EASTERN LEAGUE LOOKING FOR A LIVELY SEASON

Play Begins Today—All the Teams Have Been Strengthened and the Contest for Leadership Promises to be Exciting.

NEW YORK, April 22.—Weather permitting the League baseball clubs will today have what is regarded as the greatest opening in the history of the circuit inaugurating its first time in the season adopted for the first time as the result of the class A. A. distinction. All the games will be in the southern tier. Toronto will be seen at Newark; Montreal appears in Providence; Buffalo at Jersey City, and Rochester tackles the Champion Baltimore. For many reasons interest in the Eastern League is keyed right now at a higher spirit than at any time in the history of the circuit. The class A. A. leagues are but a shade inferior to the big major leagues in playing strength. The cities which form the eastern circuits are without exception good baseball towns. Teams since last year have been so radically shaken up as to leave the question of supremacy subject to grave doubt and furthermore several new managers and much new material has found its way into the ranks of the big minors. Yesterday afternoon President Powers called together the umpires and managers of the Eastern League in his flat iron building office for a quiet little talk. All the managers and five of the six officials were in hand. The president gave every one concerned plainly to understand that no rowdiness of any kind will be tolerated and that the umpires will be backed up to the hilt. The Eastern League will have six umpires this season, though only five will be working today. Casner has a government position in Harrisburg, Pa. and thus far has not been able to get leave of absence. Kelly will umpire in Jersey City, Byron and Murray in Newark, Finerman, in Providence, and Stafford in Baltimore.

President Powers looks for the Eastern League to have the most prosperous season it ever has experienced and also counts on the race being a thriller. He thinks all the clubs have been strengthened. "Powers last night made the following statement: "Our clubs are all evenly matched. Casey's Montreal is an enthusiastic about the return of Joe Kelly who in one year transformed the Maple Leafs from tailenders to pennant winners. Casey will do better than ever in Montreal for he will have more money behind him. In Buffalo Geo. Smith with his year's experience and the addition of Taylor and Brain will be in the fight right along. In Providence Hugh Duffy is not saying much but he always is on hand with a club which makes a bold fight for the pennant. Casey's Montreal team was the only one which made any money on its spring trip. The Royals trained in New Britain, Conn., and had a successful tour through N. C. and England. The Eastern League yesterday adopted the rule for batting in the National League, allowing fielding practice twenty minutes before practice.

COMMITTEE CHOSEN TO CONSIDER PLANS FOR THE ENLARGEMENT OF THE LADIES' COLLEGE AT SACKVILLE—WILL REPORT IN JUNE.

SACKVILLE, N. B., April 22.—A special meeting of the board of regents of Mount Allison was held for the purpose of considering a proposal to commence enlargement of the ladies' college this summer. Action taken was the appointment of a committee to examine further plans of the proposed new wing and to discuss the matter of building this summer with the executive committee of the board so that a report can be made at the board's regular meeting early in June.

LITTLE BUSINESS TODAY BEFORE THE COMMITTEES

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 22.—The public accounts committee met this morning and passed upon a number of bridge accounts of the several counties. WILL ATTACK THE NIAGARA ICE JAM WITH DYNAMITE

Four Small Towns are in Danger from the Twelve Mile Mass Now Filling the Niagara Gorge.

LEWISTON, N. Y., April 22.—The ice monster moving his devastating bulk between the banks of the lower Niagara River slumbered the night through, heedless of the war which had been declared against him by the state engineers. On his flanks anxious watchmen waited, worried by the southwest squalls which had been driving an endless procession of ice over the falls throughout the afternoon and evening. But the force of the current crowded with loose lumps of ice which evidently ground out a smooth subway for itself under the massive flows. Unless the efforts of the engineers this morning prove fruitless it is probable that the greatest danger is past. The ice which plowed the upper banks uprooted huge trees and shell piles on its lofty level but the middle line of the surface of the flow has apparently dropped a few feet. The jam is of appalling proportions when actual measurements are taken. Apparently only a powerful explosion of twelve miles in its powerful length and in many places sixty feet in its grinding depth. Taken altogether it represents millions of tons and the strength powerful enough to annihilate the four villages along its border if it should start to go out all at once. The plan of the state engineers, Henry A. Kunkle, Assistant Supt. of Public Works, and Chas. A. Tuttle, Chief of High Explosives who yesterday afternoon decided on a method of procedure and in the evening obtained the permission of the State to carry it out. It is first to blow off the head of the ice giant now projecting into Lake Ontario by a generous charge of dynamite. Other sections of the body will also be successfully separated from the whole and allowed to drift out into the lake. Three wagon loads of dynamite were sent from Buffalo last night for this purpose. Captain Mitchell, officer in command of Fort Niagara, has offered the assistance of his 120 men. Captain Nelson in charge of the life saving station at Youngstown, and his crew of seven men will also help. Considerable disappointment is being expressed on both sides of the river at the reluctance of the American and Canadian governments to hasten to the relief of the community. The plea of the Canadians were unheeded. The request of President Sanford White of Lewiston, and of Harry Cornell, the American representative of the Niagara Nav. Co. was investigated, but assistance was refused partly on the ground of impracticability and partly on the ground of lack of funds for such purpose. Governor Hughes, however, when appealed to by the same parties immediately turned the matter over to Supt. Stevens. Twenty-four hours after the request was made everything was in readiness to go ahead with the task of breaking the most devastating jam in the history of the Niagara River.

