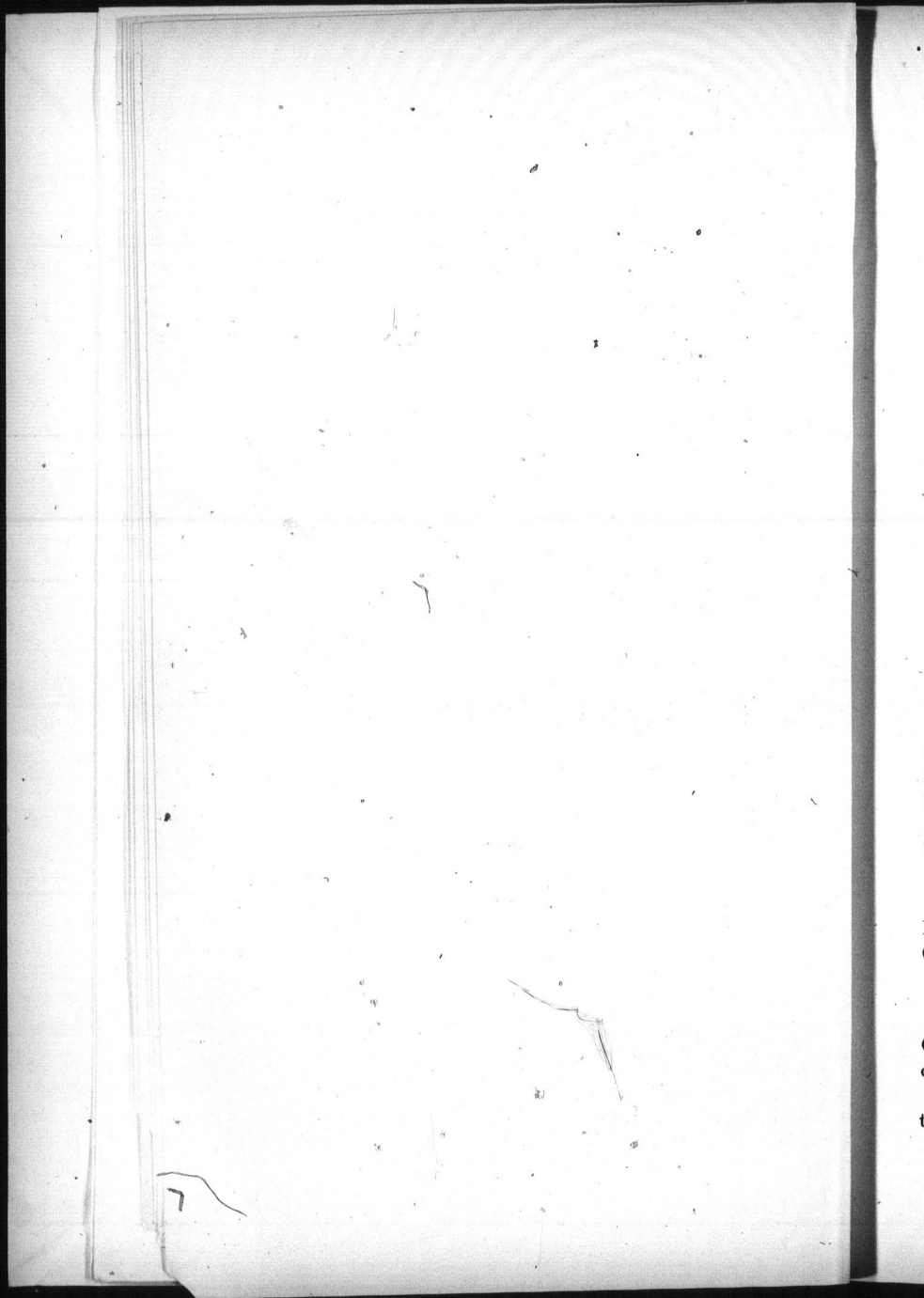

Trinity University.

TRINITY University was constituted by a Royal Charter bearing date 15th July, 1852, and was thereby endowed with all such powers of conferring degrees in the various Faculties as are enjoyed by the Universities of Great Britain.

The fundamental object of the University is to supply to the people of the Province an academic education of the highest kind, in which secular instruction shall not be dissociated from religious teaching. The University is under the control of the Church of England, but open to all who desire to avail themselves of its advantages.

GOVERNMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

By the provisions of the Royal Charter, the government of the University is vested in the Corporation, which body, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada (15 Vict. ch. 32), is composed of: 1. The Bishops of the six dioceses into which the original Diocese of Toronto has been divided; 2. The Trustees (three in number); 3. The Council.

The Council is made up of the following classes of members:

EX OFFICIO MEMBERS.

The Chancellor and Ex-Chancellors of the University, the Provost and Professors in Arts and Divinity in Trinity College, and the Registrar of the University.

MEMBERS NOMINATED.

By the Bishops of Toronto, Huron, Ontario, Niagara, and Ottawa, four members each, representing their respective dioceses.

By each Medical, Musical, or Theological College affiliated to the University, one member.

MEMBERS ELECTED.

By the Graduates in Arts and Divinity who are Members of Convocation (see below), eight members, to hold office for four years, two retiring annually.

By the Graduates in Law, two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the Graduates in Medicine who are Members of Convocation, two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the Associate Members of Convocation (see below), two members, to hold office for two years, one retiring annually.

By the whole Corporation, nine members, elected for four years, of whom at least two shall be engaged in educational work in the High School system of the Province.

CONVOCAATION.

By the provisions of the Royal Charter, and in accordance with the practice of the English Universities, the Convocation of the University consists of (in addition to the Chancellor, the Provost, and Professors of Trinity College), all Graduates in Divinity, Law, or Medicine, and all Graduates in Arts of the standing of M.A., who from the time of their admission to these degrees have paid annually the sum of five dollars towards the funds of the University.

All degrees must be passed by Convocation before they can be granted by the University, and the Supplicats for each degree must have been previously approved by a Committee of Convocation called the Caput.

Convocation has also been placed by the Corporation in the position of a Standing Committee of that body, so that its members are in this way enabled, through their representatives, to formally lay their resolutions before the governing body of the University. Convocation is represented by fourteen members on the Corporation. (See above.)

An annual meeting for the transaction of business and granting degrees is, held every year in Michaelmas Term.

Other meetings for granting degrees are held : for Degrees in Medicine and Dentistry, in June ; for Degrees in all Faculties, in October.

Graduates not qualified as above to become members of Convocation, and other friends of the University, may become Associate Members of Convocation by the same annual payment of five dollars. All candidates for associate membership must be approved by the Executive Committee of Convocation.

Associates have the right of speaking, but not of voting, at meetings of Convocation. They also elect annually a member of the Corporation. (See above.)

Local Associations of Convocation have been formed in the chief centres of Ontario. Members and associates have equal privileges in the government of the Local Associations. Each Local Association elects one member to represent it upon the Executive Committee of Convocation.

There are at present about 250 members and associates of Convocation.

The Chancellor of the University is elected for a period of five years by the members of Convocation in good standing.

The Provost of Trinity College is *ex officio* Vice-Chancellor of the University.

The Caput consists of the Vice-Chancellor and four members of Convocation, to be elected by Convocation at the annual October meeting for conferring degrees.

The Degrees of the University are open to all persons without any religious test, except in the case of Degrees in Divinity, candidates for which are required to subscribe to a declaration of membership in the Church of England, and to the three Articles of the XXXVIth Canon.

Subjects of Her Majesty are required to make a declaration of allegiance before proceeding to their degrees.

Boards of Study in the different Faculties, consisting of *ex officio* and elected members, advise the Corporation, through the Executive Committee, as to the nomination of Examiners, changes in the Curriculum, etc., in their respective departments.

Benefactions.

The original Endowment of the University was collected by the indefatigable exertions of its founder, the Right Rev. John Strachan, D.D., the first Bishop of Toronto, and those whom his Lordship associated with himself in this work.

Amongst these the Venerable A. N. Bethune, D.D., Archdeacon of York, afterwards Bishop of Toronto; the Rev. William McMurray, D.D., D.C.L., Rector of Niagara, and afterwards Archdeacon of Niagara; the Rev. T. B. Fuller, D.D., afterwards Bishop of Niagara; and the Rev. Saltern Givens, D.C.L., are worthy of special and grateful mention.

In addition to the offerings of Canadian Churchmen, amounting to over \$100,000, most liberal assistance, exceeding \$50,000, was obtained from England, including the following donations:

The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, £2,000 and seven and a-half acres of land in the city of Toronto.

The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, £3,000.
The University of Oxford, £500.

From members of the Sister Church in the United States, \$10,000, collected by the Ven. Archdeacon McMurray, D.C.L.

The following Benefactions have been subsequently given:

1853.—Dr. Burnside, \$24,000.

1864.—Collected in England by Archdeacon McMurray, \$20,000, and by Rev. W. S. Darling, \$2,500.

1865.—Hon. James Gordon, \$2,000.

1866.—Enoch Turner, Esq., Toronto, \$8,000.

1871.—Thomas Clark Street, Esq., \$4,000

1876.—Family of the late James Henderson, Esq., \$4,000.

These last two amounts were appropriated towards the erection of Convocation Hall, opened in 1877.

1882.—Supplemental Endowment Fund, raised by the Provost and Rev. R. H. Starr, D.D., partly in England, amounting to \$85,000.

