## CARTER-VENIOT AND REST OF MACHINE PANIC STRICKEN, TRY TO HAVE OFFICIAL REPORT OF THE CONFESSION ALTERED—DUGAL REFUSES TO BECOME A SCAPEGOAT.

Special to The Standard. Fredericton, April 28.—The Legislature is to be prorogued tomorrow morning by Lieut. Governor Wood. The House is called to meet at 8.30 o'clock and just as soon as formal proceedings required for the opening of a day's business have been completed the Governor will enter the Assembly Chamber, give his consent to a number of bills and then make his speech proroguing the House.

## MILITARY EXPERT PREDICTS HUN DRIVE BY ARMY AND FLEET

## RELIEF SHIP ON WAY TO KUT-EL-AMARA GROUNDS IN TIGRIS

Only aerial and artillery activities mark the progress of the war on the European fields, but the British have met with reverses both in Egypt and Mesopotamia. In a battle near Quatia, according to reports from Constantinople, a British force of four cavalry squadrons has been annihilated by the Turks who captured 300 prisoners, besides inflicting heavy losses.

## CARVELL GIVEN ANOTHER JOLT.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, April 28.—The proceedings before the Meredith-Duff commission today came close to the main charges. Just before the adjournment until Monday, Mr. Meredith abruptly asked Col. Carnegie, the chief expert-witness, when he first heard of a commission to be paid anyone. Col. Carnegie at once replied that he had never heard of such a thing until he saw it in the speech of E. W. Kyle in the House of Commons. He denied emphatically that these had ever been any mention of commissions or remuneration to any promoters or any one connected with the contract.

## MAJOR MARTIN MUST PAY \$1000 FINE FOR CONTEMPT OF COURT

Montreal, April 28.—In the court of King's bench, appeal side, this afternoon, Chief Justice Archibald, who presided, confirmed, in a judgment handed down by him, the fine of \$1,000 imposed upon Mayor Martin by Mr. Justice McLennan for contempt of court in connection with the discussion of a new transportation agreement with the Tramways Company last June.

## WAGE INCREASE FOR EMPLOYEES OF PAPER MILLS.

New York, April 28.—The International Paper Company, operating mills in New York, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine, has granted a wage increase of approximately 19 per cent. to its employees, effective May 1. It was made known at the company's headquarters here today.

## TROUBLE IN DUBLIN GONE BEYOND LIMITS OF A RIOT

LATE REPORTS FROM SEAT OF DISTURBANCE SAY THAT SITUATION WHILE UNDER CONTROL IS STILL SERIOUS—LIBERTY HALL SHELLED BY GUNBOAT BEFORE OCCUPIED—RIOTERS DIG TRENCHES IN ST. STEPHEN'S GREEN AND ARE DRIVEN OUT WITH BOMBS.

Dublin, Tuesday, April 25, via London, April 28. (10.15 a. m.)—Dublin has now been held up for twenty-four hours by a combination of members of the Sinn Fein Society and followers of James Larkin, head of the "Transport Workers' Union, and will known as a strike leader.

The Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, in a proclamation, calls the government "insurrectionary," and declares that it is due to foreign prompting. It is, he says, "small." He adds that "stern measures are being taken to suppress it."

Yesterday (Monday) at midday the Sinn Fein revolutionists were assembled as if for one of their usual parades. They were supposed to be going out for an Easter Monday march. Some of the rank and file even imagined that this was their purpose.

## EIGHT GERMAN PLOTTERS ARE INDICTED

New York, April 28.—The federal grand jury returned an indictment today against the eight Germans recently arrested on the charge of engaging in a conspiracy to place incendiary bombs on ships carrying munitions for the Entente Allies and against Dr. Walter T. Schuele, president of the Agriculture Chemical Company, the alleged leader of the conspiracy, who has not yet been arrested.

## PROVINCE TO GET 40 P.C. OF GROSS EARNINGS

Hon. Dr. Reid Gives Notice of Resolution Providing for Dominion and Provincial Co-operation in Completing Valley Railway and Operation by Government Railways.

Ottawa, April 28.—Hon. Dr. Reid acting minister of railways has given notice of a resolution in the Commons providing for Dominion and Provincial co-operation in completing the construction of the St. John Valley Railway and the operation of the road by the Intercolonial.

The resolution provides for the usual subsidy by the Dominion of \$6,400 per mile for the following lines: (a) From Andover to Centreville, not exceeding 26 miles; (b) from Centreville to Gasquetown, not exceeding 120 miles; (c) from Gasquetown to a point on the C. P. R. at or near Westfield, not to exceed 45 miles.