FIGURING OUT THE ROUTE OF THE VALLEY RAILROAD

Corporations Committee Hears Several Suggestions, But Will Wait for Final Survey—Mr. Hatheway Withdraws Income Exemption Bill

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 22.—The corporations committee this morning reviewed the bill to incorporate the St. John Valley Railway Co. The bill was taken up and explained by J. J. F. Winslow, solicitor for the company. The estimated cost of the road was quite fully discussed, it being stated that it was intended to construct a first class road. The route of the railway was discussed at length. Premier Hazen stated that it must be insured that the road follows the River St. John as closely as possible below Woodstock. The route was reached to the route would be across country to Westfield and it being stated that it was intended to construct a section of country most in need of railway facilities. Hon. Mr. Fleming discussed somewhat the proposed route above Woodstock, saying that Centreville, Waterville and other villages would be served by the railway. JAPS IN MANCHURIA
ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—A special despatch received here from Harbin, Manchuria, says that Japan is sending large reinforcements into Manchuria and that the soldiers are spreading along the frontier.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 22.—Negotiations are proceeding this morning between Nizim Pasha, the Commander of the First Army corps which garrisons Constantinople and the commanding general of the army of investment on the following points: The disbandment of 5,000 time expired men in the Constantinople garrison, and the replacement of the remainder of the garrison by Saloniki troops; the punishment of soldiers according to the degree of their guilt in the revolutionary movement of last week, and the transfer of the policing of Constantinople to the reformed Macedonian gendarmerie, all of these conditions to be executed with care and moderation in order to prevent bloodshed. The investment of Constantinople by the constitutionalists is practically complete. Contingents of the third army corps have been sent to points in Asia Minor, notably Eski Shehr, a station on the Anatolia railway to intercept fugitives; and cut off communication on the Anatolia railway to Itrion. LONDON, April 22.—A private telegram received here today from a well informed source at Constantinople says that the deposition of the Sultan is by no means a certainty.

BLOWN TO PIECES BY DYNAMITE WHILE ASLEEP
Tennessee Man Murdered by a Bomb— His Wife, at His Side, Escaped Unhurt.
CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 22.—Rudolph Buol, aged 55, was assassinated at a late hour last night while asleep. The murderer opened Mr. Buol's bedroom window and placed a stick of dynamite on his bed, exploding it with a fuse. Buol was instantly killed. His wife asleep at his side escaped without injury. A posse was immediately formed to search for the assassin. No motive is assigned for the crime.

TOBIQUE BILL DROPPED UNTIL NEXT SESSION
Federal Representatives Lead to a Postponement of This Legislation.
FREDERICTON, N. B., April 22.—The corporations committee this morning after due consideration, decided to hang up the Tobique Pulp Mill until next year. The Premier said that in view of the representations made on behalf of the Dominion Government, he thought this step advisable and in the meantime enquiries could be made and some satisfactory arrangement might be reached. With this the entire committee agreed and the bill was withdrawn from this session.

PARIS, April 22.—The General Federation of Labor has called upon the unions throughout the country to join in a general demonstrative strike on May day.

TEHRAN, April 22.—The British and Russian diplomatic representatives were received in audience by the Shah today and they advised him to proclaim amnesty to all political offenders and to restore the constitution. The Shah promised to reply within a few days.

ITALIAN SENTENCED FOR MURDERING COMPANION

ROCKLAND, Me., April 21—Having been denied by the full bench of the Supreme Court the privilege of a new trial, Domenico Teti was this afternoon sentenced in the County Supreme Court to life imprisonment for the murder of Raphael Conforto, 187, following a drunken dispute at a card game. Since his conviction two years ago, Teti has been in Knox County jail, pending action on his appeal. The court sentenced Charles Good, who pleaded guilty to breaking, entering and larceny, to two years in state prison.

\$300 ROOMS EXEMPT BUT POOR MAN MUST PAY FIVE DOLLARS POLL TAX

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 21.—The bill in amendment to the assessment law was disposed of before the House today. The amendment was expected to last for two or three days before the date of elections to all parties interested met in consultation with the result that a compromise was reached. The amendment regarding the taxing of banks, placing the assessment at one-tenth of one per cent on the volume of business instead of one-twelfth as present, was on agreement withdrawn, as was the section respecting the taxation of the street railway. In the latter case, however, it was agreed that the company and the city of St. John should draw up and enter into an agreement as set out in the act of 1908.

Only Important One
The only amendment of importance in the bill which was recommended by the committee was that in respect to the right of franchise and exemption to the extent of \$300 be exempt, but the poll tax be placed at \$5 and the right of franchise given, and that in order to have the right of franchise taxes for the year must be paid four days before election. Under the present law those who have not paid taxes for two years have the power to have the same cancelled for one hundred dollars, are exempt, but the poll tax is placed at \$2. On incomes over one thousand dollars there is to be no exemption. The other amendments to the bill were allowed to stand and this form the bill will be presented to the House.