In this sum is included a donation of \$10,000 from the Henderson family, specially appropriated to the erection of the College Chapel, and a grant of £3,000 from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, who required a further sum of £6,000 to be raised to meet it as follows:—

£1,500 towards the Endowment of three Fellowships, to meet £3,000 to be otherwise raised for the same purpose.

£1,000 for an additional building to accommodate twenty Students, on condition that £1,500 more was raised.

£500 to endow a Lectureship in History, on condition that £1,500 more was raised.

These grants have now been paid. The new building was opened in Michaelmas Term, 1890, and Fellowships in Theology, Classics, and Natural Science, as well as the Lectureship in History, have been founded, the last by the aid of Convocation having been raised to a Professorship.

In 1890 the Rev. Algernon Boys, Professor of Classics, left his estate of the value of \$6,400 to the Corporation subject to the payment of four per cent. per annum during the lives of certain relatives.

The following Benefactions have been made specially appropriated to Scholarships or Exhibitions:—

1852.—Two Scholarships, founded by the first Duke of Wellington.

1853.—Two Scholarships, founded in memory of the late Dr. Burnside.

1860.—The Prince of Wales' Prizes, being the interest on \$800 given by H. R. H. the Prince of Wales on the occasion of his visit to Toronto.

1860.—Two Scholarships, founded by the late William Dickson, Esq., of Galt.

1862.—The Pettit Scholarship in Theology, left by W. T. Pettit, Esq.

1866.—The Cooper Exhibitions, being the interest on \$4,000 left by C. W. Cooper, Esq., of Mount Pleasant.

89.—The Talbot Exhibitions in Divinity, being the interest on \$4,000 left by J. Talbot, Esq., of Cartwright.

1890.—The Palmer Exhibition in Divinity, being the interest on a debenture of \$1,000 issued by the Chapter of S. Alban's Cathedral, given in memory of the late Ven. Archdeacon Palmer, M.A., D.C.L., by his widow.

By means of the Annual payments of Members and Associates of Convocation, grants have been made towards augmenting the stipends of the Professor of History, the Lecturer on Modern Languages, and the Fellow in Natural Science.

FORM OF DEVISE OF LAND TO TRINITY COLLEGE.

Fees for Tuition and Board.

Although residence within the College buildings for Students in Arts is not in all cases compulsory, it is strongly recommended. The common Collegiate life, after the pattern of the Colleges of the English Universities, is in itself a training of great importance. A new residence containing two lecture rooms, and accommodation for two Professors and twenty Students, was opened in October, 1894, the accommodation previously existing being found altogether inadequate.

Students in Arts are ordinarily required to reside in College, but those whose parents live in Toronto are exempted from such residence, and the same privilege is granted by the Executive Committee in other cases on sufficient cause being shown. See page 81, first paragraph.

The Tuition Fees are \$65 per annum.

The charge for board of Resident Students in Arts is \$130 per annum, and for students in Divinity \$100 per annum.

These fees are payable for Arts Students in three instalments, and for Divinity Students in two instalments, terminally, in advance, and on payment being made during the first fortnight of term a discount of 10 per cent. is allowed. The rent of College rooms varies from \$5 to \$18 per term.

The Laboratory Fees are \$2.50 per term for Chemistry, \$1 per term for Physics, \$2 per term for Natural Science Pass Students and \$3 per term for Natural Science Honour Students.

The Steward's account for fuel and extras averages \$15 per annum. Students have to provide their own bedding, carpets, etc.; the heavy furniture being supplied by the College. They will also require a cap and gown and a surplice for use in Chapel.

The rooms in College will be assigned to resident Students on the first day of Michaelmas Term, beginning at 9 a.m. Letters received by the Dean after September 20th, will be taken into consideration, but it is recommended that Students should be present on October 3rd, to look after their own interests. Each Student will be held responsible for damage done to his rooms, all damage to the College premises other than Students' rooms will be charged to an account and assessed on the Students generally. If, however, any Student who has done such damage reports it to the Bursar it will be charged to him and not to the common account.

The fees for Occasional Students are \$1 per term for each pass lecture per week, and \$2 for each honour lecture per week, the minimum to be \$5 per term, and any Occasional Student taking more than six lectures per week to pay the full tuition fee.

Students on admission to College are required to make a deposit of \$10 with the Bursar which will be refunded when their final account is settled.

Matriculation.

I. ARTS.

The Examination in July will be that conducted for the Universities by the Education Department, and will begin on July 5th, 1899. The Examination will be held at Trinity College, Toronto, and at the various Collegiate Institutes and High Schools of the Province. Candidates for this Examination, if they propose to write at a High School or Collegiate Institute, must notify the Inspector and pay him the fee before May 23rd, and should at the same time send notice to the University Registrar, on a form which will be supplied on application. Candidates proposing to write at Trinity College must send the required notice to the Registrar by May 23rd, accompanied by a certificate of good character and the fee. A second Examination will begin at Trinity College on September 22nd. Notice for this Examination, together with the fee, must be sent to the Registrar by September 1st, on a form which will be supplied on application. A Candidate who failed partially in July and desires to complete the Examination in September and who did not write at Trinity College, must send a copy of the marks obtained in the July Examination, certified by the Head Master of the school where he wrote, on a form which will be provided by the Registrar. In July the fees will be \$2 for Part I., \$5 for Part II., \$5 for Parts I. and II. taken together, for Candidates completing the Examinations \$2 for one or two departments, \$5 for more departments than two. In September the fee is \$5 if one department is taken, and \$10 if more than one department is taken. The Candidate for Matriculation must have entered on his sixteenth year.

II. LAW.

The Candidate for Matriculation in this Faculty must have passed the Arts Matriculation Examination of Trinity University, or of some other recognized University, or the Primary Examination of the Law Society of Upper Canada, and have paid the Matriculation Fee of \$5.

III. MEDICINE.

The Candidate for Matriculation in this Faculty may proceed in the following ways :

(a) By passing the Matriculation Examination in Arts or Medicine of Trinity University, or of some other recognized University.

(b) By passing the Matriculation Examination accepted by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario or Quebec, or the Primary Examinations of the Law Society of Upper Canada.

(c) By passing an Examination recognized as equivalent to any of the above.

MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.
ARTS.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

Candidates for Matriculation must furnish satisfactory certificates of good character and conduct.

Candidates in the July Examination who fail in not more than one paper in Part I., or two departments in Part II., may be permitted by the Examiners to present themselves for examination in the papers in which they failed at the Supplemental Examination in the September following, or in the next July Examination.

The same privileges shall be allowed in the same circumstances, in the succeeding July Examination to candidates who have presented themselves for the first time in September, or taken the complete Examination in September.

A Candidate for Matriculation who has failed in the July Examination for Second Class Teachers' Certificates, but reckoning the subjects in which he has satisfied the Departmental Examiners, does not require more than three departments to complete the Matriculation Examinations, will be allowed to take these subjects at the succeeding September Examination, or in the next July Examination.

The standard for honours in any department is 67 per cent. for First Class and 50 per cent. for Second Class.

REGULATIONS FOR 1899.

All Candidates for Matriculation shall take the following subjects:—Latin, English, History, Mathematics, French, or German, and either (1) Greek or (2) the second Modern Language with Physics and Chemistry.

The Examination may be divided into the following two parts, which may be taken in either order and in a different year:—(I.) Arithmetic and Mensuration, English Grammar and Rhetoric, Physics, and the History of Great Britain and Canada; (II) Greek, Latin, French, German, English Composition, English Literature, Ancient History, Algebra, Geometry, and Chemistry.

Divinity may be substituted for Physics.

The percentage for Pass shall be thirty-three and one-third per cent. on each paper of the Examination taken by the Candidate.

The marks for sight-work on each of the "Authors" papers shall constitute at least thirty-three and one-third per cent. of the whole of the marks for the paper.

Second Class Teachers' or Junior Leaving certificates will be accepted *pro tanto* at both Part I. and Part II. of the Pass Matriculation Examination, but Candidates who desire to compete for scholarships or relative standing will not be granted this exemption in the case of Part II.

PASS EXAMINATION.

PART I.

ENGLISH GRAMMAR AND RHETORIC.

The main facts in the development of the language. Etymology and Syntax, including the inflection, classification and elementary analysis of words, and the logical structure of the sentence. Rhetorical structure of the sentence and paragraph. As far as possible the questions shall be based on passages from authors not prescribed.

ARITHMETIC AND MENSURATION.

Arithmetic.—Proofs of Elementary Rules; Fractions (Theory and Proofs); Commercial Arithmetic.

Mensuration.—Rectilinear figures, Right Parallelepipeds, Prisms and Pyramids; Circle, Sphere, Cylinder and Cone.

HISTORY OF GREAT BRITAIN AND CANADA.

Great Britain and Canada from 1763 to 1871, with the outlines of the preceding periods of British History.

The Geography relating to the History prescribed.

PHYSICS.

An experimental course defined as follows:—

Metric system of weights and measures. Use of the balance. Phenomena of gravitation. Matter attracts matter. Law of attraction. Cavendish experiment. Attraction independent of condition. Illustration of weight of gases, liquids, and solids. Specific gravity.

Meaning of the term "a form of matter." All matter may be subjected to transmutation; "Chemistry;" application of measure-

ment by weight (mass) to such transmutation leads to the theory of elements. Matter indestructible.

