A short time ago Burns had Green and his two sons in court and had them bound over to keep the peace, as is complained of their making threats against him.

MIGHT HAVE BEEN SUFFOCATED

Arrest of Wilber Regarded as Fortunate Occurrence. It was a fortunate thing for Newton Wilber that the police found him yesterday in Wentworth street and took him into custody, for they say that he was lying in such a position that had he remained there much longer he would have suffocated. He was brought into court this morning, charged with drunkenness, and remanded by Magistrate Ritchie, who ordered that the man receive medical attention. At the same time the magistrate recommended that Mary Robinson, who was remanded yesterday on a charge of threatening William Hatfield, be examined as to her mental condition. One man and one woman, both charged with drunkenness, were remanded and one man was fined \$4 or ten days on the same charge.

THE RIVER STEAMERS

The steamer Hampstead will leave Indianstown late this afternoon for Gagetown to begin her running on the Gagetown-Fredericton route tomorrow. It was planned that she should leave this morning, but the repairs were not quite completed. She has been renovated and is now in fine shape to undertake the season's work. Captain Flowers, who will have charge of her, and she will be operated by the Fredericton syndicate which acquired her and the steamer Victoria a few weeks ago. The "Vic" is being repaired now, and it is expected that she will be running on the Fredericton route early next month. Nothing further has been heard in connection with the rumored negotiations concerning the steamer Elaine.

SIR EDWARD GREY FORGES BULGARIA

British Minister of Peace Using His Great Influence to Avert Outbreak Among Balkan States

A cable to J. M. Robinson & Sons says that Sir Edward Grey is urging Bulgaria to sign the peace terms and leave it to the powers to induce Greece and Serbia to sign. (Canadian Press) Sofia, Hungary, May 28.—The military circles of the Bulgarian capital expect almost immediate outbreak of hostilities between Bulgaria and Serbia. London, May 28.—The Times correspondent sends the following despatch from Athens: "Bulgaria is striving to come to an agreement with Greece in order to have her entire force free to operate against Serbia. The Bulgarians propose to give up their claims on Saloniki on condition that Greece abandons certain territory in the Panghaion district. Should this arrangement succeed, Serbia and Greece will be separated by Bulgarian troops. General Savovitch also will go to Saloniki, and it is hoped that the chiefs of the two armies will come to an understanding which will prevent a recurrence of irritating incidents." Vienna, March 28.—According to the Reichspost, Bulgaria had addressed a note to the European powers offering to submit to their decision the question of the future allocation of Saloniki. Saloniki, May 28.—The most severe tension still exists between the Greek and Bulgarian armies facing each other some distance to the north of this city. Several clashes, during which shots have been exchanged, occurred yesterday and today, and the Greeks accuse the Bulgarians of assuming the aggressive. In spite of the declaration made at the Bulgarian capital that the Bulgarian troops have been ordered to observe a moderate attitude and avoid conflicts with the Greeks, the Bulgarian commanders apparently are preparing to attack Eleftheria, with a view to gaining complete occupation of the dominant position of Mount Panghaion. They have already placed guns on the crests of the hills to the southeast of Prava, commanding Eleftheria. The Bulgarians have also occupied the heights commanding the village of Butjuka, to the south of Lake Doiran and the town of the same name, which is occupied by the Greeks. It is the belief of the Greek generals that the Bulgarians are systematically creating incidents and endeavoring to drive the Greeks toward the sea and seize the positions vacated by them.