The resolution further authorizes the governor-in-council to empower the minister of railways to enter into an agreement with the government of New Brunswick and the St. John and Quebec Railway Company subject to the necessary legislation being passed by New Brunswick, whereby the company shall construct up to a standard for safe operation the railway from Gasquetown to Westfield on or before February 1, 1917, and shall complete the construction and equipment of the line from Centreville to Andover by the end of December, 1918, and upon the making of the said agreement the Dominion shall enter upon an interim lease of the Dominion line from Centreville to Gasquetown and upon the completion of the line from Gasquetown to Westfield the Dominion shall enter into a lease thereof and operate the same pending the completion of the remaining line to Andover, in accordance with terms and conditions to be agreed upon in each case, including the 40 per cent. and 60 per cent. division of gross earnings. The resolution further recites that as soon as the lines referred to have been constructed and equipped to the satisfaction of the minister of railways, the Dominion will enter into a lease of these lines and operate them for a term of 99 years.

## WOODSTOCK MAN SENTENCED TO TWO YEARS IN DORCHESTER

**GOV'T ACTION WAS IN ALLIES BEST INTERESTS**

Sir Geo. Foster Defends Commandeering of Wheat Last Fall—Most Prompt Action and Big Saving of Money.

Ottawa, April 28.—An explanation and a defence of the government's action in commandeering some thirteen million bushels of grain last fall was made by Sir George Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, in the House today. Sir George said that owing to the abnormal crop of the world over the government urged upon the Allies and the British government that large orders should be placed. After considerable negotiations an order for wheat and oats was received last Nov. 23. It was a large order, principally for Italy where there was a serious wheat shortage. The order was a rush one.

The government considered the best method of securing such a big order in a hurry. There were three possible plans. One was to buy direct from the farmers, this would take time, and in view of the nature of the order and the fact that navigation on the Great Lakes was nearing a close it was not feasible. Another plan was to purchase through brokers. This would have meant a heavy commission, while the news was bound to leak out and the market would have gone sky rocketing. The third plan was to commandeer the grain in the elevators in Port William and Port Arthur and the eastern ports. This was decided upon as it meant speedy action and would save money for the allied governments.

Sir George admitted that difficulties were afterwards met with, but any plan would have resulted in difficulties. The Allies also, owing to the shortage of tonnage on the Atlantic were unable to secure vessels to carry away the grain. The result was that the last of it would only leave the next month. The government carried out its part of the bargain and took it for granted the Allies would arrange to supply the ships.

Incidentally, during the course of his speech, Sir George told the house of the remarkable development of the grain inspection during the past four years since the appointment of the grain commission. Canada was now one of the best equipped countries in the world in regard to grain elevators. Last year over three hundred million bushels were inspected at Winnipeg. The only objection of the Liberals to the commandeering of grain was that it had interfered with legitimate business, although the only persons whose corns were hurt were the brokers and middlemen of the Winnipeg exchange.

Sir Wilfrid said such action should only have been taken as a case of dire need and the necessity was not pressing. The grain could have been purchased in the ordinary way.

## GOV'T ACTION WAS IN ALLIES BEST INTERESTS

**CONDITIONS IN MEXICO FAR FROM BRIGHT**

Washington, April 28.—Conditions in Mexico City were reported today to the state department from confidential sources as "bad from every point of view," and that description was said to include the capital and the immediate surrounding territory. Food supplies were reported not sufficient, and the railways are unable at present to relieve that condition.

The pursuit of Villa by American troops, the advices said, bids fair to make him a hero of national proportions, and has had a natural effect upon the Carranza government. The financial situation was given as poor.

## WAR GROUP AGAIN SHOWS BUOYANCY

Market Was Strong and Active—Foreign Outlook More Hopeful.

U.S. STEEL ONLY BIG STOCK TO HANG BACK

Sluggishness Attributed to Foreign Liquidation—Closing Hour Enlivened by Urgent Demand for Mercantile Marine.

New York, April 28.—The same forces that contributed so appreciably to yesterday's strong and active market were again in evidence today, albeit in more moderate measure. Steel, bond shares and other investment stocks added variably to their gains, the rise being stimulated by further reportable statements of earnings.

A large portion of the trading element which bases its operations primarily on the foreign outlook inclined to increased hopefulness, most advice, apart from the Irish revolt, making for greater encouragement. The strength of Mexican oil stocks spoke more confidence in that quarter.