Meaning of "Force." Various manifestations of force, with illustrations from the phenomena of electricity, magnetism, and heat. Force measured in gravitation units; consequent double meaning of the terms expressing units of weight as mass, and units of weight as force.

Meaning of "Work." Measurement of work in gravitation units. Meaning of "Energy."

Effects of force continuously applied to matter. Laws of matter in motion. Velocity. Acceleration. Statement of Newton's Laws of Motion. Definition of "Mass." Meaning, value, and application of "g." Mass a measure of matter.

Conservation of Energy. Energy, like matter, indestructible and transmutable.

Study of the three states of matter. Properties and laws of gases, liquids, and solids. Laws of diffusion.

Elementary laws of heat. Mechanical equivalent. Latent heat. Specific heat. Calorie.

DIVINITY. (OPTION FOR PHYSICS IN PART I.)

To be examined on in September.

Grammatical questions on the passages from prescribed texts shall be set, and such other questions as arise naturally from the context. Translation from English into Greek of sentences and of easy narrative passages based upon the prescribed prose texts.

Grammatical questions on the passages from prescribed texts shall be set, and such other questions as arise naturally from the context.

Translation from English into Latin of sentences and of easy narrative passages based upon the prescribed prose texts.

The Candidate's knowledge of Grammar will be tested mainly by questions based upon prose extracts.

The Examination in Composition will consist of (a) translation into French of short English sentences as a test of the Candidate's knowledge of grammatical forms and structure, (b) formation in French of sentences of similar character, and (c) translation of passages from English into French.

Translation at sight of modern French, to which special importance will be attached. Candidates will be expected to have supplemented the reading of the following texts by additional practice in the translation of French:—

ENGLISH.

The Candidate should also give attention to the structure of the whole essay, the effective ordering of the thought, and the accurate employment of a good English vocabulary. About three pages of foolscap is suggested as the proper length for the essay; but quality, not quantity, will be mainly regarded.

Literature.—Such questions only shall be set as may serve to test the Candidate's familiarity with, and intelligent and appreciative comprehension of, the prescribed texts. The Candidate will be expected to have memorized some of the finest passages, and to have read carefully both prose and poetry outside of the specified work. In addition to questions on the following selections, others shall be set on a "sight passage" to test the Candidate's ability to interpret literature for himself :—

Electricity.—Voltaic cells, common kinds ; chemical action in the cell ; magnetic effects of the current ; chemical effects of the current ; voltameter ; astatic and tangent galvanometers ; simple notions of potential ; Ohm's Law, with units ; best arrangement of cells ; electric light, arc and incandescent ; magnetism ; inclination and declination of compass ; current induction ; induction coil ; dynamo and motor ; electric bell ; telegraph ; telephone ; electroplating.

Sound.—Caused by vibrations; illustrations of vibrations, pendulums, rods, strings, membranes, plates, columns of air; propagated by waves; its velocity; determination of velocity; pitch; standard forks, acoustical, $C=512$, musical, $A=870$; intervals; harmonic scale; diatonic scale; equally tempered scale; vibration of air in open and closed tubes, with wave-lengths; resonators; nodes and loops; vibration of strings and wires; reflection of sound; manometric flames.

Light.—Rectilinear propagation; image through a pin-hole; beam, pencil; photometry; shadow and grease-spot photometers; reflection and scattering of light; laws of reflection, images in plane mirrors; multiple images in inclined mirrors; concave and convex mirrors; drawing images; refraction; laws and index of refraction; total reflection; path through a prism; lenses; drawing image produced by a lens; simple microscope; dispersion and colour spectrum; recombination of white light.

CHEMISTRY.

Chemical Theory.—The practical study of the following elements, with their most characteristic compounds, in illustration of Mendeleeff's Classification of the Elements; Hydrogen; Sodium, Potassium; Magnesium, Zinc; Calcium, Strontium, Barium; Boron, Aluminium; Carbon, Silicon, Tin, Lead; Nitrogen, Phosphorus, Arsenic, Antimony, Bismuth; Oxygen, Sulphur; Fluorine, Chlorine, Bromine, Iodine; Manganese, Iron. Elementary Qualitative Analysis.

BIOLOGY.

1. Elements of Zoology.

Thorough examination of the external form, the gills and the viscera of some common fish. Study of the prepared skeleton of the same. Demonstration of the arrangement of the muscular and nervous systems and the sense-organs, as far as these can be studied without the aid of the microscope.

Comparison of the structure of the frog with that of the fish. The skeleton of the pectoral and pelvic girdles, and of the appendages of the frog, should be studied and the chief facts in the development of its spawn observed, till the adult form is attained.

Examination of the external form of a turtle and a snake.

Examination of the structure of a pigeon or a fowl.

Study of the skeleton, and also of the teeth and viscera of a cat or dog.

Study of a crayfish as a type of the Arthropods.

Comparison of the crayfish with an insect (grasshopper, cricket or cockroach); also with a millipede and a spider.

Examination of an earthworm and a leech.

Study of a fresh water mussel and a pond-snail.

The principles of zoological nomenclature as illustrated by some of the common fresh-water fishes, such as the sucker and herring, bass and perch.

Study of an ameba or paramecium as a type of a unicellular animal.

The modifications of the form of the body in vertebrates in connection with different methods of locomotion.

2. Elements of Botany.

The Examination will test whether the Candidate has practically studied representatives of the flowering plants of the locality in which the preparatory school is situated, and representatives of the chief sub-divisions of cryptogams, such as a fern, a lycopod, a horsetail, a liverwort, a moss, a lichen, a mushroom, and a chara.

An elementary knowledge of the microscopic structure of the Bean and the Maize. Attention will be given in the Examination to the drawing and description of parts of plants supplied, and to their classification. Comparison of different organs, morphology of root, stem, leaves, and hair, parts of the flower, reproduction of flowering plants, pollination, fertilization, and the nature of fruits and seeds.

BACHELOR OF ARTS.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

All Candidates for this Degree must be Matriculated Students of Trinity University, and have kept nine terms. They will be required by the University to pass the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations.

No change in the Curriculum shall affect any Student who has registered before March 1st, in the year in which such change is announced in the Calendar, but Students who degrade into a lower year shall come under the regulations affecting the year into which they have degraded.

Students may be admitted to College by the Provost without Matriculation ; but if they have not written in the Supplemental Matriculation Examination they must pay a fee of \$5, and they cannot be registered with the University or receive a certificate of registration until they have passed the Primary Examination.

In order that a Student may keep a term, he must attend seventy-five per cent. of the Lectures delivered in the term by each Professor or Lecturer whose Lectures he is required to take ; and, if resident in College, attend sixty per cent., if living in lodgings, fifty per cent. of the Chapels of the term, and if residing at home, sixty per cent. of the morning Chapels of Sundays and Holy-days.

Students attending Lectures in Trinity College will not be allowed to present themselves at the Primary, Previous, or Final Examinations, unless they have passed the Christmas College Examination, held at the end of the Michaelmas Term, on the work read in Lecture during the Term, or the

Supplemental Examination, held at the end of the Lent Term, on the work read in Lecture during Michaelmas and Lent Terms, of the First, Second or Third Year respectively. The marks obtained in this Examination by Candidates in the First and Second Years, are also reckoned in the awarding of Scholarships in June, in case of equality in the June Examination.

In the Primary, Previous and Final Examinations for the Degree of B.A., the Candidate must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and forty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination he is required to take.

The Examination of Form IV. of the Department of Education will be accepted *pro tanto* for the Primary Examination.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

The keeping of terms may be dispensed with in individual cases, in which application to that effect shall have been made to the Executive Committee, and the grounds assigned by the applicant unanimously approved by the Committee. In such cases the applicant must not be less than twenty-five years of age, and will be required to matriculate and to pass the Primary, the Previous and the Final Examinations, at intervals of not less than those which are prescribed in cases of Resident Students. The Executive Committee is, however, empowered to accept equivalent Examinations for the Primary and Previous Examinations. The fee for each June Examination will be \$10.

Students attending any Divinity School in connection with the Church of England, will be admitted to the Degree of B.A., on condition of passing the usual Examinations, viz., the Matriculation, the Primary, the Previous, and Final Examinations, at the accustomed time, the Candidate producing on each occasion the necessary certificate from the authorities of his Divinity School, viz., at the Matriculation Examination, that he has been admitted as a Student of the

School, and at the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations, that he has kept at least the requisite number of terms, and that he is in good standing. Students who do not reside for so long a period as three years may be admitted to the Degree of B.A., on condition of keeping at Trinity College the rest of the terms required, and of passing the necessary Examinations. Or they may make, severally, applications to the Executive Committee to be allowed to avail themselves of the Statute under which Candidates are admitted to the Degree of B.A., by examination only. Candidates who hold the certificate of S. Augustine's College, Canterbury, will be exempted from the Matriculation Examination.

Students-at-law of Osgoode Hall, or Students of any Medical College, may be admitted to the Degree of B.A., if during their Course of Law or Medicine, respectively, they have kept three terms in Trinity College, and have passed the Matriculation, the Primary, Previous, and Final Examinations for the Degree of B.A.

Undergraduates of other Universities may, at the discretion of the Provost, be admitted *ad eundem statum*, up to the end of the Second Year, provided they have kept their terms by attending Lectures and passing Examinations, the fee for admission being \$5

SUPPLEMENTAL EXAMINATIONS.