CHEAPER LIGHT AND POWER IN WEST FROM MUNICIPAL PLANT

Edmonton is to Cut Rates by 12 1/2 and 25 Per Cent

Edmonton, Alta., May 28.—Users of electricity for lighting and power purposes will be the first to benefit from the municipal ownership of public utilities in Edmonton by a reduction of from 12 1/2 to 25 per cent in rates, effective early in June. A. W. Ormsby, superintendent of the department, which has a surplus of more than \$100,000, has recommended a cut of 12 1/2 per cent on light rates, now eight cents per k. w. h., and 25 per cent reduction in power rates, now four cents, with a sliding scale for manufacturing concerns. The total profits of all the publicly-owned utilities in Edmonton was \$86,000, last year. EXPERT AS AVIATOR, BUT IS DASHED TO DEATH

Hanover, Germany, May 28.—A Horn, a German aviator, was killed this morning in an invention, just patented by a Danish engineer named Asen, does what is alleged it will. Asen says he has invented a cylinder which may be buried in the ground for years in the same fashion as submarine mines are placed in harbors, doing no damage until they are fired. The cylinder is operated by electricity from a station four or five miles distant. When a button is pressed, the cylinder jumps two feet from the ground and fires 400 shots horizontally, the shots being effective at a range of 3,000 yards. Any number of cylinders may be placed around places to be defended, in one or several lines, and the inventor says that they would mow down ninety per cent of the attacking force.

REFUSED TO SING GOD SAVE THE KING; NOW THERE IS TROUBLE FOR TEACHER WHO WHIPPED HIM

Toronto, Ont., May 28.—A despatch to the World from Niagara Falls, Ont., says: "Because Miss Lillian Jackson, teacher in Simcoe street public school, whipped Hugh, the eleven-year-old son of H. M. Wilson, superintendent of the Ontario Power Company, when he refused to sing 'God Save the King,' the Wilson family took the boy out of school and will send him to the American side for his education, so it was learned last night. Young Wilson, whose parents are Southerners, refused point blank to sing the National Anthem, and received a strapping at the hands of the teacher. When he went home he told his parents. They threatened trouble. "George Thiemster, a member of the school board, said last night that he had heard nothing officially of the incident as yet."

PREMIER FLEMING IS TO BE A SPEAKER

Outline of Great Presbyterian Meeting in Toronto

BILLETING ALL ARRANGED

Evangelism, Social Application of The Gospel, The Problem of the City and Financial Matters are Subjects to Be Taken Up

(Canadian Press) Toronto, Ont., May 28.—Rev. R. J. Glasford announced this morning that the difficulty in billeting the 4000 delegates to the general Presbyterian congress which will open next week, has been overcome and that the large numbers who are arriving daily, will all find homes in the city before Saturday night. Some fine instances of hospitality are reported and in some instances verandas will likely be occupied after the guests have been tucked away for the night. The speakers on the subject of "Evangelism" are to be Rev. Dr. Robert Johnston of Montreal; Rev. D. McOrlun, Moncton, and Rev. John McNeill of Toronto. They are to be given sufficient time to present the case and it will be fully expounded by such a group of speakers. "The Social Application of the Gospel" is to be given a full evening and three outstanding men are to treat it: Professor Graham Taylor of Chicago, Rev. M. A. Mackinnon of Regina and Dr. J. A. Macdonald of Toronto. Each of them will deal with a different phase of the great theme. "The Problem of the City" is to be spoken by Rev. J. A. Clark of Calgary, Doctors J. W. Macmillan of Halifax, A. G. Sinclair of Winnipeg and J. G. Shearer of Toronto. A team of this kind will bring all the dark ends of the subject out into the light. Edward Brown, a former layman from Winnipeg, is to discuss the budget under the subject, "The Stewardship of Money" which is to be presented by J. A. Paterson of Toronto. Other speakers in this connection will be James Hallowell of Toronto, on "The Weekly Envelope," and M. Parkinson and Hon. J. K. Fleming, premier of New Brunswick, on "The Every Member Canvass."

