FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Girls' Ibome, 1897.

"Behold the day is passing swiftly over; our life is passing swiftly over; and the night cometh wherein no man can work."

DEAR FRIENDS,-

The number of children in the Home, Sept. 30th, 1896, were 100. Since admitted, 58. Discharged, 70 Number in residence, Sept. 30th, 1897, 88.

Another year of active work (the forty-first) has been added to the history of the Girl's Home. Much has been accomplished of an encouraging character, and little has occurred of a discouraging We feel in a sense that it has been a Jubilee year, and in nature. commemmoration of it; and to keep in touch with those who were celebrating the "Golden Era," in this our beloved Queen's reign, the Directorate rented, in June, a house with grounds on Eglinton Ave., where the children could be sent, in detachments, and each child have at least three weeks genuine holiday of freedom and country life. Apart from showing the feeling of profound respect and affection-which we feel towards our "Mother Queen," and the sentiment of participating in ever so small a degree, in the "Jubilee festivities," the Directorate felt that this entire change would be of marked benefit to the little ones entrusted to their care, especially so, as scarlet fever had developed in November, and later on diphtheria Knowing all the trials of the winter, the Board rejoiced that through God's Providential care, kind friends had been so good to the Home, that they felt they were justified in using part of the money donated, to so good a purpose. The health of the children during the summer has been exceptionally good;

their brown sun-burnt faces testifying to their out door rambles ; the earnest hope is, that their continued good health will be the reward for the extra trouble and expense incurred in the under-As already mentioned, the children were attacked by taking. scarlet fever and diphtheria; most of the afflicted ones were sent to the Isolation Hospital, where they received every attention, and to whose staff we are deeply indebted ; but when their wards were full, it became necessary for our Board to engage a trained nurse to wait upon the children in our own Infirmary. The greatest care and watchfulness were given by our medical staff, to whom our sincere and grateful thanks are due for kind, unwearying services gratuitously rendered. All recovered except Blanche Silverthorne, who died on the 12th of May, a very delicate child convalescing from Bronchitis when admitted to the Home. All requiring vaccination have been vaccinated, but the Managers refer you to the Medical Officers' Report for further particulars. Grateful acknowledgements are made to Dr. Adams for his continued interest of kind attentions and dental services.

The Directorate are exceedingly grateful to their friends and subscribers for their continued sympathy and the support they give through their subscriptions; but they regret to have to report for this year a very large falling off in the regular house to house collections. They were insufficient, even when augmented by the Government and the City grants, to maintain the Home in the condition to which it has attained; therefore it was with extreme regret that the Managers had to encroach upon the legacies of this year, as they are desirous of using only the interest from the bequests.

The Managers earnestly strive to use to the best advantage all moneys so generously contributed. Still unforeseen expenses develop in so large an institution, which leave but a small balance at the end of the year. When this Home was erected, a tank, to supply the water demands of the house was put in on the top flat. This tank and its pipes had been for some time a constant source of annoyance and expense, until they became so thin and perforated, that they were beyond ordinary repair, in consequence, it was

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decided to have them removed, and to put the supply on the "pressure system," simply leaving a small tank, automatically constructed to supply the hot water coils. Apart from relieving the minds of the Directorate from the fear of a deluge, and the petty repairs, which amounted to a large sum annually, the Directorate think they have removed what may have influenced the health of the children. All drinking water came from this tank, so from a sanitary standpoint they hope the change will be of great benefit.

The Management are sometimes criticized for not teaching the children more household work. It would be well for those critics to visit the Home and judge for themselves, if whether or not there are idle moments, or drones in this "Bee Hive." Every child not in the nursery, has her daily allotted task of household work, she has the gymnasium for physical development and recreation, even the spare moments are profitably employed in darning, mending, etc. We have only to glance around us to see the power of bad habits; so it is the earnest endeavor of the management to sow the good seeds of application and industry with obedience, knowing that,

> "Never from the blasting thistle Was there gathered golden grain,"

and to bring these children up in such a manner that they may go through life respectable and respected. For this a certain amount of study and knowledge are necessary, and while they are in the Home, they receive a Public School education, under the able management of the Misses McKee and McMaster, whose interest in and devotion to their work cannot be too highly praised.