Those Students who shall have been rejected at the Regular Examination of their own year, or who shall have been absent from such Examination, may present themselves, the latter with the consent of the Executive Committee, at a Supplemental Examination which will begin on September 22nd, and those who then fail to pass will be required to attend the same Examination in the succeeding year.

Students who have failed at their Annual Regular Examination in not more than three departments, may be permitted, if the Examiners think fit, to present themselves for examination in those departments only, at the following Supplemental Examination.

Students proposing to attend the Supplemental Examination are required to pay a fee of \$5 if one department only is taken, and \$10 if more than one are taken, which fee, together with a notice of his intention to present himself for examination, the Candidate must present to the Registrar, on or before September 1st.

Candidates taking the whole Examination in September as a Supplemental cannot be allowed the Examination unless they pass in all the subjects thereof.

HONOUR EXAMINATION AT B.A.

Candidates may take the Degree of B.A. with Honours in the following departments: (I.) Classics; (II.) Mathematics; (III.) Theology; (IV.) Mental and Moral Philosophy; (V.) Physical and Natural Science; (VI.) Modern Languages and Literature, (VII.) Modern History; and (VIII.) English. The results of these Examinations will be published in the College Hall, in three classes; the order of merit in each department being determined by the number of marks obtained in this Examination.

The standard for Honour Classes is for First Class sixty-six per cent., for Second Class fifty per cent., and for Third Class forty per cent.

The Examiners in Mathematics may, at their discretion, add a Fourth Honorary Class to their Honour List, consisting of those who, not being Candidates for Honours, have highly distinguished themselves in the Mathematical part of the Pass Examination.

Candidates for Honours who shall have claimed exemption from any part of the Final Examination though they have failed to obtain a class in Honours, may be granted the Degree of B.A. on the recommendation of the Examiners.

Candidates who desire to take two Honour Courses may, after completing the first course at the end of nine terms as at present, take one or two years for the second course, if they wish it.

Honour Courses shall be divided into two groups:—

A. Classics, Mathematics.

B. Theology, Philosophy, History, Science, Modern Languages, English.

When a course in group A. is selected it must be completed before any course in group B. that may be selected. When both the courses selected are in one group the order is left to the option of the Candidate.

- (3) General European History from the Reformation to Modern Times.
- (4) Political Science requiring a knowledge of the more important examples of different forms of government, Ancient and Modern.

- (5) Three Special Periods to be studied in detail, one of English, one of General European, and one of American History. In one at least of these periods a knowledge of selected original authorities will be required.

The periods for examination 1899 and 1900 will be as follows:—

- (a) Life and Times of Alfred to be studied in the English Chronicle and Asser.
 (b) European History, 1598-1715.
 (c) The War of 1812 in Canada.
 (6) A dissertation on some historical subject of which notice has been given in the June of the year preceding the Examination. This shall state the authorities consulted and must be sent to the Head Examiner by June 1st.

Subject for Dissertation for 1899: "The Similarities and Differences between the Roman and British Empires."

HONOURS IN ENGLISH.

The Student who gains at the Matriculation Examination the Burnside Scholarship in English, History, and Geography will be allowed to proceed for Honours in either English or History.

Students who take Honours in English will be subject to the same regulations as those who take Honours in any other department. (See page 55.)

All dissertations must be in the hands of the Professor in charge of the department by June 1st of the Final Year, and must state the authorities that have been consulted.

SPECIALISTS' CERTIFICATES.

The Education Department of Ontario accepts the Honour Degree of Trinity University, Toronto, in Classics, Mathematics, and Science, obtained on the courses specified in the Calendar of this University, as the non-professional qualification for a Specialist in the departments of Classics, Mathematics, and Science, respectively.

In the case of other Candidates for the non-professional qualification of a Specialist in these departments, the Education Department will accept, until the regulations in force in 1894 are rescinded, the Examinations of this University, held on the specified courses; provided the Candidates make one-third of the marks assigned to each paper, and sixty-seven per cent. of the total of marks for all the papers, and provided the papers be taken at one regular Examination (not a Supplemental) or at not more than two such Examinations.

MASTER OF ARTS.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Arts of one year's standing. He must send to the Registrar notice of his intention of proceeding to the degree, together with the fee, at least three days before the Convocation.

SCHOLARSHIPS, EXHIBITIONS AND PRIZES.

The Wellington Scholarship in Classics of \$275 (\$80 and three years' tuition free).

The Wellington Scholarship in Mathematics of \$275 (\$80 and three years' tuition free).

The Bishop Strachan Scholarship in Classics of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Burnside Scholarship in Mathematics of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Dickson Scholarship in Modern Languages of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Dickson Scholarship in Physical and Natural Science of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Burnside Scholarship in English and History and Geography of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

The Pettit Scholarship in Divinity of \$235 (\$40 and three years' tuition free).

In addition to the above, a Scholarship in Mental and Moral Philosophy will be awarded at the end of the Second Year, entitling the holder to one year's free tuition.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

Candidates competing for the Scholarships offered at Matriculation, except the Pettit Scholarship, are required to write in the July Examination.

The Scholarship in any Department will be awarded to the Candidate who obtains the highest marks in Honours in the Department or Departments for which the Scholarship is offered, provided that he has passed the Matriculation Examination, Part II., of the year in which he is competing, and has been awarded a First Class in Honours in his Department, or, if there be more than one Department, a First Class in Honours in one Department and a Second Class in another.

NOTE.—The Bishop Strachan Scholarship in Classics and the Burnside Scholarship in Mathematics will be given to the Candidates who obtain the second highest aggregate marks in these Departments and comply with the other conditions.

In order to hold the Scholarships in the Second and Third Years, Candidates must retain the positions in their Departments which they have won at Matriculation.

NOTE.—A Candidate obtaining the Wellington Scholarship in Classics, the Dickson Scholarship in Modern Languages, or that in Physical and Natural Science, must obtain the highest place in the First Class in Honours in his Department in order to retain the Scholarship in the Second and Third Years. The same applies to the Bishop Strachan Scholarship in Classics except that the second highest place in the First Class in Honours in that Department is required.

A Candidate obtaining the Burnside Scholarship for English and History and Geography, will be required to obtain the highest place in the First Class in Honours in Modern History or in English in the subsequent years.

A Candidate obtaining the Pettit Scholarship for Divinity will be required to obtain the highest place in the First Class in Honours in Theology.

Should the holder fail to satisfy the above requirements in any year, his Scholarship will pass to the Student who has so done.

The holders of Scholarships are ordinarily required to reside in College, but when they reside with their parents or guardians, by permission of the Provost, they will be allowed free tuition when such is the whole or part of the emolument of their Scholarship.

In addition to the above, the following Prizes are annually competed for, being open to all Students attending Lectures.

The Corporation has also provided that four Bursaries shall be open every year, tenable from year to year, for a period not exceeding three years, of the value of \$62 per annum. Any Student who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination, and shall have satisfied the Executive Committee that he cannot, without the aid thus afforded, avail himself of the advantage of a University Education, shall be eligible for a Bursary, provided that he is not the holder of a Scholarship or Exhibition. *Ceteris paribus* the sons of Clergymen will be preferred.

Scholarships, Exhibitions and Bursaries will be forfeited if the holder fails to keep a term, or to pass any Examination at the regular time.