MONCTON MAN BADLY INJURED IN ONTARIO

Thomas McKinnon Seriously Hurt in Dynamite Explosion—Death of W. A. Graves in Montana

(Special To Times) Moncton, N. B., May 28.—Thomas McKinnon who is reported in despatches as lying at death's door near Brockville, Ont., as the result of a premature dynamite explosion on demolition construction work, belongs to Moncton. He is a son of James McKinnon, a former well known I. C. R. employee, who also is engaged in railway construction work in Ontario. Friends here are anxiously waiting further word. Mrs. Gordon, wife of Conductor H. B. Gordon, has received a telegram informing her of the death of her brother, W. A. Graves in Montana. Death is supposed to have been sudden as his friends here had no notice of his illness. At a school board meeting tonight it is understood that a teacher will be appointed to the high school staff to succeed W. A. Cowperthwaite, who will go to Winnipeg. W. T. Denham of Woodstock is an applicant for the position and stands a good chance of being appointed. Freshwatermen leaving here today for Toronto to attend the Presbyterian gathering include Rev. D. HINT AT STRIKE OF THE MONTREAL 'LONGSHOREMEN'

Call to the Union For Expression of Opinion Before Definite Decision. Montreal, May 28.—The Syndicated Longshoremen of Montreal have decided to issue a call to the whole union before taking any direct steps toward conflict with their employers. George Poliquin, business agent for the union, said that this step meant action, and that at no distant date, on the part of the wharf laborers. The secretary of the Shipping Federation, who represents the opposing interests, said that he had as yet heard of no intention of a strike. The matter of contrike could be decided only by a conference of opinion. Mr. Poliquin said, and by next Sunday's meeting this would have been sufficiently obtained to apprise the leaders whether or not a strike was advisable. Personally, Mr. Poliquin said he had no doubt what the outcome of this "call to arms" would be.

LONDON SOCIETY NEWS

More Money for Investment In Canada Likely — Handsome Dresses of Canadian Ladies at Recent Royal Court

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, May 17.—Lady Victoria Carrington is receiving many congratulations on having carried off one of the richest "parties" of the age, young Nigel Legge-Bourke, to whom she is just engaged. Lady Victoria is the youngest daughter of Lord and Lady Lincolnshire, and is only just twenty-one. She was god-daughter of Queen Victoria and was the Queen Mary's train-bearer at her coronation—the third of them to be married, by the way.

Nigel Legge-Bourke is also connected with the court. He was a page to King Edward as a boy, and his mother, as Lady Lambart, was one of Queen Victoria's favorite maids of honor. She was an exquisite dancer and it is told of her that on one occasion, after having danced before the aged queen and her guests, Her Majesty asked her what reward she would like, she said promptly, "The hand of Mr. Gladstone on charge."

Nigel Legge-Bourke owes the last part of his name to his uncle, Harry Bourke, who picked him out from all his nephews to be his heir. He assumed his relative's name and arms by royal licence in 1911, and soon after his uncle died and left him a large fortune. Nigel is an extremely lively young spark, and is known to have a great penchant for the members of the musical comedy stage. Lady Victoria is the exact antithesis of Mr. Legge-Bourke, being quiet and gentle—perhaps that is the secret of her conquest.

Most tragically sad was the death of Mrs. John Ford last week. She was the daughter of Mrs. George Cavendish and as quite a young girl, soon after she came out, fell in love with John Ford, but for a long time her parents would not consent to the marriage on account of Mr. Ford's being a "cancer" of the law. But the young people prevailed in the end.

SENATE AND NAVAL BILL
Sir George Ross moved in the senate yesterday that the senate was not justified in giving its assent to the naval bill until that bill had been submitted to the judgment of the country.

Sir George Ross cannot be charged by his opponents with a leaning toward a separatist policy. He has always been a pronounced Imperialist. As an Imperialist and a self-respecting Canadian he protests against offering the British North America Act, when there is no emergency and no reason whatever for pursuing such a course.

We are told that great interest was shown in the proceedings in the senate yesterday. Premier Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier were both attentive listeners to a speech of historic interest and importance. The government was able, by the adoption of closure, to force the naval bill through the house of commons, but it had no such power over the senate. It is true that veiled threats were made by government members and by Conservative newspapers of what would happen to the senate if it dared to run counter to the wishes of the government, but the senators were not disturbed. Sir George Ross in the course of his speech yesterday said that the senate did not presume to be above the Canadian people, and he significantly added: "nor is the house of commons above the Canadian people."

