CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This association, composed only of Ministers and Delegates, who shall be members of the Churches which they resent, shall be styled 'The Western N. B. Baptist Association.'

Axr. 2. The Association shall meet Annually, at 2 o'clock,
P. M., on the 1st Saturday of September, at such place as they
shall appoint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The

Aar. S. Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one

gate or more; but no Church, however numerous, shall be ensitled to a greater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

ART. 4. At each meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preceding year shall call for the vote for a Moderator, and the person who shall be chosen by a majority of the members present chall, apper his acceptance lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain due order among the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk, to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during their Session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the Bress-sengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the additions and diminution within the last year; and generally of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, to-gether with the whole number of members in communion. ANY 6. Any 7. When a Church shall neglect to make any communication.

the Minutes, unless two or more members shall request its continuance, and shall engage to inquire into its standing, and report at
the next meeting of the Association.

Art. 8. Althought as an Association, we disclaim all power over
the Churches, so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline, yet we down thour privilege to judge for,
ourselves of the propriety of continuing any church or Minister in
our connexton, which to us shall appear to be unacriptural in prinsiple, or irregular in practice. In order however, that we may
not withdraw our fellowship without sufficient reason from any
Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made by two
snembers of this body, it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a Committee to investigate the points of complaint, and report the result of their inquiries to the Association, that they may

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

Scarcely a church is to be found where some member does not harbour iniquity in his heart against his brother, and yet his name stands on the Church book, and he is returned year after year to the Association as a member in good standing. It may be that some of the Messengers and Delegates who hear the letters and bring the statistics of their several charches think that other churches are in better standing then their own; yet we fear that we are not all thes ignorant, and that while we send a letter giving an account of the state of the church, we are not as honest as we a be in the sight of God. One great reason why so many remain un-reconciled to their brethren, is the total ne flect of the law of Christ. We are told "If then hast aught against thy brother, fell him fault between him and thee alone." Flow seldom is this done. But it a difficulty takes place, it is related, it may be, to a church member, told to a neighbour, the ungodly and the inventiont spread the news, and in a short time, we see how great a matter a little fire kindleth that might at first, by attending to the law of Christ, have been quenched by a lew penitential tears. So long as we lean to our own understanding and disregard or treat with indifference or contempt the law of Zion's King, so long may we expect that the disapprobation of Heaven will rest upon us. Are there not many who have hardness against their brethren, who yet expects pect to ascend to glory end to God? Hear the Lord's language upon it, "except ve from your heart forgive every one his brother, neither will your heavenly Father forgive you, but if ye forgive men their trespasses even so will your heavenly Father forgive yours." If there be those in the church who will not honour the law of Christ, who respect not the law nor the lawgiver, shall we allow such to remain as church members? I fear by such a course of conduct, we wink at their iniquity, and of necessity become partakers of their sia. Should we not beware lest we also being led away with the error of the wicked fall from our own stendinstness? Let us rather by pureness, by knowledge, by the Word of God, (that word which is profitable for reproof, for correction and for instruction in righteousness,) endeavour to keep ourselves in the love of God, in the unity of the Spirit, and in the bonds of peace.