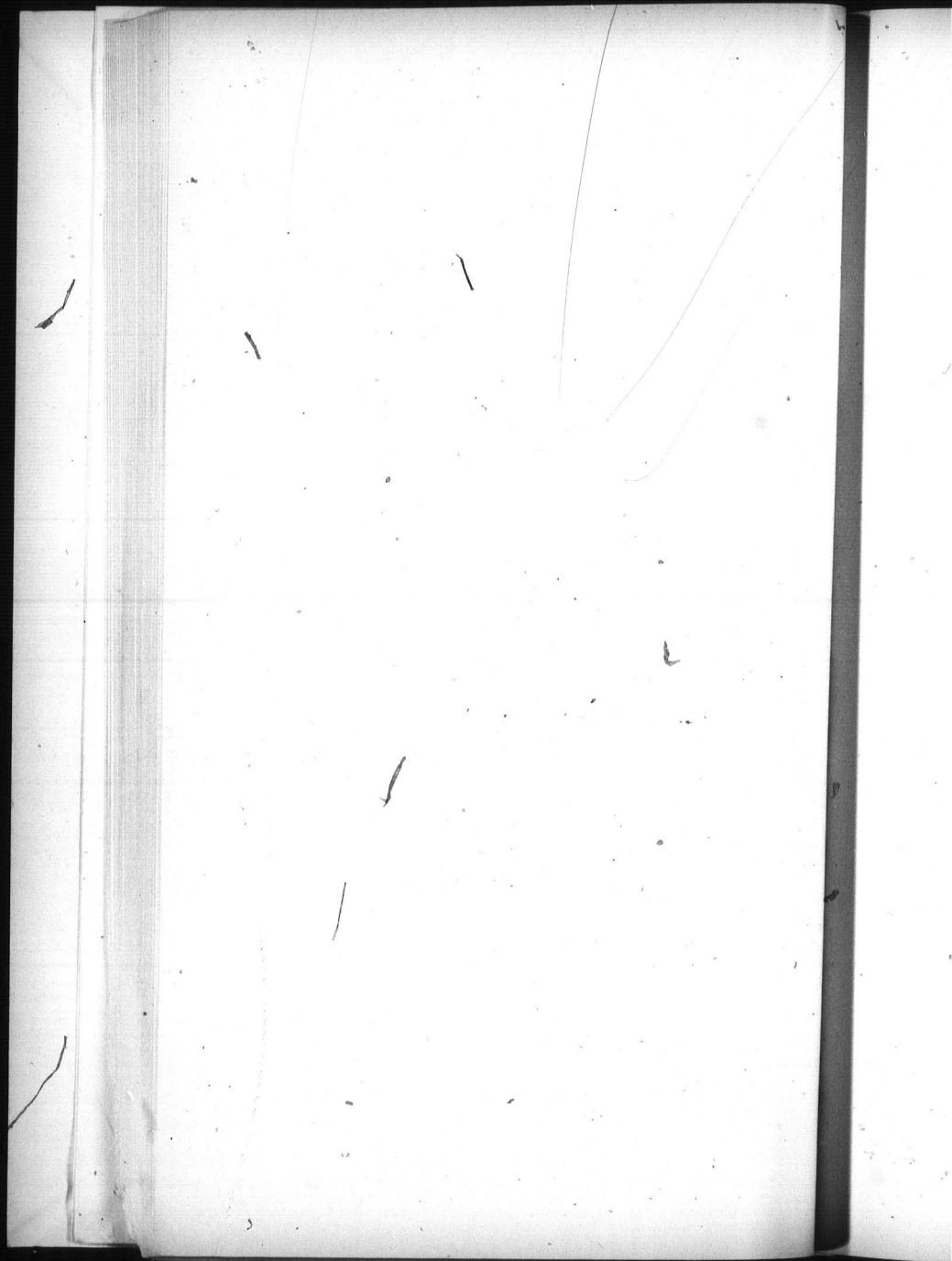

FACULTY OF DIVINITY.

Proceedings in Divinity.

DIVINITY CLASS.

The course of work in the Divinity Class comprises both theoretical and practical work, such as the composition and preaching of Sermons, reading the Liturgy, Sunday School work, Mission work, etc.

Special importance is attached to the building up of the devotional life. Short services of Instruction, Meditation, or Intercession are held regularly in the College chapel.

The following persons may be admitted to the Divinity Class provided they have obtained the approval of the College Committee :—

(1) Graduates in Arts of Trinity University or of other Universities in which Classics form a part of the course required for the B.A. degree, being of the full age of twenty years, who are admitted into the second year of the Class, but are required to take at the April Examination, in addition to the second year work, the first year work of the Class in English Church History, General Church History, Hooker and Elementary Dogmatics.

(2) Undergraduates of Trinity University and of such other Universities aforesaid, being of the full age of twenty years, who have attended the Lectures of the Arts Course for one year, and have passed the Examination at the end of the first year of such course. They are admitted into the first year of the Class.

Graduates of Universities other than Trinity University, must pass an Examination in all Divinity subjects required in the Final Examination for the Degree of B. A. in Trinity University, and Undergraduates of such Universities in those required in the Primary Examination in Trinity University.

Before his admission each student must subscribe to the Thirty-nine Articles.

The period of study will be three years ; and no certificate in the Theological Department can be granted within this time except as otherwise provided ; and unless the Student has attended Chapels and Lectures as required by the Statutes. All members of the Divinity Class are required to reside in College, a portion of which is set aside for their exclusive use.

A Graduate in Theological Honours (who has not previously taken Honours in some other Arts department) will not be granted his letters Testimonial for Holy Orders, until he shall have passed at an Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine, Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended one complete year's Lectures in those subjects after having completed the Theological Honour Course. A Graduate in Honours in any other Arts department who is a Candidate for Theological Honours may attend these Lectures and pass this Examination *during* his Theological Honour Course.

Students may substitute for the Hebrew work prescribed above, the Greek Testament work prescribed in Division (2) Sections (c) and (d) of the Theological Honour Course.

The standard in the Divinity Class Examinations is for Honours, seventy-five per cent.; for First Class, sixty-six per cent.; for Second Class fifty per cent.; and for Passing, forty per cent. of the whole marks of the Examination, and thirty-three per cent. of the marks of each paper.

Members of the Divinity Class will be required to take such Pastoral work as may from time to time be assigned to them by the Provost.

Any member of the Divinity Class who may be nominated or appointed as an Exhibitioner or Scholar or receive any other financial assistance from the University or College shall be required to give a bond to the College in double the amount of the assistance to be received conditioned to serve in some Diocese of the Church of England in Canada for one year for each year he may have received such assistance, or to repay a year's instalment for each year of default of such service.

LICENTIATE IN SACRED THEOLOGY.

The Candidate for this Degree must have kept nine complete terms. He must (1) have passed the Primary Examination for the Degree of B.A., and three April Examinations of the Divinity Class; or (2) have taken the Degree of B.A. and passed two April Examinations in the Divinity Class; or, (3) have obtained Honours in Theology, and passed at an April Examination of the Divinity Class in the year's work of the Class in Doctrine, Apologetics, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, having attended at least three terms' Lectures in these subjects.

Candidates for this Degree if in Priest's Orders may be admitted to the Degree by examinations only, without attendance at lectures. They will be required to matriculate in Arts, pass the Primary Arts Examination and the three examinations of the Divinity Class at the regular times. Priests may also be admitted to the examinations of the Divinity Class, and on passing any examination will be given a certificate to that effect by the Registrar, but will not be eligible for the Degree of Lic. Th.

A Prize of \$10 given by His Honour Judge McDonald for a paper on general Biblical knowledge to be set for the whole Divinity Class as part of the April Examination. The prize is to be open to all the years, but is not to be awarded twice to any Student.

A prize of \$20 for a sermon.

HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE.

The family of the late Mrs. John Hamilton, of Hawkesbury, have founded, in her memory, an annual Prize of \$22.50, under the following regulations:—

I. The Prize to be called the HAMILTON MEMORIAL PRIZE, is to be awarded according to the result of the following papers:—

(a) A paper or papers on a selected book or selected books illustrative of Scripture History, Antiquities, and Interpretation.

(b) A paper on general Scripture History to be set in the April Examination of the Divinity Class.*

II. All Students belonging to the Divinity Class, as well as all others who have passed through their Theological Course, and have not attained three years' standing from B. A., shall be eligible as Candidates.

III. The Examination in the selected book or books shall take place towards the end of the Lent Term in each year, and the marks obtained shall be added to the marks of the April Examination.

IV. The Examiners shall be empowered to withhold the Prize if no Candidate is found worthy.

The Examination for the Hamilton Memorial Prize will be held at the same time as the Supplemental Divinity Class Examinations.

JUBILEE SCHOLARSHIP.

These two Scholarships were founded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, from the Jubilee Fund of the year 1851, of the annual value of \$120, tenable for two years. One of these Scholarships is awarded yearly to the most deserving Bachelor of the year, who has obtained at least Second Class Honours in Classics or Mathematics. On admission to the Scholarship, a declaration must be signed by the holder that it is his purpose to complete the Divinity Course in Trinity College, and to present himself as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and should he fail to do so, he will be held bound to refund to the College such proceeds of the Scholarship as he shall have received.

Candidates for Honours in Theology who have previously graduated with Honours in some other department, will be allowed to compete for the Sermon Prize, the Hamilton Memorial Prize, and the Reading Prizes, in each year of their Course in Theological Honours, but those who have not previously graduated with Honours will be allowed to compete only in the year following their graduation.

DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

Candidates for these Degrees resident in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, other than Candidates for the Degree, *Jure Dignitatis* will, for the future, be required to proceed in accordance with the Canon on Divinity Degrees passed

by the Provincial Synod of Canada in 1889. For copies of these regulations application should be made to the Provost.

The following regulations apply to Candidates *residing outside the Ecclesiastical Province.*

BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Graduate in Arts of the University of three years' standing, or in the case of a Graduate admitted "*ad eundem statum*" of at least three years' standing from his first Degree. The requirement that the Candidate shall be a Graduate in Arts may, however, be dispensed with by the Corporation, on special application having been made to them, in the case of Clergymen who have been in Priests' orders for at least six years, but such Candidate shall be required to pass the Matriculation Examination of Trinity University.

Except in the case hereinafter provided for, the Candidate must pass two Examinations, to be called the First and Second Examination for the Degree of B.D., and at least one year must elapse between these Examinations.

Graduates who have completed the Divinity Course in Trinity College, and have passed the regular Examinations of the Divinity Class, obtaining at least a Second Class in each Examination, shall be exempted from the First Examination for the Degree of B.D.

The Examination in Divinity will begin on September 22nd, 1899, and Candidates for any Examination must send notice to the Registrar not later than April 1st, specifying, where necessary, the group for which they intend to present themselves.

BACHELOR OF CIVIL LAW.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a matriculated Student of Trinity University, but if he be a Student-at-Law who has been matriculated by the Law Society of Upper Canada he will be admitted to Matriculation in the University without further examination.