He had sent four houses of commons put out of doors in his time, and it might happen again. Sir George Ross set forth in clear language the reasons why the naval bill should not pass. Of course he will be bitterly attacked by the Tory press. The St. John Standard in this morning's issue "Laurier's puppet senators" stabling a bill to aid the Empire; and from one end of the country to the other there will be another outcry by the High Imperialists who sit cheek by jowl with the followers of Henri Bourassa.

But the government must now make up its mind whether to drop the naval bill, and thus admit that the whole emergency story was sheer humbug, or keep up the bluff that there was an emergency, and go to the country in another flag-waving campaign. So far as the government is concerned, mere abuse of Sir George Ross and the Liberal members of the senate will not settle the question. Moreover, the government has just declared its confidence in the senate by appointing four new senators.

WESTERN CONDITIONS
There appears to be some little anxiety with regard to the western crop. One crop expert says that the conditions in the west this spring are almost identical with those of 1907, when there was one of the coldest summers known in the Canadian West, and when large areas of crop failed to mature. The latest reports, however, indicate some improvement in the weather. Canadian Finance of May 21 says:—

"The circumstances that wheat seeding has been somewhat later than the average and that the weather in the first half of this month has been rather cool for the time of year, have recently caused some tending to 'wait and see' in general trade circles throughout the west. It has prevented business from being as active as it would undoubtedly have been had the climatic conditions been more favorable. It is the early summer sowing business that is mostly affected, however, owing to the fact that the weather has not been suitable for the early movement of warm weather materials. Local wholesale merchants report a more satisfactory placing of orders for fall merchandise; that is, in lines usually placed for fall at this time of year. The season is early yet, and the trade are hopeful that conditions in June will be favorable for disposing of the goods they have stocked in preparation for the season."

The Royal Society of Canada has voted in favor of admitting women to membership. There was no good reason why it should not have done so before.

The question of good roads was again discussed at the board of trade luncheon yesterday. It has been decided by the Automobile Association to spend a certain amount of money in patrolling the roads to Robtsey and Westfield, and the members of the association feel that they ought to receive a certain amount of assistance from the government. The government, however, has replied that it has no funds for this purpose, although it sympathizes with the aims of the association. No doubt the process of conversion will be slow, but sooner or later the views expressed by Mr. E. A. Smith will so impress themselves upon the provincial government, the municipal authorities, the farmers' associations, the boards of trade and all concerned that an adequate policy of permanent road construction will be regarded as essential to the progress of the province. It is not a wise policy to disregard the condition of the roads when a strong appeal is being made for immigration. Good roads would be a great advertisement in a campaign for new settlers, but good roads are also needed for the benefit of our own farmers and the people generally.

Apparently there is to be a little war between Bulgaria and Serbia. It would think that these people had had enough of fighting for some time to come, but apparently they have only got warmed up to their work.

Another murderer has been permitted to preach a sermon from the scaffold and to tell the people that God has forgiven him and he dies in peace. How about his victim? She was very hurriedly removed from the world, and could not even profit by his solemn exhortation to repentance, for at the time he killed her he had not repented. It is surely time to put an end to this public boasting on the part of murderers and other criminals that God has forgiven them their sins. It has a tendency either to develop skepticism, or a certain lack of respect for that which ought to be regarded as worthy of reverence.

The Toronto Housing Association is heartily supported by the press. The World for example, says:—"It is none too soon for Canada to consider the housing problem. In the ordinary dwelling the climate has forced a greater regard for comfort upon the builders than is usual in Great Britain. But the poorer class of houses leave much to be desired, and whether as models, or as an actual beginning in the rehousing of the slum dwellers of Toronto, the work of the Toronto Housing Company promises to be of the highest value. The co-operation of the city council should be cheerfully given to an effort which involves no risk to the city and means much for the welfare of the citizens that most need this consideration."