We generally find an interest in items of intelligence about the children individually, so our Cor. Sec. will give you some extracts from letters which she has received.

The Xmas dinner so liberally and kindly provided by friends was much enjoyed, but the Xmas festivities were marred, and the pleasure of receiving gifts from off a Xmas tree, had to be deferred to another year, owing to the Home being in "quarantine." In April quarantine was removed for a short time, when the opportunity was taken to have a musical and literary At Home. The impersonations and recitations were rendered in a very choice manner by Pauline Paddon, a genius of seven years; the Misses Rutter, Cameron, Corcoran, McConnel, each gave choice selections of music; after which the long expected gifts donated from many well wishees, were distributed to smiling happy recipients. This pleasure giving event was under the management of Mrs. Beatty and Miss Ellis, who spared no pains to have each child receive gifts that would be the most suitable and therefore, the more appreciated.

The lantern views, illustrative of the animal kingdom, with appropriate stories as related by Mr. Kelso, were instructive and entertaining, and were very much enjoyed by all present. The Directorate are again indebted to Mr. Withrow for his kind invitation to the Industrial Fair. The children consider this day at the Fair a great treat, and are filled with wonder and delight at all they see.

Our thanks are also due to Mr. James Carruthers, who, while enjoying the sights of the Oriental world, was mindful of the children's delight at Home. He generously gave the means for a Tally Ho drive to Olcotts, and the novel experience of "staying out to tea." The management of this bright and jolly pleasure was most successfully carried out by a friend, and thoroughly enjoyed by all the children.

Being in the country during the summer, the children only attended their respective picnics in connection with St. Peter's and All Saints' Sunday Schools to Rosebank and the Reservoir Park, both picnics were enjoyed and our grateful thanks are due to the Managers for the care and comfort they bestowed upon the children.

The Board desires to return grateful thanks for the continued grants from the Government and the City Council.

To their solicitor, Mr. Neville, for valuable advice, freely given. To Mr. Lee and Mr. Finch, for kindly auditing the financial statement, and to the many others, who have in any way remembered the needs or helped them throughout the year. The Sunday School is still under the Superintendency of Miss Elliot and her faithful band of helpers. The Ven. Arch Deacon Boddy continues his weekly Bible talks to the older girls; to all of these kind friends we are very grateful. We would also acknowledge the kindness of Mrs. Gartshaw, for her attention to the children while at the Églinton Home, and those kind neighbors and friends at Eglinton, who remembered with deeds of love the children during their holidays.

During the year we have to record the death of one of our Honorary Members, Mrs. Alcorn. The Directorate desire to express their appreciation of her services in the early history of the Home, and for the interest she continued to take in its welfare, even when removed from active duty.

Our esteemed Matron, Mrs. Bright, is still the valued Head of the Home, and with her assistants, makes it one of the model Institutions of the city.

We who are now permitted to take part in this work of sheltering and training young girls, providing homes for them, desire humbly to go forward in the Spirit of the Master. The gratitude and appreciation felt by those thus provided for, and the pleasure which they have brought into some of the homes where they have been placed, repay and encourage us to continue our labors, knowing that with God's blessing, Longfellow's words will be verified :

> "The wrong shall fail, The right prevail, With Peace on earth, good-will to men."

"Has pity lost her old-time loving touch? Does charity but seek herself to please? Nay, God be praised, kind hearts ever be For whom Christ's words are spoken—Inasmuch As ye have done it unto one of them, Ye have most truly done it on Me."

REPORT OF INDENTURE CHILDREN FOR 1897.

We have at present 33 children out under indenture.

During the year eight have been returned to the Home. Of these, one ran away, one was sent to her mother, one has been placed out for wages, and five are still in the Home.