The Candidate must be of the standing of three years from the date of Matriculation, and of the full age of twenty-three years, but the latter condition may be dispensed with in the case of Students-at-Law of Osgoode Hall who have kept three complete Terms in Arts, and passed the Primary Examination.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations, separated by intervals of not less than a year, to be called the First, Second, and Final Examinations in Law. If, however, the Candidate produces a certificate of his having been called to the Degree of Barrister-at-Law by any Law Society in Her Majesty's Dominions, and be a Graduate in Arts of Trinity University, or of any recognized University, the first two Examinations may be dispensed with, and the Degree of B.C.L. may be conferred after the Candidate has passed the Final Examination only.

The Examination in Law will begin in 1899 as follows : The First and Final on June 13th, and the Second on June 16th.

Candidates for any Examination are required to give notice to the Registrar by June 1st, on a form which will be furnished on application, together with the Examination Fee and in the case of the Final Examination, with the Degree Fee also.

In order that a Candidate may pass in any of the three Examinations he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination. Candidates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit, the standard for the 1st and 2nd class respectively being seventy and sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who fail in the First or Second Examination, may, at the discretion of the Examiners, be allowed to take a supplemental Examination in the following June, *together with* the subsequent Examination, those who fail in obtaining fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination being required to take the whole Examination, those who obtain fifty per cent. of the total, but fail in particular papers, being required to take only those papers in which they have failed.

 MEDALS IN LAW.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded upon the special recommendation of the Examiners, to the Candidates who obtain the first and second places respectively in the first class at the Final Examination for the Degree of B.C.L.

DOCTOR OF CIVIL LAW.

The Candidate for this Degree must be a Bachelor of Civil Law of seven years' standing complete.

He must compose a Thesis on some legal subject to be appointed from time to time, and send it in to the Registrar on or before May 15th, together with the fee of \$5 for its examination, and the fee for Degree.

In 1899 the Candidate may select one of the following subjects for his Thesis :—

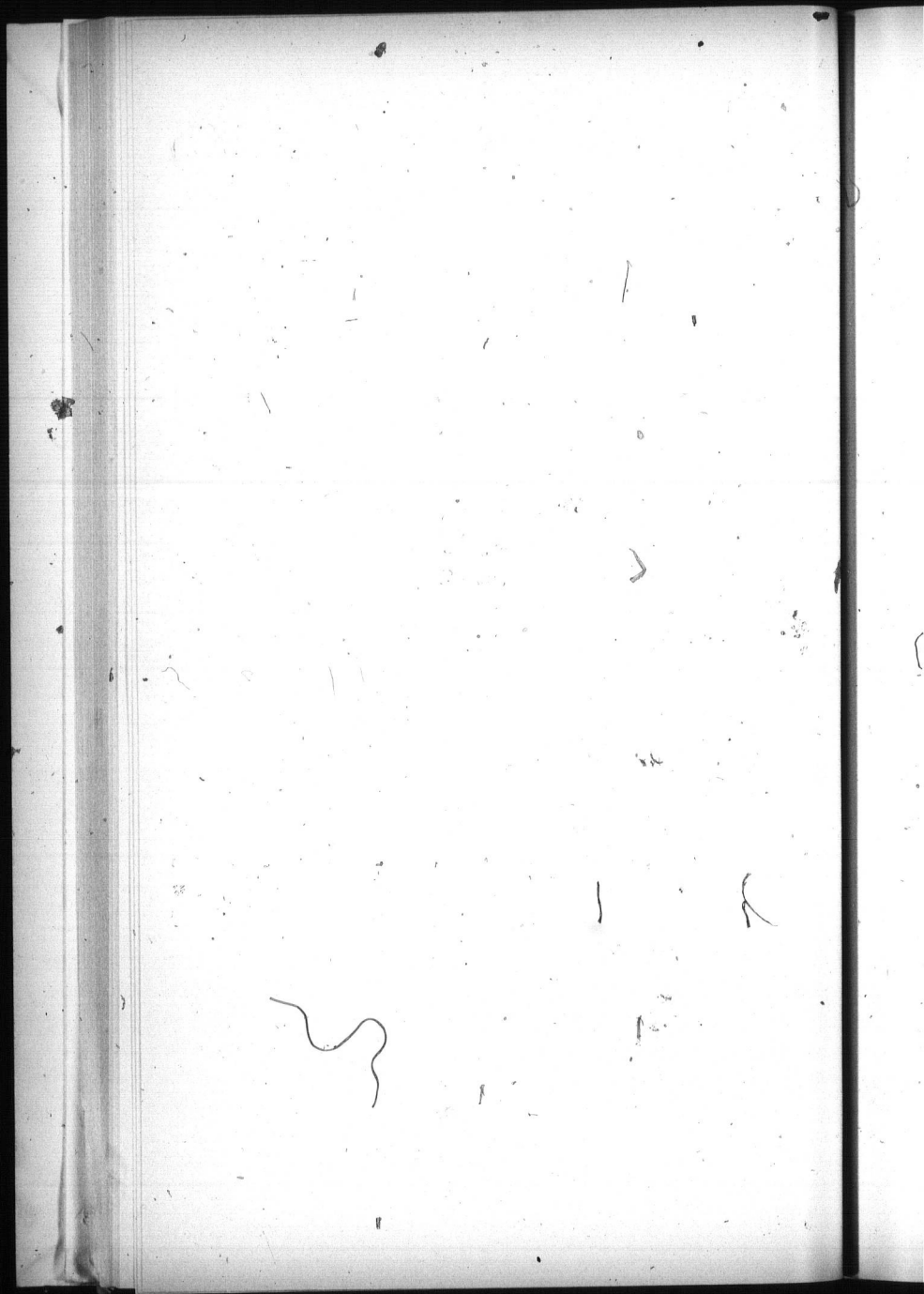

Proceedings in Medicine.

DOCTOR OF MEDICINE, AND MASTER OF SURGERY.

The Candidate for the Degree must have matriculated in the Faculties of Arts or Medicine.

The *Medical Matriculation Examination will be held twice in the year in Trinity College, beginning on the second Friday in March and October respectively.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar of Trinity University, together with the Examination fee of \$5, at least one week before the Examination, on a form which will be supplied on application.

The subjects for this Examination until further notice will be:—

- (1) English Language, including Grammar and Composition.
- (2) Arithmetic.
Algebra, including Simple Equations.
Euclid, Books I., II., III., with easy deductions.
- (3) Latin.
Grammar.
Cesar, *Bellum Gallicum*, Bks. I., II., or Bks. III. and IV., or Bks. V., VI.; or Cicero de *Lege Manilia*; or Virgil, *Æneid*, Bk. I. in 1899, Bk. II. in 1900 and 1901.
Translation of easy passages from unspecified Latin authors.
- (4) One of the following divisions, to be selected by the Candidate;
 - (a) Scripture History; and St. Matthew's Gospel, ch. i.-x. incl., in Greek.
 - (b) Greek: Grammar; Xenophon's *Anabasis*, Bk. I.
 - (c) French: Grammar; Voltaire's *Charles XII.*, VI.-VIII.
 - (d) German: Grammar; Schiller's *Thirty Years' War*, Bk. I.
 - (e) Natural Philosophy, including Mechanics, Hydrostatics, and Pneumatics. (Balfour Stewart's *Lessons in Elementary Physics* is recommended.)
 - (f) Logic.

*This Examination will not qualify Candidates to practise Medicine in Ontario, as the Ontario Medical Council only can confer a License to practise.

The standard for passing is 25 per cent. on each paper and 33 per cent. on each department.

Candidates who pass in two departments may, at the discretion of the Examiners, be allowed to take the remaining subjects at a subsequent Examination, a fee of \$5 being required for each Examination.

No change in the Curriculum shall affect any Student who has registered in the University before March 1st in the year in which such change is announced in the University Calendar, except that any change in the requirements for the Final M.D., C.M. Examination shall apply to all Students who have not passed their Primary Examination at the time of the issue of the Calendar containing notice of such change, provided also, that Students degrading into a lower year shall be bound by the regulations affecting the year into which they have degraded.

The Candidate for Degrees in Medicine or Surgery must be of the full age of twenty-one years.

He must furnish certificates of having attended four Winter Sessions at some Medical College recognized by the University, except he be a Graduate in Arts or Science, when attendance at three Winter Sessions will be accepted.

Before admission to the Primary Examination in Medicine, he must have attended in some recognized Medical College the following courses of Lectures :—

Two courses of six months each on

Descriptive Anatomy.
Practical Anatomy.
General Chemistry.
Materia Medica and Pharmacy.
Physiology.
Histology.

And one course of three months on

Practical Chemistry.
Toxicology.

Before admission to the Final Examination, he must further have attended two courses of Lectures of six months each in some recognized Medical College on

Theory and Practice of Medicine.
Principles and Practice of Surgery.
Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children.
Clinical Medicine.
Clinical Surgery.

And two courses of three months each on
Medical Jurisprudence.
Therapeutics and the art of prescribing.

And one course of three months each on
Applied Anatomy.
Sanitary Science.
Practical Pathology.
General and Special Pathology (taken in the Third Year).

He must have attended for at least *eighteen* months the practice of some general Hospital, and, during two sessions, Clinical Lectures on Medicine and Surgery.

He must have attended for at least six months the practice of a Lying-in-Hospital, or must give satisfactory evidence of having otherwise enjoyed equivalent advantages of gaining obstetrical knowledge, with a certificate of attendance upon at least six cases of labour.

He must have passed two University Examinations, called the Primary and Final Examinations in Medicine.

Before admission to the Primary Examination, he must produce a certificate that he has passed the First Year's Examination in some recognized Medical College.