The city council will not be able to carry out as large a programme of permanent street paving this year as had been anticipated. The reason is that after the council had decided upon work to be carried out, the property owners along certain streets objected and some of it had to be abandoned. Commissioner Agar hopes to see plans completed for next year's programme in ample time so that there will be no holding up of any of the work, and so that by calling for tenders for a large amount of work at the same time it may be possible to get it done at less cost. This is the right policy, and it may be hoped that the plans of the commissioner will be realized. Where a little paving is done here and there by separate tender the cost is a good deal larger than it would be if the city were in a position to call for tenders for larger amounts of work.

At the Westminster Coroner's Court on the 22nd ult., a verdict from natural causes was returned in connection with the death of Sir Charles Rose, M. P., who was seized with fatal illness while returning in his motor car from Hendon aerodrome, after making an ascent in an aeroplane. Medical evidence showed that death was due to heart failure.

The death is announced from Nice of Lord Gorell. He will be better remembered as Sir John Gorell Barnes, a judge of the divorce court, of which he was president in 1908-9. Born in 1846, the son of a Liverpool ship-owner, he is succeeded by the Hon. Henry Gorell, who was born in 1882.

FIFTY MILLIONS LOST BY BAD HANDLING

(Bureau of Railway Economics.)
It is notorious that cotton has been the most slovenly handled of all of the agricultural products of the United States. The farmers often leave it exposed to be damaged by rain and infiltrated by mud. Even when offered for shipment it is sometimes in this condition. All too frequently it is looted and inadequately packed. It has been said that upon receipt at foreign ports bales of cotton look more like rag-bags. For many years the railways have sought to have the cotton shippers exercise greater care, but the railways have no such automatic power as those of Germany where no shipment is accepted unless it is packed and marked in accordance with rigid specifications. Government experts have estimated that of the cotton crop of the United States there is between the gin and the spinner a wastage and damage amounting to \$50,000,000 per annum.
The Japanese several years ago ruled that they would not accept cotton that was not clean, securely packed and plainly marked. They got what they want. The possibility of losing the custom of a nation makes a difference. Those concerned in cotton growing and shipping find that shiftlessness reacts upon their pocketbooks. It is probable that a better order of things will come about. Not only the money but the good will of the foreign consumer is worth while especially in these times when he is endeavoring to stimulate the growth of cotton in other countries than the United States.

GOOD RICH MILK
(Dominion Department of Agriculture)
The critical consumer of milk may give a snap verdict on the glass of 'good rich milk' given him in the restaurant or at home, and may vaguely wonder what percentage of fat the milk is supposed to contain. Certain standards of richness are fixed by various countries, and by municipalities, while some purchasing companies and dealers also set a standard below which the milk must not fall.
The knowledge of the average test of the herd, interesting as it is, is not as valuable to the progressive dairyman as a knowledge of what each cow's milk tests. Whether it is 2.9, 3.4, 4.5 or 6.6 per cent. of fat depends on various factors, and can be ascertained only after systematic sampling and testing. Such testing sometimes reveals curious facts. A pet cow whose 'good rich milk' was reserved for table use was recently discarded by a farmer when cow-testing proved to his dismay that her milk was nearly the poorest in the herd.
The average test of the herd is a vital matter to every dairyman whose milk is paid for at the cheese factory by the test. It is of decided importance to both creamery manager and patron when considering the by-product of skim-milk for feeding, and the loaded wagon for the cream-hauler. For two lots each of 16,000 pounds of normal milk may contain either 200 or 600 pounds of fat; one lot is scarcely the best for cheese-making, while the other would be 'good rich milk'.
Last year the United States exported automobiles to the Canary Islands, Dutch East Indies, French islands in the Pacific, Turkey in Asia, Siam, French Guiana, Portuguese possessions in Africa, and practically all of the Central and South American countries, also to Montenegro, Serbia and Bulgaria.

