GERMANS STRIKING BACK IN CHAMPAGNE SUMMOND BY

Making Determined Effort to Divert General Nivelle From His Ceaseless Pounding of Shaken Hindenburg Line-French, How-New ever, Are Advancing Steadily-Critics Believe Huns Intend to Withdraw to Belgian Border

The Germans are striking back in Champagne in a determined effort to divert General Nivelle from his ceaseless pounding at the base of the shaken Hindenburg line. The scene of the counter offensive launched by Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is along a fifteen mile front starting about 25 miles east of Rheims. Attacking in force in this sector the Germans have driven the French from some of their advance trenches but have failed so far to make a serious

NTIME FRENCH ADVANCING

In the meantime the iron semicircle, which General Nivelle has thrown round the southern half of the great St. Gobain plateau is steadily contracting. If the French maintain their present rate of advance it can only be a matter of a very few days before the entire plateau is in their grasp, removing the last great natural barrier to Laon. The British are moving forward steadily to the north but the fact that they are capturing villages with cavalry indicates that they are not yet in contact with the main German forces. The most advanced British outposts are still ten miles from the Cambrai line, where allied observers have assumed the Germans propose to make their real

HUNS TO WITHDRAW TO BELGIAN BORDER?

Military critics in Paris and London are reverting to the belief that the present German retreat is only part of the plan for a retirement on a tremendous scale to the Belgian border. In support of this theory it is pointed out that the withdrawal from the Noyon and Bapaume salients is rapidly forcing the whole German line into the form of an immense right angle. The upright of this angle runs north and south for 120 miles from Nieuport on the Belgian coast to Laon. The horizontal runs for about an equal distance east to the Lorraine border. It is into the apex of this angle that General Nivelle is boring his way, threatening to cut the forces of the invaders squarely in two.

IN BAVARIA VERY SERIOUS

Minister of Interior Draws Gloomy Picture of People's Suffering-Friction Between North and South Germany Due to the Administration of the War

London, March 29—A gloomy picture of the food situation in Bavaria was frawn by minister of the interior, Gret triech in an address before the landtag on Tuesday according to a Berne dispatch to Reuter's. Minister Brettreich is quoted as saying that the recent stock taking had shown that conditions were very serious, and that there was a deficiency of 90,000 tons in Bavarian bread-stuffs. Conditions outside Bavaria, he said, were even more unfavorable.

The minister said that it could not be denied that during the war a certain friction had arisen between north and south Germany, chiefly due to the administration of the war. He said there were more than seventy different war organ-- Reported Governor Nego- izations in Germany and that a greater consolidation would have been prefertiating for House Now Occupied able. After predicting that the coming weeks would be very hard on the people, he concluded: "But we must hold out. If we lie down England will squeeze the blood out of our fingernalis. OF TERRIFIC SNOW STORM

Great Victory Won By British Over The Turkish Forces

London, March 29-The entire divisional staff of the Fiftythird Turkish Division in Palestine has been captured by the Britit is announced officially

The statement says that British troops have advanced for a distance of fifteen miles along the southern Palestine coast of the Mediterranean. The British forces have pushed forward from Rafa to the Wadi Ghuzzeh, a river five miles south of Gaza (Ghuzzeh). Gaza is twenty miles north of the Egyptian-Syrian boundary.

London, March 29-The British army in Palestine has defeated a Turkish army of 20,000 men, capturing 900 men, including a general. The war office announces this.

The text of the official statement reads: "Telegraphing yesterday the commander-in-chief in Egypt reports that we advanced our troops fifteen miles from Rafa to the Wadi Ghuzzeh, five miles south of Gaza, to cover the construction of a railway.

"On Monday and Tuesday we were heavily engaged in this neighborhood with a force of about 20,000 of the enemy. We inflicted very heavy losses on him, taking 900 prisoners, including the general commanding and the whole divisional staff of the 53rd Turkish Division. These figures include four Austrian officers and thirtytwo Austrians and Germans of other ranks. We also captured two Austrian 4.2 inch howitzers.

"All the troops behaved splendidly, especially the troops of the Welsh, Kent, Sussex, Hereford, Middlesex and Surrey regiments and the Anzac and Yeomanry Mounted Troops.







British House Votes In Favor of Principle - Sound Death-Knell for Party Government

London, March 28—After an interesting debate today the house of commons, by a majority of 279, expressed approval of legislation on the lines of the speaker's conference recommendations for franchise reforms. The small minority postponing legislation of such a con-centious character until after the war. The great feature of the debate was the frank acceptance by ex-Premier Asquith and Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, of woman's right to

As a result of the debate, the government, as Mr. Bonar Law announced, will proceed with legislation to give effect to the recommendations of the conference. The bill will embody all of the recommendations expect proceed to the recommendations expect to the recommendations. The bill will embody all of the recommendations, except proportional representation and woman's suffrage. These will be omitted, first, because the government is still undecided on the question, and second, because it is held that parliament, must first of all, express acceptance of the principle of woman's suffrage. The present idea is to make the bill as little contentious as possible, so that the second reading may be easily secured; then, in committee, these two excepted questions may be raised as amendments to the bill, thus giving the house an opportunity to record its opinion.

It cannot be doubted that the views expressed today by Mr. Asquith, Walter Hume Long and other prominent former opponents of woman's suffrage, will influence many other opposing members, and in any case during the war this opposition has been a rapidly dwindling one. It is still possible that the women may have to wait until after the war for the fullest recognition of their claims, is now certain. 

ST. LOUIS RAN AT FURIOUS SPEED

Saw Evidences Three Ships Had Been Sunk

Captain Did Not Leave Bridge for Three Days and Nights-First Armed American to Cross to England

London, Monday, March 26 (Delayed by censor.) (From a staff correspondent of the Associated Press)-The St. Louis, the first passenger vessel carrying the American flag to cross the Atlantic since Germany's declaration of unre-stricted submarine destruction, and the first American armed liner to enter European port since the war began, arrived this morning. She carried a meagre number of passengers—33 all told—but her holds were filled to capacity with non-contraband freight.

The St. Louis came through without interpretary No submarines were sight. nterruption. No submarines were sight ed, nor was there at any time any indi-cation that German undersea boats were cation that German undersea boats were after the big liner. If any of them saw the St. Louis they made no attempt to destroy her, but kept carefully away from the guns of the American ship.

Saw Driftwood and Field of Oil

But signs of war were not lacking, and the last three days aboard were anxious ones for passengers and crew alike. On Friday and again on Saturday, after the St. Louis entered the forbidden zone, driftwood was passed—apparently parts of destroyed lifeboats. Yesterday a great field of oil was countered. Vague rumors of the sink-ling of ships either ahead of or near the St. Louis increased the nervous tension.

For three days and nights the captain did not leave the bridge, and never in her twenty-two years of existence has the American ship been driven so furiously as she was from the time she passed into the zone until she was picked up by a pilot.




