

In its very essence the all-Canadian transportation policy is national, and the benefit which would flow to the Maritimes from it, however great, would be incidental. \* \* \* \* \*

Geographical draw-backs cannot well be dealt with by acts of parliament, and the United States Government is not likely to irame its tariff policy to meet the convenience of Canada. It is not unreasonable to ask the Dominion Government, however, to do all that lies in its power to remove unnecessary hindrances to Mari-time prosperity and happiness.