MUST SUBMIT THE NAVAL AID BILL TO THE PEOPLE

Liberal Leader in Senate Moves Amendment Declaring That Electors Must be Consulted

Ottawa, May 27.—The naval bill will have to be submitted to the people before it becomes law. Sir George Ross, the Liberal leader, who represented the majority in the senate, made this declaration today when he closed a notable speech with an amendment which declared that the people should be consulted upon a question of such far-reaching constitutional importance. Great interest was shown in the proceedings. A large audience assembled to hear the speech. The government house gallery was filled by members of his royal highness' household, including Col. Lowther, Premier Borden and Mrs. Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Lady Laurier were also present, with many members from both sides of the house of commons during the delivery of the speech. The debate lasted until midnight and will be continued tomorrow afternoon. It is now for the government to decide whether it will allow its naval aid proposals to drop or submit them to the people by a general election. Opinion is equally divided as to which course they will pursue.

It is probable that the pavement at the foot of Indiantown will be repaired with broken stone and tar.

Friends of Charles McIntyre, formerly engaged in newspaper work in this city, but for the last few years editor of the Western Canada Contractor and

Western Lumberman, will be interested to learn of his further success in the west. He has purchased a half interest in the Los Angeles Mining Review, a trade paper, and will leave about the first of this month for that city to take up his position as editor and part owner.

Otto Guttmann, of Berlin, Germany, arrived in St. John yesterday to look over the province and select a farm on which to settle. He says that conditions in Germany are discouraging to the small farmer, shop-keepers and laborers, and that many would be glad to settle in New Brunswick if they knew of its possibilities. He also said that the proposed C. P. R. excursion from Germany to Canada for business men and manufacturers had attracted much attention, and 800 men are likely to take advantage of the opportunity.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Premier Borden left Ottawa yesterday for Grand Pre, N. S., to go to the bedside of his aged mother, who is seriously ill. Her death is expected any day. Hon. Robert Rogers is acting prime minister during his absence.

Six persons are dead as the result of an explosion yesterday in the home of a family named Marshall at Marietta, Ohio, when a can of kerosene was left to burn in an open fire. Mrs. Marshall and five of her children were killed.

The Royal Society of Canada, in session at Ottawa yesterday, voted for the admission of women to its ranks. Those in favor of the move were championed by Prof. G. Adams, while in opposition was led by Colonel Denison of Toronto. There was considerable discussion on the question, which was finally voted upon favorably.

COMMISSION GOVERNMENT

(Ottawa Citizen)

The progressiveness of the city of St. John, N. B., in the way of civic government is not generally known, and is certainly not given the publicity which it deserves. As a matter of fact, it is an example which promises a great influence for good. As an object lesson in popular government and business administration, it could hardly be better.

And since both of these are being recognized as of greatest value in modern affairs, it will pay the citizens of Ottawa, and every other Canadian city, to keep close watch on St. John.

About a year ago the city adopted the commission form of government. The governing body consists of a mayor and four aldermen, each of whom is a commissioner. The term of office for the mayor is two years, and that of the commissioners four years, two being elected at each biennial election. The length of terms means greater continuity in office, and consequently greater efficiency in administration. The usual practice of changing the members of the civic administration after a brief term which simply prepares for efficiency is not wise from a business standpoint. The city is thoroughly safeguarded against inefficiency in its officials by means of the recall. By it any official may be removed from office by the votes of the electors. At all times the citizens are supreme in their right and power.

Popular government is further assured by the initiative and referendum. It is in the power of the people not only to compel the reference of any by-law or ordinance to the electors, but to initiate such measures as are thought to be for the public good, and have them submitted by a referendum. As will at once be seen, this will mean that the people have the right of direct legislation. They are not dependent upon any elected officials who may profess to know their minds better than they know themselves. Public wisdom, will, conscience, become directly effective.