Realizing was again the dominant issue among the rails, adding 2 points to its substantial advance of the preceding session, while Union Pacific, Atchafalpa, St. Paul, New York Central, and some of the bituminous shares rose a point or more. In well-informed quarters it was believed that a satisfactory adjustment of the anthracite controversy would soon be announced. Gains in the rear group showed the irregular range of 1 to 4 points, with 10 1/2 for Bethlehem Steel. Coppers, oils, motors, sugars and fertilizers improved one to three points, while half a score of miscellaneous stocks, including American Tobacco and American Coal Products, were lifted three to five points.

United States Steel was almost the only important stock to hang back, scoring only a slight gain at the outset and manifesting restraint thereafter. For want of a better explanation Wall Street seemed disposed to accept the theory that steel's relative sluggishness resulted from foreign liquidation.

The last hour's trading was enlivened by an urgent demand for Mercantile Marine, the preferred rising 3 3/4 to 5, duplicating its record price of the early year. The common rose 7 1/2 to 24 1/2, within a fraction of its record, recently made.

There was nothing to account for the uprush in these stocks, which was scored at the expense of most other leading issues, one of which yielded the greater part of their gains of the forenoon. Total sales amounted to \$80,000,000.

For March Norfolk and Western reported a net gain of \$1,322,000, Northern Pacific \$181,000, Lackawanna \$761,000 and Chesapeake & Ohio \$460,000.

Bonds were firm, but without especial feature. Total sales, par value, \$7,800,000.

THE GOVERNMENT AND PROHIBITION.

These antagonists to the Provincial Government, and who welcome any action or event that seems to afford opportunity of manufacturing capital against it are now circulating stories to the effect that in the introduction of a prohibition measure the Government lacked sincerity and fixed May 1st, 1917, as the date on which the act would come into force in the hope that, in the meantime, events might so shape themselves that the measure need never become operative.

GERMANY DESPERATE.

If the opinion of the military critics of the Paris Staff represents anything more than ordinary common sense in the war situation, then Germany indeed is in desperate straits. Major De Civriens who, it may be recalled, predicted the successful defeat of the Mons to the Marne, the defeat of the Gallipoli campaign, now gives it as his opinion that the Germans are about to undertake a great concerted military and naval move against the Anglo-French lines and the coasts of France and Britain. This, he believes, will be the last and greatest of Germany's offensives.

A GENTLEMAN GONE.

The death of E. T. C. Knowles, Probate Judge of the city and county of St. John, which occurred yesterday morning after a brief illness, marks the passing of a gentle, kindly spirit, and a good citizen. Judge Knowles, while long well known and esteemed, had never aspired to public honors, being content rather to devote his life to his profession, his family and his friends. A gentleman in all that the word implies he was ever a wise counsellor and a true friend.

CARTER REPUTIATED.

That the scandal mongering tactics of Grit Organizer E. S. Carter have disgusted even the leader of the opposition party in the Legislature of the Province, is evident from the frank statement made yesterday morning by Mr. Dugal.

Capt. Tilley's Speech On Prohibition Bill

Owing to a mishap yesterday morning part of the remarks made by Capt. Tilley in the legislature in reference to the prohibition were credited to Hon. Mr. Baxter instead of to Capt. Tilley. The report of Capt. Tilley's speech should have read: On motion to report the bill, Mr. Tilley said that there were many features of it with which he was not in favor. In fact objectionable features of the bill were, in his mind, so apparent that he had no hesitation in saying that in the interest of public sobriety he would prefer to have the present liquor license act with its present local option prohibitive clause really in force.

DAYLIGHT SAVING.

One of the last official acts of His Worship Mayor Frink was to sign the proclamation by which it shall be legal for the residents of the city of St. John to adopt the Daylight Saving proposition during the summer months. The plan is very simple. His Worship requests that at eleven o'clock on Sunday, April 30th, all citizens set their clocks one hour ahead and at the same hour on the last Sunday in September set back their clocks one hour.

The advantages of the Daylight Saving plan have been very apparent in portions of Canada where it has been in effect for several summers. In New Brunswick the twenty-four minutes of daylight gained by the adoption of Atlantic Standard time was regarded as a boon for the year following its adoption; after that period the people became so accustomed to it that it was looked upon as the natural thing. There has yet to come to light the first well grounded case of complaint.

We venture to predict that the new plan will also be regarded with high satisfaction. Workers who have leisure after six o'clock in the evening will find that they can indulge in sports and pastimes to an extent which, under the present conditions, is impossible. The added hour of daylight will make outdoor life and exercise more attractive and generally work to the well-being of the great mass of the people. It is regrettable that there are in the province communities which do not see eye to eye with the proposal, but after one summer's experience they will probably come into line. There may be, and probably will be, some local objections and some cases where the new plan will cause minor inconveniences, but generally it will prove a distinct step in advance.