^o Two of these five are incorrigible, one is simple minded and far safer in this Institution than out in the world, one will shortly be of age to leave us, and one is to be reindentured.

Four of our girls are in situations in Toronto, and earn wages. I must call attention to the extremely favorable report I have of all of them. They are becoming useful and respectable members of society, and when their time expires, will be found well fitted to care for themselves. They all possess bank books, and store their savings.

In regard to our incorrigibles, I find it strange that the Victoria School for girls of that class, will not relieve us of them, although we fine them a serious drawback to our work. The Victoria needs inmates. Why do they not receive these?

The contagious diseases which were in the Home were the causes of so few children leaving for homes of their own. Five girls have finished their terms of indenture, and four of them are remaining with those who brought them up, and are most comfortably and happily settled.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting, combined with the Anniversary Devotional Meeting, was held in the Board Room of the "Home," on Tuesday December 14th, at 10.30 a.m.

Rev. A. H. Baldwin occupied the chair, and opened the meeting by reading a portion of cxix. Psalm, after which Mr. Warring Kennedy led in prayer; then the hymn, "Sweet hour of prayer," was very sweetly sung by the children. The reading of the different reports by their respective officers' followed: the adoption of which was moved by Rev. Dr. Thomas, who gave an interesting and encouraging address, making "Love" the foundation-stone on which this praiseworthy work is carried on; seconded by Mr. Warring Kennedy, who emphasized the value of such a "Home" in forming the character of these children for their future.

The children then sang, "We plough the fields" in happy unison. Before closing the meeting, Mr. Baldwin spoke of the pleasure he always felt in visiting the "Girls' Home" and hearing of its success. Dr. Thomas led in prayer, and the meeting closed by all joining in the "Doxology." The children, marching two and two, wended their way to the dining-room, singing "Excelsior."

MEDICAL REPORT OF GIRLS' HOME, 1897.

Madam President and Ladies.-

The past year has been marked by a somewhat larger amount of illness than usual among the children, but though we have had two epidemics, neither of them was serious in character, and in only one case was the result fatal. Everything possible has been done to keep the Institution in good sanitary condition and to maintain the children in good health, and the results have certainly justified the large amount of work expended by the Board and staff in these directions.

In November, 1896, scarlet fever broke out among the children, and cases occurred at intervals until late in January of this year. Seven girls in all contracted the disease and were promptly sent to the Isolation Hospital, where they made excellent recoveries, and had all returned to the Home by the end of February.

Late in February, however, diphtheria made its appearance among the younger children, and those attacked, six in number, were also sent to the Isolation Hospital, with the exception of the one last taken ill, Blanche Silverthorne, who could not be admitted on account of the crowded condition of the hospital at that time. She apparently made an excellent recovery, though the attack was a severe one, and after being separated for six weeks from the others, was once more allowed to join them. In a few days, however, she again showed signs of illness, and on May 12th died somewhat suddenly, from what appeared to be a second attack of the disease.

It is almost impossible to determine the origin of these epidemics, especially the last, that of diphtheria, for when this occurred, the children had had no communication with the outside world for over two months.

In August two of the inmates of the Home were sent to the Orillia Asylum for the feeble-minded, where they can obtain the special attention demanded by their condition.

At the beginning of September, a case of whooping-cough occurred and was sent to the Toronto General Hospital, where she is making good progress toward recovery. Fortunately no other cases have as yet made their appearance.

The medical attendants have again to acknowledge their indebtedness to Mrs. Bright and her assistants, whose vigilance and intelligent help have been invaluable.

CONSTITUTION OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. This Institution shall be called the "GIRLS' HOME," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral and temporal welfare; also the maintenance and support of girls from two to fourteen years of age.

2. Children are given out to parties furnishing suitable references, on payment of five dollars in advance and five dollars per annum till the child is fifteen, then ten, fifteen and twenty dollars for the next three years respectively; these sums, except the first, to be invested for the said child's benefit and given to her at the expiration of her term of service.