What is of even greater interest, is the fact that the new system works satisfactorily. It has been tested, and is declared to be a success. Business men in the city have declared that the business system means efficient government. The feeling of satisfaction is apparently general. The experience of St. John is pointing out the way.

Between \$16,000 and \$18,000 damage was caused by a fire at the Great Northern Railway Company of Ireland's works at Dundalk on the 12th ult. Three carriage factories, with their contents, were demolished.





BIG LABOR DAY PARADE HERE IS TALKED OF

Plans are now in the preliminary stages for the holding of a large labor parade here on Labor Day, under the auspices of the Trades and Labor Council. The matter is now being given consideration, and it is expected to be carried through successfully, with the result that the greatest labor parade witnessed in St. John in many years may be conducted. During the last year or so various new unions have been formed or re-organized about the city with an increase in membership in almost every case. Each union would be called upon to furnish a float of some description, representative of the craft or otherwise. The scheme has not yet been passed upon definitely, but prominent members of the Trades and Labor Council are inclined favorably towards it and intend endeavor to work for its accomplishment.

'PHONE MATTER OFF TILL JUNE 20

Rothsley Rates Were to Be Taken up By Commission

COMPANY PRESIDENT ABSENT

Subscribers and Company Unable to Come to Terms, and Former Will Press for Decision by The Public Utilities Commission

The New Brunswick Public Utilities Commission met this morning in the provincial government rooms, Prince William street, to deal with the application of the New Brunswick Telephone Company for permission to place their Rothsley exchange in the same classification as others of the same size and to introduce a toll rate of ten cents on all messages between St. John and Rothsley. Owing to the absence of the president of the telephone company the hearing was adjourned until June 20 and the commission proceeded with routine business.

The chairman, G. O. D. Oty, presided, with Commissioners A. B. Connel, K.C., of Woodstock, and Felix Michael, of Lunenburg, and Secretary F. P. Robinson of Fredericton, present. W. A. Ewing, K.C., appeared for the New Brunswick Telephone company, and H. F. Puddington and E. S. Carter for the Rothsley subscribers.

At the meeting came to order at 10.30 o'clock, Mr. Ewing submitted affidavits showing that the meeting had been duly advertised in the St. John and Sussex papers. He then asked that the session should be adjourned on account of the absence of H. P. Robinson, president of the company.

Mr. Puddington announced that the Rothsley subscribers had met and appointed a committee to confer with representatives of the telephone company. The two committees had met, but the telephone people had made it clear that they would accept nothing in the way of a settlement except the arrangement for which they were asking the approval of the commission. Accordingly the subscribers had been forced to the conclusion that the only thing to do would be to proceed with the hearing.

The representatives of the subscribers wished to have in evidence certain data relating to the cost of the Rothsley exchange, the cost of maintenance, the profit which had been done to meet the requirements of a growing service. Counsel for the company agreed to produce this information at the next meeting.

POLICE REPORT 526 DOG-OWNERS IN DEBT TO CITY FOR LICENSES

Street Work Brings Report Against Superintendent—Two Against Coachman

Five hundred and twenty-six people in the southern section of the city have been reported by the police for having dogs in their possession without a license as the by-law requires.

A. A. Winchester, superintendent of the street department, has been reported by the police for allowing several loads of sand to be dumped in Waterloo street on the night of the 27th inst.

SOME ONE TAMPERING WITH THE LANTERNS

Lighting of Building Work Interrupted With

Three cases of violation of by-laws requiring lights on stagings and building materials in the streets came up in the police court this morning. Patrick Mooney was reported for having no light on a fence in front of the new Bank of British North America, Dock street, on the night of the 28th inst. Michael Clancy, who looks after the lights for Mr. Mooney testified that he filled and lighted them on the night in question. There was another report against Mr. Mooney for having no light last night on a pile of building material on Market square and Dock street. Mr. Clancy said, in this case, that he put a light on the pile about dusk. The case was allowed to stand over until tomorrow afternoon.