PRIMARY EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

This Examination may be passed at the end of the Second Year. The subjects are: Descriptive Anatomy, Practical Anatomy, Physiology, Histology, General Chemistry, including Chemical Physics, Practical Chemistry, Materia Medica and Pharmacy, Toxicology.

The Primary Examination of other recognized Universities, or that of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, Quebec, or Manitoba, will be accepted in lieu of the University Primary Examination, provided that the Candidate shall in all cases pay the full fee for the Degree, but if any of the subjects of the Primary Examination do not form

part of the Examination allowed, the Candidate shall be required to take such subjects together with his Final Examination.

Graduates of any recognized University will not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Examinations.

FINAL EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

Candidates for this Examination will be required to furnish proof that they have passed an Examination at the end of their Third Year in such subjects as the Faculty of the Medical College or School they may have attended may require.

In cases where this has been unavoidably, as from illness, omitted, an equivalent Examination must be passed prior to going up for the Final Examination.

The Final Examination shall take place at the end of the Fourth Year. The subjects are: Theory and Practice of Medicine; Principles and Practice of Surgery; Clinical Medicine; Clinical Surgery; Midwifery, Diseases of Women and Children, Medical Jurisprudence, Sanitary Science, Therapeutics, Applied Anatomy, Pathology, and Bacteriology, including Practical Work.

In order that a Candidate may pass in either of these Examinations, he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination. Candidates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in three classes in order of merit; the standard for the first and second class respectively being seventy and sixty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination.

Candidates who fail in more than four subjects in either of the Examinations of the Faculty of Medicine shall be deemed to have failed altogether in that Examination. Candidates who fail in not more than four subjects may at the discretion of the Examiners be allowed to take these subjects at the Supplemental Examination, or at the next Annual Examination, provided that a Candidate shall not be

given credit for any portion of the Examination unless he shall have obtained at least thirty-three per cent. of each paper and fifty per cent. of the total marks of such part of the Examination. A candidate who does not complete the Examination as above will be required to take the whole Examination again.

Candidates in the First Class of the Final or the Primary Examination in Medicine, shall be awarded Certificates of Honour, provided they obtain at least seventy-five per cent. of the marks of the Examination.

The Primary and Final Examinations may be taken together at the end of the Fourth Year.

Supplemental Examinations will be held, beginning for Final Candidates on June 19th, and for Primary Candidates on September 28th.

MEDALS IN MEDICINE.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded to the Candidates who are first and second respectively in the Final Examination, and two Silver Medals to the Candidates who are first and second in the Primary Examination for the Degree of M.D., C.M., provided that a Medal shall not be awarded to any Candidate who obtains less than seventy-five per cent. of the total marks of his Examination.

All Candidates for the Final Medals must have taken the Primary Examination in this University; and if they have not already done so, they may take it at the same time as the Final Examination.

In case of equality for the Final Medals, the Gold Medal shall be awarded to the Candidate who obtained the greatest percentage of marks at the Primary Examination. It shall be open to any Candidate who desires to do so to take the Primary Examination a second time with the Final, and in this case the Primary marks so obtained shall be those counted for the Medal.

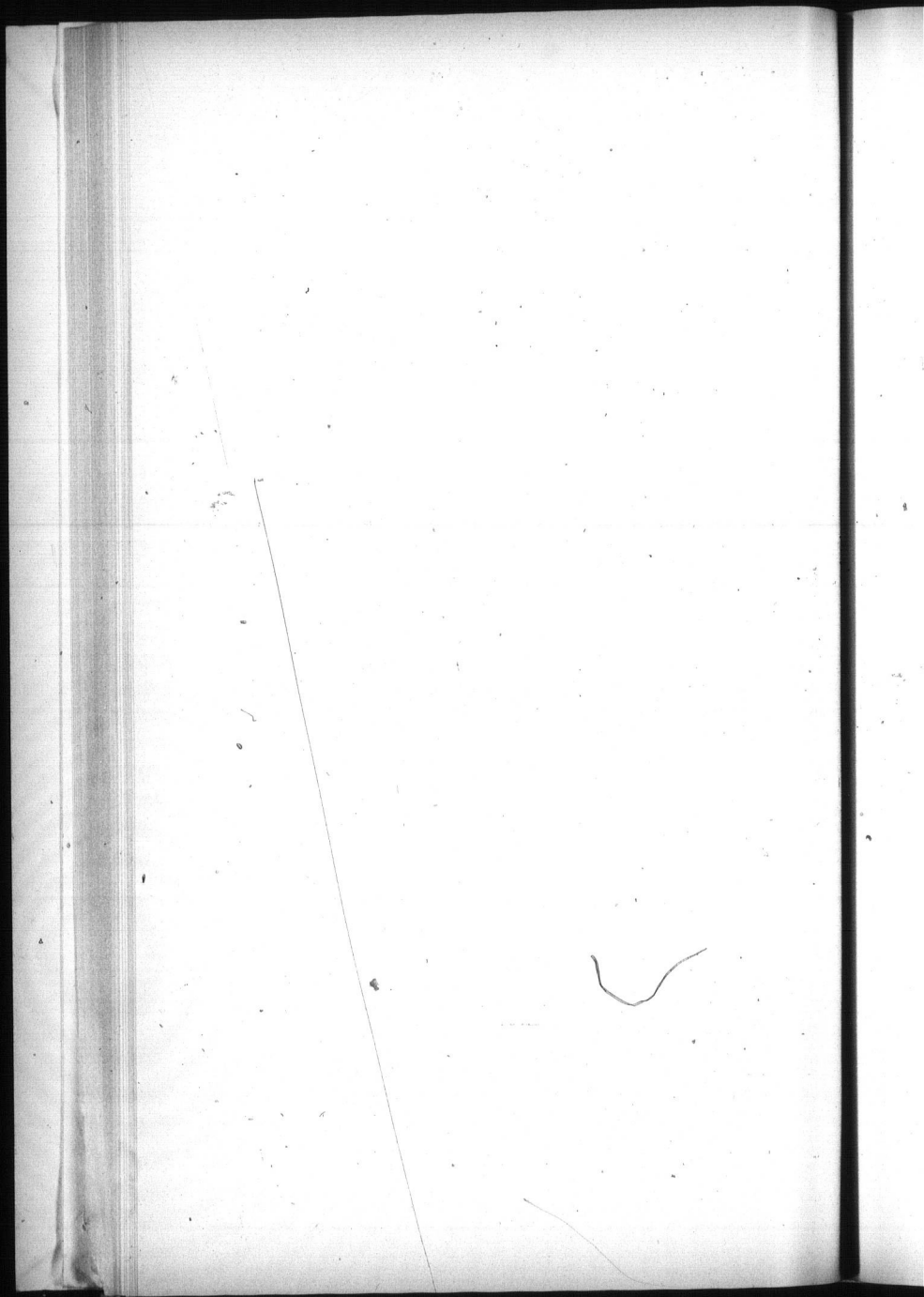

BACHELOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this Degree must pass a Matriculation Examination, consisting of the English and one of the Languages, Latin, Greek, French or German of the Arts Matriculation Examination held in July or September. See pages —. He must also furnish

(i) A certificate of character in the following or some equivalent form :—

“ I, —, hereby certify that I have known A. B. for the last — years, and I believe him to be of good moral character.”

(ii.) A certificate that he has employed five years in the study and practice of Music.

The Candidate will be required to pass three Examinations in Music separated by intervals of not less than one year, to be called the First, Second, and Final Examinations in Music, and he must also send to the Registrar an original Composition for voices on a sacred or secular subject, consisting of four movements : (1) a chorus, or solo and chorus, in five part harmony, (2) a solo in cavatina or aria form, (3) a trio or quartette, unaccompanied, and (4), a fugue in four parts, the accompaniment to be written for a string band. The movements may be in any order preferred, and the whole must occupy from fifteen to twenty minutes in performance. This Exercise must be approved of by the Examiners.

MEDALS IN MUSIC.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are awarded annually on the special recommendation of the Examiners to the Candidates who are first and second respectively in Class I. in the Final Examination for the Degree of Mus. Bac., regard being had also to the Exercise. A Candidate will not be eligible for the Medals if five or more years have elapsed since he passed the First Examination for Mus. Bac.

DOCTOR OF MUSIC.

The Candidate for this degree must produce a testimonial of his having studied in this faculty for the space of three years subsequent to admission to the Degree of Mus. Bac.

He must send to the Registrar an original composition for voices on a sacred or secular subject containing harmony and fugal counterpoint both in eight parts with orchestral accompaniments, sufficiently long to occupy forty minutes in performance, and this Exercise must be approved by the Examiners. He will also be required to pass an Examination in the higher branches of the Science of Music, and also work a paper on the form and scoring of a given work, and containing one or more questions respecting his own work, unless the Examiners see fit to exempt him from this Examination on account of the excellence of his Exercise.

DOCTOR OF DENTAL SURGERY.

A Candidate for this degree must have passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts, Medicine or Dentistry of this or some other recognized University, or the Non-professional Examination for a first, second, or third class teacher's certificate (with Latin), or an Examination accepted by the University as equivalent to the above.

The Matriculation Examination in Dentistry which is the same as for Matriculation in Medicine will be held twice in the year in Trinity College, beginning on the second Friday in March and October respectively.