Had Got Together
When the committee resumed at 4.30, Mr. Pickett said all parties had since adjournment got together. Bill 33 would be withdrawn and they had agreed to amendments providing etc.

GASTRO'S FRIENDS ON HAND TO AID

Generals Who Defied Gomez Waited in Trinidad in Hope of Blow at Venezuela.
CARACAS, Venezuela, April 20.—In the belief that General Castro would be permitted to land in Trinidad and there start a campaign against President Gomez, two friends of his are there. They are General Luciano Mendive, late captain of the State of Guayrico, who defied the power of Gomez by murdering the military commander of the State and fleeing into Colombia with his garrison, and General Torres, a natural son of Castro, who defied the Gomez administration by killing General Parra, a brother-in-law of Castro, who had been sent to govern the State of Colon Territory. The decision of the High Federal and Cassation Court, which indicts General Castro for the crime of murder in the person of General Antonio Parra, has been a severe blow to the conditions on Sunday in the Republic, and in consequence of this the suspension of the Republic, decreed against General Castro by the General Assembly of the Republic, on February 11, in the criminal suit instituted against him by the Attorney General of the nation, continues in force.

General Castro would have a hard time of it if he should attempt to start a revolution at this time. Political circles believe that his only chance is to sit down and patiently wait for the day when the military government will break out in the present government. When his enemies begin to fight one another, he will have a chance to land in Venezuela and make a last desperate effort to regain his lost power and chastise his enemies for bringing about his overthrow and humiliation. Sancho Panza, a Caracas daily newspaper, in an editorial entitled "Waiting for Napoleon," comments on Castro as follows: "Deep alarm has been caused throughout the country by the news of Castro's embarking for Venezuela. He is a species of demon who carved out during nine years of misfortune of Venezuela and at present is the lightning of women and of faint hearted men. Castro never will pardon Venezuela nor the men responsible for the events of December for the enormous crime of overthrowing him. Our monarch will not resign himself to be so bloodily overthrown and he says that sovereignty of his kind can only be overthrown by death. He is eloquent in the tribune, coolly fortunate in war and a ferocious and implacable bird of prey in peace."

PRINCE GEORGE'S REMORSE Details of the Homicide Which Depreled Servia of Her.

BELOGRADE, April 21.—The resignation of the Crown Prince of Servia was not due to political complications, but, as already hinted at in cable dispatches, to the fact that in a spasm of temper he killed his valet, named Kokolovic, and was filled with remorse. Here are the details of the tragedy as authoritatively related by a member of the palace staff.

BELLS AND CHIMES RING IN HISTORY

Their Use Very Ancient, Bible Tells of Them.

Chimes on Old Trinity, N. Y., Oldest in United States—Others Have Romantic History.

(Bazaar Commercial). The story of the bell contains more of the civilized world to Christianity than any other inanimate thing known in history. Its use since the earliest times has been chiefly ceremonial, and mainly consecrated to religious purposes.

The use of bells is very ancient. We read of them in the tabernacle of Jewish high priests. The Chinese temple bells are doubtless far older than Judaism, and the warhorses of the ancient Babylonian and Assyrian armies were hung with them, as well as the steeds of the Greeks in the Trojan wars.

Trinity credits the first use of bells in convoking church congregations to Paulinus, Bishop of Nole, in Campania, about 400 A. D., though Jerome mentions one at an earlier date than this. In the time of Peter in the seventh century, their use in religious worship was well established.

The venerable bells of Trinity were introduced into England in 670 A. D., and the churches throughout Switzerland, Germany and the Netherlands, especially Belgium, were soon using their bells in calling the faithful to worship.

Henry VIII. GAMBLER WITH BELLS. Except in Scotland, the Reformation spared the bells. Even the "passing bell" was retained. But while the psalms were meritorially to be preserved them, even though associated with a faith other than his own, the soldier was less merciful to the bells.

The chime, or carillon, is native to Belgium, where Peter van den Gheyn struck a medal to commemorate the Louvain. Now large carillons of 49 bells and more are common there, and are found in many parts of Europe.

W. D. Scott, commissioner of immigration, was before the House of Commons today. He estimated that about 200,000 immigrants will come to Canada this year. Last year the arrivals totalled 165,000, which was a decrease of 44 per cent. over the previous year.

NEW I. C. R. BOARD. The new international railway board of management, which was appointed last week, will meet at the Ministry of Railways and its deputy here on Monday for organization.

THE LARGEST SINGLE BELL. In Vredryck Fyppes's old brick church in Sleepy Hollow, in the Hudson valley, still hangs the bell with the date "1838" on its side, though its peeling has long been still. Other church bells not so still as this are those that compose the chime in St. Louis Cathedral, New Orleans.

THE LARGEST SINGLE BELL. The largest single bell in this country is probably that of Montreal Cathedral, which weighs 28,500 pounds. That in the New York City Hall weighed 20,000 pounds, but was recast into five smaller bells.

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
