

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

One of the chief qualifications of the new Wallachian embroidery, that has sprung into such popularity during this last winter, is that it can be very quickly done. A woman, even a busy one, can start a piece of it with some prospect of getting it finished within a reasonable time. To begin a gown in the ordinary types of embroidery, such as satin stitch or eyelet work, Hedebo or Roman cut work, as late in the spring as this would require extreme rapidity or constant application to finish it in time for wear this summer. But a Walla-chian gown should easily be embroidered in a fortnight by spending several hours on it each day.



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