For the subjects of this Examination see page 102.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar of Trinity University together with the Examination Fee of \$5 at least one week before the Examination, on a form which will be supplied on application.

The Candidate must be of the full age of twenty-one years, and must furnish a satisfactory certificate of good conduct.

He must produce certificates of having attended lectures in some Dental College recognized by the University for not less than two winter sessions, and of having spent twenty-four months in addition in the office of a legally qualified Dental Surgeon. He must pass two University Examinations called the Primary and Final Examination in Dentistry.

Before admission to the Primary Examination he must have attended in some recognized Dental College the following lectures:—

One course of five months on each of the following subjects :

Special Dental and Practical Anatomy.

Chemistry.

Materia Medica.

Physiology, including Histology.

Graduates in Arts of any recognized University, shall not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Examinations.

FINAL EXAMINATIONS IN DENTISTRY.

This Examination will be held at the end of the Final Year. The subjects are :

Operative Dentistry, Oral and Dental Pathology, Dental Anatomy, Dental Therapeutics, Prosthetic Dentistry, Physiology, Histology, Chemistry, and Materia Medica.

BACHELOR OF PHARMACY.

The Candidate for the degree of Phar. B. must have (a) passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts, Medicine or Dental Surgery of this or some other recognized University, or (b) the Departmental Non-professional Examination (with Latin) for a first, second or third class Teacher's Certificate.

The Candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and before examination must furnish to the Registrar of Trinity University satisfactory evidence of his having attended courses of lectures on Pharmacy, Chemistry, Materia Medica, and Botany, including their collateral branches, together with laboratory work, for at least six months in some recognized College of Pharmacy or Medicine; and, also, of his having passed a practical course of instruction for at least four years under the direction of a qualified Pharmacist.

The Examination will be held in May of each year, and will embrace the following subjects:—

DOCTOR OF PHARMACY.

The Candidate for the degree of Phar. D. must be a Bachelor of Pharmacy of at least three years' standing, and must have passed the Examination hereinafter specified, which will be held in May of each year.

The Candidate shall be at liberty to select for special study two of the following Departments, of which Pharmacy shall always be one.

PHARMACY.—Advanced work in one or more of the following:—

- (a) Assay of the organic drugs official in the British Pharmacopœia.
- (b) Methods of preparation of the official galenic compounds, and detection of impurities and adulterations.
- (c) Dispensing methods, including the subject of incompatibility.

CHEMISTRY.—Advanced work in one or more of the following:—

- (a) Volumetric Analysis as applied to official chemicals.
- (b) Analysis of Potable and Mineral waters and Urinary Analysis.
- (c) Plant Analysis.

MATERIA MEDICA.—Advanced work in one or more of the following:—

- (a) Principles of Pharmacognosy. (Flückiger's Manual must be carefully studied.)
- (b) Therapeutics of official drugs.

BOTANY.—Advanced work in one or both of the following:—

- (a) Classification.
- (b) Bacteriology.

The applicant for a degree must send notice to the Registrar at least ten days before the date of the Examination on a form which will be furnished, and which must be returned, together with the fees for registration, examination and degree.

The Examination in Pharmacy in 1899 will begin on May 10th.

Admission to *Ad Eundem* Degrees.

Ad eundem degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, or Music, are granted to Graduates who are resident in the Dominion of Canada, of Oxford; Cambridge; Trinity College, Dublin; King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia; the late King's College, Fredericton, New Brunswick; Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Quebec; or the late King's College, Toronto, on their paying the fee of the degree, and making the declarations required.

Clergymen of the Church of England, resident within the Dominion of Canada, being graduates in Arts of three years' standing of any chartered University in Her Majesty's Dominions shall be admissible to *ad eundem* degrees as soon as they shall have complied with the conditions requisite for the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity, or of Bachelor of Music.

The Professors of Trinity Medical College and of the Woman's Medical College, Toronto, are in all cases admissible to *ad eundem* degrees.

Application for *ad eundem* degrees not provided for in the foregoing regulations are considered by the Executive Committee, but no such degree can be granted unless the Candidate has taken the degree at his own University in course.

The fee for an *ad eundem* degree is the same as for the degree taken in regular course.

Hoods of the Various Degrees.

- Mus. B.: Black silk, lined with violet silk.
- Mus. D.: Scarlet cloth, lined with violet silk.
- M.B.: Black silk, lined with light blue silk.
- C.M.: Brown silk, lined with light blue silk.
- M.D.: Scarlet cloth, lined with light blue silk.
- M.D., C.M.: Scarlet cloth, lined with light blue silk, faced with brown silk two inches wide.
- B.C.L.: Black silk, lined with French gray silk.
- D.C.L.: Scarlet cloth, lined with French gray silk.
- Lic. Th.: Black stuff, edged with dark blue silk four inches wide.
- B.D.: Black silk, lined with black silk.
- D.D.: Scarlet cloth, lined with black silk.

The shape of the Hood shall be in all cases the same as that in use in the University of Cambridge.

The full dress Doctor's gown in each Faculty shall be of scarlet cloth, lined in the same way as the Hood, and of the shape worn in the University of Cambridge. The cap shall be of black velvet.

Candidates taking a College Supplemental Examination in Arts or in the Divinity Class will be required to pay a fee of \$5.

If a Candidate for any Examination fails to send the notice and pay the fee by the date prescribed in the Calendar, the Registrar may at his discretion accept the notice, but he shall in all cases require the payment of an additional fee of one dollar.

Candidates for the First Degree in any Faculty may be admitted to such Degree *in absentia* by permission of the Executive Committee on payment of an additional fee of \$10. Candidates for Higher Degrees may always be admitted to the Degree *in absentia*.

Candidates taking the First Degree in any Faculty at a Convocation other than the April or October Convocation must pay a fee of \$5 in addition to the ordinary fee.

The annual payments made by Bachelors of Arts to Convocation will be credited in payment of the fee for M.A.

The fee for the Degree of M.D., C.M., shall be paid by the Candidate as follows: \$15 before presenting himself for the Primary Examination, and \$25 before presenting himself for the Final Examination. Candidates who fail at the Primary Examination shall be entitled to have the fee returned to them, less \$8, and Candidates who fail at the Final Examination shall be entitled to have the fee returned to them, less \$12. Candidates conditioned, must pay a fee of \$8 for the Supplemental Primary Examination, and a fee of \$12 for the Supplemental Final Examination, unless fewer subjects than four are taken, when the fee for each Supplemental Examination will be \$5.

The fee for any degree other than M.D., C.M., shall be paid when notice is given for the Final Examination together with the Examination fee.

For admission *ad eundem gradum* the Candidate shall pay the fee for the degree to which he is admitted as specified in the foregoing table of fees.

Candidates taking the Supplemental Arts Examination, or the Matriculation Examination in September will be required to pay \$5 if they take one department only, and \$10 if they take more departments than one.

The University Library contains about 10,000 volumes, 600 of which were a gift from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. Valuable additions have, from time to time, been made to the Library by the following donors: The Government of the State of New York, the University of Oxford, the University of Cambridge, Trinity College, Dublin, the Smithsonian Institution, Columbia College, the First Bishop of Toronto, General Sir Henry Lefroy, the widow of the late Rev. W. Ripley, the late Rev. E. B. Pusey, D.D., the Rev. J. E. Mayor (late Librarian of the University of Cambridge), the late Rev. John Smithurst, the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune (from the library of the Second Bishop of Toronto), the late Rev. Prof. Boys, the Royal Irish Academy, the Associates of the late Rev. Dr. Bray, the late Rev. E. K. Kendall, and others.

The Library is open during Term at fixed hours, when the Librarian will issue books to members of the University and other persons to whom the privilege of using it has been extended.

Members of the Staff and non-resident Graduates may not have in their possession more than six volumes at a time, and Students not more than three volumes.

Books, except books of reference and text books, may be retained for a fortnight by residents of Toronto and Students not resident in Toronto, and for a calendar month by Graduates not resident in Toronto.

Undergraduates in Medicine or Law shall pay 25 cents per volume for each book taken out or, if they prefer it, a

Library fee of one dollar per term during the time that they use the Library, and shall be subject to such rules of the Library as are applicable to them.

All books must be returned to the Library on or before June 24th and December 24th.

Any person retaining a book beyond the time allowed or after the two days mentioned in the preceding paragraph will incur a fine of two cents a day till the return of the book.

Non-residents of Toronto must prepay the charges for the carriage of books both ways.

Loss of books or damage done to books must be made good by the person in whose name the book is taken out.

The vestibule of the present building has been fitted up for the temporary reception of a Museum of Natural History, towards which many Mineralogical, Geological, and other specimens have been contributed.

In November, 1884, a very complete collection of specimens illustrating the geological formations of Canada was presented to the Museum by Professor Selwyn, Director of the Geographical and Natural History of Canada. The Museum has been classified and re arranged by Mr. Montgomery.

The Curators will be glad to receive specimens from Graduates or other friends of the University.

COLLECTION.

A large and valuable collection of minerals, fossils and other geological specimens, the property of Henry Montgomery, M.A., has been deposited in suitable glass cases in a room in the west wing of the College. Nearly all the Provinces of Canada and States of the Union, as well as most other foreign countries, are represented in this collection. Some of the specimens are of extreme rarity, and all may be profitably used in the study of the various branches of mineralogy and geology.