3. The management shall be trusted to a Committee of not more than forty-five ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected by ballot Directresses, Treasurer, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Superintendent of Districts. All vacancies shall be filled by ballot, on a majority vote at a monthly meeting after at least one week's notice. Should it happen at any meeting that no directress be present, then the ladies in attendance, if sufficient to form a quorum, may elect some one of their number to take the chair, the lady so appointed to have, for the time being, the same authority in all respects as Directress.

4. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alteration must always be given to the Board, at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF

THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held every Tuesday, at 10.30 a.m., the first Tuesday in the month being the day of the Monthly Meeting, for which all important business shall be deferred. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.

2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer, and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present, which shall consist of five members at a monthly and three at a Weekly Meeting, being conducted in the following order : (1st.) The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed, or in case of a Monthly Meeting, the minutes of all the meetings during the past month; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read the general Reports of the condition of the Institution.

(2nd.) The presiding lady shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and, if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as a member of the Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation not addressed to the presiding lady shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4 Any lady allowing three months to pass without being present, or notifying her inability to attend to the Secretary, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fee, keeping account of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month

6. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep account of all children given out from the Home, and correspond with them at least once a year, and shall keep account of and read all correspondence respecting them, at the Board Meetings.

7. The Secretary of Districts shall arrange with the collectors all details of the districts to be visited, and take charge of the lists of subscription for the Annual Report.

8. The Secretary shall direct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all children in the Institution giving a general report thereof at the Monthly Meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

9. Two members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to **visit** the **Home** daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the Regular Weekly Meetings. The 1st Directress, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, and Secretary shall not be of the number of Daily Visitors.

10. Any three Managers, including a Directress, may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with a doctor's certificate insuring them to be free from disease.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MATRON AND CHILDEN OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the girls between the ages of five and fourteen, in sewing, knitting and household work.

2. She shall admit any applicant not younger than two years, or older than fourteen, upon a doctor's certificate—subject always to the approval of the Board.

3. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be five dollars per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction may be made as approved by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.

4. The Matron shall daily inspect the cleanliness of the children, see that they attend the day school punctually and regularly, and every morning and evening conduct family prayers.

5. The children shall rise at 6 a.m., from May 1st to October 31st, and at 7 a.m. from November 1st to April 30th. The time for going to rest to be from 5 to 8 p.m.

Children under fourteen are not allowed to wash or scrub more than three hours a day.

6. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a.m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals by the elder children. The Matron and one servant to be present.

7. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday-School, and also Divine Service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron, or some other competent person, and in the afternoon attend the Sunday-school in the Institution.

8. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them on Wednesday afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock. Persons wishing to come on other days must obtain a permit from the Board.

9. The Home shall be open to the public any afternoon during the week.

TERMS OF INDENTURE OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

Parties taking a child from the Home are required to provide the said child, during the whole period of service, --viz., till the child is eighteen years of age-with all necessary and proper food, clothing, lodging, medicine and medical attendance, to bring her up in the principles of the Protestant religion, to pay due attention to her moral and spiritual culture, and to allow her to attend Sunday School and place of worship regularly, to instruct the child in reading , writing and plain needle work, and in general household duties, to pay into the Home in advance, the sum of five dollars ; and at the end of the first and each year of service until the child attains the age of fourteen, the sum of five dollars ; when fifteen, ten dollars ; when sixteen, fifteen dollars ; when seventeen, twenty dollars ; which money is invested by the Board for the child's benefit; and further, to provide the said child, at the expiration of her term of service with a good new suit of clothes. In case, through protracted illness or death, or any other cause, the parties fail to carry out their various obligations, the Home reserve to themselves the right of resuming their control over the child, or of taking such measures to secure her rights as they may deem necessary.

In case the parties taking a child shall not be satisfied with her, they have the power of returning her to the Home, after satisfying the Board that such action would be to the interest of all concerned.
