## THE THAW JURY OPENED THEIR MEETING WITH PRAYER

Jewish Member Said a Few CAUSE FOR DIVORCE Words for Himself—The Counsel for Defence Disagree and New Lawyers Will Likely be Engaged-**Everybody Disappointed** 

NEW. YORK. April 13-Although be acquitted, Harry K. Thaw is bear-ing up bravely. Indeed his composure is on a par with the remarkable good spirits he showed during much of his protracted trial and the wearisome protracted trial and the wearisome hours before the jury gave up its task. So sanguine was he of freedom that shortly before the jury came for the last time into the court, he wrapped up a large number of letters and papers which he meant to take with him from his cell. When he was told by Messrs. Peabody and O'Rellly that the jury could not agree, he dropped his bundle of papers to the floor, speechlessly disheartened. But he speedily recovered his courage. The news of the discharge of the jury reached the Hotel Lorraine some time before the arrival of the autombile containing Mrs. William Thaw, her daughter, the

rival of the autombile containing Mrs. William Thaw, her daughter, the Countess of Yarmouth, and Mrs. George L. Carnegie, and Josiah and Edward Thaw. The prisoner's mother bore herself with the fortitude that she has exhibited all along and when asked if she had anything she wished to say about the trial and its results, she looked her questioner straight in the face and kept silent. The Countess of Yarmouth was also calm, but she was paler than her mother, On the other hand, Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, who reached the hotel shortly after this, was excited and flushed.

### USE INDIAN NAMES SAYS JAMES BRYCE

Too Many Londons and Washingtons to Suit Him.

He Sees No Reason Why America Shoul Gopy Old World Names When So Many Others are Available.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—James Bryce, the rew ambassador to the United States from Great Britain, says he is not a reformer, but should he at any time be inclined to embark upon a reform movement, it would be in the direction of revision of names for the American and Canadian cities. He says he especially abhors duplications, as they lead to confusion in the mails and telegraphs. While in Canada recently he wrote a number of despatches to his government and addressed them London. The despatches went to London, Ont. Now he is convinced that United States and Canada, as the Indians have provided an unlimited supply of musical names that may be given to towns, cities or other geographical points. The wisest thing the people of Toronto, Canada, ever did, says Mr. Bryce, was to adopt the present name of the city in the place of "York," by which the settlement was first called.

In relieving you from your labors, I sincerely trust that the blessings of Providence may rest bounteously upon you in the discharge of your ordinary avocations, as well as upon the people whom you represent, and you carry with you my best wishes for your prosperity and happiness."





# ON A WEALTHY FARMER

## THEATRICAL COSTUMIER

Police Thought He Was an Anarchist Because He Carried Suspicious Looking Bombs.

PARIS, April 13—Mr. Willie Clarkson, the London theatrical costumer, was nearly arrested as a dangerous anarchist by the Boulogne police a week ago. He was on his way to Paris with a number of bombs which are to be used in Mme. Sarah Bernhardt's production of "Faust" to produce the fiashes of light which were regarded as so effective in Sir Henry Irving's production at the London Lyceum.

While Mr. Clarkson was in the buffet a customs official noticed the parcel in the railway carriage. As it felt heavy he called in his colleagues, and to the consternation of all the bombs were discovered. Boulogne is regarded as the headquarters for a band of international anarchists and that only had a tendency to make matters worse. A tank of water was immediately procured, the bombs were placed into it, and six detectives were told off the guard to watch the cariage and seize the "anarchists" when they returned. On Mr. Clarkson's appearance it required more than half an hour's argument to convince the officials that the bombs were harmless, and he had to unpack the parcels himself before they would allow him to proceed on his journey.



BERLIN, April 13—Socialists are making elaborate preparations for the funeral tomorrow of Ignace Auer, the well known Socialist member of the Reichstag, whose death was announced April 10. The Socialist organ, the Vorwafrts, today prints the programme of the ceremonies and order of the procession. The police, however, forbid the playing of marches or other music, except of a funereal character, and prohibits the carrying of red flags, unless heavily draped with crepe. In addition persons in the procession must not wear red rosettes or other party emblems, and the delivery of speeches at the grave is strictly forbidden.


